

Speaker Recommends Charlie Lovelace As Sheriff 'Now And Forever More'

"I recommend Charlie Lovelace as your sheriff now and forever more," said Judge E. A. Bills, former judge of the 154th judicial district and a resident of Littlefield who served as judge of the judicial district which includes Parmer County for 13 years and who worked closely with the sheriff during that period, in speaking at the Appreciation Night honoring the Parmer County Sheriff on Thursday evening.

Some 300 persons, including peace officers from over Texas and Eastern New Mexico were in attendance at the program, honoring the sheriff and his family, which was held in the Bovina Schools Auditorium Thursday evening.

Master of ceremonies for the occasion was Bedford Caldwell, Bovina, who attended high school with Lovelace and who said, "A friendship like ours is one of those which has weathered many storms and will continue throughout the years."

Caldwell read letters and telegrams of appreciation from friends who have been associated with the sheriff through the years and who have known him to be one of the most efficient peace officers in the area and the state.

Judge Bills, who was introduced by Sam Aldridge, Farwell attorney, said, "This is one of the happiest occasions of my life, for I have never worked with a peace officer who gave more efficient service than Charlie. He cannot be excelled by any other and I count him as one of the top law enforcement officers in the state." Bills concluded his statements by saying, "As long as we have men like Charlie Lovelace in the sheriff's office we can expect good law enforcement and fair trials."

W. L. "Preach" Edelman, Friona, presented the sheriff with a gold watch bearing the

inscription: "1966-Chas. Lovelace - presented by Parmer County Friends" and a gold plaque inscribed, "To Charlie Lovelace - presented in grateful appreciation for faithful and dedicated service as sheriff of Parmer County in the State of Texas - by friends of Parmer County - 1966," on behalf of the citizens of Parmer County. In addition, Edelman also presented the sheriff and his wife, Alice, with U. S. Savings Bonds in the amount of \$2,000 in appreciation from grateful citizens who feel that crime in the county has been held to a minimum through the efforts of the sheriff and his capable deputies.

Lovelace, almost too overcome for words, could only repeat, "Thank you a thousand times, Thank you a thousand times." He then introduced his staff of deputies including Tom Adkins, Farwell; Henry Minter, Bovina; Garland Freeman, Fri-

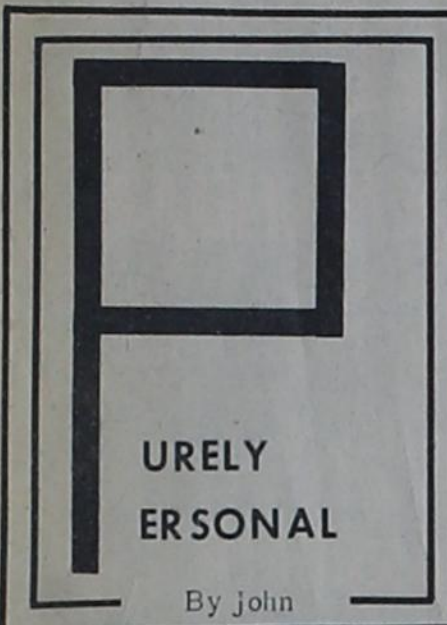
ona; and Raymond Treider Jr., Laabuddie.

Howard Files Intent To Seek Mayors Post

For a time on Monday, with the deadline for filing for the positions of mayor and councilmen in the Texico township drawing near, it looked as if no one was interested in filling the offices for the next few years. However, just before the deadline, 5 p.m., W. D. Howard Jr., who has served one two-year term as mayor, filed for that office and only minutes later the names of Perry Winkles and B. A. Rogers were filed for the councilmen posts.

Earlier in the month, Sam Lewis, incumbent police magistrate, and Norma Lee Sanders, had filed their intent to seek the police magistrate post.

The town election will be held on March 1 at which time a mayor, two councilmen and a police

magistrate will be elected. Although deadline for filing was on January 31, write-in votes may be cast for any of the positions. Ed Farmer, who has served for the past two years as mayor, declined to run for the office due to the press of other matters. Bob Lebow and Perry Winkles are the councilmen with terms in office expiring. Winkles is seeking re-election and B. A. Rogers who is seeking the other councilman's position is a candidate for the first time.

Anderson Sells Radio Station To Best Broadcasting Co. Inc.

G. D. Anderson Sr., owner of Radio Station KZOL, which has been in operation in Farwell since 1958, this week announced the sale of the station to Best Broadcasting Company, Inc., formerly of Levelland.

New manager and part owner of the station is Gil W. Patschke, who has been with station KLVV in Levelland for the past 13 years. The new manager assumed his duties on Tuesday morning, Feb. 1. Negotiations for the purchase of the station were begun in October, but it was not until the transfer of ownership was approved by the FCC in Washington on Jan. 15 that the sale became final.

The station first began operation in Muleshoe in 1957 and was moved to Farwell in 1958 with Marilyn Edwards as manager. Jimmy Self of Clovis assumed management of the station in March 1963. He will remain with the station for the present. No other changes in personnel are anticipated at this time, says the new manager. Station personnel include Harvie Jordan, Hugh McEvoy, John Urban and Ruth Burkett.

In making the move to Farwell from Levelland, the new manager stated, "I am pleased

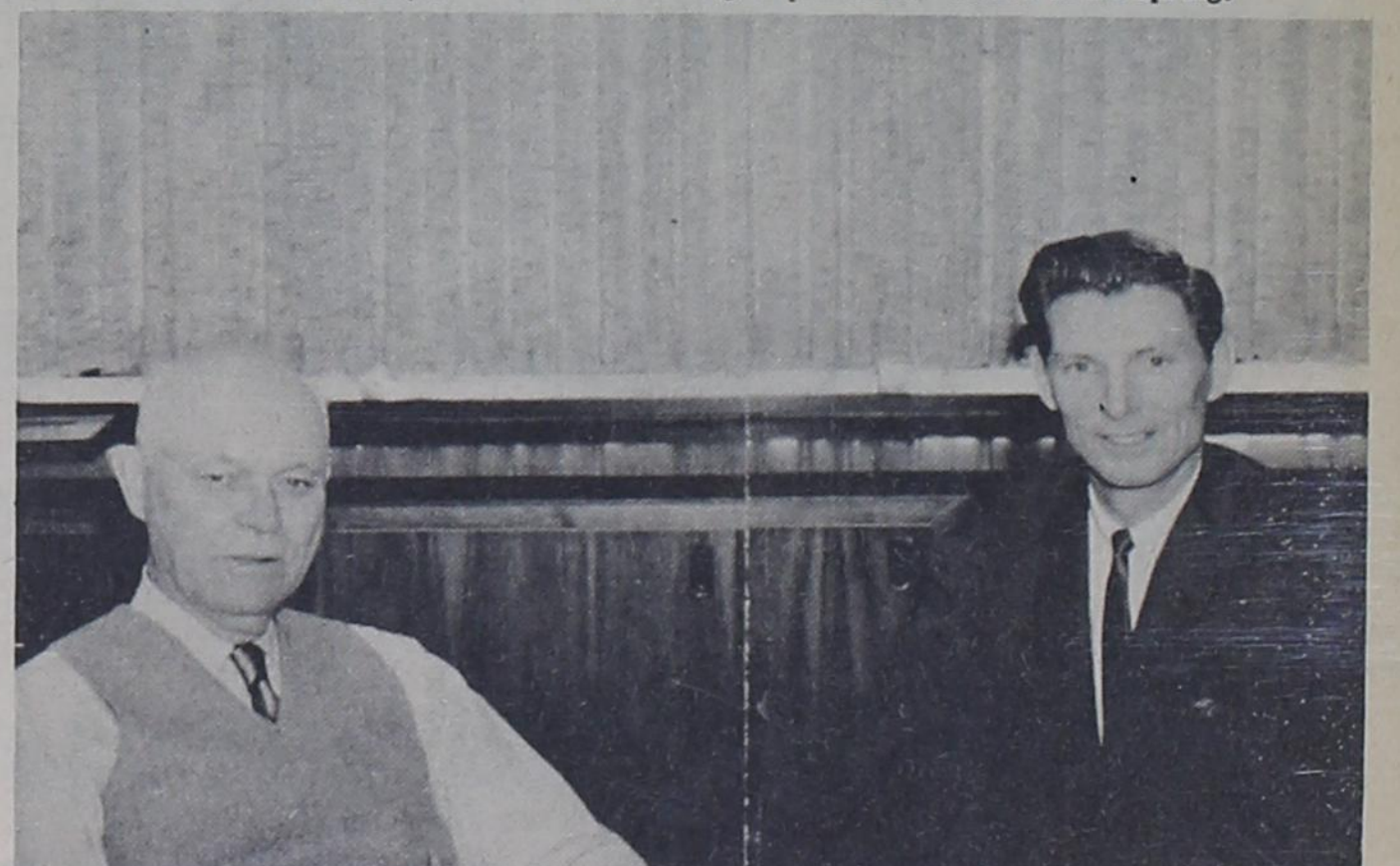

School Receives Title I Funds

Supt. W. M. Roberts of the Farwell schools announces that through the Federal Aid to Schools, Title I program, the Farwell school has hired three additional teachers, who will set up and direct a remedial reading program in the school. In addition, the school has secured equipment and reading materials to improve the program through the Title I program. Funds received by the school for use in the program is \$16,769. Approximately \$6,000 will be spent for materials and equipment.

Directing the remedial reading program in the first through fifth grades is Mrs. Linda Kresik, whose husband is stationed at Cannon Air Force Base. Mrs. Kresik has six years experience. Working with students in the sixth grade and high school is Q. T. Shults, a veteran teacher with 18 years of experience. He comes to Farwell from Roswell. Mrs. Mildred Porter, a graduate of Eastern New Mexico University and a native of Clovis, will direct the program in the seventh and eighth grades.

Under Title II, of the Federal Aid Program, the school was granted approximately \$1,490 with which library books will be bought. Larry Reynolds, who has been teaching speech and history in the high school, resigned, effective last week, to accept a position with a college in Yankton, South Dakota, where he will be teaching economics. Mrs. Joyce Hart has been hired to fill the vacancy. At the January meeting of the school board, the contract of School Superintendent W. M. Roberts was renewed for another year. Contracts for principals will be reviewed at

the February meeting of the board, set for Monday. Teachers are due to be hired in March. Supt. Roberts states that any parent with children who will be six years of age before Sept. 1, 1966 and will not be 18 by the same date, and who has not been contacted during the current school census, should contact any of the principals or himself at the school. An effort has been made to contact all people who have children of school age, but it is almost impossible to contact everyone and all children of school age should be on the census. Cooperation of school patrons is asked by school officials.

Preliminary Meetings Set

In preparation for the workshop "Alteration of Patterns," preliminary meetings will be held in Rhea, Friona, Bovina and Lazbuddie. The meetings will be conducted by Cricket B. Taylor, Parmer County HD Agent, who stresses that those who plan to participate in the workshops, MUST attend one of the meetings in order to be eligible to participate in the workshops to follow. Information received at these meetings is necessary for the workshop meetings. Bovina preliminary meeting will be held at the Homemakers Cottage, at the school, Friday, Feb. 4, 9:30-11:30 a.m.

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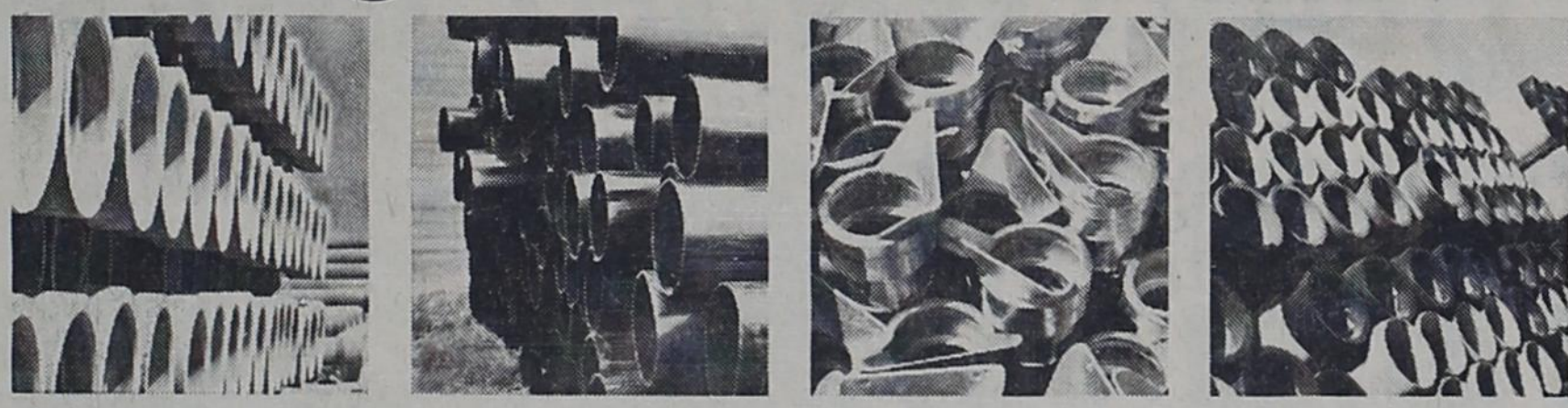

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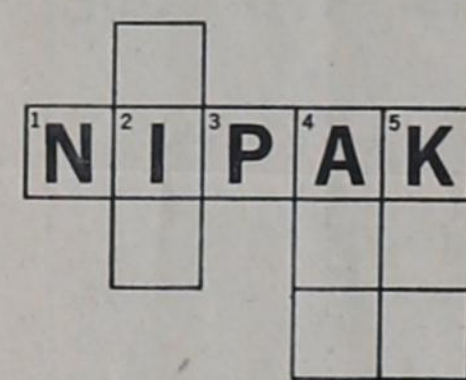

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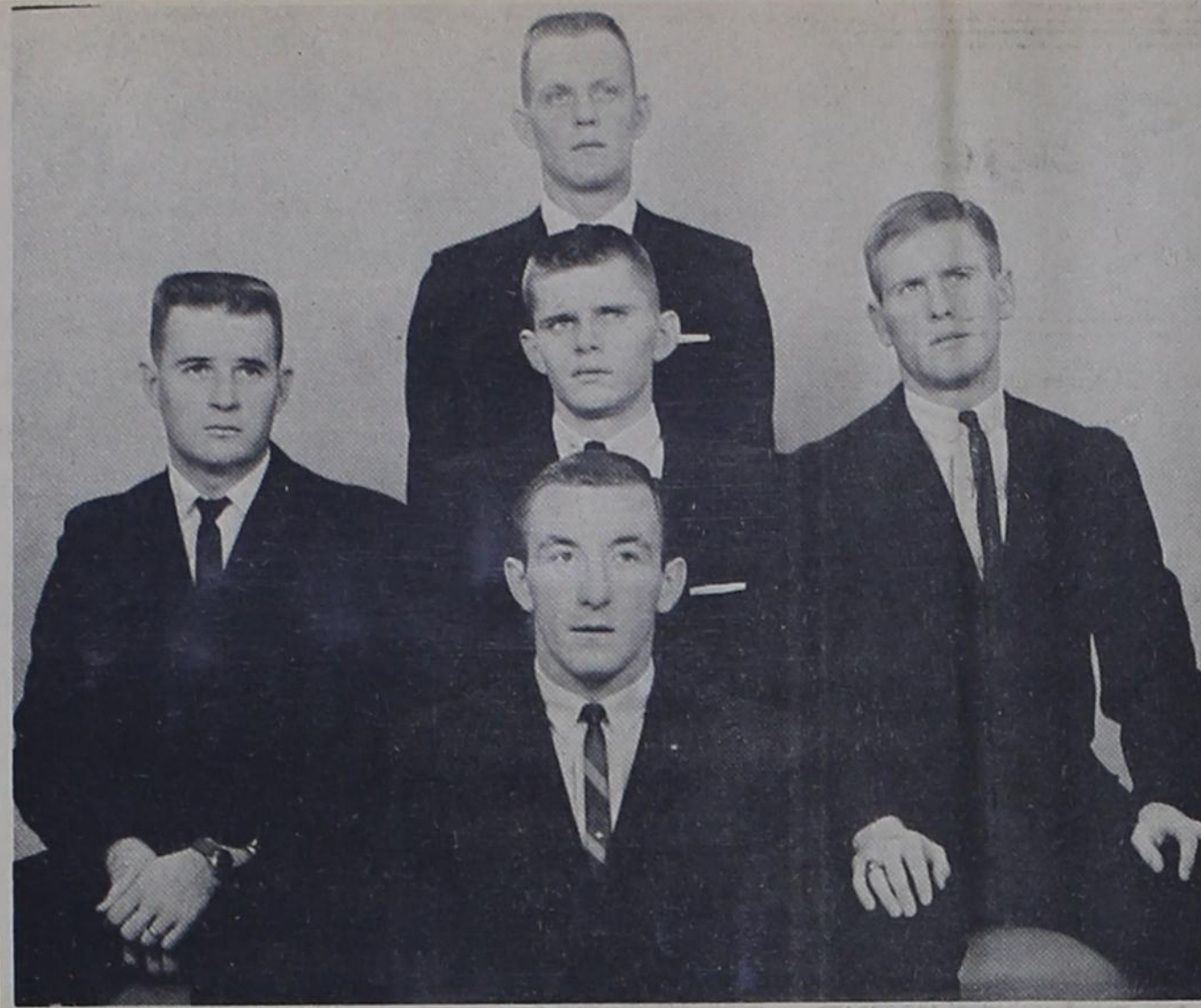
