Next week is Public Schools Week in Texas. W. M. Roberts, Farwell School Superintendent, has prepared a very interesting article on this observance. I think it worthy of use in this week's column.

"Our forefathers in their wisdom, recognizing their importance of education in the function and operation of a democracy, established the public school to make education available to all. The people of Texas declared, by the expressed terms of the State Constitution, a 'general diffusion of knowledge being essential to the preservation of the liberties and right of the people, it shall be the duty of the Legislature of the State to establish and make suitable provision for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of public free schools."

"The 1854 school law provided for the first Public School System in Texas. As the years passed our laws were strengthened to make sure that all children of school age shared in this opportunity for public education. Today, the importance of education is not a debatable subject. Our job is to see that the children of this generation get the best possible education we can give them."

"By visiting the schools and familiarizing ourselves with the problems of teachers and students, we become more competent to safeguard and advance the institution that is so American, the public school."

"The need for the public school never changes, but times and conditions may change, or require to be changed, methods and practices of public education. This is inherent with anything that grows, for growth is the result of change."

"It is a healthy thing in our democratic way of life to have intelligent understanding of the important functions of our basic institutions. This is especially true of the schools. The initiative and resourcefulness and the wisdom and leadership that our schools are inculcating in the youth of today are the answers of the problems of citizenship in the years ahead."

"Yes, 'bring me men to match my mountains.' That is the need of our times and must come from the public schools -- schools that are strong in virtues required for building strong men and women."

"We can be assured of this and do our part in understanding and helping the public schools to fulfill their great obligation to our times by being a participant in the annual Public Schools Week, March 7-11, 1966."

"The Farwell Public Schools will hold open house; accept their hospitality, and you will enjoy the experience of going back to school -- if but for a day."

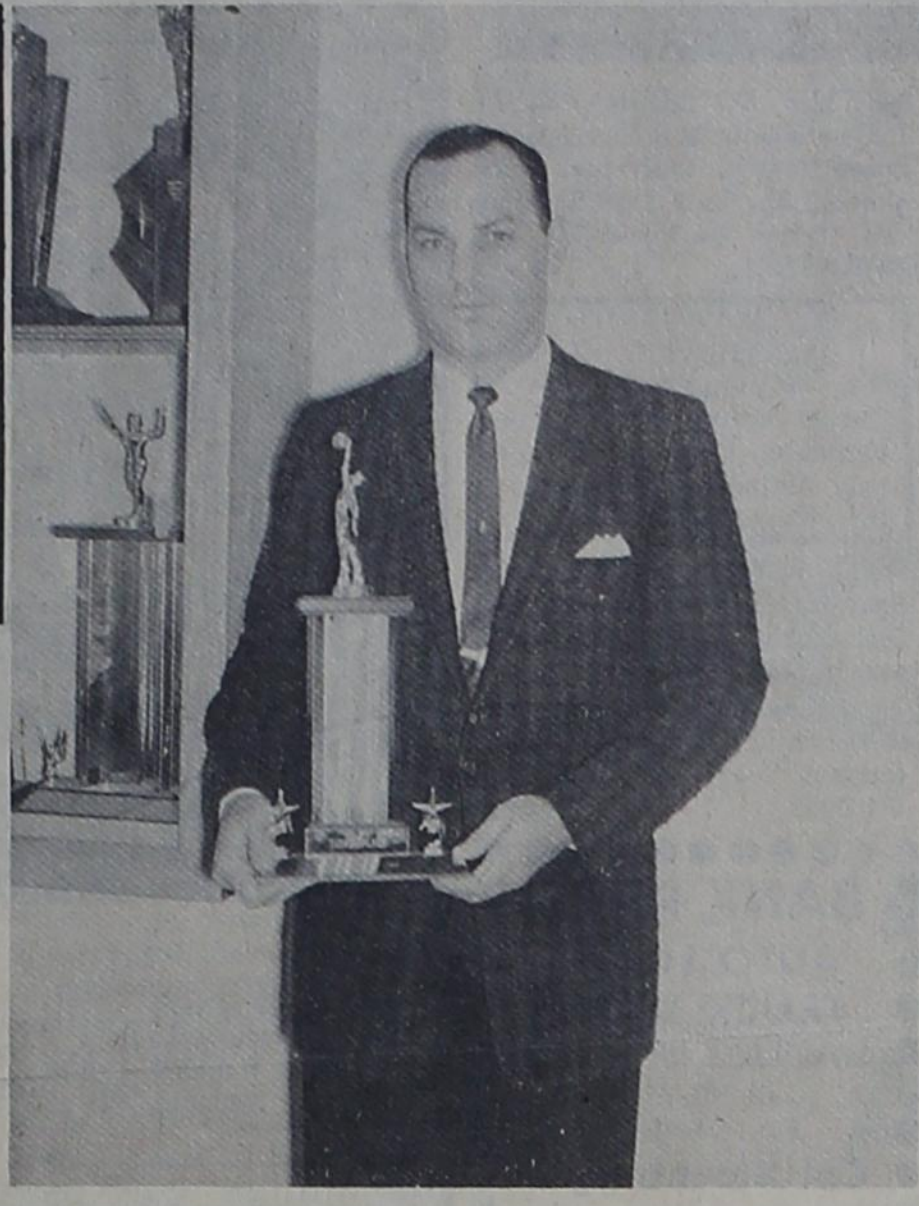
72 Persons Called For Petit Jury

Wolves Finish Third In Dist.

Texico Wolverine's finished their basketball season on Saturday by defeating a strong Causey team for third place in the district tournament. In previous games in the tournament they had been defeated by top-seeded Floyd, and had taken a game from Elida.

Final score in the Texico-Causey game was 76-67, with Gary Brakebill second highest scorer in the state (all schools) netting a total of 33 points for Causey in the game. Manuel Martinez had 25 for Texico followed by Joe Patterson with 23.

Texico was behind at the end of the first stanza 20-14 but by half time they had forged ahead to lead by a one point margin (32-31). During the final two stanzas Texico scored 22 points in each quarter and Causey scored 18 in each stanza.

Coach Johnny Green said, "I am proud of the effort of the team for the whole season. They started slow but by the end of the season they had developed and came along real strong." He went on to say, "If Texico had had the breaks in the tournament they might now be playing in regional, but then that is the way the ball bounces," he concluded.

Following the tournament an all-tournament team was picked by the press with two Texico boys, Joe Patterson and Manuel Martinez, named to the team and

another, Duane Williamson, given honorable mention.

Patterson's scoring record for the tournament was 15.7 and his season record is 20 points per game. Martinez racked up an enviable 20.3 record for the tournament. Brakebill, second scorer in the state from Causey, had the top record for the tournament of 32.2.

Other boys named to the tournament team are: Larry Washington, Greg Burris and Charles McCallister, all of Floyd; Charlie Fallon, Ft. Sumner; Bill Bryant, Elida; Loren Molleur, Tatum; and Gayle Carter, Grady.

Floyd, who had been top seeded team for District 6B, won the tournament as expected, although not as easily as predicted. Ft. Sumner, third seeded team in District 6B was winner of second place. The two teams are playing in regional this week at Santa Rosa. Top teams in District 7B are Santa Rosa and San Jon. Winners of this playoff will be playing at the state tournament next week in Albuquerque.

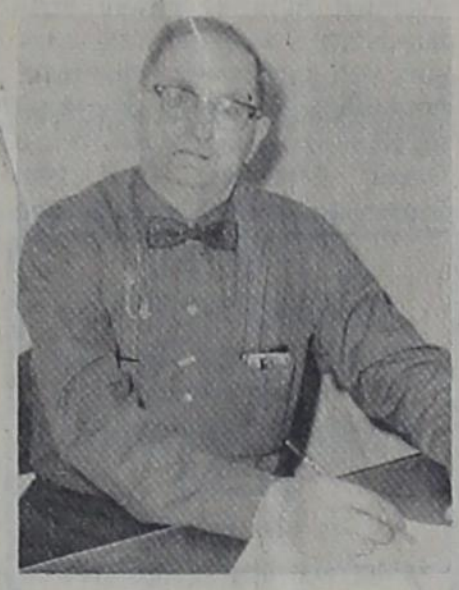
Coach Johnny Green commented that the Wolves have had a pretty good season, winning 13 games and losing 12 during the year. They finished fourth in the EPAC tournament and third in district play.

Final score in the Floyd-Texico game was 86-67.

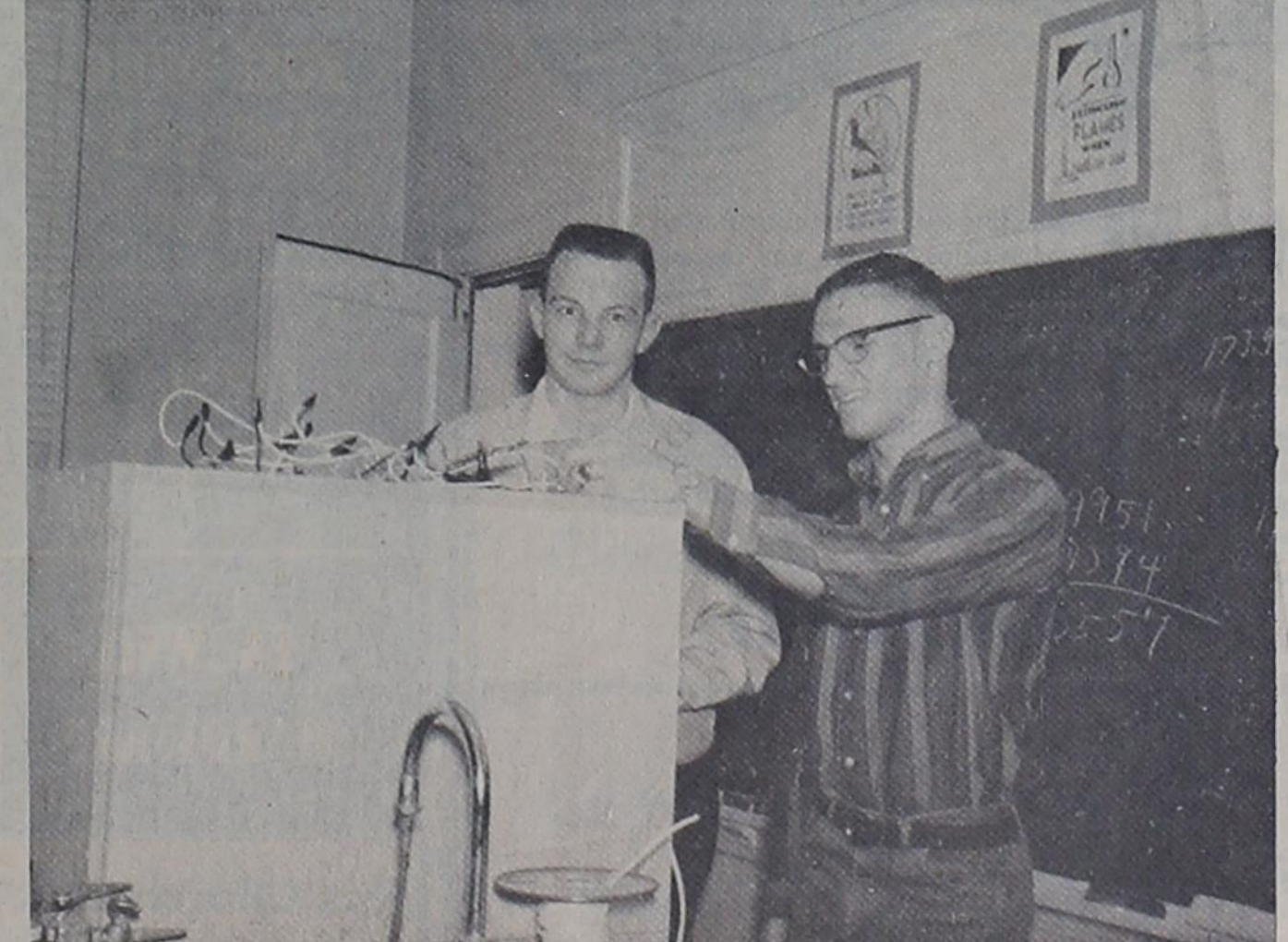
Science Fair Set At Farwell School

Five ballots were spoiled and could not be counted. There are approximately 350 registered voters in Texico, but the voting was considered above average.

Izzard was born in Chicago in 1900 and moved to the Kansas City area with his parents when he was seven years of age, where he grew up. He got into World War I barely in time to become a corporal and when he was mustered out he began work as a cub reporter for the old Kansas City Journal.

After a year on this job he decided to attend college and four years later he was graduated from the University of Illinois. He returned to work for the Kansas City Journal for a few months, later he applied for and got a job on a newspaper being started in Amarillo, by Gene Howe, son of the famed country editor of Atchison, Kan. (Ed Howe).

Izzard has been with the Amarillo operation since, during mergers, expansions and a deep plunge into the radio-TV business. He is now editor and publisher of the Daily News and a corporate officer of KGNC Radio and TV. Although he has retired from active broadcasting, he is the oldest radio newscaster in point of service in Texas, his news commentaries dating back to 1928.

Izzard was married to Helen Easterday of Illinois in 1922. They are parents of two children. Their son is head of the KGNC Radio and TV news de-

partment. Their daughter, also married, lives in Albuquerque. The Izzards have seven grandchildren.

The Izzards, who arrived in Amarillo 40 years ago this spring, when Amarillo was a town of no more than 18,000, travel frequently, and have been abroad several times. They have seen Amarillo grow from a small town into a city of some 166,000 residents.

Izzard is a member of the American Society of Newspaper Editors, Sigma Delta Chi, the professional journalism fraternity, and various regional newspaper groups.

County Commissioners Set Tax Valuations

Parmar County Commissioners meeting in regular session on Monday set the tax valuations for the county. Valuations approved by the commissioners are:

Farm and Ranch land: class 1, \$10 per acre; class 2, \$9.00 per acre; class 3, \$8.00 per acre; class 4, \$7.00 per acre; class 5, \$6.00 per acre; class 6, \$5.00 per acre; and class 7, \$4.00 per acre.

Farm improvements: class 1, \$25,000-\$30,000; class 2, \$20,000-\$25,000; class 3, \$15,000-\$20,000; class 4, \$10,000-\$15,000; class 5, \$5,000-\$10,000; class 6, \$2,500-\$5,000 and class 7, \$2,500 and less.

Cotton gins: class 1, \$17,500; class 2, \$14,000 and class 3, \$10,000.

Pool tables, \$100 each; cattle, \$30. per head; horses, \$20 per head; hogs, \$15 per head; and sheep, \$5.00 per head. Irrigation wells, \$500 each. Merchandise, 25% of inventory on January 1.

Automobiles: 1966, \$450; 1965, \$450; 1964, \$400; 1963, \$350; 1962, \$300; 1961, \$250; 1960, \$200; 1959, \$180; 1958, \$160; 1957, \$140; 1956, \$120; 1955, \$100. This tax is set on all motor vehicles including cars, trucks, pickups, tractors and combines.

Grain elevators, four cents per bushel on capacity and 20% of building cost on flat storage.

Town lots, \$100 each; Town property: residence, 10% of cost or value; business, 20% of cost or value. NH3, \$600 each. Tax remains the same at \$1.25 per \$100 valuation for county purposes.

In other business the commissioners approved the minutes of the last meeting and bills for the preceding month. They also authorized the judge to advertise for bids for air conditioning the district courtroom; and also to advertise for bids for purchase of a motor grader for the Lazbuddie precinct, and also for purchase of three new cars for use by the sheriff's department.

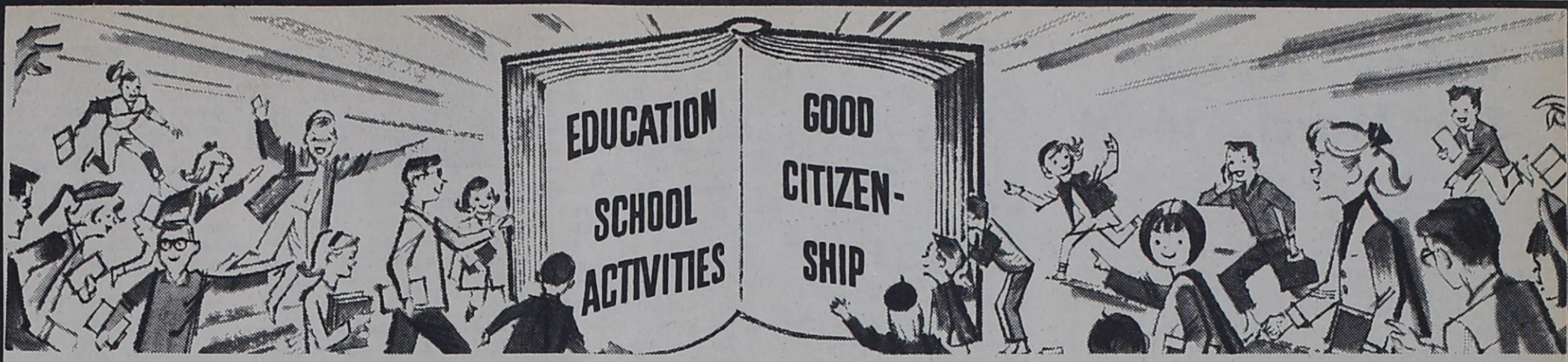

Cotton Growers Have New Weapon Against Seedling Diseases

With cotton planting time approaching, area growers are making plans for their 1966 crop and one of their first considerations will be how to best cope with seedling diseases. Each year damping-off organisms in the soil cause death of countless seedlings which otherwise would develop into mature cotton plants.

A new measure for curbing these diseases were adopted on a trial basis by numerous Texas cotton growers in 1965 and produced outstanding results. This was particularly true in Wharton County, traditionally plagued with heavy seedling disease infestation. The new method centers around Lanstan soil fungicide used in combination with PCNB and applied directly in the furrow at planting time.

Byron Mariner, a Wharton County cotton grower since 1941, reports that he used a Lanstan - PCNB combination on a trial basis on 10 acres of his 1965 cotton crop with excellent results. He found that the new fungicide treatment promoted rapid early growth of cotton seedlings. He notes that first bloom was obtained in the field where Lanstan - PCNB had been applied, despite the fact that non-Lansta treated plots had been planted earlier. More important, he found that where Lanstan was used he had an excellent stand, with few skips, while on untreated plots he had a badly broken stand which was entirely unsatisfactory.

Developed in the research laboratories of Niagara Chemical Division of FMC Corporation, Lanstan soil fungicide is effective against such cotton seedling diseases as sore shin and damping-off -- relating to the Fusarium, Rhizium and Rhizoctonia species of soil fungi. It has been shown to be highly effective against these organisms when used alone -- as has been the case in California and other areas -- but in Texas preference has been shown for its use in combination with PCNB.

Benji Dial Receives Final Football Letter

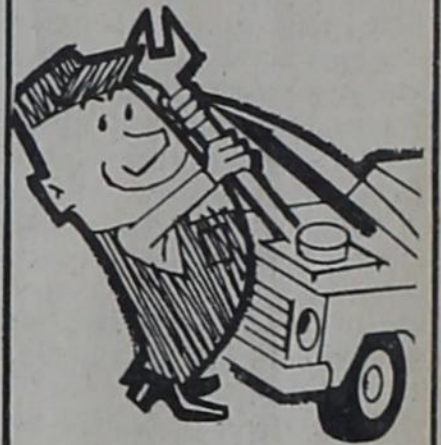
Among the five seniors at Eastern New Mexico University who received their final football letter recently was Benji Dial, son of Mrs. Clytie Dial, Farwell.

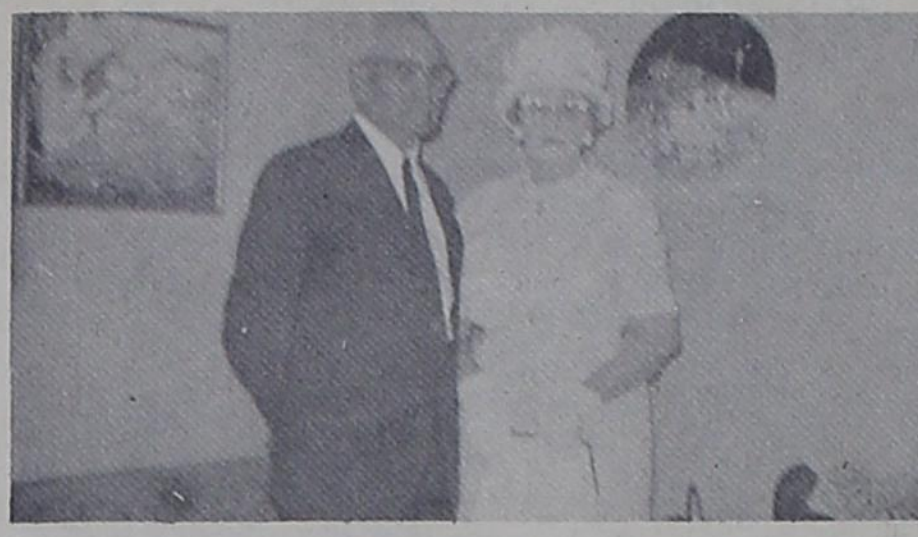

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Our Seasonal Man From Uncle

(EDITOR'S NOTE -- The following article which appeared recently in a San Antonio paper tells a little about the interesting life led by David Sides and his wife, the former Gladys Bates, both of whom were residents of Parmer County several years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Sides taught in the Rhea and Oklahoma Lane school systems in the early 1930's where Sides served as basketball coach. After leaving Oklahoma Lane, Sides began work for the U. S. Government and also spent some time in the Army. His wife, Gladys, who worked for the Civil Service, retired last year.

Sides is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Sides. He has a brother, Sam Sides, who lives in Hereford, and a sister, Mrs. Jewel Barry of Bovina. Mr. and Mrs. Sides are parents of four children and have 11 grandchildren. They have a home in San Antonio but spend most of their weekends at their home on the river, between Marble Falls and the Wurtz Dam, according to Mrs. Barry.

who could don a red suit and pass for Santa Claus. Instead he is something of a seasonal Man from Uncle.

He's administrative officer of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service office at 434 S. Main Ave. in San Antonio, a third-floor labyrinth of helpfulness and hunters from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31 every year.

The help comes at this time of year from trained field and office auditors who answer the phoned-in questions of taxpayers from 8:15 a.m. to 5 p.m. and other agents who provide personal assistance in filling out tax returns at the office. Hunters seek out the chronic group of tax-hating individuals who file their returns with the Austin district office but neglect to include a check for taxes owed and then maintain studied indifference to settling accounts.

Sides credits the majority of taxpayers with being honest and smart -- some of them too smart.

"In looking over returns," says Sides, "we find that CPAs and attorneys get trapped by the same thing we do -- the taxpayer withholds information because he's smart enough to know what's going to hurt him and what's not going to hurt him."

But the taxpayer who thinks he's being smart "sometimes hangs himself because he hasn't secured the proper information," Sides adds. Instead of saving money he may wind up overpaying his taxes.

An IRS auditor can spot the mistake, says Sides, but he can only adjust. "We have no power to change" the return.

If a man operates a complicated business, Sides recommends that he seek the services of a tax accountant "be-

fore he gets into trouble" not after the harm has been done.

The collection division of the IRS office here handles a "tremendous amount of cases," Sides relates, although adding that the number is small in relation to the percentage of people who pay what they owe.

"There are a certain number of people who don't like income taxes, just like they hate to pay rent. They're a chronic group," he says.

When the chronic ones ignore a statement from the Austin office asking for remittance of taxes owed, the cases are referred to the San Antonio office collection division.

If the non-taxpayers show a continued lack of interest in letters asking them to drop by the IRS office and settle up, a field collection group "goes hunting them."

"They're the ones," Sides says, "who start putting tags on property and collecting wages."

And there are some businesses who withhold tax moneys from employes' wages as required by law, but also withhold them from Uncle Sam.

"Maybe the business hasn't been doing so well and needs a little extra cash," Sides suggests, and the money in the trust fund suddenly becomes working capital.

Sides readily admits that the IRS is sometimes "properly accused" of giving wrong answers to taxpayers based on facts relayed. But, he points out, it's frequently because the taxpayer is guilty of not stating all of the facts.

Administrative officer of the IRS office here since 1956, Sides has been a U.S. Treasury man since 1937. Times have changed, but "some people still think that agents get a commission on the taxes collected," he says with a smile.

Medicare Meetings For Parmer County

Three Medicare information meetings have been scheduled for Parmer County on Wednesday, March 9. These are joint projects with the Social Security Administration, Parmer

County program building committee and the county extension agents.

The meeting schedule for March 9 is:

10:30 a.m. in Farwell at the Security State Bank Community Room;

1:30 p.m. in Bovina at the First State Bank Community Room;

3:30 p.m. in the Friona State Bank Community Room.

People who are age 65 and not receiving social security benefits or not receiving Old-Age assistance will be interested in recent changes in Social Security Law. It is now possible for them to participate in health insurance programs (Medicare) even though they are still working and earning too much to permit payment of retirement benefits. Also, they may be eligible to participate in Health Insurance programs if they're age 65 even though they have never worked under Social Security.

An application for these benefits, however, must be filed before March 21 if the applicant was 65 before January 1, 1966.

These meetings are being held especially for people over 65 and they are urged to attend one of these meetings. There will be an explanation of the health insurance programs and an opportunity to ask questions and to file an application.

Permits Issued By City Clerk

The Friday meeting of the Farwell City Commission was a routine session with bills for the past month approved and ordered paid. All other business was of a routine nature.

Bill Clayton's Legislative Report

A large majority of the members of the Texas Legislature have voted for a voter-registration bill that will provide for annual registration of voters with no fees charged. The new law would be similar to the present poll tax registration law, but would provide that a fee be charged for such registration.

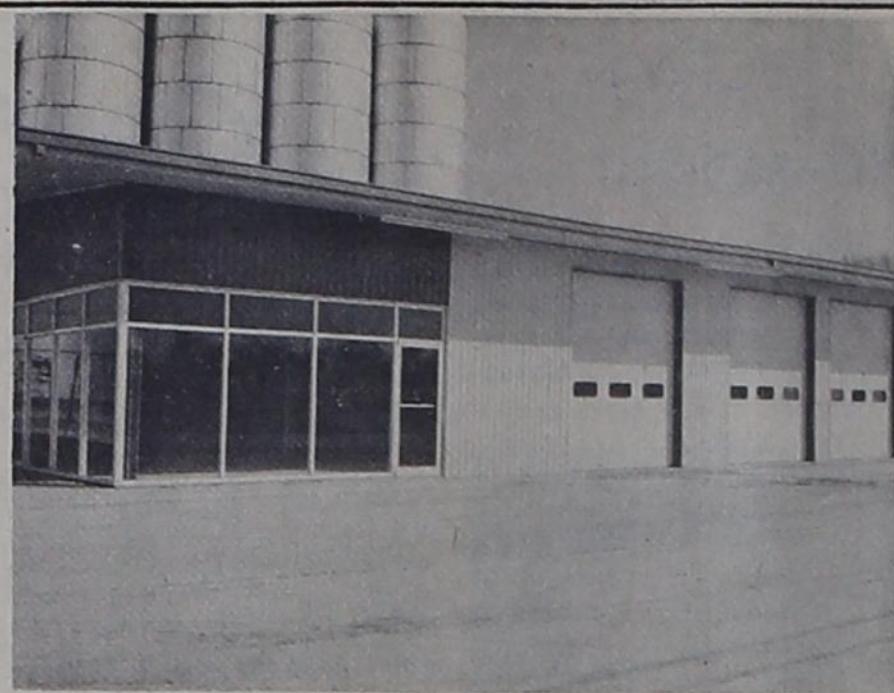
The Governor did not extend the call to include any other legislation, and the members of the legislature voted to adjourn February 23, 1966.

"When their returns are examined for the first time, they're always very wary, very scared."

Then, with a chuckle, he can think of a case, "an elderly person who's laughing all the time; about the only contact he's had is with an agricultural agent, and then an income tax man shows up. It really scares him."

But the IRS is not out to scare, Sides stresses. If there's a liability it is to be corrected. That's all.

6 Accidents Investigated In Parmer County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of January, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor.

These crashes resulted in two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$2,760.00.

April 15 is the deadline to have your motor vehicle inspected. During the past five and one-half months only 2,000,000 or 40% of the approximately 5,000,000 registered vehicles in Texas have been in-

spected. This leaves 3,000,000 vehicles to be inspected in approximately two months. If the number of uninspected vehicles were divided evenly among the 5,200 official inspection stations in Texas each would have approximately 577 vehicles to inspect in about 40 working days, or about 15 vehicles per day. The inspection stations in heavily populated areas will have more than this average number to inspect. In areas where there are only a few inspection stations you may have many miles to travel to get your vehicle inspected.

The Sergeant urges motorists to have their vehicles inspected without delay to avoid the inconvenience of waiting lines. Remember -- no extension of the Safety Inspection deadline, April 15, 1966.
