He was a self-employed electrician, starting Lee's Electric in 1966. He was known for helping quickly when needed. His wife was a great help to the family business.





175 years ago

On one morning 175 years ago, April 21, 1836, the dawn was bleak and forlorn for the freedom fighters of Texas.

The dictator, Generalissimo Antonio Santa Anna, had abolished the Mexican Constitution of 1824 and in the 12 provinces of Mexico that had rebelled against his tyranny, he was slaughtering the free men and women who opposed him. When the southern rebellions were crushed, he led an army of about 4,000 north from Mexico City to crush the cries for freedom in the province of Coahuila-Tejas.

After 13-day battle, Santa Anna's army on March 6 slaughtered the 182 defenders of the fortification established at the Alamo in San Antonio and on March 27 it murdered the 342 men under Col. their surrender Goliad.

On this morning of April 21, he was closing in on Gen. Sam Houston and his rag-tag force of 900 Texians (Anglo-Texans) and Tejanos (Hispanic-Texans) on the bayous near the Gulf Coast. The Texas freedom fighters and the Mexican army watched each other warily from their separate campsites in the marshes at a place called San Jacinto.

Because Santa Anna had 1,500 soldiers, outgunned him in artillery, outmatched him in cavalry, and had two other armies advancing join his main force, Houston could have prudently attempted to try and outrun Santa Anna.

But on this day, Houston and his fighters chose to stand and fight. They risked their families, their lives, and all the dreams they had for the rest of their lives. They risked it all for freedom. They

them. They risked it all for us.

Houston led his infantry in silence through the trees and Spanish moss in the afternoon, during the traditional siesta time, closing to within yards of the Mexican camp before being detected. After the initial volley from the muskets, his Texians and Tejanos charged with the bayonet, shouting "Remember the Alamo" and "Remember Goliad", determined to grant no more quarter to Santa Anna's army than it had

The battle itself lasted only about 18 minutes in which time nine Texas warriors were killed and Houston was wounded, the only casualties they would suffer. The Tejanos and Texians, haunted by the slaughter of their friends in March, unleashed their fury and by sunset, more than 700 Mexican soldiers were dead, 730 were captured, and the remainder fled in terror as the Texas cavalry pursued them.

The victors of Texas did not execute Santa James Fannin despite Anna, but that left them with a problem; the government in Mexico City refused to accept the return of a defeated dictator. He was instead transported to exile in Washington, D.C., for a short period.

> He ultimately would return to Mexico and between 1833 and 1855 he was to rule Mexico 11 different times. He vaingloriously proclaimed himself to be "the Napoleon of the West" although military historians record him as being


risked it all for the gener- one of the worst military ations who would follow leaders in world history. He finally died in obscurity in Mexico on a small pension almost 40 years after his greatest defeat at San Jacinto.

April 21 remains one of most important dates in the history of the world. Santa Anna's armies had crushed the rebellions against his tyranny in every other province of Mexico but here alone, in Texas 175 years ago, it succeeded.

Within a decade of San Jacinto. Texas would become state. Following America's victory over Santa Anna in 1846, the territories that are today New Mexico, Arizona, and Nevada were also freed. Santa Anna's spirit of brutality has always refused to join him in his grave through all the years since his death, however. The current nightmare on the border hideously proclaims that the contagions of his terror and oppression have never been eradicated.

Our American nation is imperfect, no question about that, but less so than the other countries on this planet. Free markets, class mobility, and opportunity have been the rule here rather than the exception. Critics endlessly about the faults of the American Republic, criticisms which in our system are even encouraged.

But the fact remains that this is the finest nation that ever existed. Millions of people confirm that when they endure the bureaucratic nightmare of legal immigration to get here, or the dangerous and illegal

The Texico City Council on April 12 discussed an issue with property at the intersection of Rose and Avenue F.

The property deed in the name of Mr. Goforth shows that Avenue F should have dead-ended into the property, but years ago the road was extended into the

Tom and Kathy Landry are in the process of buying the land and asked for a variance to put four mobile homes on the lot.

The Council asked City Inspector Terry Martin to look into the lot sizes to see if there was enough room for the trailers.

Martin said he wasn't sure if there was enough room, especially if the city right-of-way was taken out of the property also.

Part of the property also lies outside of city limits.

City Attorney Ty Rutter said he believed the road had been continuously used and maintained by the city long enough that it would fall under rules of easement by prescription, meaning the road would stay.


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Texico golfers take 1st place in Clovis

Live Cattle prices bottomed early last week, but prices were unable to find any buyers to push prices back up. Cash trade dropped down to \$119 from \$123-124.00 last week. If the market fails to move higher early this week and the market closes below last weeks low which is now support, expect to see another test of the March lows around the \$110.50 level basis the June contract. Seasonal's are down in April.

Feeder prices are looking at the same situation facing the Live Cattle. Prices saw just a little more recovery after bottoming early last week, but failed to show much into Friday's close. A close below last weeks low should lead to another leg down to test their market lows around the \$128.00 level basis the May contract.

Soybean prices dropped below most of their support levels and stopped last week. There is very little support at these levels. The market may be able to see a little rally early this week, but like so many other markets, a close below last weeks low would project another leg down to test the March low around \$12.78 basis the July contract.

Corn prices have continued to remain one of the strongest of the grain complex. Prices have been able to reach new contract highs, but the pull back down last week looks like a failure to penetrate the 2008 high at this time. Although it's still too early to call this rally a failure, it's something to keep in the back of your mind? The strongest level of support at this time lies around the March high which was \$7.45 basis the July contract. For the most part, prices are trading inside a tight range at this time.

Wheat prices traded down for several days in a row. Odds are good that a pop back to the upside could take place at anytime. Most of the fundamental's have probably been factored into prices around these levels, but a change in the overall grain complex will either pull prices one way or the other. Odds are good that wheat will continue to trade closer to soybean prices than corn over the near term.

Cotton prices also sold off over the last few days and may now be in a position to rally for a few days. Like most markets, the Funds will continue to play an important role in supporting prices and fundamentals may remain secondary? Technically, short term trends turned down, but long term trends remain higher. Severely dry conditions across much of the Texas area could help to support prices at these levels.



Early yesterday morning several women set out for Joseph's garden to complete the task of annointing Christ's body. They kept asking each other, "Who shall roll away the stone from the door of the sepulchre?"

When they came to the grave they saw that the stone was rolled away. They could harly believe their eyes, for on the stone was a most unusual person. He was dressed in a pure white garment

and his face was as brilliant as lightning. It is reported that this was an angel and that he told the women, "Fear not, for I know that you seek Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for He is risen as He said. Come see the place where you and the others put His body. Now go quickly and tell His disciples that He is risen from the

dead, and He will meet you in Gaillee.' The women left the grave and as they returned to the city they were met by the risen Jesus whom they immediately recognized.

Another follower of Jesus, Mary Magdalene, also came to the grave early yesterday. Mary remained at the grave and was very dejected over the absence of Christ's body. She even accused a man, whom she thought was the local gardener, of stealing the body. To her utter surprise, this man was none other than the risen Christ who identified Himself by calling her by her name.

Reluctantly but deliberately, he washed his hands before the mob, saying: "I am innocent of the blood of this just Person; see to it yourselves." Reluctantly he signed the death warrant for Jesus of Nazareth. Justice finally had been trampled into the dust. Pilate had sold out to the opposition.

This raises some interesting questions: Will Rome condone such action in its courts? Can Pilate continue as Governor? What, in fact, does the future hold for Pilate? Time alone will tell.

A conversation took place between Jesus on the center cross and the thief who was crucified on His right. The thief apparently recognized in Jesus more than criminal traits as he asked to be remembered by Him in His kingdom. The thief received the answer, "Today you shall be with Me in paradise."

Great concern was expressed about the darkness which prevailed for three hours, from noon to three in the afternoon. Out of that darkness Jesus was heard to cry in a tone of

He has been active in the Rotary Club for many years, serving as president and in other offices, and has entertained many with his quick wit and "thoughts for the day."


He currently serves on the High Plains Emmaus Community Board and is president of the Farwell **Hospital District Board.**







Planting season nears

by Benji Henderson, Parmer County extension agent:

Planting season is growing closer. A good rain would do as much good as anything. Many producers are pre-watering ground and getting ready for spring planting.

With cotton on many producers' minds, we need to look at fertility and what cotton needs to produce a desired yield. Nitrogen is many times one of the most expensive portions of a cotton fertility program. A soil sample is needed to determine the amount of residual nitrogen available to the crop.

The following chart gives basic recommendations for the amount of nitrogen needed to produce various yields in cotton.

Yield (bales/acre)	Nitrogen Recommendation (lbs./acre)
1/2 bale	25
1 bale	50
1 1/2 bale	75
2 bale	100
2 1/2 bale	125



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

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
