## \$83.94 Raised For UNICEF By Oklahoma Lane MYF

Four groups of children from the Oklahoma Lane Methodist youth department were "trick or treating" for UNICEF on Wednesday night. Two groups went from door to door in the rural area and the other groups visited homes in Farwell. Mrs. Melborn Jones, in charge of

the group, reports a successful drive with \$83.94 collected for the fund during the evening.

Through UNICEF over 193 million young people have been vaccinated against tuberculosis; about 14 million victims of trachoma have been saved from

blindness; over 3 billion vitamin capsules have been shipped overseas; more than 2 million leprosy victims have been treated and over 1 billion pounds of milk have fed hungry children.

Mrs. Jones, speaking for the organization, says "We wish to extend our thanks and appreciation to all who helped to make the drive for UNICEF a success.

It is not my intention to comment on the deaths as they occur in our community, but I feel that the life and example of A. D. Smith deserves more than the obituary column space.

I was privileged to know the Judge for only the last 18 years of his life, but in that length of time I came to admire and to respect him as I have few men. He was intensely patriotic, took deep pride in his town, county, state, and nation. And not necessarily in that order.

The Judge could clearly see the paths of ultimate good that we must follow. He believed in a personal code of honor that brooked no equivocation. He felt that thrift and prudence were personal virtues to be observed and practiced by each person. He believed in education as both a right and a privilege. As a right, all were entitled to as much as they could assimilate and as a privilege, one that demanded work and effort to get the most value from.

Judge Smith was a devout Christian. He served many long years on the Official Board of his church. He carried the Christian's concept of life and living over into his daily work and decisions. The Judge was firm in his beliefs, yet always willing to listen to the other person's views.

He was innately friendly, always a handshake, a call of the name and a good word for you. I never knew him to speak ill of any individual. Sometimes he would not have much to say, but it was never ill or spitefully spoken. Fiercely independent, the Judge asked no favors, pulled his own oar, took care of his own needs. Truly remarkable in today's dependent times. As his generation fades into the limbo of history, it can be said of him, "they don't make 'em like that no more."

### Light Turnout For Amendment Vote

In a light turnout at the polls Tuesday, Parmer Countians passed five out of ten of the proposed Constitutional Amendments. Only 437 interested voters, out of 1760 registered, turned out in the county.

Amendments passing in the County returns were Number 1, to finance college buildings; Number 3, aid to needy; Number 5, teachers retirement fund; Number 6, Texas opportunity plan; and Number 8, Judges' Retirement.

Failing to pass in the County were Amendments Number 2, veterans' land fund; Number 4, four-year terms for state representatives.

Voting by boxes was as follows: Black, 16 ballots; Friona, 150; Bovina, 104; Farwell, 82; Lazbuddie, 40; Oklahoma Lane, 17; Rhea, 15; and Lakeview, 13.

At a call meeting of the Farwell School Board held on Tuesday evening, final plans were made and the contract awarded on the building program at the Farwell School.

The contract in the amount of \$459,270.00 was awarded to Claude Martin and Sons, general contractors from Lubbock. Architects are Brasher-Goyette-Rapier.

Included in the building program are an auditorium, conversion of the present high school into a junior high school, vocational shops and other equipment, remodeling of the administration and tax offices and a new field house.

Deadline for completion of the auditorium is May 10 and all other buildings are to be completed by August 19 (in time for the beginning of school).

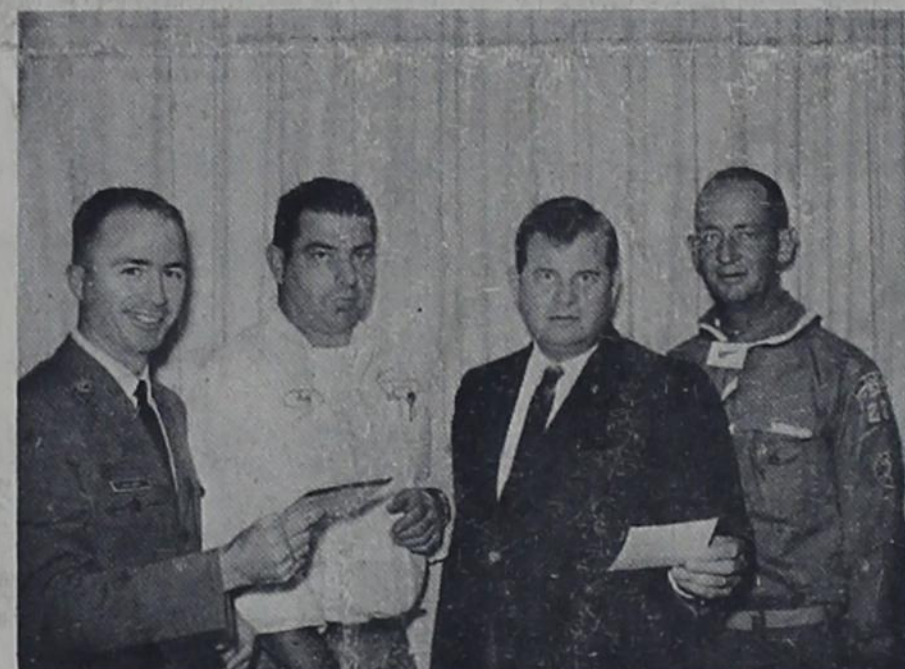

### Judge Smith Area Pioneer Succumbs

A host of friends and acquaintances that number in the thousands were saddened the first of the week at the announcement that death had taken Judge A. D. Smith. He died at 4 a.m., Monday morning in Clovis Memorial Hospital where he had been a patient for several weeks. He had suffered a heart attack before going to the hospital and had not been in good health for several months.

Funeral services for Judge Smith will be at Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church at 2 o'clock Sunday. Steed Funeral Home will be in charge. Burial will be in Mission Garden of Memories.

Judge Smith was a colorful and lovable citizen who pioneered in educational work in Eastern New Mexico and was a central figure in Parmer County public life for many years. He was county judge here for 13 years and eight months, from April 1945 until January 1, 1959. His love of people was a central plank in his political activities, and he is probably as well known as any man who has ever held office in Parmer County.

Mrs. A. D. Smith preceded the judge in death about a year ago and the senior couple were among the most active workers in the community in church and civic activities. Their service

in the local Methodist Church was outstanding for years.

"The Judge" as he was affectionately known continued to be active and maintained a full schedule of activities even after his retirement from the political scene in 1959. He was the courthouse's most familiar figure, and although in later years to do so required the use of a cane, he daily made his way up and down the steps of the courthouse to keep in touch with affairs which had been woven into the fabric of his life over the years.

"The Judge" was born in Johnson County, Texas, Dec. 27, 1875 and grew up on his fathers farm. He later attended college at Grandview Collegiate Institute and was graduated from that school. He then attended classes at Texas University for two years before teaching in Texas for two years.

He moved to New Mexico and taught in the Ft. Sumner school system for 10 years and was superintendent at Melrose for a period of time. He later served as DeBaca County school superintendent for four years.

Judge Smith also attended and was graduated with an AB degree from New Mexico Normal (Highland University) and received a law degree from Cumberland University in Tennessee.

**Councilmen Issue Warning To Town Residents**

City residents in Farwell are asked by the city commission to place only items in their trash barrels which are not too heavy to be handled easily by the garbage man. Items such as concrete, rock, and other heavy articles should be placed beside the barrel and attention of the garbage man called to them, if the residents wish them to be hauled away.

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The mayor and councilmen are asking the cooperation of all town residents on this matter since several times the garbage man has hauled away items placed near the trash barrel to the city dump ground and found later that the items should have been left. Therefore, if any item is to be hauled away and is too heavy to be placed in the trash barrel citizens should call the city hall and notify the city clerk who will give the message to the proper authorities.

**On The Farm In Parmer County**

**DON'T GUESS - SOIL TEST**

Soil testing season is here. This is especially true for farmers who want to apply dry fertilizer broadcast and then plow it under.

The Agricultural Extension Service offers farmers a soil testing and fertilizer recommendation service for \$2.00 per soil sample. This \$2.00 is the actual cost of the soil testing work. The fertilizer recommendations are made to supply only the necessary plant food for the yield goals farmers ask for. These recommendations are made based on continuous, year to year, fertilizer rate research plots located in our area and even in Parmer County.

During the past year, September 1, 1964 to August 31, 1965, there were 638 soil samples analyzed by the Extension Service soil testing laboratory. This number ranked Parmer County seventh in the State for soil samples. Castro County farm-

ers submitted 1555 samples to lead in number of samples. For \$2.00 per field for a soil sample, I believe this to be the wisest amount of money spent for next year's crop.

The soil sample information sheets, soil containers and mailing cartons are available at the County Agent's office and ASCS office in Farwell and the SCS office in Friona.

**JUDGING CATTLE FOR MEATINESS**

Relating live steer judging to production efficiency and carcass value is perhaps the greatest challenge facing the beef cattle industry. And back of the challenge, is the cost-price squeeze and beef consumers who want high quality, lean beef.

In order to assist stockmen in meeting the challenge, Texas A&M University has prepared a bulletin, B-1026, "Judging Slaughter Steers." Copies of the

publication are available from the county agent's office. The publication is illustrated with many pictures and drawings covering such important factors as muscling, finish, dressing percentage, value and carcass evaluation in determining live value of steers of desirable weights. Considerable space in the publication is devoted to a discussion of terms relating to carcass evaluation and U. S. Department of Agriculture grades, live and dressed. Stockmen who are interested in learning more about selecting beef cattle which will produce the kind of carcass and cuts demanded by consumers can pick up a copy of S-1026 at my office in the Courthouse.

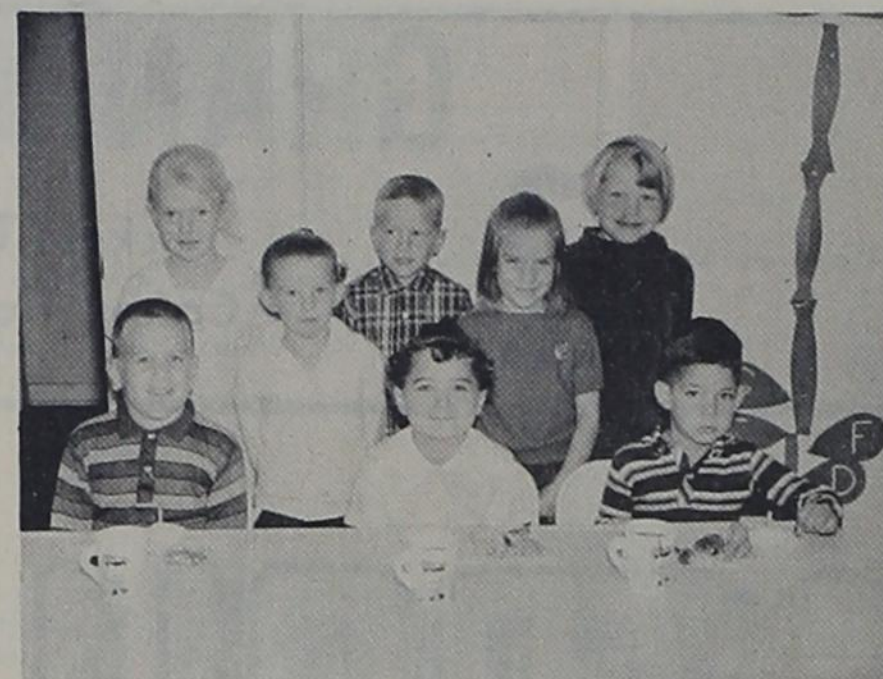

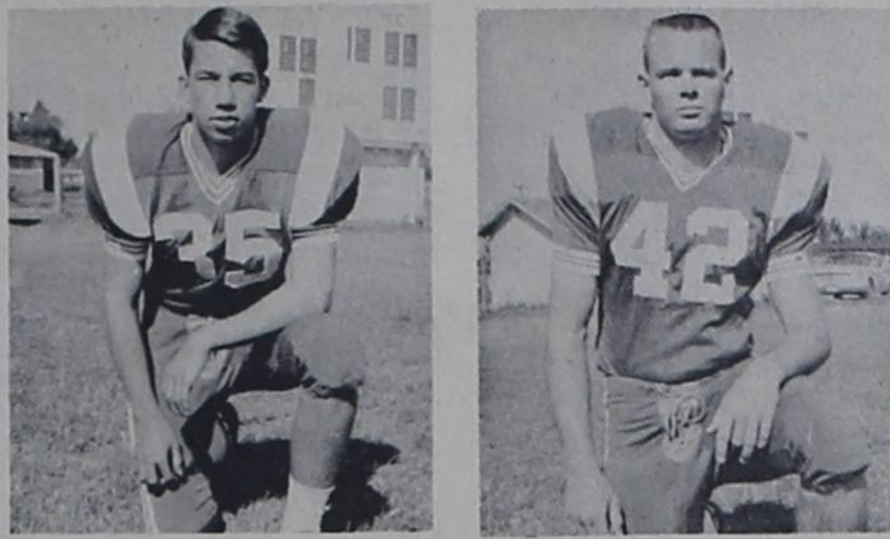

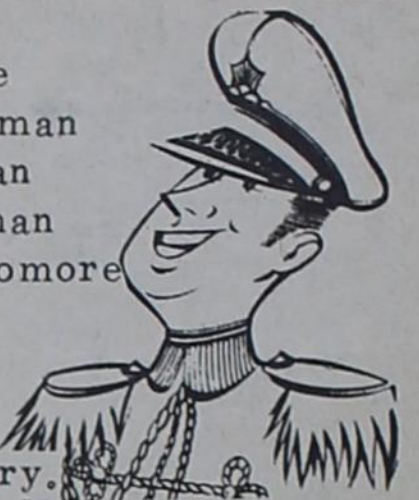
The Farwell 8th grade defeated Silverton in the game by a resounding score, putting them in a better position to bring home the district title.

Terry Lovett, state president of the New Mexico FBLA (Future Business Leaders of America) and a senior in the

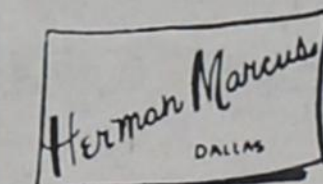
