

Warren Wins Clerk's Race In Demo Primary

Parmer County Democrats, voting in the primary election Saturday, named a county clerk in the only contested county-wide race.

Mrs. Bonnie Warren, the incumbent county clerk, received a total vote of 773 as compared with a total of 553 for her opponent, Mrs. Joyce Haseloff. Both are from Farwell.

Parmer Countians gave a more than 3-2 advantage to Andy Rogers of Childress in the State Senate race. Jack Hightower of Vernon was the overall winner in this race, however, as he downed Rogers and a third candidate, James R. Ray, of Hale Center.

Hightower and Rogers were both incumbents in old senatorial districts, but were forced to run against each other after re-districting by state legislatures last year.

In balloting in Parmer County, Rogers had a total of 693. Hightower received 412 and Ray had 69. Rogers carried all boxes in the county except Farwell where Hightower had an advantage of 122-83.

Lack of a close, interesting state-wide race kept the Parmer County vote total from being higher than it was. Most of the county's eight boxes had a light turnout. The exception was Bovina where the Justice-of-the-Peace race, which featured two candidates on the ballot and a strong write-in candidate, brought out a near record turnout of voters.

Vote totals in the Precinct No. 3 JP race were 209 for Wilbur Charles, the write-in candidate; 174 for Lucille Killough, the incumbent; and 103 for Harley Sherich, Charles and Mrs. Killough will meet in the second primary June 4.

The Friona JP race also resulted in a run-off being necessary. Jim Roberts and Walter Lovelace will face each other in it. Mrs. Ben McDonald was the third candidate in the Friona race.

Voters in this county gave overwhelming majorities to the winners of the top three races, John Connolly for governor, Preston Smith for lieutenant

governor and Waggoner Carr for United States senator.

For attorney general, Crawford Martin was a top heavy favorite in this county as he picked up 710 votes as compared with 294 for Franklin Spears and 238 for Galloway Calhoun. Martin and Spears will battle it out for the AG post in the state-wide runoff next month.

A breakdown of voting by Parmer County's eight boxes plus the absentee ballots in the

county, district and state office appears elsewhere in this issue.

County officials being returned to office for four-year terms without opposition in the primary were Loyde A. Brewer, county judge; and Mabel Reynolds, county treasurer.

Two county commissioners were also re-elected without opposition. They were C. H. Jefferson of Precinct No. 2 (Bovina and Rhea) and G. W. Crain of Precinct No. 4 (Lazbuddie). J. R. Thornton, Farwell justice of the peace, was also unopposed in his bid for re-election.

Walter Rogers, United States Congressman from the 18th District of Texas, was unopposed in the primary. He will face a Republican opponent in the general election in November.

Also elected in Saturday's balloting without opposition were Bill Clayton of Springlake, state representative of District 78; and Pat Boone, Jr. of Littlefield, judge of 154th Judicial District.

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Services Held For Glenn A. Singleterry

Survivors include his wife, Lucille; two sons, Monte, Albuquerque, and Gary, University of Costa Rica; one granddaughter, Kimberly, Albuquerque; two brothers, Ray, Clovis, and Pearl, Pleasant Hill; five sisters, Mrs. Velma Billingsley, Stratmore, Calif., Mrs. Dessie Rutledge, Clovis, Mrs. Faye Wilson, Friona, Mrs. Gladys McDonald, Texico, and Mrs. Evelyn Tuckness, Amarillo. Also numerous nieces and nephews.

URELY PERSONAL

Another primary election has passed into history. I do not know what, if any, great decisions were rendered by the voters last Saturday. It is difficult to analyze the more subtle aspects of a vote.

Many of our more learned pundits in the journalistic field always see great trends, or deeper meanings, to a vote than I manage to find. However, there are several trends in the past election in Parmer County that are worthy of note. These facts have been obvious in our vote tallies for the past decade.

The Friona precinct is rapidly becoming not only the largest box in the county but bids fair to soon be the majority box. This election saw Friona with 938 eligible voters out of 2503 in the county. This is 38% of the county in just one of the eight voting precincts. Bovina is emerging as the second most important precinct with 526 eligible voters this time.

Farwell has fallen to a weak third by having only 432 registered voters. Obviously we are not keeping up with the rest of the county in our growth and development. As the years go by we are being outstripped in the competition for people, growth, and economic development. In the next election the percentage of voters who turn out to the polls is likely to be a little better. Friona turned out only 45% of their eligible voters while we at Farwell voted 60% of our eligibles.

But the most politically oriented precinct in the county is Bovina who tallied 85% of their eligibles at the polls. They had two races that were of considerable local interest to them and caused this extremely high percentage of voters.

On the other hand, surely the County Clerk's race was of local interest to us also and we mustered only a 60% turnout. I would conclude that on the basis of numbers of voters and percentage of voters turning out, the Farwell precinct is ranking a poor third in the county. Lazbuddie is fast approaching us in voter registration.

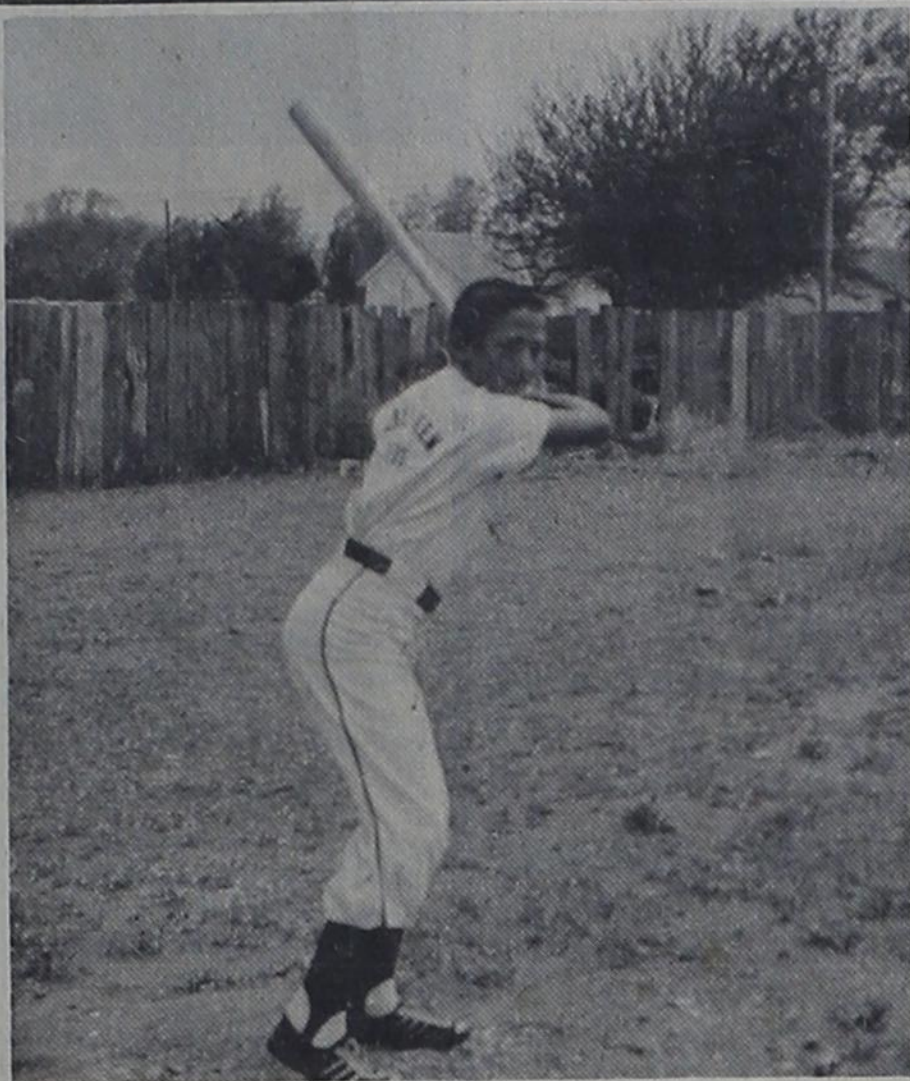
We all know that most of our governmental goodies are passed out on the basis of votes. In the competition for economic survival we are falling behind and as we lag behind, the factors operating against us will increase at a faster pace. Nobody loves a loser, especially a politician when he passes out political favors. Our local leadership had better examine the policies we have been operating under and see if a more venturesome attitude may not be called for. Complacency, self-satisfaction, and selfishness, are poor building blocks to rest our future growth upon.

We attended the Farwell Senior Class play Tuesday evening. It was a very enjoyable evening from the standpoint of the play itself. The old auditorium was up to its usually distracting self. Noise, heat and poor acoustics robbed the actors of much of their effectiveness.

One factor that has been evident for some time is the tendency of the small fry to act in an unrestrained manner that causes much of the dialogue to be lost in a shuffle of feet and a scrape of chairs. The practice of public discipline has long disappeared and often the enjoyment of the public to a play, speech, or ballgame is spoiled by the undisciplined actions of a small group.

Even our church services are often arenas of public embarrassment to all concerned. We heartily condemn the actions of the teenage mobs in our large cities, but fail to remember that discipline begins early in life.

It is often said, with a great deal of truth, give me the child's first seven years and I will have the rest.

Little League Baseball Season Begins June 2

With the beginning of the Little League Baseball season less than one month away there is still a great need for coaches and umpires for the program, according to Fred Chandler who is in charge of the program this year. The program is sponsored by the Texico-Farwell Lions Club and the two communities.

Chandler says that plans call for four PeeWee teams (boys 7-10) and four Little League teams (boys 11-13). In addition plans are underway to organize at least four girls' softball teams. Girls 10-18 are eligible to participate.

At the present time only 64 boys have signed up for the program. Chandler urges all boys to return the letters which were sent out earlier immediately, since all boys must have their parents consent to participate in the summer program. Plans cannot be completed until workers in the program know how many boys and of which ages can be expected to participate.

Letters will be sent out for the girls league in the near future.

The summer program which gets underway on June 2 will end with a tournament on July 28-30. The invitational tournament will involve teams from Bovina, Texico-Farwell, Elida, Portales, Muleshoe and Fort Sumner.

Regular season play will end on July 2.

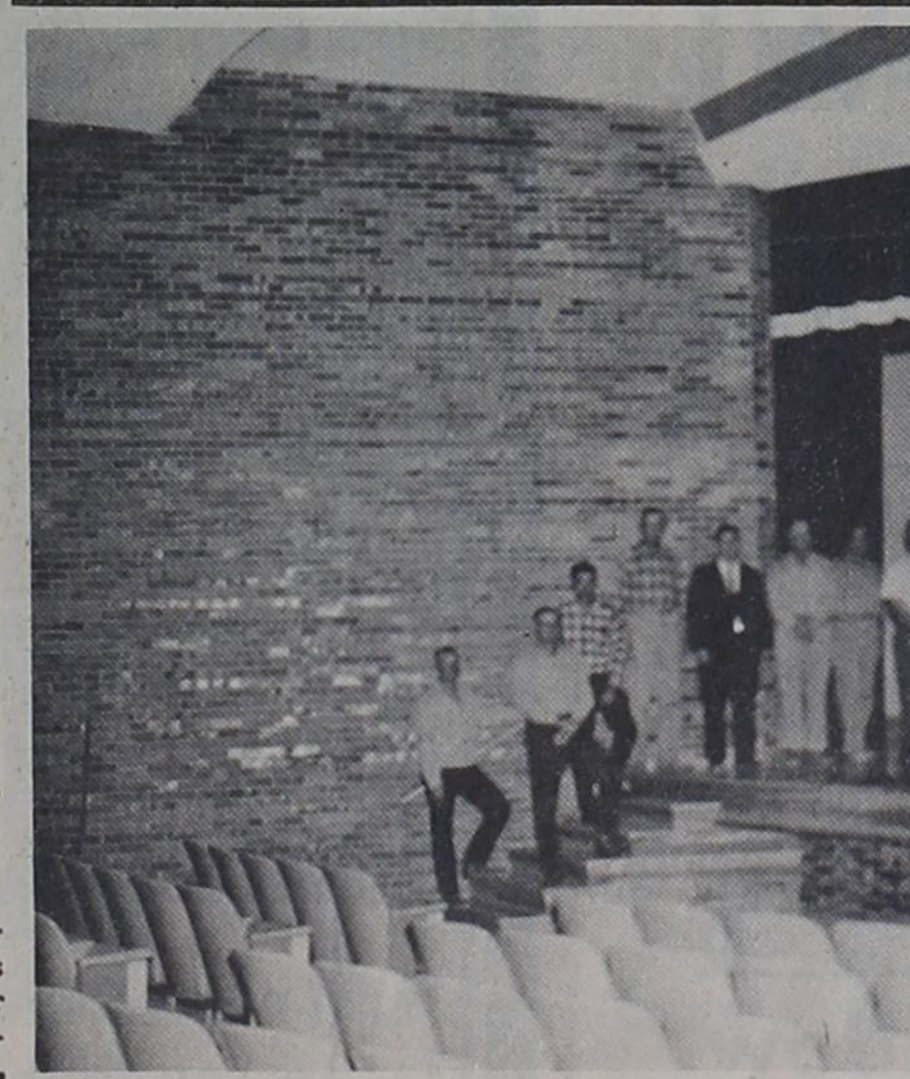
In Texico -- Commencement Set

Texico School Top Students

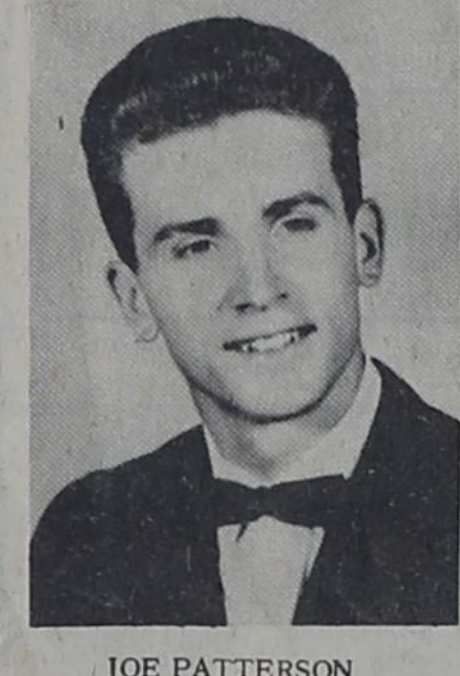

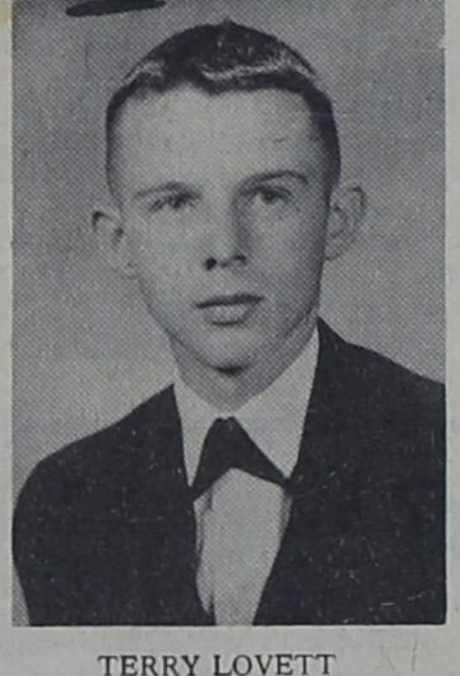
In addition he is serving as president of the senior class and is active in sports, participating in softball, basketball (honorable mention all state team), and track.

Steven Joe Blair, salutarian, will extend the welcome and Greg Scott Hargrove will give the valedictory address.

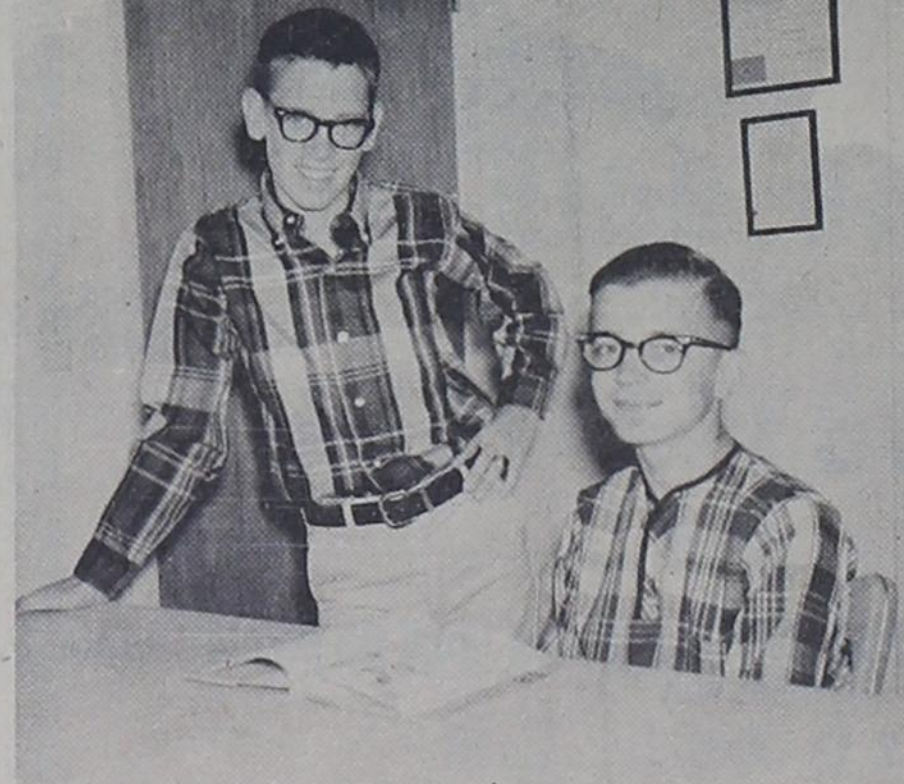

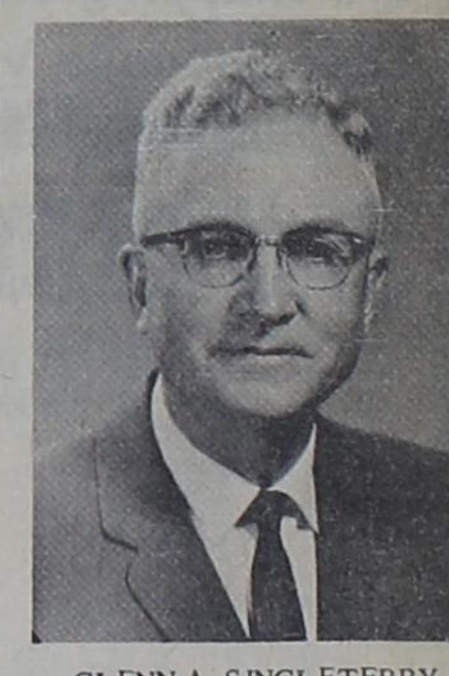

Girls' Auxiliary Observes Focus Week

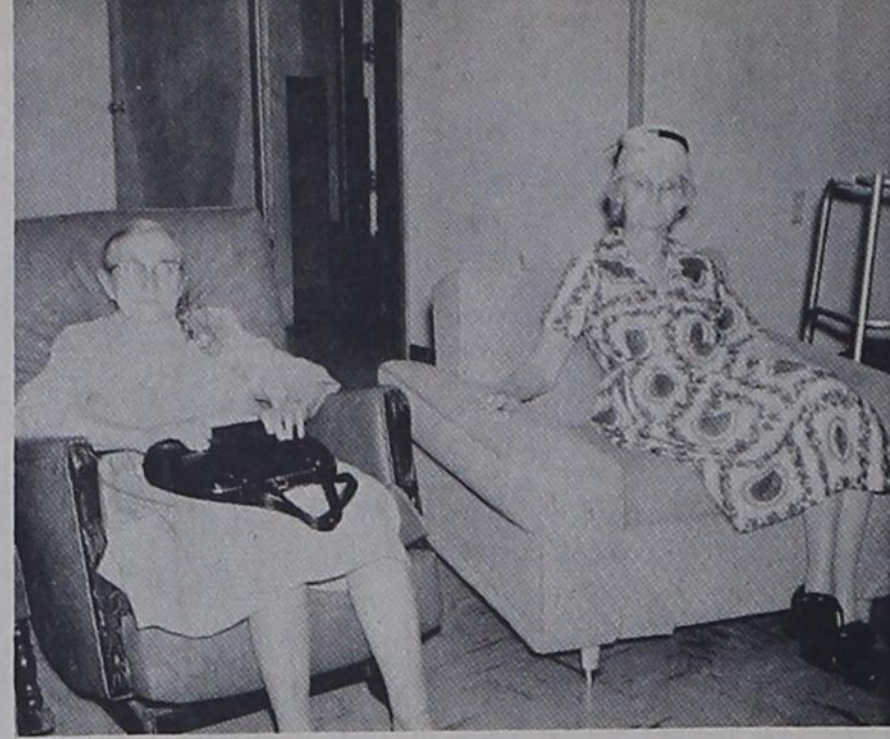

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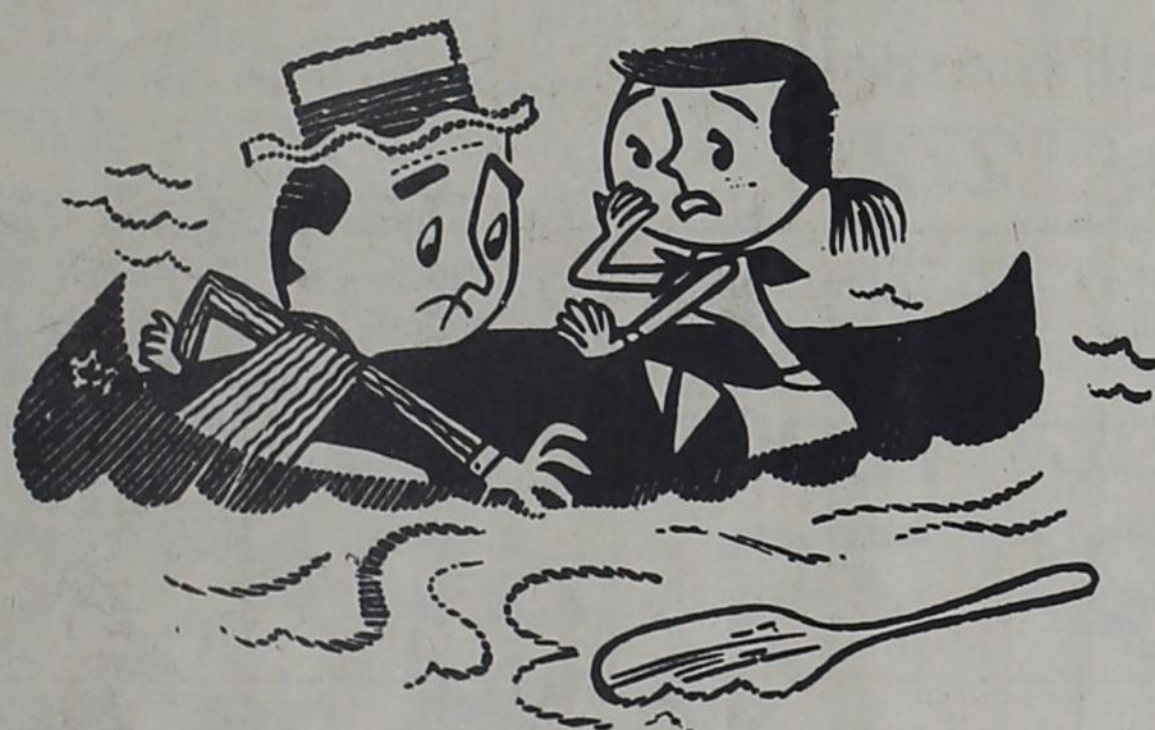

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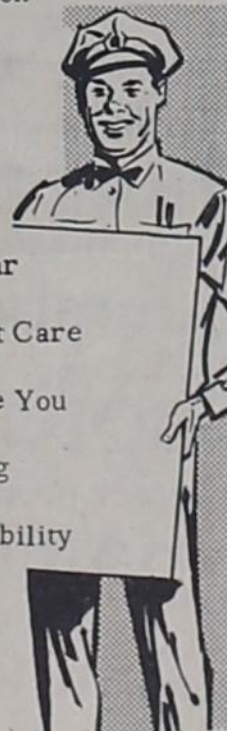
