Their plans, attitudes, decisions and daily awareness are completely removed from having anything to do with God's presence or will. Likewise, too many churches are dead to their experience of God and His acts in the present world. What happens today that moves about our lives is completely separated, all too much, from what many of our churches either talk about or try to do." End of quote.

All seed offered for sale must the yield. have a Texas Tested Seed Label attached, except when one farmer sells to another and when the selling farmer does not advertise outside his home county or ship by a common carrier.

The percentage of pure seed, inert material, other crop seed and weed seed must be on the seed label, and these should add up to 100.

Good seed of corn, oats, wheat, cotton, barley, rice and sorghum should contain at least 98.5 per cent pure seed. Good seed seldom has more than 1.5 per cent inert materials.

Buying certified seed is the best guarantee of varietal purity. Certified seed must meet a certain standard of perfection and should be the best seed of a particular variety available.

To be certified, each bag of Texas certified seed must have the blue certification tag and the small tin seal of the State of Texas attached. If these are storage. not attached, the seed is not certified.







Both the Texas Education fore fall. Agency and the State Board of Education received the policy statements and promptly scheduled meetings over the state to post local school administrators as to the requirements.

Primarily concerned are 600 districts that submitted voluntary desegration plans to the U. S. Office of Education for the 1965-66 school year to assure that they remained eligible for federal aid.
