





Many wheat fields over the county have some yellowing tion which gives the color, disshowing up in them now, For solve four pounds of bluestone, the most part this yellowing is blue vitriol or sulphate of copcaused by Leaf Rust. Leaf Rust per and three pounds of rock caused by fungi and rust spores are carried by wind movement. If you look closely at some of this wheat you will notice small, round, orangeyellow pustules on the leaf surface.

A heavy leaf rust infection, such as some fields have now, can cause extensive damage to the leaf foliage. When plants thus weakened from loss of foliage, they are less resistant to colors. extreme cold or dry weather. The spread of rust should

slow down now that we have started having freezing temperatures. Some wheat fields are getting pretty dry and probably should be watered. ### Christmas Mail Lesson In War Of 1812

The Post Office Department has come a long way since 1812 when 2,000 men were injured or died in New Orleans because it took months to get a high priority message from Belgium to New Orleans, Postmaster J. R. Smart said. Two or threeday delivery is standard practice for such a letter today.

"However, if people held the vast column of Christmas mail until the last moment, even a high priority letter could be bogged down in the mail avalanche." the Postmaster said.

The 1812 incident was the Battle of New Orleans, General Andrew Jackson's forces defeated a British army on January 8, more than two weeks after a peace treaty had been signed ending the War of 1812. The message wasn't delivered until March 6.

"While the late delivery of Christmas mail may not be as tragic," the Farwell Postmaster said, "much of the joy of Christmas would be lost."

"About seven billion pieces of mail will be delivered nationally during the Christmas peak season. To make sure it gets to the proper destination in time, everyone should plan to mail as far in advance as possible. Mail as early as possible and not save all gifts and greetings for one deposit.

"In other words, mail early
