Steers Topped By Friona In Tournament

The Farwell Steers went down in defeat to the Friona Chieftains in the final game of the invitational tournament held in Farwell over the past weekend. Final score Friona 44-Farwell 34.

Larry Buckley of Friona was high point man for the game with 14 points to his credit. Dale Milner contributed 12 and Gene Weatherly found the basket for 10 for Friona.

Warren Gossett led Steer scoring with a total of 10 points. Larry Gregory and Johnny Atkinson each contributed seven to the Steer effort. Jerry Childs and Charlie Dannheim contributed six and four, respectively.

In other tournament games the Steers were successful in defeating Bovina and Amherst. Final score in the Bovina game was Farwell 68-Bovina 41.

Larry Gregory led Steer scoring in this game with 14 points. Also hitting in the double figures were Jerry Childs - 13 and Jerry Fields - 12. Others scoring were Charlie Dannheim, Johnny Atkinson, Warren Gossett, Doyle Johnson, Johnny Schell and Bruce Billingsley.

Gene Pruitt with 11 was high for the Bovina quintet. Scotty

Rundell contributed nine and Jerry Roach hit for seven.

Second game of the tourney saw Farwell defeating Amherst by the lopsided score of 67-31. Jerry Childs took scoring honors with 18 points closely followed by Johnny Atkinson with 15.

Other boys contributing scores to the Steer tally were Doyle Johnson, Jerry Field, Warren Gossett, Dale Gober, Bruce Billingsley, Larry Gregory, and Charlie Dannheim.

James McAdams with 13 points was high for Amherst. No other Amherst player hit in the double figures.

The two Farwell girls teams went down in defeat to teams from Amherst, Muleshoe, Hart and Bovina.

In the Farwell B-Amherst game Jackie Gast sparked Farwell scoring with 12 points to her credit. Others contributing to the scoring were Sharon Busbice, Debbie Hargrove and

Nelda Winegeart. Kathy Campbell with 21 points led Amherst scoring. Wanda Durham contributed 14 to the Amherst effort.

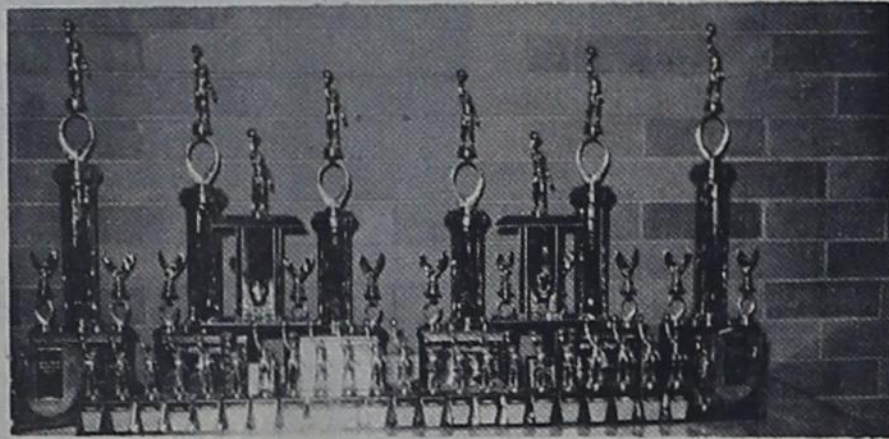

Groundbreaking Sunday

Ground breaking ceremonies were held at the Texico First Baptist church on Sunday morning immediately following the morning worship service for the new church building which is to be erected, south of the present church location. Cost of the building is expected to be approximately \$49,000. Contract for construction of the building was awarded to George Taylor of Friona in a meeting of the planning committee on Dec. 9.

The building, of masonry construction will be 44' x 100' and will house an auditorium, with seating capacity for 400 persons, in addition to a pastors study and a nursery (which will include a cry room). Construction on the building will possibly begin late this month or early in February and is due to be completed by early

summer (possibly June), according to the pastor Leroy Looper.

Serving as chairman of the building committee was Murray White, who is also chairman of the Board of Deacons. Others serving with White in addition to the pastor were D.J. Brown, Bill Boling, Mrs. B. A. Kelley, Mrs. Buddy Pearce and Kathy White.

The old church building in use since the early 1900's will be used for an additional educational plant when the new building is completed, says the pastor.

At the Sunday ceremonies, Mrs. B. A. Kelley, had prepared and read the church history (dating from 1904 to the present date). No one is sure when the church was first organized since no minutes were

kept until 1904. Earl Landtroop, Associational Missionary for this area gave the ceremonial prayer for the groundbreaking ceremony.

Members joining in turning a shovel of earth simultaneously were Mrs. J.O. Ford, oldest member of the church; Alan Halle, youngest member of the church; Olan Schlueter, oldest member in number of years belonged to local church; Murray White, chairman of the building committee and Board of Deacons; Kathy White, representing the young people and Rev. Earl Landtroop, Associational missionary.

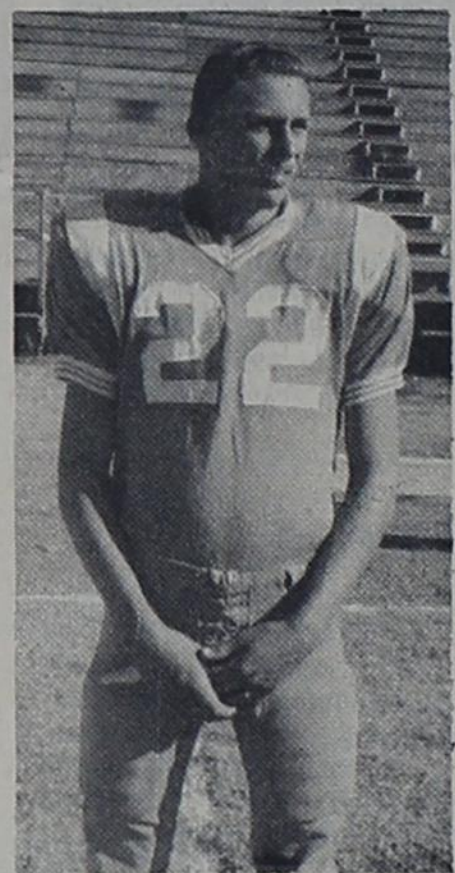

Two Steers Named To Regional Team

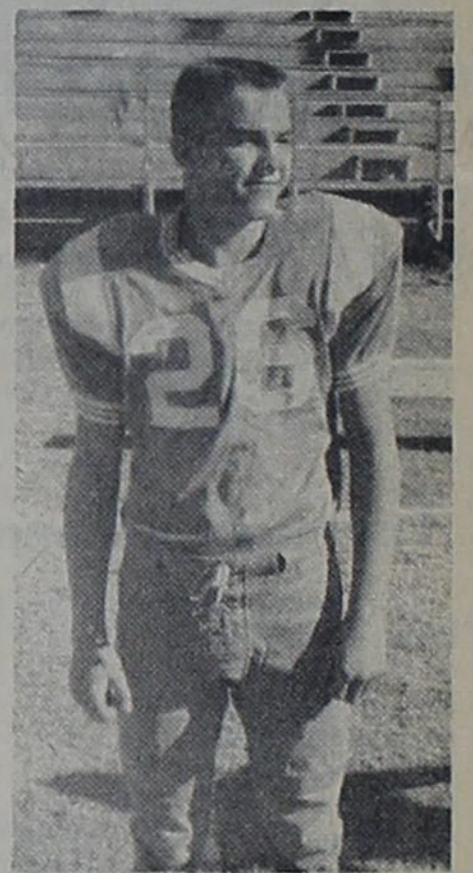

Receives Medal

Airman Charles W. Chisman, U.S.N., son of Mr. and Mrs. Chase V. Chisman received the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal while serving aboard the antisubmarine aircraft carrier USS Kearsarge in the Far East.

The medal was awarded to all crewmembers of the U.S. Seventh Fleet carrier which provided anti-submarine warfare protection for ships of the fleet operating in the South China Sea off the coast of Viet Nam after Viet Cong PT boat attacks against U.S. destroyers in the Gulf of Tonkin.

The Kearsarge returned to its home port, Long Beach, Calif., Dec. 16 following six months operation in the Far East as the major anti-submarine warfare ship of the Seventh Fleet. Although the Kearsarge spent most of its time off Viet Nam, the ship was also afforded visits to such foreign ports as Subic Bay, Phillipine Islands, Hong Kong, B.C.C., and Sasebo and Yokosuka, Japan. Enroute to the Far East the ship also visited Pearl Harbor.

Upon returning to the United States, the 18 year old carrier will enter the shipyard for a six month overhaul in drydock.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From The State Capitol

AUSTIN -- Just one year and four months ago, the state law establishing the office of Regulatory Loan Commissioner -- called the "Loan Shark Law" -- went into effect.

Opening of that state office marked the end of more than 36 years of legislative battles over regulatory control of loan companies. Actually, that part of the law which provides for the licensing of those making loans of \$1,500 or less, once they meet rather rigid licensing standards, didn't become effective until December 23, 1963.

Since that time, some 1,800 loan offices have been licensed. Commissioner Frank Miskell says that 22 examiners have made a thorough check of the books and records of 724 offices.

Also, the agency's enforcement division has investigated 154 complaints by individuals against lenders. According to Miskell, 72 of the complaints involved alleged overcharges or refund shortages. But most of the investigations revealed that borrowers had not been overcharged. "They just woke up to the high cost of borrowing money."

Forty of the complaints involved charges of harassment or unreasonable collection efforts. Investigation of these led to the discovery that some complaints were unjustified. Also, some were beyond the jurisdiction of the Loan Commissioner. These have been referred to district courts.

Other complaints ranged from hip-pocket (unlicensed) lenders to concealment of facts that should have been revealed in license applications. At the close of the agency's first year of operation, all but four of the cases were classified as "settled."

Miskell says that the "big ones" -- the complaints that will be subject to public hearings and possible revocation of license -- will be coming up early in 1965.

EGG PRODUCERS GET REMINDER -- Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reminds egg retailers and industry men that after January 1 all egg containers must bear the license number of the grader-packer.

Number identifies eggs and fixes responsibility for grading or labeling violations, White said. Also it is aimed at preventing out-of-state firms from shipping eggs into Texas without paying required fees.

Producers who sell eggs from their own flock on an ungraded basis do not have to have a license number. New provision of the law was passed by the Texas Egg Marketing Advisory Board last summer. License numbers were assigned on September 1 when the annual re-registration period began.

BOB HOPE TALKS TEXAS -- A special premiere of a film designed to tell the "true story" of Texas will be held in Austin on January 13, when "Bob Hope Talks Texas" will be shown to Gov. John Connally, members of the Legislature and other state officials.

Film was produced through efforts of the Texas Industrial Commission, it was financed by 14 industries and chambers of commerce. Purpose is to sell persons in other states and other countries on Texas and its business, industry and tourist attractions.

E. B. Germany, chairman, said the commission hopes that the film will have some impact on plant location decisions -- and that it will "hit at the image that Texas is all cowboys, Indians and sage brush."

TAX ESTIMATES DUE -- R. L. Phinney, administrative officer of the Internal Revenue Service, reminds farmers and ranchers that Friday, January 15, 1965, is the final day for filing their estimated Federal

income tax returns for 1964. That is unless they have arranged to file their final return on or before February 15.

Phinney said that farmers and ranchers who do file estimated returns on January 15 and pay the tax due on the estimate have until April 15 to file final returns and pay balances of taxes due.

Tax law defines a farmer or rancher as one who earns two-thirds or more of his gross income from farming or ranching.

OPTIMISTIC NOTE FOR OILMEN -- Dr. Robert B. Williamson, research associate with UT's Bureau of Business Research, says Texas oil producers have grounds for cautious optimism concerning 1965.

He notes that while mid-December stocks of Texas crude were at the lowest point in 16 years, prospects for greater demand were in view. State crude oil production allowable for January was raised to the highest level in two years.

Williamson reports that the U. S. Defense Department, an important oil and gas customer, plans to increase its military purchases of petroleum fuels by three per cent during the fiscal year ending in June, 1965.

He points out that crude production rose one per cent the first 11 months of 1964, and oil and gas well completions also were up fractionally.

INAUGURAL INVITATIONS -- Some 40,000 Texans have received invitations to the two big state political-social events of the season -- the gala Democratic victory dinner on January 25 and the inauguration of Governor Connally and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith on January 26.

Party leaders hope to set new attendance and financial records at the \$25 a plate dinner. Speaking will be limited to a minimum for political functions, probably confined to Connally, Smith and House Speaker Byron Tunnell.

Inauguration ceremonies will be simple and brief. **REDISTRICTING DELAY?** -- High Texas political leaders have not given up on thwarting federal court-ordered legislative redistricting on the basis of population alone.

Connally, Smith and Tunnell all have made known their support of efforts to amend the U. S. Constitution permitting state senates to be selected with consideration given to geography, as well as head count.

Tunnell was chairman of the resolutions committee, at the recent General Assembly of the States, which called on all states to petition Congress for a constitutional convention on re-apportionment.

Look for two resolutions to be introduced on this subject during the 1965 session of the Texas Legislature. One will call for a constitutional convention to consider an amendment reserving to states the right to determine makeup of their subordinate political subdivisions.

Another version may simply urge Congress to submit such an amendment for ratification by three-fourths of the states. Actions by 34 state legislatures would be necessary to require Congress to call a federal convention. Apparently, a simple majority vote of Congress could set the convention in motion. A two-thirds majority in Congress is necessary for outright submission of an amendment to the states.

Under a federal court decision, Texas lawmakers have an August 2 deadline staring them in the face for completion of legislative redistricting. Nevertheless, some continue to hope that they will find a way out through a constitutional amendment.

S. Bishop so stated in commenting on a presidential advisory committee report which criticized the Guard in some states for balking toward integration.

Bishop said the Texas National Guard began integrating early in 1960. It now has about 200 Negroes (two per cent of the force). A number are non-com's but none are officers. "There are no rules, regulations or practices in the state military forces of Texas that discriminate against any racial minority," Bishop stated.

The U. S. Coast Guard, as we know it today, was established January 28, 1915.

In May, 1964, the Coast Guard placed in operation the world's first atom-powered lighthouse in Chesapeake Bay, Md. It is anticipated that ultimately automatic facilities will supplant many of the manned light stations now in use.

During 1964, members of the U. S. Coast Guard were responsible for saving nearly 3,000 lives and rescue of ships and cargo valued at more than 2.1 billion dollars.

PORTALES (Special) - Excerpts from a John Steinbeck novel and a Jules Feiffer cartoon will launch Readers' Theatre, and Innovation in University Theatre productions at Eastern New Mexico University, Friday night (Jan. 8). No admission charge will be made for the 8 p. m. presentation in the university Theatre. Director will be Dr. Don B. Wilmeth, assistant professor in speech and drama. Dr. Wilmeth calls Readers' Theatre a "theatre of the mind," in which oral interpreters read the text "but the audience must mentally furnish the scenery, the costumes, the action, the makeup, and the physical appearance of the characters."

The production will include a cutting from Steinbeck's "The Pearl" and Feiffer's "Passionella." "The Pearl" is the story of a fisherman who found a pearl beyond price, with which he hoped "to buy peace and happiness for himself, his wife and little son. 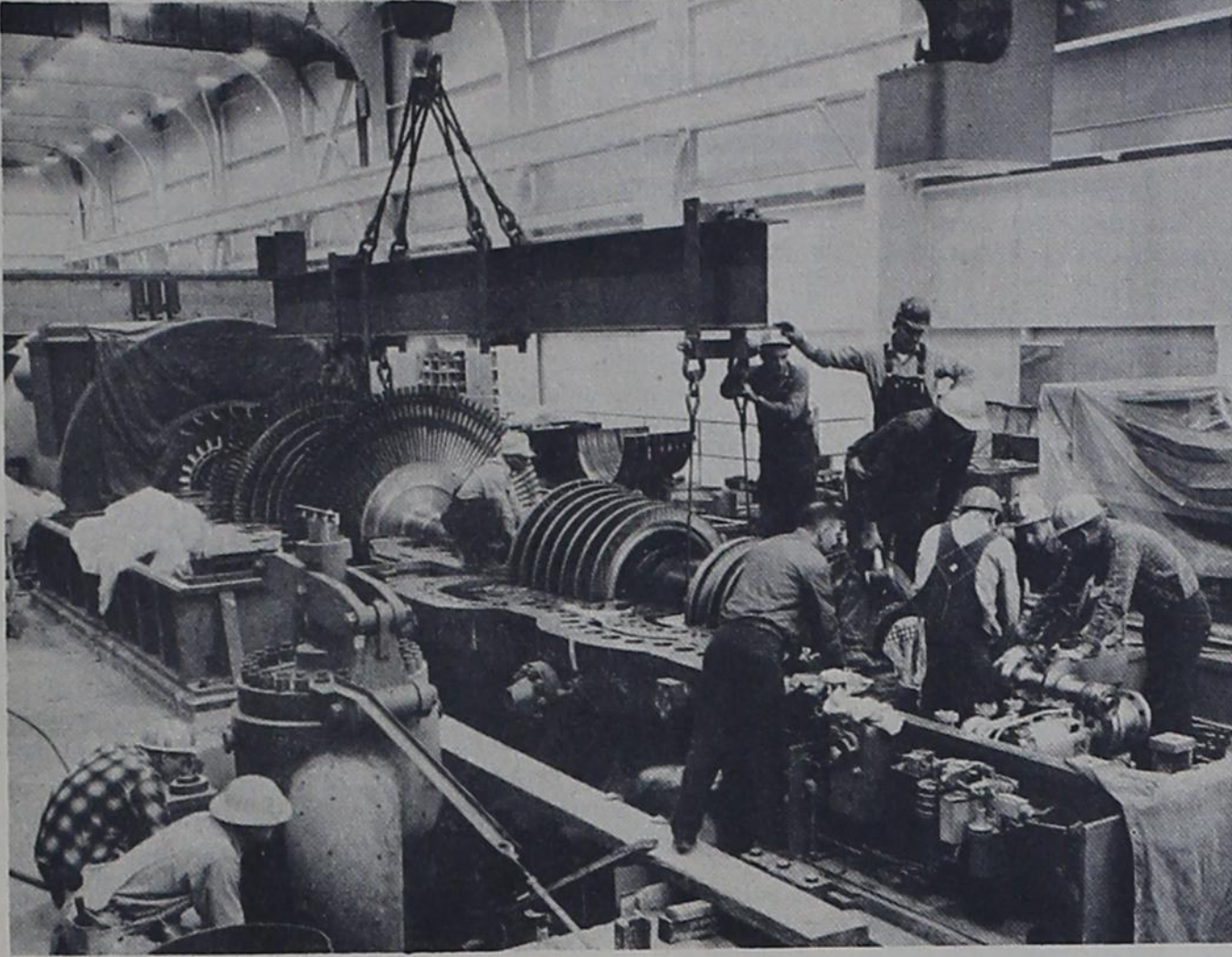

SWPS New Construction Tops \$24 Million

Southwestern Public Service Company's 1965 construction and improvement program calls for an investment of \$24,607,000 in new facilities, it has been announced by A.R. Watson, president and general manager of the electric company.

The company's construction plans for 1965 anticipate the second largest annual improvement program in the company's history, topped only by 1964's record investment of more than \$30,000,000. At the conclusion of the 1965 program, the electric company will have invested nearly \$120,000,000 in new equipment in the 1961-65 period. "One year ago, when we announced a record single year construction budget, our forecast was for continued growth throughout our 45,000 square mile service area. Our optimistic outlook remains

unchanged, as evidenced by the continued high level of new equipment investment we plan for 1965 and the years to follow. Inasmuch as we must begin our planning and

construction to meet our customer's needs from 3 to 5 years in advance of their actual requirements, it is apparent that we anticipate continued economic expansion in our service area", Watson said.

A major portion of the electric company's 1965 construction budget will go for additions to its interconnected generation and transmission system, which includes 11 base-load electric generating stations which are linked together by a 4,000 mile network of high voltage transmission lines. The additions to the generating capability include a 210,000 kilowatt unit to be installed at Cunningham Station, west of Hobbs, New Mexico. The Cunningham addition will be the second 210,000 kilowatt machine to go into service within the period of a year. Plant X, near Earth, Texas, houses the first of these giant generators, the largest single unit in service on the company's system.

The other generating additions to be completed in 1965 are gas turbine units to be installed at Borger and Pampa. These units will be located at industrial plants in each case, with the fuel to be provided by the customer.

At the Borger location, where natural gas will be purchased from the customer for fuel, the exhaust gases will be returned to the customer for use in his plant.

At Pampa, hot pressurized gases which are a by-product of the customer's manufacturing process will serve as the fuel for the turbine. "These 'tailored' installations of generating equipment are indicative of our responsibility to conserve the natural resources of the area we serve. In each case, there will be total utilization of the heat energy present in the gases, and all waste will be eliminated. This, of course, introduces economies for us as well as the customer, and is the type of program we must carry on to keep the customer's price down by keeping our costs down. The benefit of this type of planning goes to all of our customers," Watson said.

1965 will see a continuation of a program started last year to convert the main arteries of the company's transmission network to 230,000 volt lines.

The major voltage was 115,000 volts until this year.

Scheduled for completion this year are 230,000 volt lines running from Plant X to Cunningham Station and from Plant X to Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo.

The 230,000 volt lines have 4 times the carrying capacity of the 115,000 volt circuits and their increased transmission capability ties in with the larger more efficient generating units such as the two new 210,000 kilowatt machines to both improve service and keep it economical.

A 115,000 volt line is being constructed from Amarillo to Borger to provide the electric power for pumping the water through the aqueduct system associated with the Canadian River Dam.

Load growth in the Hereford-Dimmitt area will bring the construction of another 115,000 volt circuit from Plant X to Hereford. This will "firm up" for many years the power supply in this growing region.

"There is great satisfaction in being able to say to our customers once again as a new year starts that their electric service dollar is buying more than ever before. Three things make this record possible. First of all are the customers themselves, who are using more electric power than ever before. They make it possible for dedicated employees working with the most modern and efficient equipment to keep down the price of our service in the face of rising costs for fuel, equipment and labor", Watson concluded.

THE HIGH PLAINS FARM AND HOME

First Federal Assets Over \$45,000,000

Another year of progress and growth was enjoyed by the First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Clovis during 1964, according to the institution's annual report issued today.

Clyde Rayl, president of First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Clovis, said that asset growth of \$5,717,414.00 during 1964 represented a 14.5% increase over total assets held one year ago, and that assets at the end of 1964 stood at \$45,135,390.00

Rayl said that the growth reflected a combination of increases of mortgage loan and savings balances outstanding.

Net savings gains at First Federal in 1964 totaled \$4,078,783.00, bringing total savings held by the institution at year end to \$38,805,547.00—a gain of 11.7% over the 1963 figure.

The institution also reported record annual dividend payments during 1964 totaling \$1,628,392.00 based on a current dividend rate of 4 1/2% per annum.

New mortgage loans made by the association during 1964 amounted to \$12,683,182.00 and the total mortgage loans outstanding at the end of the year climbed to \$40,793,764.00.

In the annual report to the association's savers Rayl commented that during the year, First Federal's board of directors made plans for a new home office building to be constructed at Eighth and Pile Streets, in Clovis. An architect has been hired and it is anticipated that plans and specifications will be ready for contractors to make bids for construction of the new building by March 1, with the completion date to be some six to eight months later in the year.

Seventy grain sorghum hybrids were tested and compared in the research program at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1964. The tests were under the supervision of Barry Love, Associate Agronomist. Thirty four of these hybrids were of equal value in yielding

ability. Yields among these 34 hybrids ranged from 7,165.4 to 6,286.6 pounds per acre. These 34 hybrids are the largest number to be listed as of equal value in any year since research began at the Foundation. This shows an increase in the number of grain sorghum varieties found to be acceptable for high

and profitable yield in West Texas.
Testing of grain sorghum for the various commercial seed companies started in 1960 with 52 hybrids and varieties. The test has grown to seventy in 1964.
The information on the seventy entries in the hybrid grain sorghum tests and the 2, 3, 4, and 5 year average yields will be included in the 1964 research report now being

prepared for the supporters of the Foundation. The chemical composition of the grain will also be reported for each hybrid.
There were eight hybrids that had a four-year yield average of above 7,000 pounds per acre. Four hybrids also averaged above 7,000 pounds per acre in the five-year yield record at Halfway.

"The grain sorghum testing program is a service performed for the seed and grain industry and farmers to provide information on the hybrids best adapted to the area. If farmers will select the best adapted hybrids for their individual farming operation, it will greatly increase their profits," Dr. Earl Collister, Director of the High Plains Research Foundation, said in commenting on the research results, December 26, 1964

the surface of the earth are great natural underground reservoirs in which a portion of the water derived from rain and snow is stored to supply the wells and springs and to maintain the flow of streams during periods of fair weather.
Water levels in wells register the stages of these natural reservoirs; they show the extent to which water supplies are depleted by drouth or by heavy pumping for irrigation, industrial uses, and public water works, and also the extent to which they are replenished in seasons of abundant rainfall or melting snow.
In 1937 depths to water were measured periodically in several hundred observation wells throughout the High Plains. Some of the wells were used for irrigation, some for domestic purposes and some were unused. Until 1940 measurements were made for the most part at intervals of 1 to 3 months.

Experience has shown, however, that the most dependable information regarding net annual losses from and additions to storage in the ground water reservoir can be obtained by comparing water level measurements that are made in successive years in late winter or early spring prior to the irrigation season.

The initial observation wells were located in areas of heavy pumping. As irrigation spread over the High Plains, the observation wells did not. Consequently, there are numerous areas where hundreds of irrigation wells exist, but only a few observation wells.

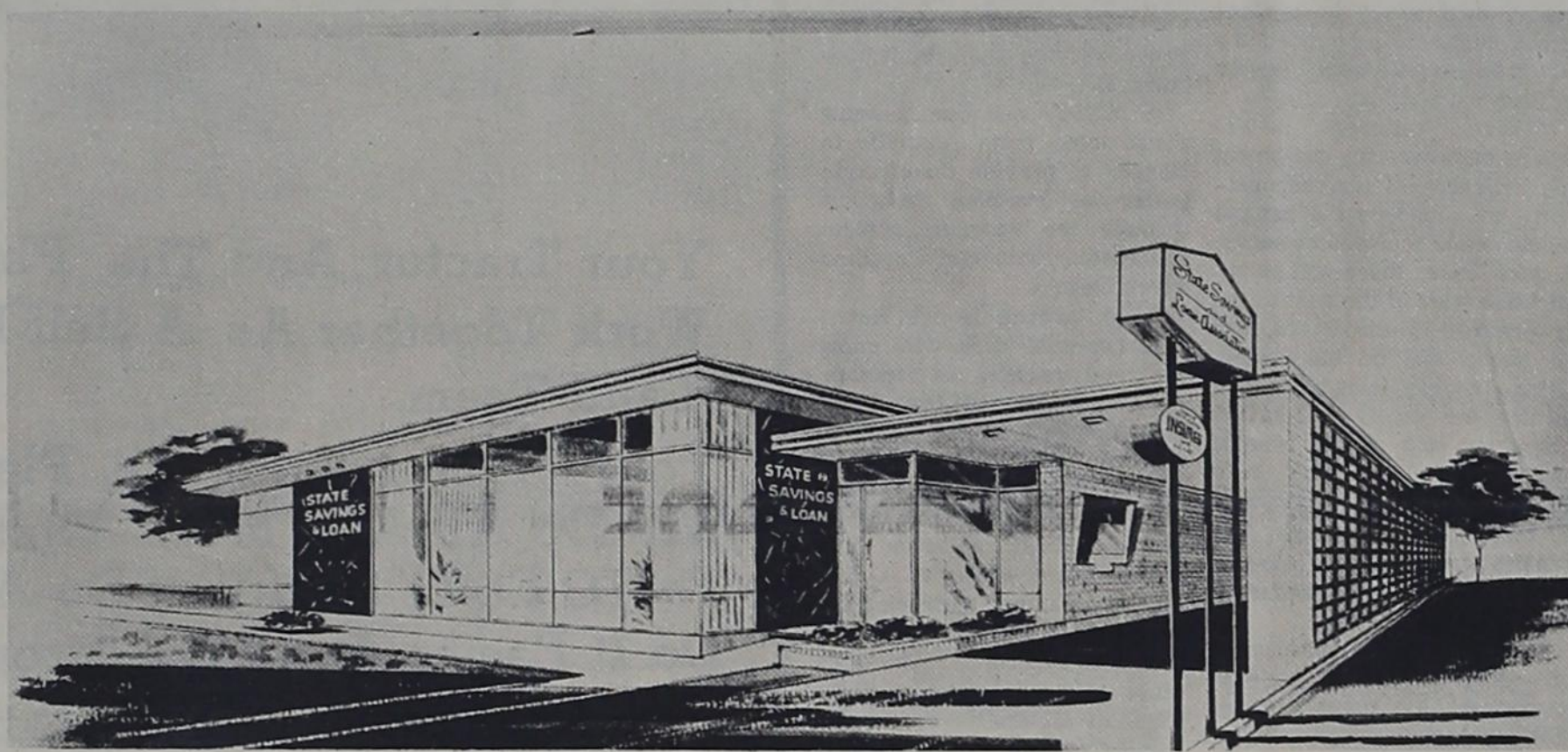
Observation wells are measured with steel tapes. The tapes are 300 to 500 feet in length. The tapes are entered into the well annulus to measure the water level. The water level of the well is then added or subtracted from last year's reading to determine the present level of the water in the well.

In the High Plains Underground Water District, observation wells are measured during January of each year. Factors determining the selection of January are:

- *Reasonable recovery period after the end of the summer irrigation season.
 - *Prior to early spring pre-plant irrigation season.
 - *Available personnel to measure the wells.
 - *Necessity of making water level measurements near the same date each year.
- After the observation well is measured the levels are recorded and sent to the office in Lubbock to be kept in permanent files.

On The Farm In Parmer County

As we start this new year we thought it might be appropriate to list the areas of work that County Extension Agents have as their responsibility. From time to time we have people ask us just what we do.

Ours is not an easy job to describe as we are a unique partnership of local people and their organizations; county, state and federal governments; and the land-grant universities, which is Texas A&M for us. Hence our organization is formally called the Cooperative Extension Service.

The major function of the Cooperative Extension Service, as stated in the Smith-Lever Act, is: "To aid in diffusing among the people of the United States useful and practical information on subjects relating to agriculture and home economics, and to encourage the application of the same."

We have nine major work areas that we have responsibility to provide educational assistance on. These areas of emphasis are: 1. Efficiency in agricultural production; 2. Efficiency in marketing, distribution and utilization; 3. Conservation, development and use of natural resources; 4. Management on the farm and in the home; 5. Family living; 6. Youth development; 7. Leadership development; 8. Community improvement and resource development; and 9. Public affairs.

AUSTIN, Dec. -- Coastal operations of the Parks and Wildlife Department brought new accomplishments for the year just ending, reports Terry Leary, coordinator for marine fisheries.

He said the shrimp landings "almost equaled" the thumping forty million pound catch of 1963, and added: Oyster production last winter and spring reached new heights with approximately two and one half million pounds taken;

There was a successful redfish spawn with excellent survival and speckled trout catches have been consistently good;

The blue crab spawn was favorable, brightening the prospects for good crabbing for next season.

The old Port Lavaca Causeway was converted into "the longest fishing pier in the world" in cooperation with the State Highway Department. Leary pointed out that some

adjustments were found necessary in authorizing shrimping in the bays because of a cold spring.

He said the new production figure for oysters marked the season which began in October, 1963 and ended in March, 1964.

Leary observed that the good redfish spring spawn already is producing fourteen to eighteen inch redfish in bay catches.





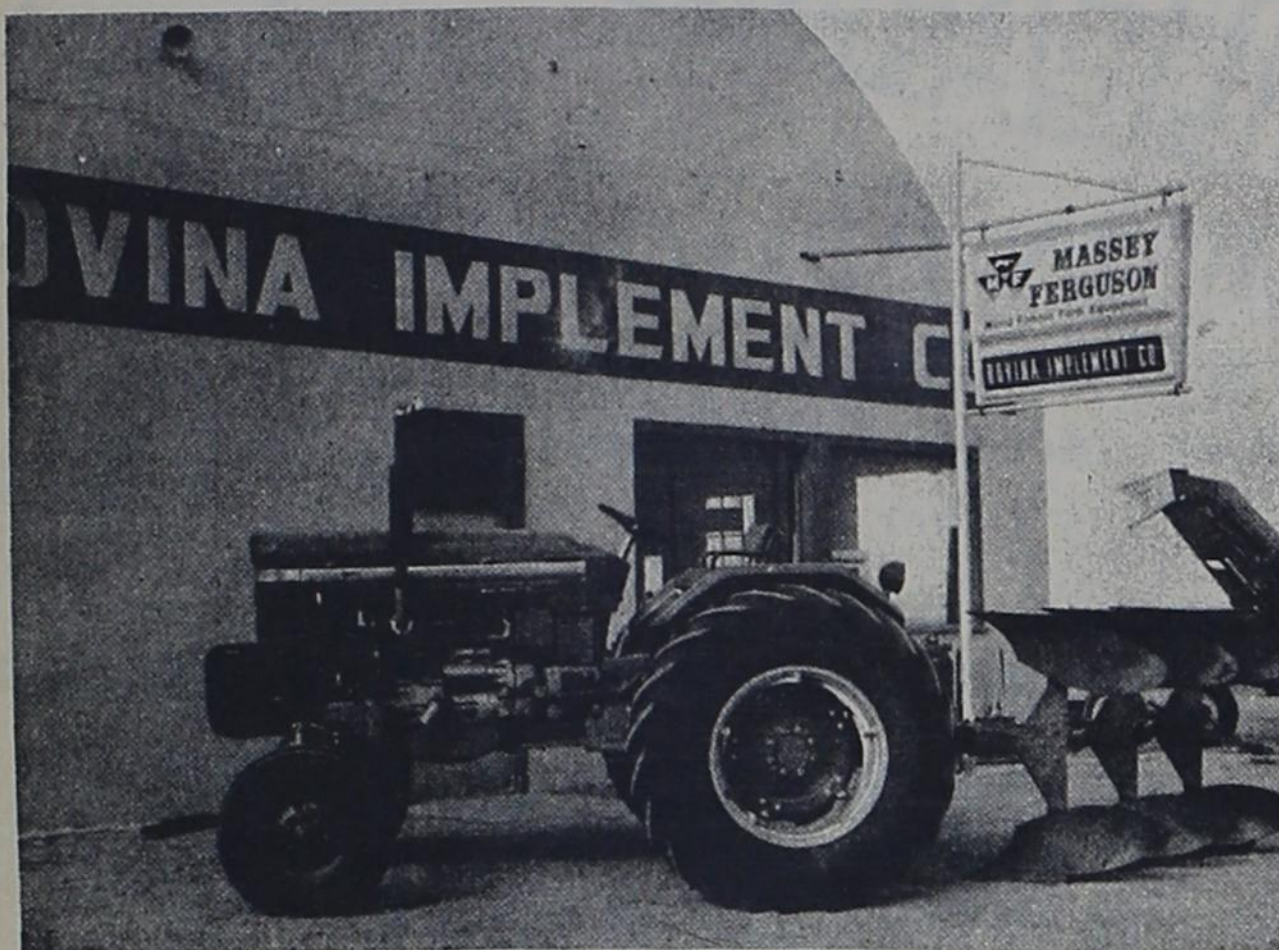

AUSTIN, Dec. — Advance in inland experimental projects involving both fresh water and salt water species were made in 1964, said Marlon Toole of the Parks and Wildlife Department staff.

The coordinator for inland fisheries said both redbfish and speckled trout have been existing in salty West Texas waters after transplants from Gulf Coast areas.

Meanwhile, the first confirmed catch of a walleyed pike in Texas was made in Possum Kingdom Lake where sizeable numbers of the prized game fish were released in both 1963 and 1964.

Toole stressed the operational routine of freshwater fish hatcheries which delivered 16,981,097 fish to Texas waters during 1964, and more important retained substantial brood numbers to restock streams, lakes and tanks depleted by the early season catch.

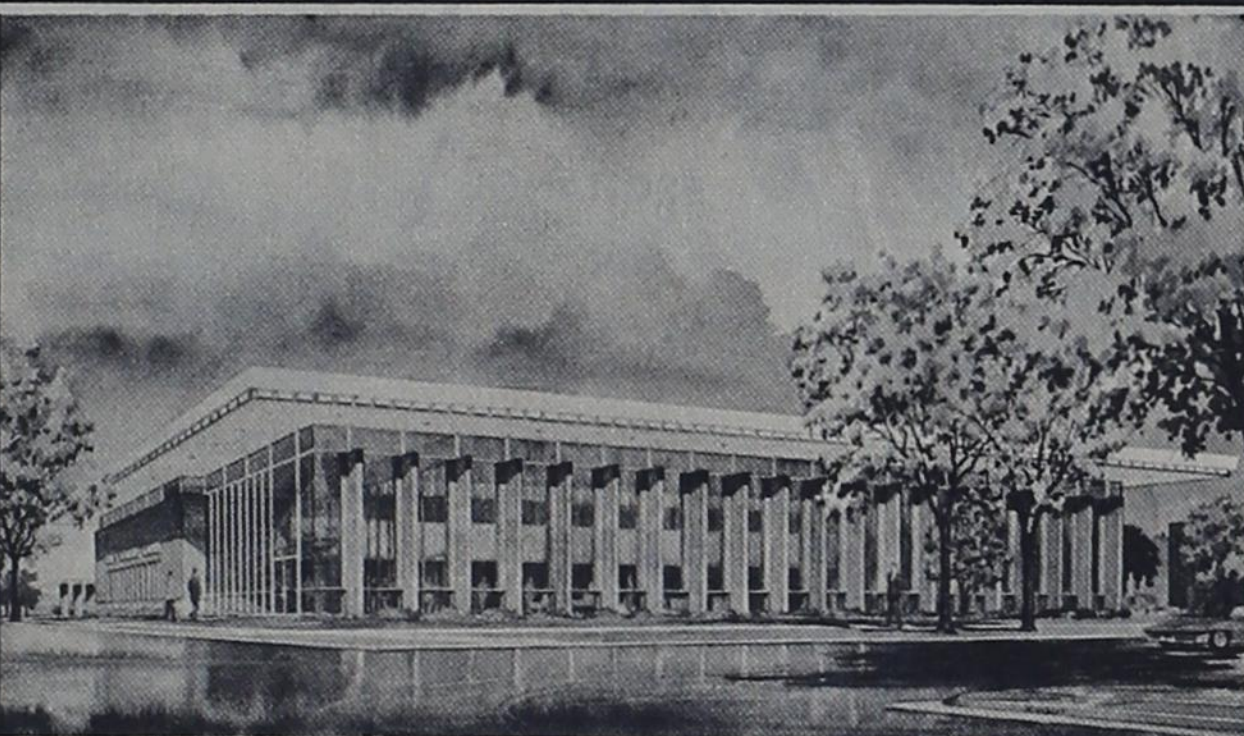
Toole said salt water transplants of redbfish and flounder were made in Sheldon Reservoir near Houston and Red Bluff Reservoir and Imperial Lake in West Texas. He said experiments indicate that speckled trout might have a better chance of survival than redbfish since the former might be able to spawn and reproduce, a routine considered necessary to survival.

The walleyed pike catch was made in early fall by a fisherman angling for crappies in an area near where walleye fry, flown from Iowa to Texas, were released last spring. The fish was 11 inches long.

Toole said the mammoth state hatchery distribution included 13,500,000 black bass and 2,309,000 channel catfish.
