The other day I went from Clovis to Bovina and passed two radar traps, one in New Mexico and one in Texas. In New Mexico the police car was well off the road partially hidden by the row of trees between the highway and the railway right-of-way. In Texas the car was in a partially hidden curve of the road that tended to hide the identity of the machine.

This, I suspect, is considered unsporting by the majority of motorists because from the other direction, a constant stream of cars was blinking lights giving the old "V for victory" sign as an indication that radar activity was ahead. Evidently, the public figures it is morally all right to warn possible lawbreakers that they may be apprehended. This I think is just one of many things that tend to give the public their attitude of non-cooperation in law enforcement. This attitude, magnified, has contributed greatly to our present state of national lawlessness.

I realize that our officers are only doing their job as given to them in the laws passed by your and my legislatures. 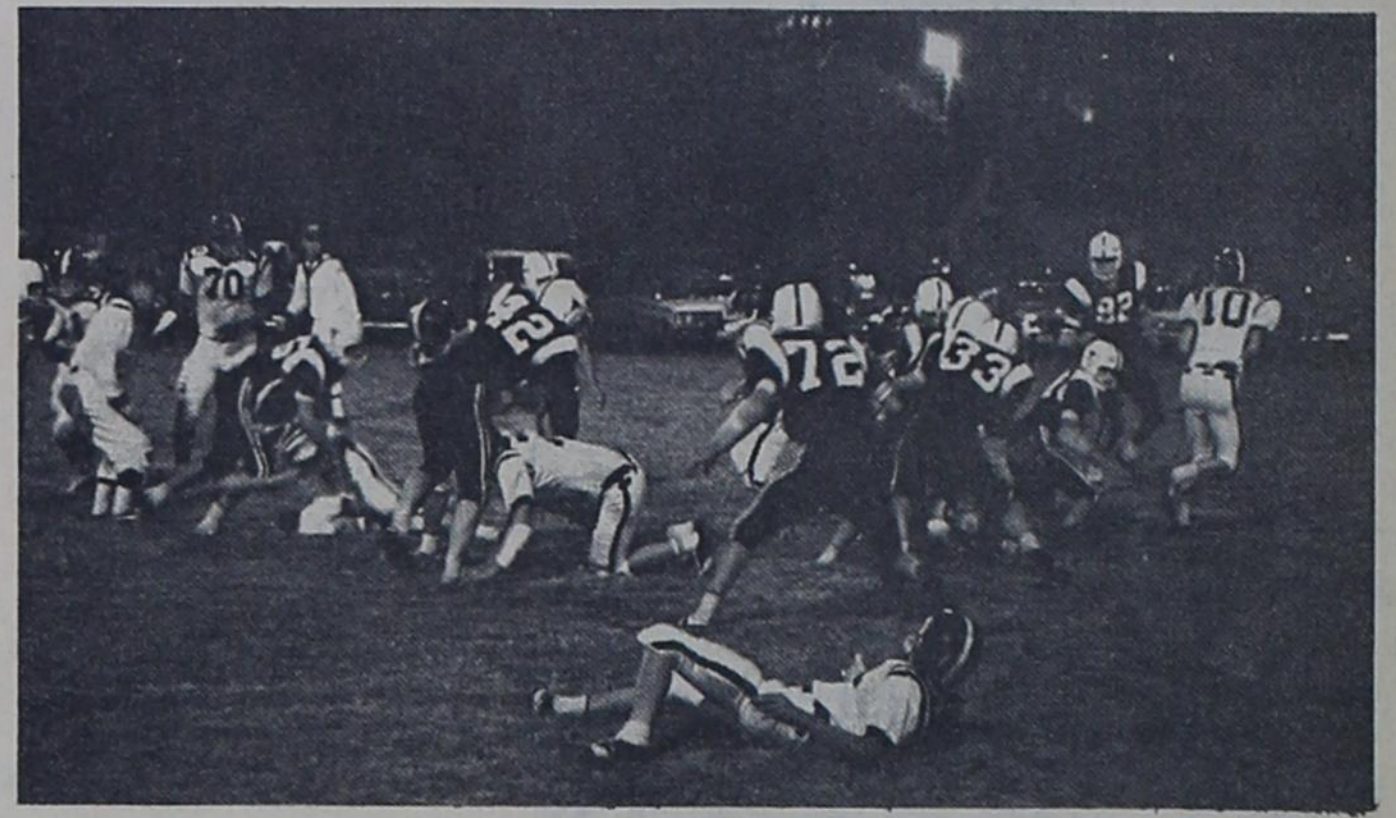

# Steers Blank Bovina For Second Victory

Farwell's Steers came up with a touchdown early in the third period Friday night at Bovina and that just about told the story of the annual gridiron duel between the two Parmer County rivals. The final score was 6-0, Farwell.

Both teams featured highly capable defenses and sputtering offenses.

Each was playing with a "rookie" field general. Johnny Schell, the Steer signal chlrper, is a converted halfback who was filling in at the man under position for the injured Bobby Field, Jerry Roach, at the Mustangs' reins, is a converted end who was starting his first game at that position.

The game was the season opener for the Class B Mustangs. It was the second consecutive win for the Farwell boys who upset Friona in their opener the previous week.

The game was played in ideal weather before a crowd estimated at 1000, near a full-house at Mustang Field.

Except for a couple of spectacular offensive plays by the Farwell team, the game could have been a scoreless duel.

The Steers' Lewey Bradshaw returned the second half kickoff from his own 20 to the Bovina 40 on a beautiful run. Halfback Hobbie Coffman plunged for four to the 36 to set the stage for a brilliant performance by Schell, who waltzed through a herd of Mustang defenders to the one-yard line. Schell then sneaked the ball across the goal line on the next play.

The lack of offensive punch by the teams was indicated by the first downs. Bovina had six to Farwell's four.

The Mustangs were forced to punt seven times while the Steers elected to boot the pigskin four times.

Farwell missed a pair of scoring opportunities early. Bovina received the kickoff and was forced to punt. A high snap from center made it impossible for Punter Roman Ramirez to get the ball away and the Steers had possession on Bovina's 20. Two plays later, however, the hard-charging Mustangs forced a fumble and regained possession on their own 10.

From there, the Mustangs managed one first down before being forced to kick again. This time, Ramirez' kick was blocked and the Steers had possession on the 12 yard line of Bovina. The Pontes held, however, and regained possession on downs on the 10. Bovina's defensive efforts were aided by a five-yard penalty against Farwell.

The teams battled on even terms during the second stanza as both defenses played rock 'em, sock 'em football.

Larry Suttle and Charles Norton lead the Steer defenders.

For the Mustangs, it was Ramirez, Eddi Corn and Donnie McKinney doing bulk of the

stopping.

The Steers threatened late in the half as they took to the air with timerunning out. Schell and End Larry Gregory teamed up for a 17-yard aerial and a first down on the Bovina 15 with time remaining for only one play. Schell then passed incomplete to End Doyle Johnson in the endzone as the half ended.

The Mustangs shot their big offensive gun late in the third period.

With their running game all but halted, Roach caught the Steer defenders by surprise with a long throw to End Lane Gober. Gober, aided by a good block by Lynn Murphy picked up 68 yards and a first down on Farwell's 10.

The blue and white defense stiffened its back right there, though, and four plays later, the Mustangs lost the ball on downs at that point as a fourth down pass attempt from Roach to Gober went incomplete.

Farwell's offensive efforts were handicapped in the fourth quarter by fumbles as the Mustangs took advantage of two Steer miscues in that stanza to eliminate additional scoring thoughts by the winners.

## Mrs. Engram To Be Installed Acting Postmaster

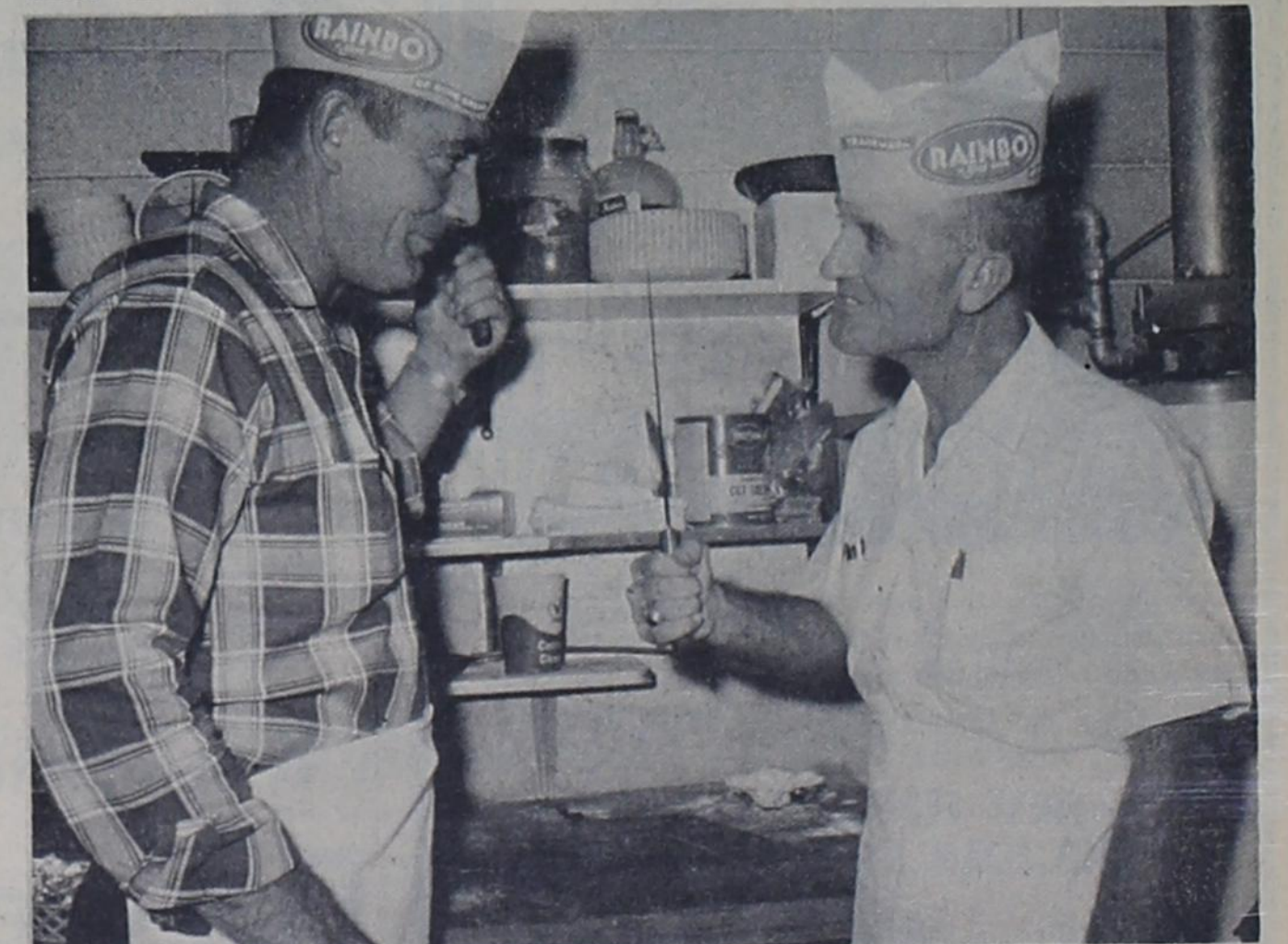

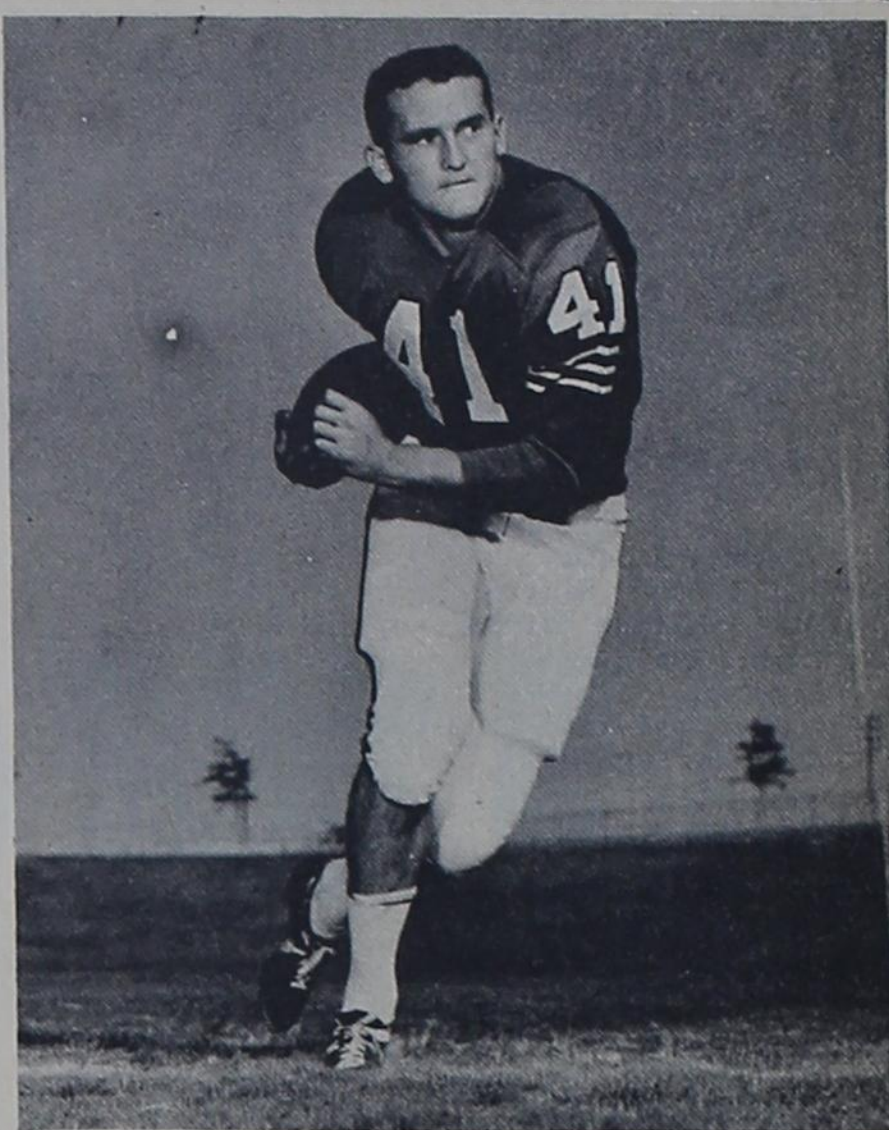

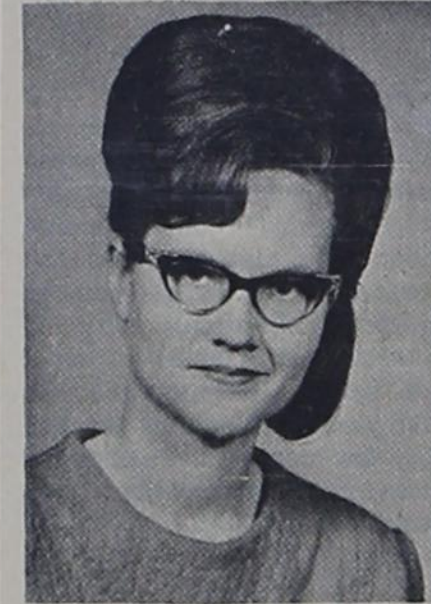

Club visitations and socials are held to help promote friendship and understanding between the clubs and a wider appreciation for the ideals and goals of Lions International.

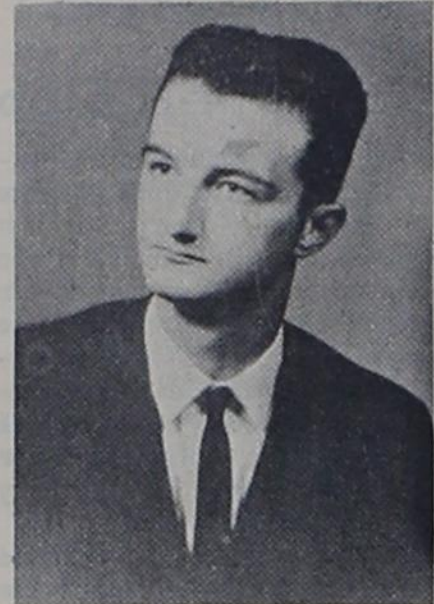

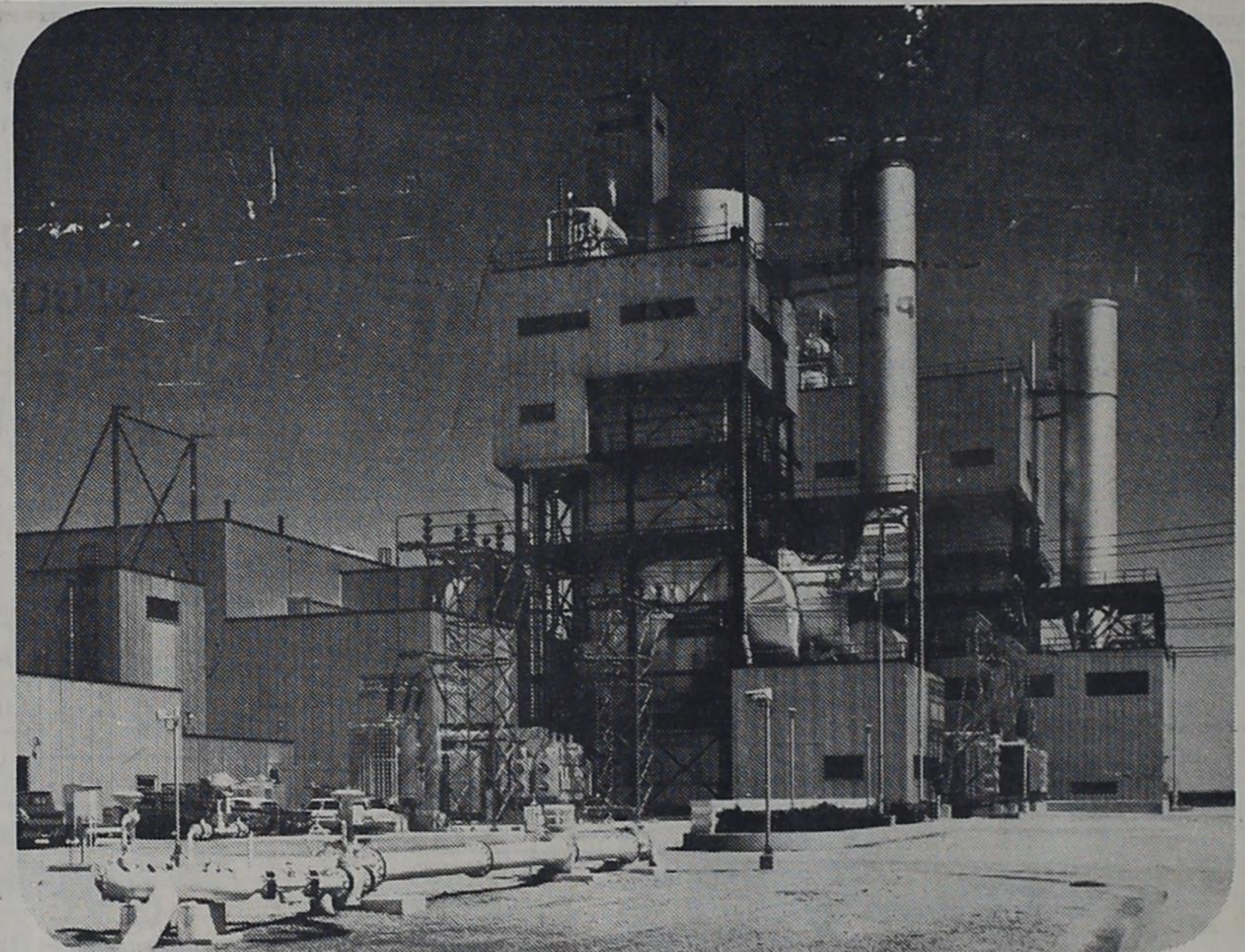
Grand Master Hinsley stressed the importance of attendance by all Lodge officers and emphasized that other Masons are welcome.

neighborhood communities of Texico and Farwell.

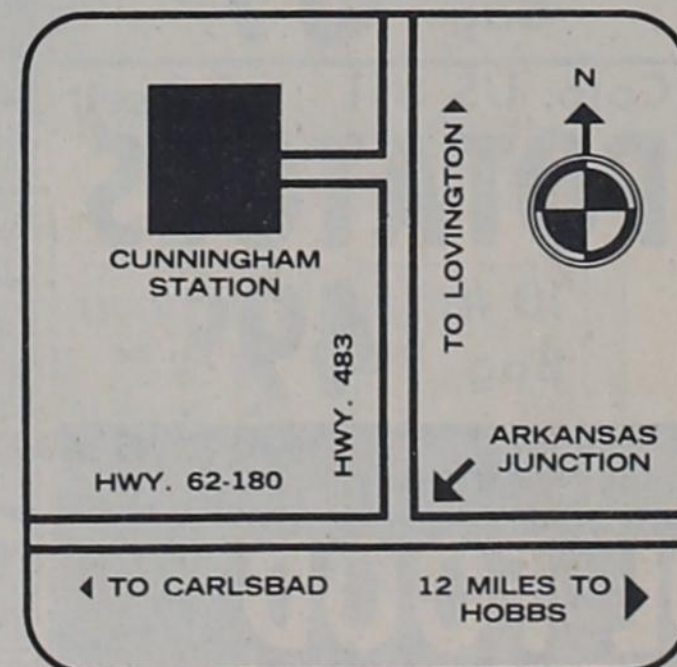

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## At Home In Palmer County

### HOME DEMONSTRATION NOTE DEVELOPING THE ART OF BEING WELL DRESSED

It is a natural desire of women to be attractive—whether admitted or not. Being well dressed is one of the finest arts in the world, and there are many things to know and learn in developing this art in ourselves. Learning the difference between good and bad taste is a good starting point—this is not a question of money, but rather a question of knowledge. It is in reality an expression of personal style to suit your own physical proportions, your personality and your way of life. One of the most difficult lessons

for some is to distinguish real beauty and elegance from the tricky or eye-catching fashions so frequently seen around us. Taste is what you choose, style is how you wear it—and no amount of wealth can buy style. It takes self-respect, self-discipline, and a good sense of values.

#### HERE ARE A FEW POINTS TO REMEMBER

**Build your wardrobe around never out-of-season clothes, known as classics.**

**Contrast**—is the key to emphasizing good points or moods. Too much contrast can detract from the whole picture. If a heavy set person finds it desirable to carry the eye to the face, there should be no breaks or contrast of color line, or texture below this point of emphasis. Bright gloves would certainly be a mistake for her. It is rarely advisable to put intense color on hands—the color calls attention not only to hands but to any part of body

the hands may be near. For instance who wants to call attention to large hips?

A woman with a large body and small feet would not want to wear delicate looking shoes—this could result from too light a shade, too fine texture or shoes that are too open. Again, if one has poorly shaped legs, or large legs or feet, she would be wise to stick to neutral or dark shade simple shoes.

**Accessories** must be appropriate. Never wear fancy shoes with sports costume, long, dangling earrings or high heel shoes for traveling.

Have only one outstanding or important thing in a costume at a time, such as a hat, bright colored flowers, a plaid suit, an interesting well chosen pin.

**Jewelry**  
\*Don't have everything match—those sets of earrings, bracelets, necklace and etc.

\*Dare to be simple. If there are fancy buttons, let them be the focal point of interest in your costume without other adornment.

\*Unless your pin expresses something about your costume, leave it in your dresser drawer and look at it there.

\*Many women over 50 find silver jewelry more flattering than gold.

\*If you have over-sized bust, avoid wearing too long or too bulky a necklace.

\*Short white gloves are smart with anything sleeveless or summery; or short black ones may be more interesting.

\*Short, wrist-length gloves are often a smart choice for party dresses, also. In some cases, no other accessory can do as much for a dress as the right pair of gloves.

\*Gloves are traditionally a sign of dignity, but not soiled ones! When wearing light-colored ones always carry an extra pair in your purse.

\*There are informal occasions when gloves aren't needed but always wear them on the street, even without a hat, to church, the theatre and luncheons.

There is much more about gloves but these are the usual questions asked and may prove helpful.

Modeling accessories appropriate for three different occasions will be a member from each of the Home Demonstration Clubs, and serving as Commentator and discussion

leader will be the Home Agent. The three occasions will be: 1. Shopping, street wear and travel, 2. Church, afternoon or daytime dress-up affairs, 3. Informal, dress-up after five occasions.

Everyone is invited to attend these club meetings. Just tell a club member in your community that you would like to attend and watch for the date.
