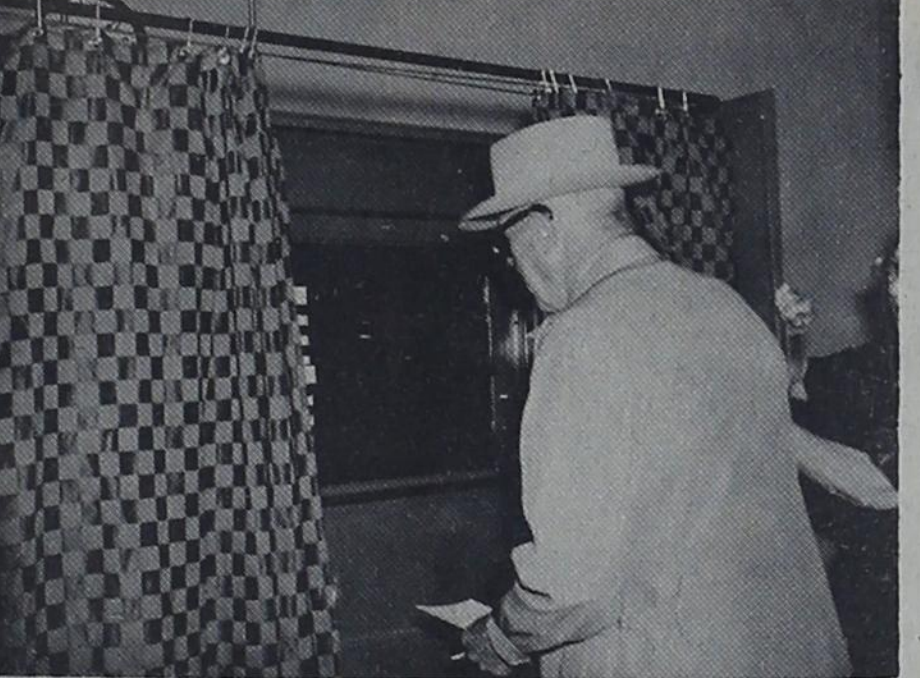

Deposits At Security State Bank Soar To All-Time High

Deposits and total assets at the Security State Bank have soared to the highest peak in the history of the bank, according to R. W. Anderson, vice-president.

Total assets at the bank as of April 6, 1966 were listed as \$7,410,368.06 as compared with assets on April 26, 1965 which stood at \$6,197,566.64. Total assets which for the first time topped the \$7 million mark have risen \$1 million three hundred thousand since this time last year.

Deposits, meanwhile, also took a jump forward with deposits on the report a year ago listed as \$5,638,995.96. Deposits listed on April 6 of this year total \$6,807,408.87.

Anderson said the only thing he could attribute the all time high to was the fact that unusually good crops were made this year; with wheat, cotton and maize all piling off well for the farmers. "We also had more cattle marketed during the year and then people have been saving a little more of what they made this year," he concluded.

Parmer County residents along with registered voters from over the state of Texas will go to the polls on Saturday to select their favorite candidates for the general elections in November on both the Democratic and Republican tickets.

Farwell democrats will vote at the county courtroom in the Parmer County courthouse and Republicans will cast their ballots at the city offices in the city hall.

On the county level the only contested race is that for county clerk where incumbent Bonnie Warren is seeking re-election opposed by Joyce Haseloff, a newcomer to the political battles.

In Precinct 2, Walter Lovelless, Linda McDonald and J. W. Roberts are vying for the Justice of Peace position. Vying for the Justice of Peace position in precinct 3 are Harley Scherich and Lucille Killough.

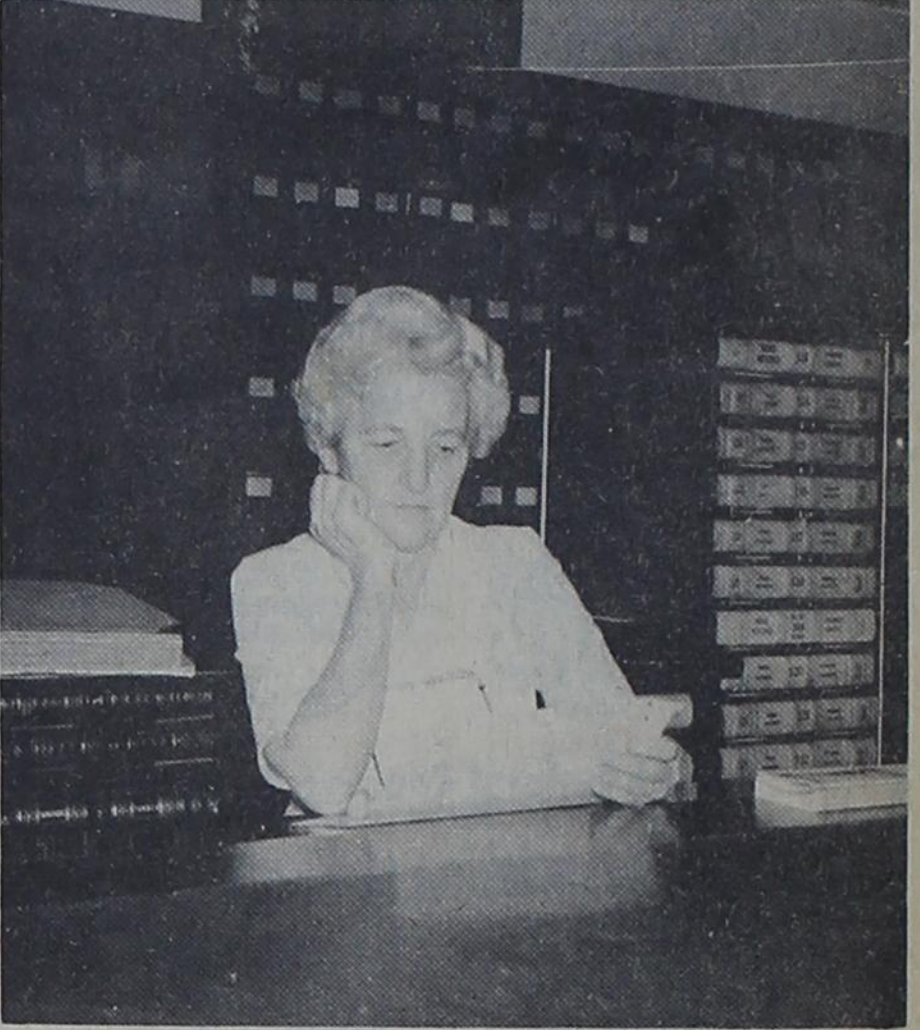
Democrats seeking the nomination for governor are Gov. John Connally, Stanley Woods and Johnnie Mae Hackworth. Preston Smith of Lubbock County and Bill Hollowell of VanZandt County are seeking the democratic nomination for Lieutenant governor.

The present Attorney General Waggoner Carr and John R. (Jack) Willoughby of Harris County are seeking the nomination for United States Senator, a position now held by John Tower, Republican, who is seeking re-election.

Seeking the nomination for Attorney General are Crawford C. Martin of Hill County, Galway Calhoun of Smith County, and Franklin Spears of Bexar County.

Jerry Sadler, incumbent Commissioner of General Land Office, is seeking re-election, opposed by Fred Williams. Seeking the nomination for Railroad Commissioner are Byron Tunnell of Smith County, Paul B. Haring of Goliad County, and P. S. (Puss) Ervin of Dallas County. Jack Onion of Bexar County and W. T. McDonald of Brazos County are seeking the nomination for Court of Criminal Appeals Judge. James R. Ray, Jack Hightower and Andy Rogers are seeking the nomination for state senator from the 30th Senatorial district.

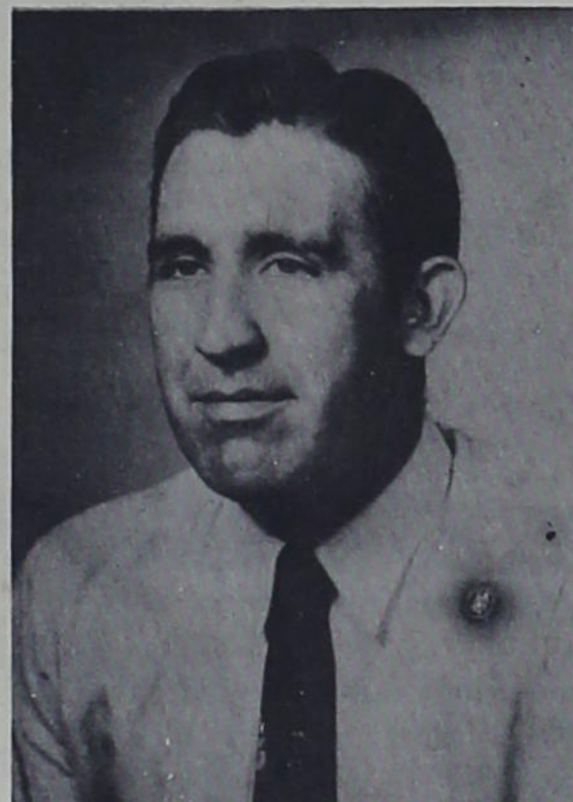

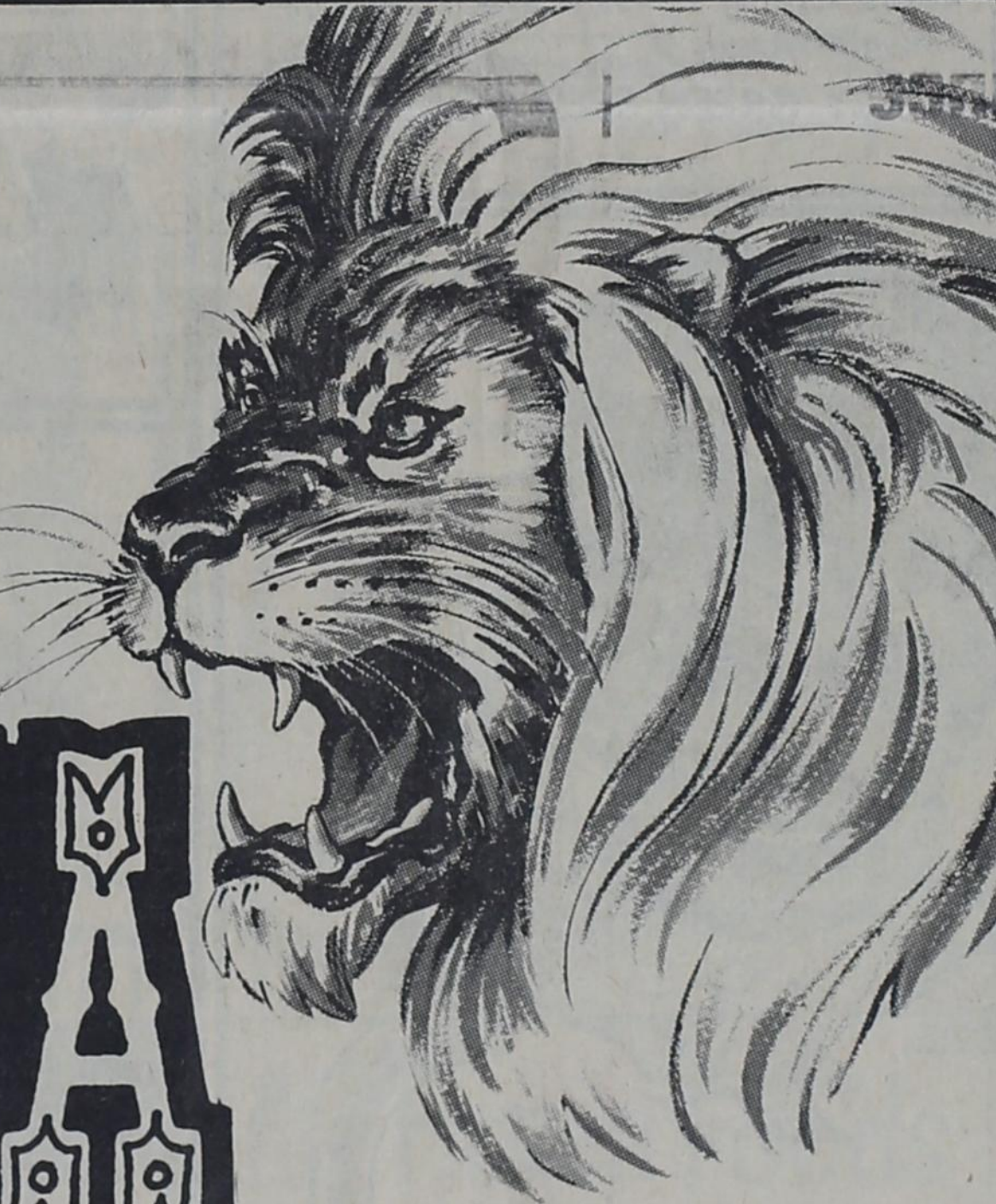

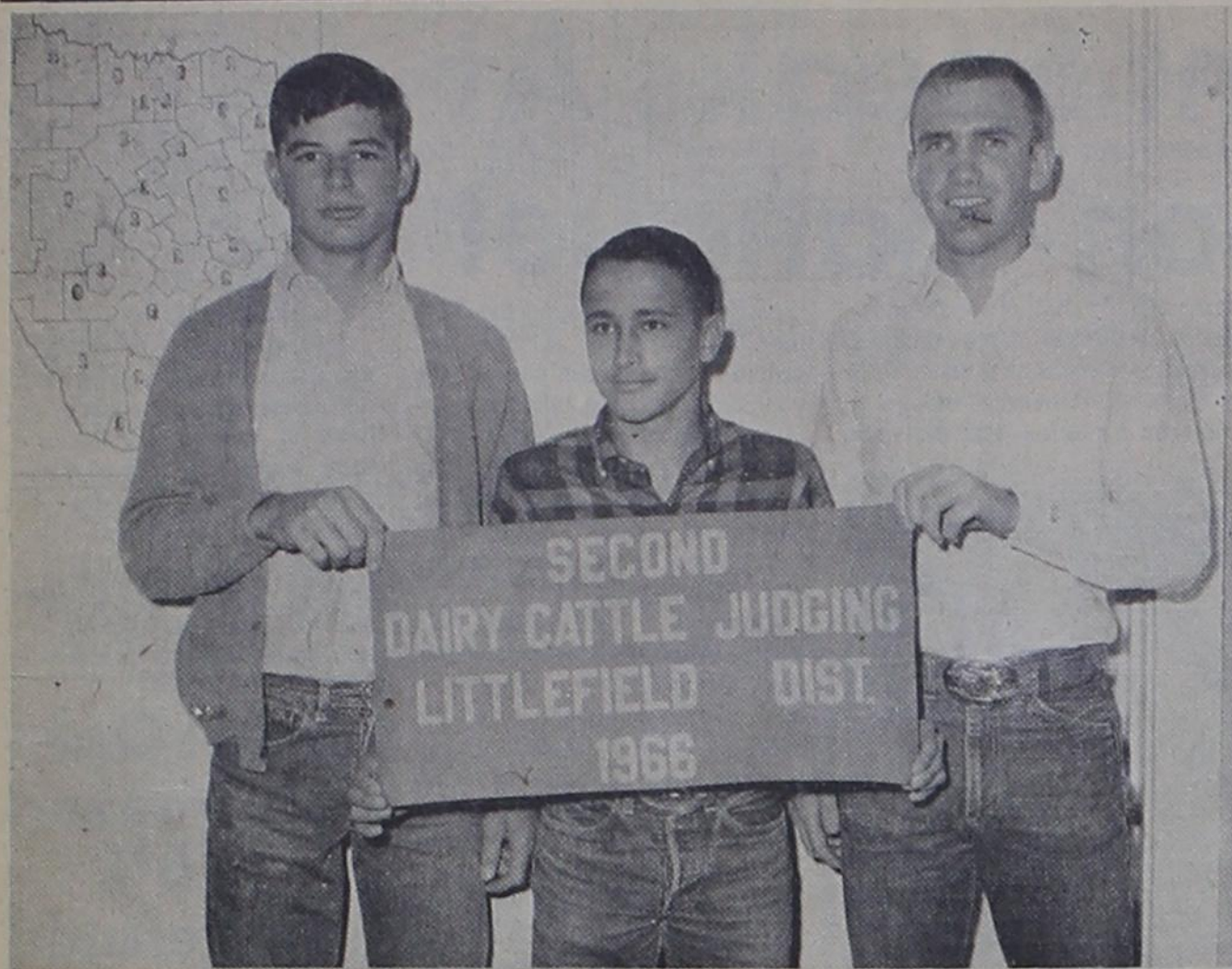

At Home In Parmer County

"The Critical Decades" is a film on aging for the young, emphasizing that the best time to tacky the medical problems of old age is before the patient gets old. It stresses the

importance of the middle years, in order to prevent trouble later on.

This makes sense "we don't wait until the horse is stolen before locking the barn," this is an old saying we have heard many times, but never the less true. The film has been made available for Extension Use and would make an excellent program for groups. Several weeks notice is required if any group would like the film. Call the County Extension Office 481-3619 in Farwell.

MAY - SENIOR CITIZENS MONTH

Clubs, organizations or study groups that may be interested in protecting senior citizens against frauds may be interested in securing a leaflet from this office entitled "Your Money and Your Life." It is put out by the Food & Drug Administration and would be especially good to give to some older persons that you may want to remember and help.

Beware of Motion Sickness and Nausea Drugs

The U. S. Food & Drug Administration acted in March to warn against the use of certain drugs by pregnant women. These drugs, which are used for nausea, motion sickness and vomiting, may cause birth deformities taken during pregnancy. These products are considered safe for other persons and are sold without prescription.

Action by the Federal Drug Administration was taken because certain of these products do not contain a statement warning women of the potential danger. Unless the companies change their labeling they will be required to withdraw the product from the market.

It is important for women to never take medicine, not even aspirin, while pregnant, without their doctor's approval. This is a fact of which many women are not aware. When a woman is pregnant, nothing (vitamin pills, medicines for an upset stomach, headache prescriptions) should be taken without her doctor's consent.

MEDICAL SELF HELP
Training of leaders with information similar to that received in Red Cross nursing programs could provide a valuable resource for communities in Parmer County in which medical facilities are limited. It is needed and could be an

excellent project for County Committees. All the information is available from this office (County Extension Office) for conducting such programs, and this agency can give help and guidance. All is needed is a club or group that wants to do a worthwhile community service. The County Program Building Committee appointed a chairman for a Committee in 1964. This was Mrs. Phyllis Sanders of Friona. Before she could hardly get started on this, she moved away. The idea is still on the shelf, and it is hoped the new County Family Living Committee can come up with some action in regard to this.

NEW PUBLICATIONS
If you are interested in clothes (who isn't) come by the office and get the new bulletin entitled "Clothing--Action--Fabrics". It is an excellent source of information on characteristics, use, care and trade names of various manmade fabrics. Also a good leaflet is available on buying or sewing permanent press fabrics. You might discover you don't know all you thought you knew about buying clothing fabrics; if so, then that's real learning. Call 481-3619 or come by the County Extension office on second floor of courthouse for a copy.

Vote 'Yes' To Bookmobile

At a joint meeting of county commissioners from Parmer, Cochran, Bailey and Lamb Counties last Wednesday in Muleshoe, a decision was reached to continue with the Bookmobile Library Service.

Citizens of the four counties had been receiving the library service at the expense of the Texas Library Association for the past year. Beginning with January 1, 1967, the expense of the Bookmobile Service will be taken over by the four counties, with each county paying its share of the expense based on a population quota.

Total service for the Bookmobile Service for one year is \$14,000; of this amount Parmer County with 21.3 per cent of the total population in the four counties will be paying \$2,986; Lamb County, 45.6 (\$6,391); Cochran County, 14.3 (\$2,033); Bailey County 18.7 (\$2,620).

The Bookmobile visits each of the counties several times each month making stops in the various communities in order to give better service to the residents of the area.

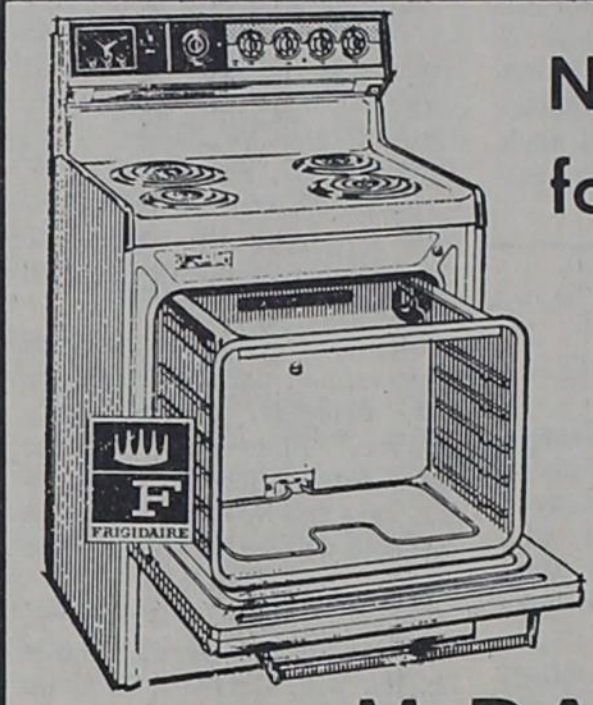

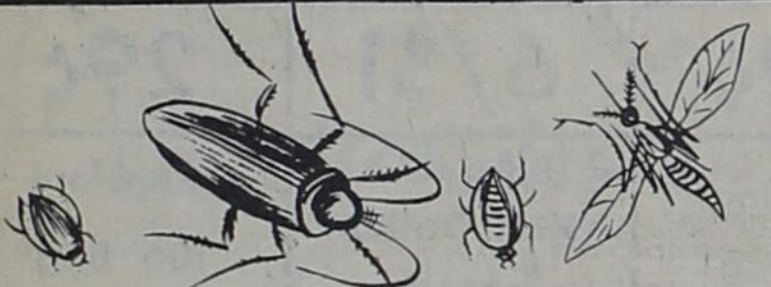

TORNADO Safety Rules

TO KNOW WHAT TO DO WHEN A TORNADO IS APPROACHING MAY MEAN THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN LIFE AND DEATH!

I If you are near a tornado cellar:

When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. THERE IS NO UNIVERSAL PROTECTION AGAINST TORNADOES EXCEPT UNDERGROUND EXCAVATIONS.

II If you are in open country:

1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.
2. If there is no time to escape, lie-flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

III If in a city or town.

1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!
2. In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building.
3. Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

IV If in schools:

1. In city area: If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS with large, poorly-supported roofs!
2. In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

V Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case."

VI Keep turned to your radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may tie up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.

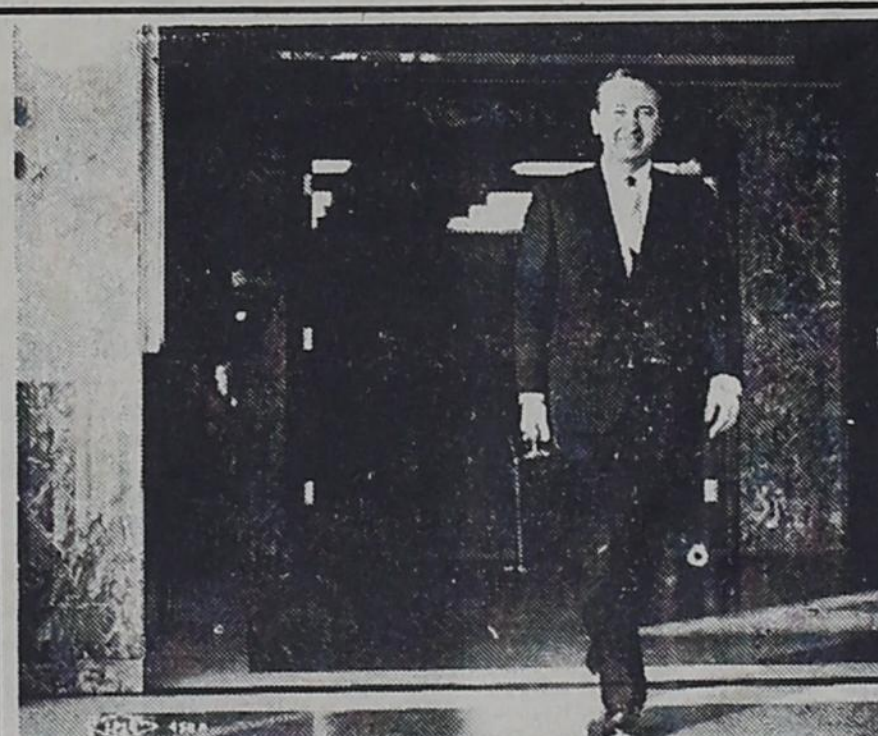

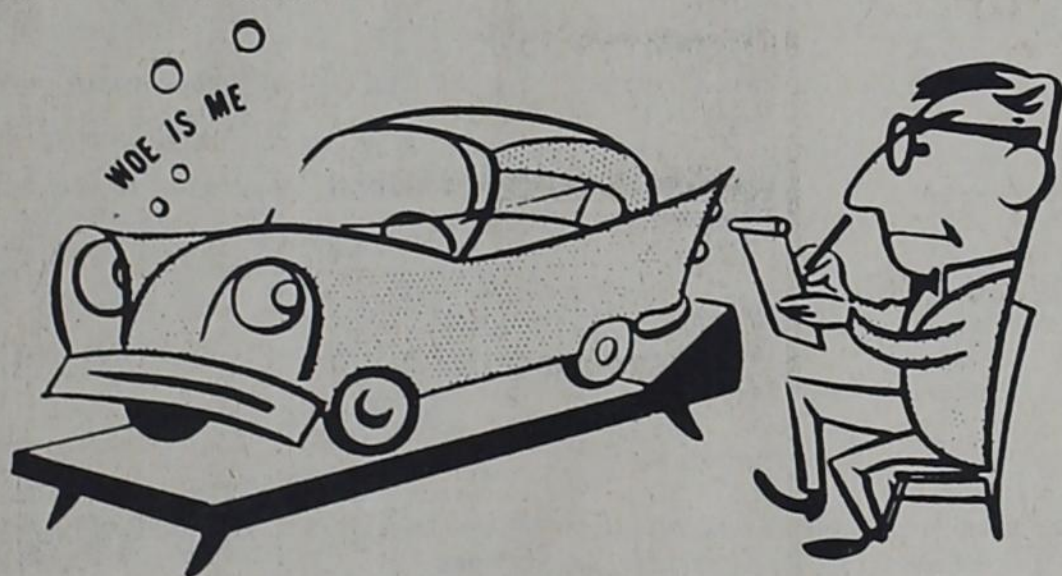

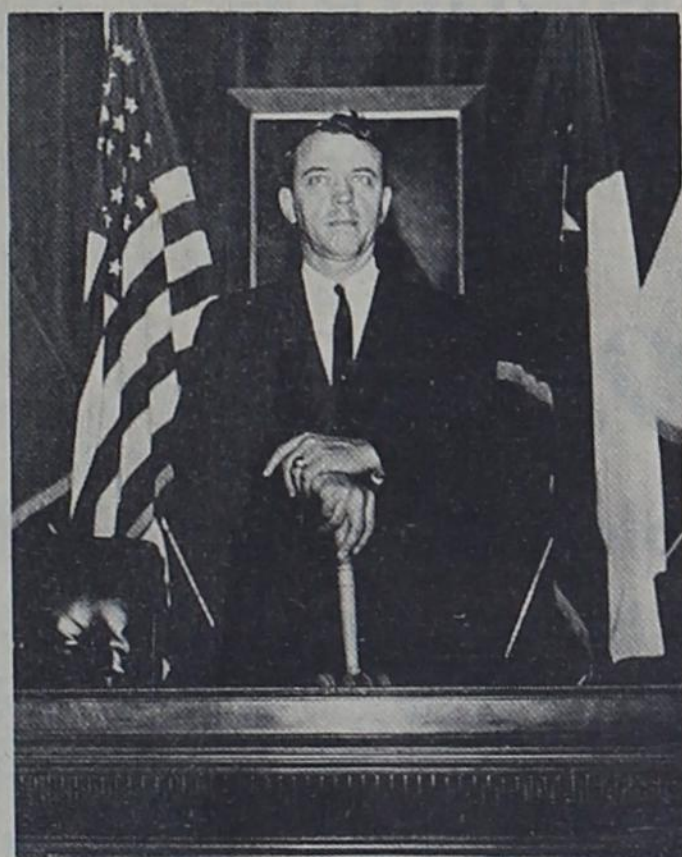
