Grand Jury Returns 19 True Bills



Fifteen of the persons indicted are either in custody or have been released on bond. Four of the persons have not been apprehended.



The time of the primaries draws near, both for Texas and New Mexico. We have a goodly supply of candidates running for the various offices that are open this year. It is good to see so many contests in the Republican Party this year.

Curry County Primary Tuesday, May 3

Curry County residents will go to the polls on Tuesday, May 3, to elect Democratic and Republican candidates for county, state and federal offices in the November general elections.

Polls will open at the town hall in Texico at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. (CST). Presiding judge of the election will be Mrs. W. J. Matthews, Democratic Chairwoman. Judges are John Hadley, Republican and Wesley Engram, Democrat; alternate judges are Olan Schlueter, Democrat, and Mrs. John Hadley, Republican. Election clerks are Ruth Reid, Erma Stone and W. L. Freeman. Alternates are Mrs. Grayson Roberts and Mrs. Walter Box.

As has been the practice for the past several years, ballots will be marked by the voting machine.

Democratic candidates for the sheriff's position are Nelson Worley, T. A. Harden and William J. Walden. GOP candidate is James Priest, Dee Blythe, recently appointed to the District Judge's position, is the

only candidate for that office. C. C. Murphy is unopposed for the State Board of Education four year term. Angeline Stanley, Democrat, incumbent county clerk, is seeking re-election. Her opponent is Evelyn Wagner for the GOP. Treasurer Tillie Olson Shaw, Democrat, is also seeking re-election. Opposing Mrs. Shaw is GOP candidate Frances M. Liles.

Grady Tucker, tax assessor, is seeking re-election on the Democratic ticket. His opponent is B. Lyman, Justice of the Peace John Weber, Democrat, seeks the probate judges post being vacated by W. D. (Doc) Gattis. GOP candidate is W. B. Zuber.

Democratic gubernatorial hopefuls are John Burroughs and Gene Lusk. On the Republican side of the slate are State Representatives David Cargo and Clifford Hawley.

Other races which are creating much interest locally are those for state representative and state senator. Incumbent Ike Morgan, Portales, seeks the

four-year post in District 13. Also a candidate for the office on the Democratic ticket is O. D. Shackelford, Republican candidates for the post are Allen W. Schmuck, Gerry O. Deming and Duwayne Laird.

In the District 14 six-year spot are five Democrats: Chick Taylor, Theodore Rozzell, Odus Echols Jr., all of Clovis; and Thomas Mears and Boyd Brown, Portales. GOP contenders for the District 14 spot include Robert Whatley and William D. Hays.

Curry County State Representatives all seek new terms. Hoyt Pattison, incumbent, district 1; Albert T. Cochran, district 2; and Howard Williamson, district 3; are GOP contenders. Democratic candidates are John Miller, David Norvell and Frank Foster, for district 1, 2, and 3, respectively.

Creating much interest is the \$500,000 hospital bond issue which will be decided. The bond, if passed, will be for additional facilities at Clovis Memorial Hospital.

Plans For Little League Summer Program Underway

Fred Chandler, president of the local Jaycees, who will be working with the Little League Baseball program this summer, announces that letters sent to boys who played baseball last summer should be filled in with the name, age, and team membership from last year, plus the signature of the boys parents and returned to him immediately if "you desire to participate in the program this year."

All letters should be returned to Chandler no later than May 2. This does not mean that boys who sign up later than May 2

will not be eligible to play, but simply means, that in order to make plans for the program workers need to know how many boys plan to participate this summer.

Some four or five teams will be organized in both the boys and girls leagues.

Boys seven-13 are eligible to participate. In addition plans are underway for the organization of a girls' softball league. Girls 10-18 are invited to participate. Letters will be sent to prospective members in the near future.

TB Testing Program Set For Farwell School May 3

Mrs. Katherine Lockhart, Farwell school nurse, announces that a tuberculosis testing program will begin in the Farwell school on May 3. She emphasizes that a new state law requires regular examination of school students and personnel for tuberculosis.

All pupils in the first and seventh grade will be required to have such an examination, and they may have same free

of charge at the school. The TB skin test will be given to students in the first and seventh grades whose parents sign and send in the letter which was sent to all homes this week.

No tests can be given without the consent of the parents; therefore, it is important that if a parent wishes his child to have such tests at school he should sign the letter and return it immediately.

All members of the organization are urged to be in attendance.


Jaycee Meeting May 3


Commissioners Discuss Bookmobile



Andy Rogers Discusses Issues

Due to the Federal Court's ultimatum your Texas Legislature was forced to re-district. The old 30th District I have represented for nearly 14 years has been greatly enlarged--300 miles across.

This job of State Senator belongs to YOU, the people, not to me or any other candidate. The whole object of filling this post is that YOU elect the person best able to serve you--not necessarily the most popular, best known and certainly not just the one who can spend the most money in a campaign.

I wish very much to see and visit personally with everyone, and will do so, as much as is humanly possible.

However, the huge size of our district, very limited money resources and the work and responsibility my Seniority places on me limits this personal contact, by me, quite severely.

Therefore, I sincerely request you to examine my record, satisfy yourself and help me spread the word to others.

I am a farmer, stockman, and small businessman, 41 years of age, have been active in church, lodge, civic work and farm and Veterans organizations. My wife, myself, two daughters and one son are native West Texans, of the area including our Senate district. I served three years in the United States Army during World War II and have seven years of college--Texas A&M and the University of Texas.

It is dangerous in our State Legislature not to be "go a long to get along" person. It is dangerous to speak loudly and firmly against some big officeholders when you do not agree with them 100 per cent of the time or oppose some of their programs you believe harmful to your District or State. It is dangerous to seek to really stop pollution of our surface and ground waters. It is, perhaps, even more dangerous to raise your voice against corruption in high places when it arises or to oppose the great out-of-state owned corporations who have so much power in Austin--those who seek to evade their fair share of taxes and seek to shift an ever greater burden to the worker, farmer and Texas-owned businesses.

Andy Rogers has done all of these and therefore is on their list for extermination.

When I first ran for the State Senate in 1952--there was then a great hue and cry to clean up the "mess in Washington". I was an oddity among candidates THEN, as I charged that "Austin is as rotten as Washington" and that "moral integrity is needed most".

I further demanded a law to require state officials and legislators to file for public record, a statement showing their income and its source. This wasn't, and still isn't the way to be very popular in Austin and certain other circles.

In 1954, I, and a few others, urged investigations into several matters, including the Insurance Commission, certain land transactions and certain state contracts. For our efforts we were slandered.

These methods of deceit, etc. have been perfected to an art, and, as has been said, "the perfection of art is to conceal art". But look closely--it is obvious they are at work--not necessarily because all of them love my opponents, but because they seek to destroy an old and proven enemy, Andy Rogers.

I and my family and some friends have suffered economically, socially and politically at the hands of some powerful lobbyists and others. But, I have not run from them in the past--I will not do so now, or in the future.

ISSUES
1. So the first real issue in this race for the 30th Senate District post is, can those who deceive the people and try to manipulate the Legislature and other state officials to their advantage, finally succeed with their tactics and limitless money.

2. In Wichita Falls, the main population center of our district, a group there, several of their number extremely wealthy, pretty well control their city and county. Now they intend to control your Senate representation in Austin. Recently, a banker and a very rich oilman, among their number called a "SECRET" meeting in Wichita Falls to rant and rave how horrible Andy Rogers was and to raise money for one of his opponents. He didn't bother with the facts. MORE IMPORTANT, he didn't tell why he was really against me.

The truth is that in 1959 then Senator George Moffett and other leaders in Wichita Falls asked me to sponsor a law creating a pollution authority to control oil field pollution as Wichita Falls HAD to seek a new water supply and the proposed new lake would be worthless until firm pollution control was initiated.

I passed this bill for Wichita Falls and neighboring towns and it has brought wonderful results.

But the banker and oil man who called the "SECRET" meeting did not explain how he had been and still is considered on of the worst violators of pollution control.

Most of our oilmen, including the major companies have cooperated wonderfully with the pollution authority--but not this gentleman.

He regularly contacts our legislators and other state officials to try to destroy the pollution authority. He is regularly known to be one

of the major political contributors to candidates on every political level.

Shall we let him destroy Andy Rogers who passed the bill to protect our water for all our citizens??

3. The "Iron-Curtain press". In my 18 consecutive years in politics I have never encountered any news media as slanted and biased as the Wichita Falls newspaper.

They have persisted in making "news" for their favorite son and denied every opportunity possible to let their readers know there are even other candidates running.

They have so arrogantly and flagrantly denied the public of its "RIGHT TO KNOW" selfishly violating the accepted and traditional role of the free press.


