Several weeks ago the newspaper industry was jolted out of its lethargy by the simple act of a House of Representative subcommittee reporting out a bill for House action. This subcommittee was presided over by California's gift to our national legislature, Representative James Roosevelt. The bill had many ramifications. Among those was the raising of the minimum wage and the removing of certain classes of newspapers from exemption thereof.

This bit of unannounced legislative legerdemain caused a great stir in many press circles, not because of the attempt to raise the national minimum wage but because the newspaper industry would lose some exemptions in the process. The call to arms was not to fight raising the minimum wage across the board, but only to protect our exemption.

Ah, it does make a difference whose ox is being gored. It is fine to do this or to do that, but when you go removing exemptions, well Sir, you have stepped over the bounds of propriety and the rules of politics. Reminds me of the story of the preacher who was rather caustic with his remarks about Brother Jones. Brother Smith said "Amen," but when the remarks concerned Brother Smith, he said, "Go back to preaching and quit meddling."

I believe that one of the biggest slices of Congressional bologna is that you can legislate prosperity by arbitrarily raising wages. Labor is a commodity that is bought and sold. As a commodity, it too is subject to the same laws of economics as bologna.

The laws of supply and demand apply just as rigorously to the price of labor as to the price of bologna. Raising wage rates always reduces the volume of labor that can be sold. A fact overlooked by many advocates of minimum wage legislation is that the total volume of products which can be sold is rigidly limited by the combined net spending power of all the potential customers. This means that by and large people govern their spending by their income. It follows that as higher minimum wage laws compel employers to raise the prices of their products enough to cover the added wage costs, their sales volume will decline. They will require fewer workers. They, and not the employers, will be the least efficient. They, and not the employers, will be the principal sufferers in the advance in the legal minimum wage.

At this point, you will say I am overlooking the above noted law that people govern their spending by their income. No, I am not, because as I pay out more for wages, I will have the same amount less to spend, so the total net result is zero or equal.

If by raising the price of labor, total purchasing power could be increased and prosperity induced, then the same principle would apply to raising the price of other commodities. If Congress really has the power to repeal the laws of supply and demand and to legislate prosperity, it is not doing its duty by not raising the minimum wage to \$5.00 per hour. Why be miserly with prosperity?

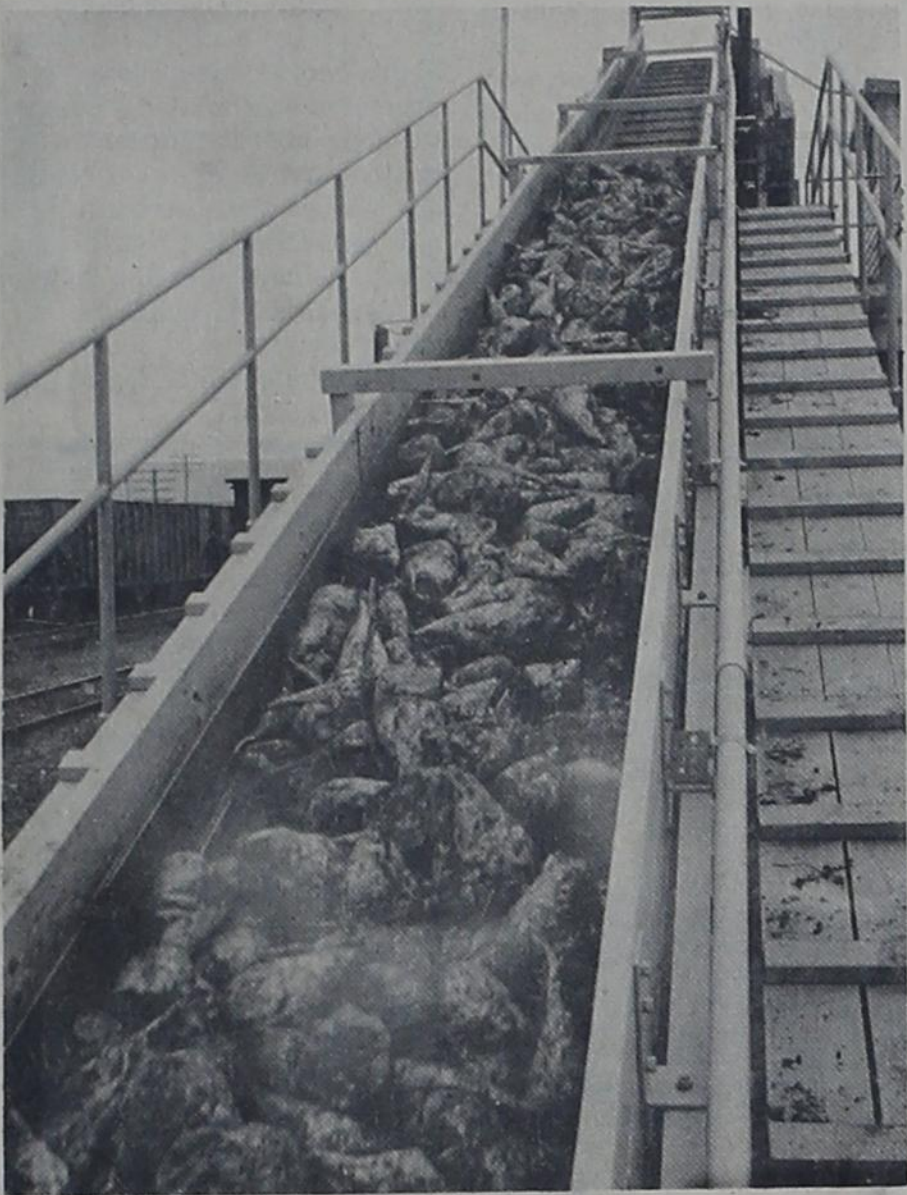
Graveside Rites For Jones Infant

Survivors in addition to the parents are a six year old brother, Dale Jr.

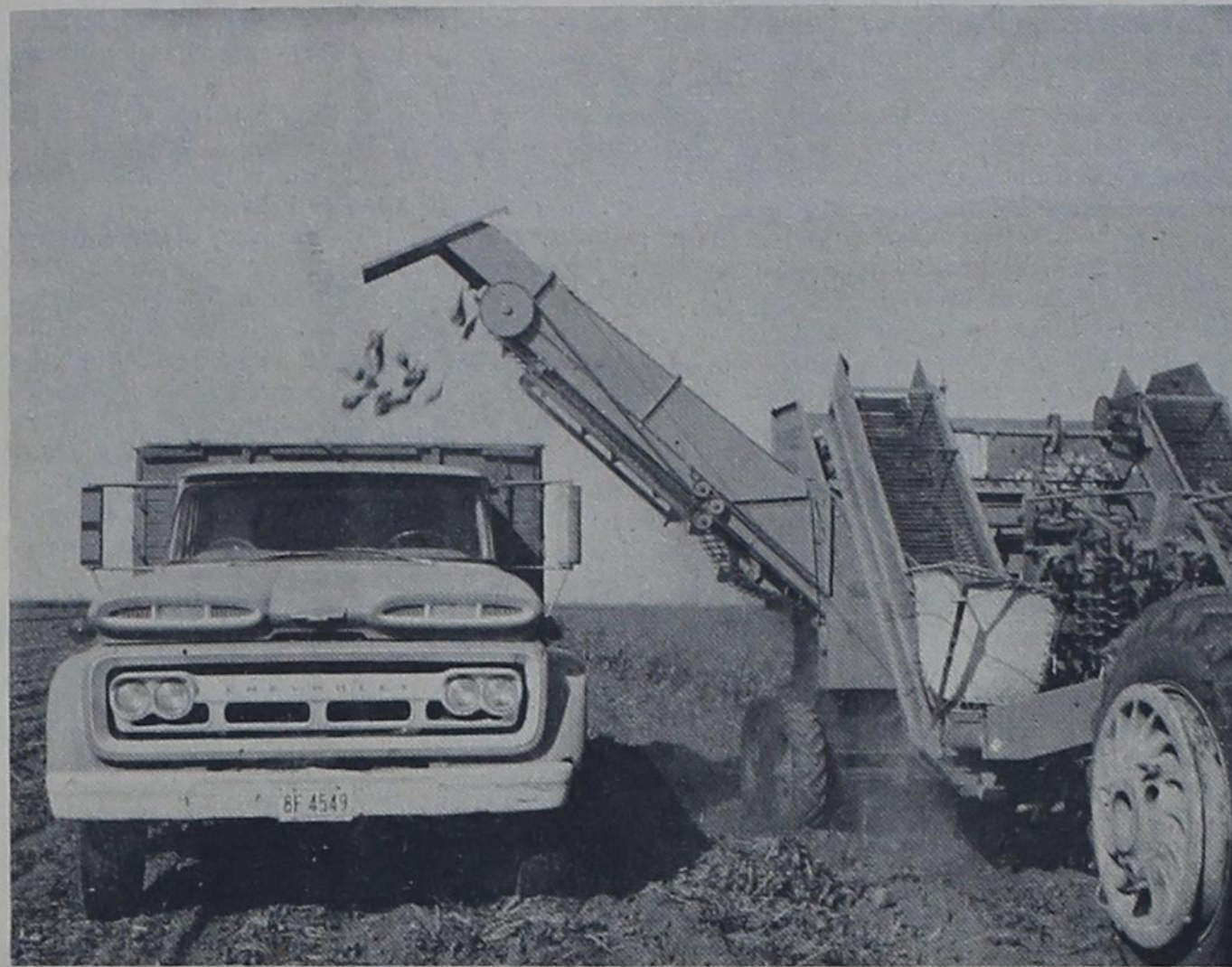

20-30 Ton Acre Yield Expected

Sugar beet harvest in the Texico-Farwell area began for the second time in history last week when diggers began operations on several local farms. The harvest will continue until around the middle or last part of December, depending on the weather.

Estimated yield of this year's crop is better than that of last year. Sugar beet prices are based on sugar content of the beets and national price of sugar. However, producers expect to receive \$14 to \$15 per ton for the sweetener.

Harvest operations on the Marlon Inman farm began last Tuesday and by Friday six acres had been harvested with approximately 190 tons hauled to the unloading site. From 32 rows of the beets Inman had harvested 25 truck loads. Most of the beets in the area

are making 20-30 tons per acre and those on the Inman farm were making a little more than 30 tons per acre.

Jack Taylor, tenant on the Inman farm, said the beets which they are harvesting were planted on March 7 and har-

vest operations began on Sept. 28. The beets were watered every 10 days to two weeks during growing season.

Cost for raising the sweetener is not as high as that of many other crops in the area says Inman and the expected return is much greater.

Farwell's Steers Stampede Seagraves

The Farwell Steers, rested after a two-week layoff, came on strong to stampede past the Seagraves Eagles to the tune of 20-0. Taking command of the game from the very beginning, the Steers scored the first two times they had the ball. With less than seven minutes of the game played, the Blue and White owned a 13-0 lead.

The Steers marched 60 yards on the opening kickoff with Hobbie Coffman scoring from 12 yards out. Ricky Fletcher kicked the extra point to make it 7-0. Seagraves was forced to punt on the next series of downs and again Farwell took the ball. Quarterback Johnny Schell engineered a 57-yard drive ending with a keeper for the touchdown. The PAT was no good and the score was 13-0 with three minutes still on the clock in the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Lewey Bradshaw intercepted an Eagle pass and in a dazzling, twist-

ing run scored on an 85-yard jaunt. It was to no avail, as a clipping penalty nullified the fine run. However, Farwell was not to be denied and drove down the field for another score with Schell running over from three yards out. The PAT was good and Farwell owned what turned out to be the final score, 20-0.

The second half was played up and down the field as both teams suffered penalties at crucial times. Seagraves lost the ball three times in Farwell territory.

Coach Booth praised the defensive work of the Steers, singling out Mike Camp and Larry Flowers. Coach Booth also was jubilant over the fine offensive work displayed by the Steers. "Schell's passing has improved 100% along with the improved running game of our back," says Coach Booth.

"These improvements will add a lot to the diversity of our attack," he added.

Farwell's next home game is Oct. 8 against Frenship, a strong Class AA school. This

Three Tied For 1st

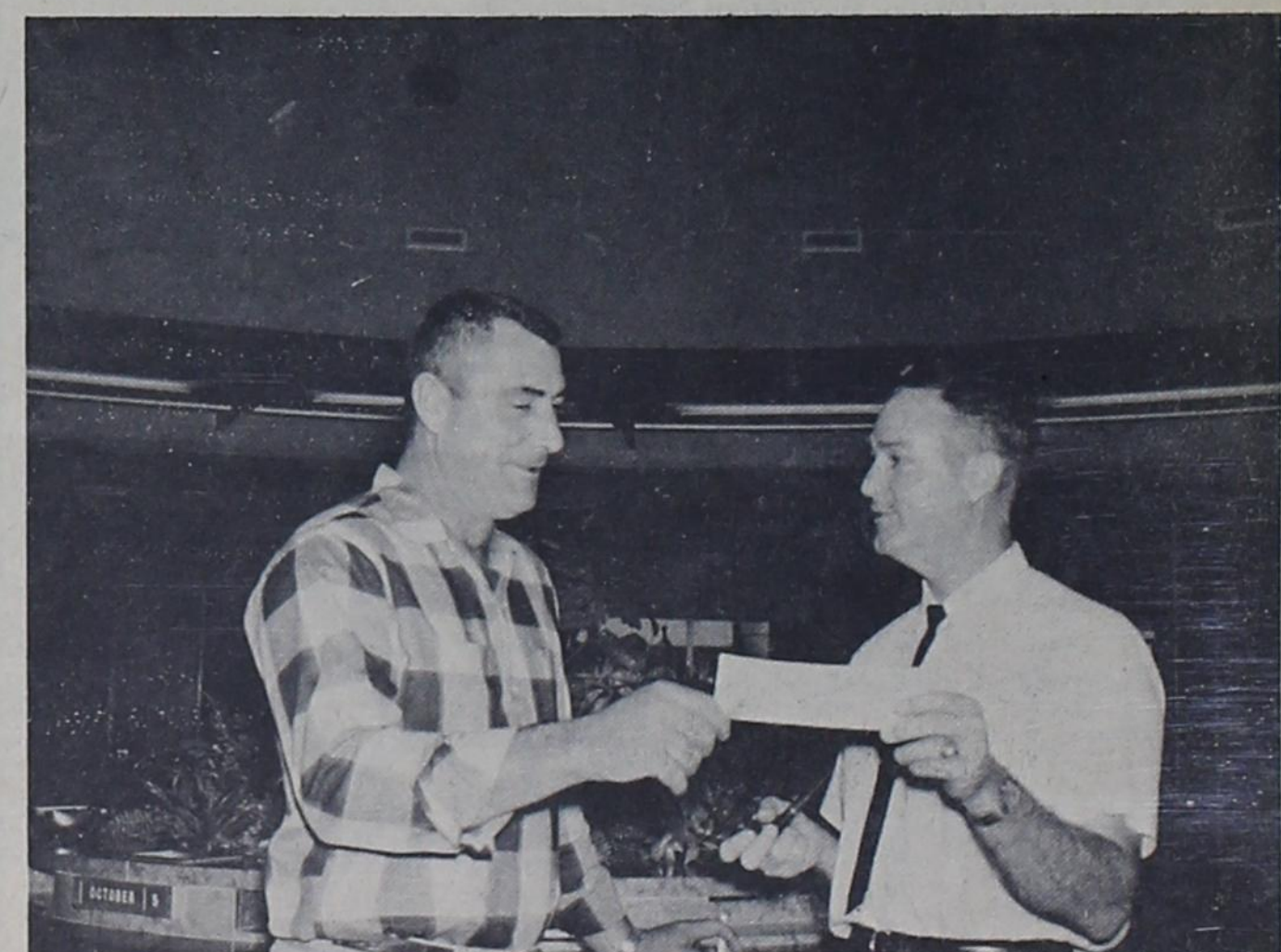
Henry Haseloff Wins Weekly Prize Money

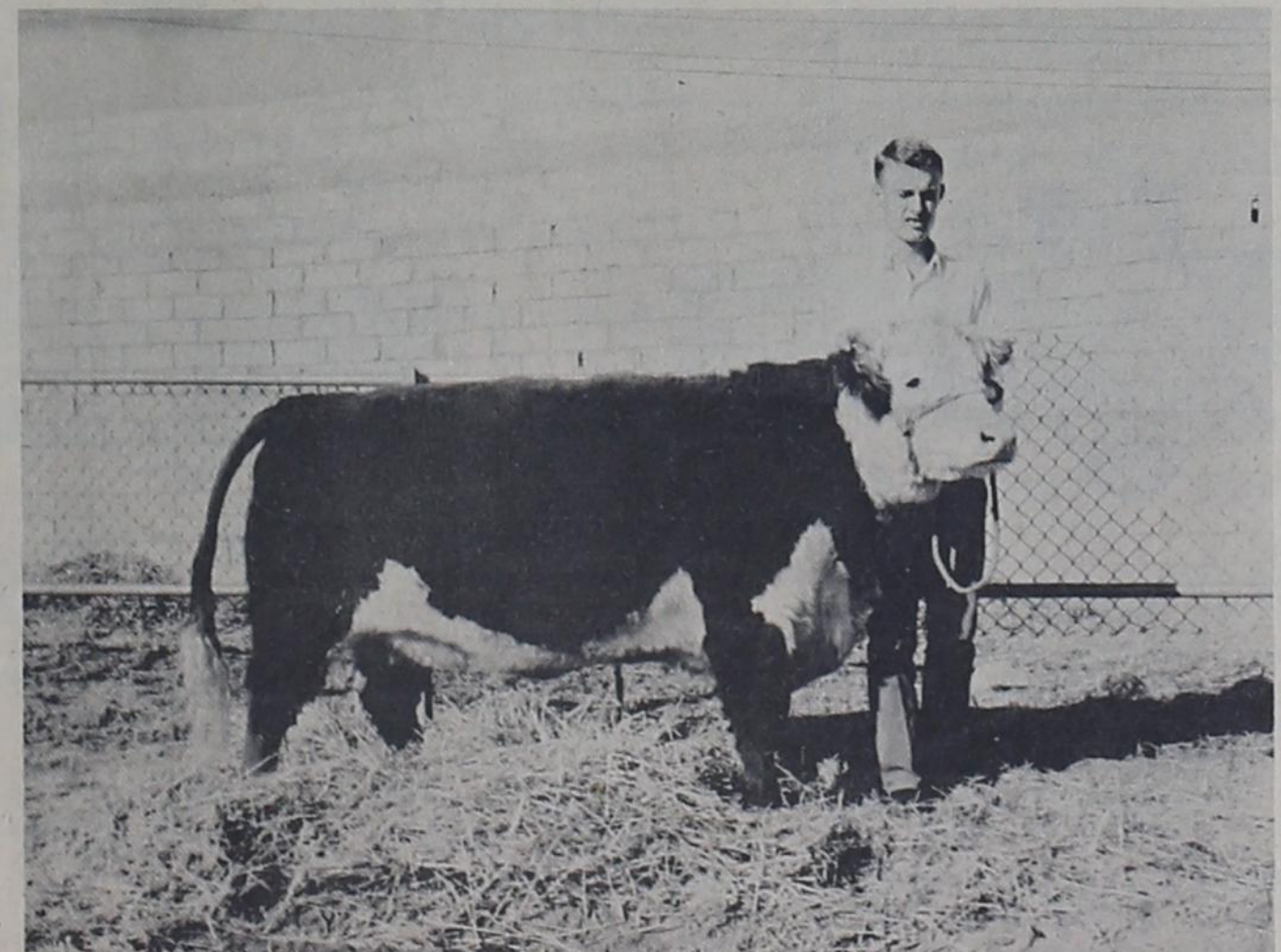

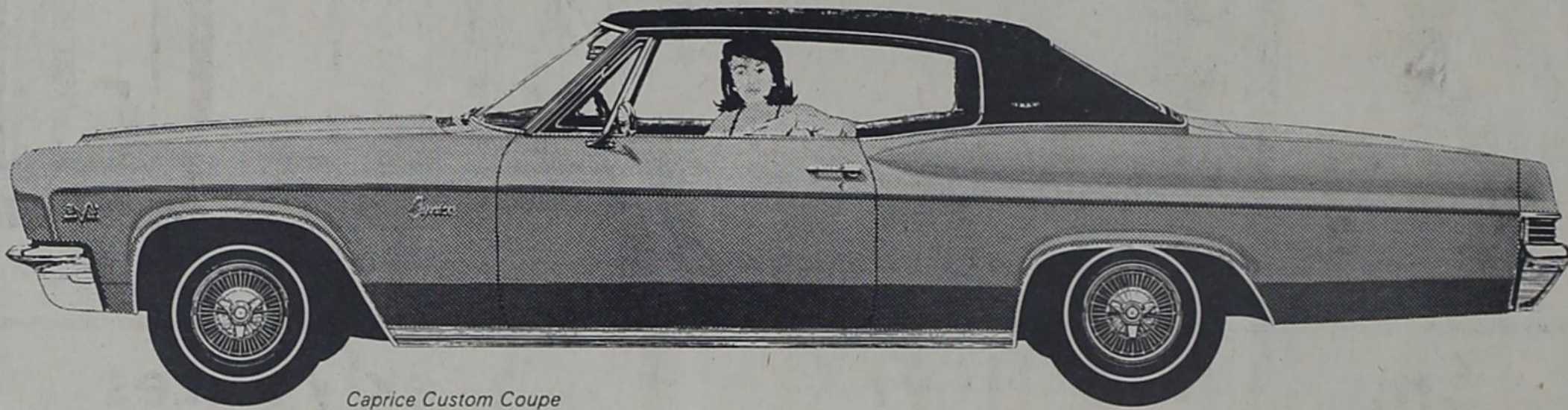
School Board Works On Acceptable Plan

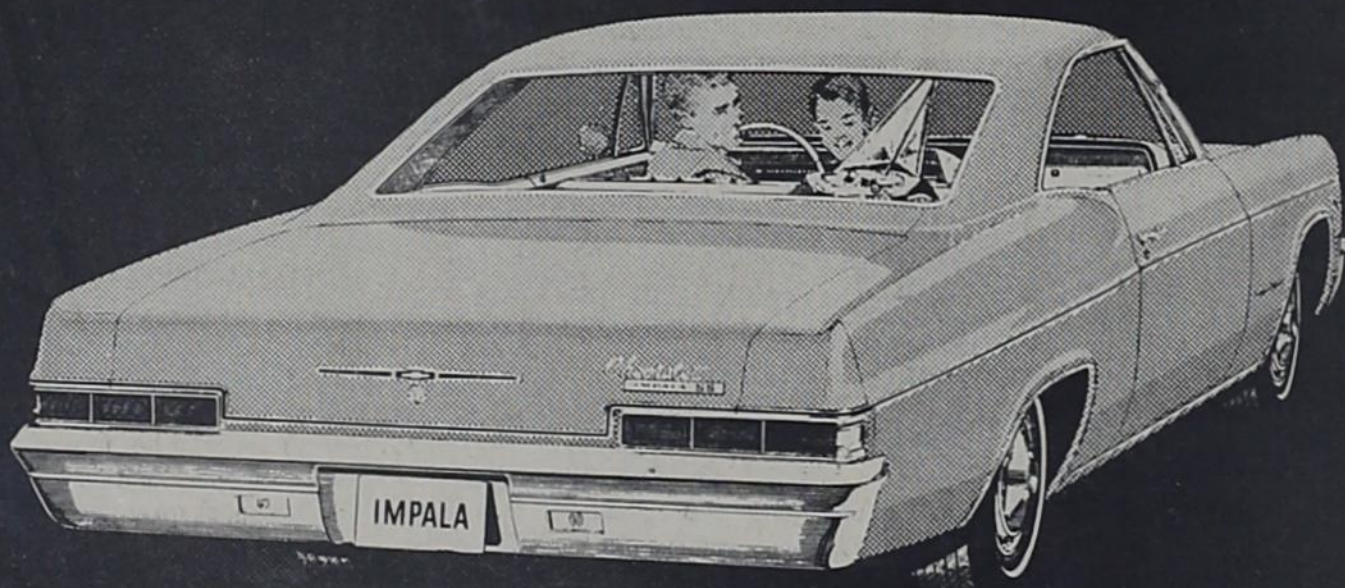

Others elected to serve on the committee were Archie Tarter, one year; Robert Schueler and Lawrence Jamerson, alternates for one year.

McFarland has served as an alternate on the committee for the past two years. Tarter has served on the committee for nine years, he will begin his 10th year. Welch will be serving his eighth year as a member of the committee. Schueler served his eighth year as a member of the committee. Schueler served as a committee alternate on two occasions (two years) in the past. Jamerson will be serving for the first time.

ASC Committeemen are charged with a great deal of responsibility. They are responsible for the local administration of such farm-action programs as the Agricultural Conservation program, the feed grain programs, wheat program, acreage allotments and marketing quotas, the National wool program, the sugar pro-

gram, the commodity price support loans, the domestic cotton program, the soil bank and storage facility loans.

Funds disbursed under the committee's supervision last

year amounted to \$12,613,078.00. Practically 100 per cent of all farmers in the county participated in one or more of the programs administered by the committee last year. Of the total disbursements, price support loans on the 1964 crops -- directed toward increasing market returns above what farmers would receive on an unsupported market -- totaled in excess of \$6 million.

ACP cost-sharing assistance -- representing about one third the practice cost -- was responsible for a total conservation investment of about \$340,000,000 locally.

The figures above would indicate that a committeeman has a rather large order to fill -- and the men who are willing to accept such a position of service to the county are to be commended, says Prentice Mills, ASC office manager in Parmer County.

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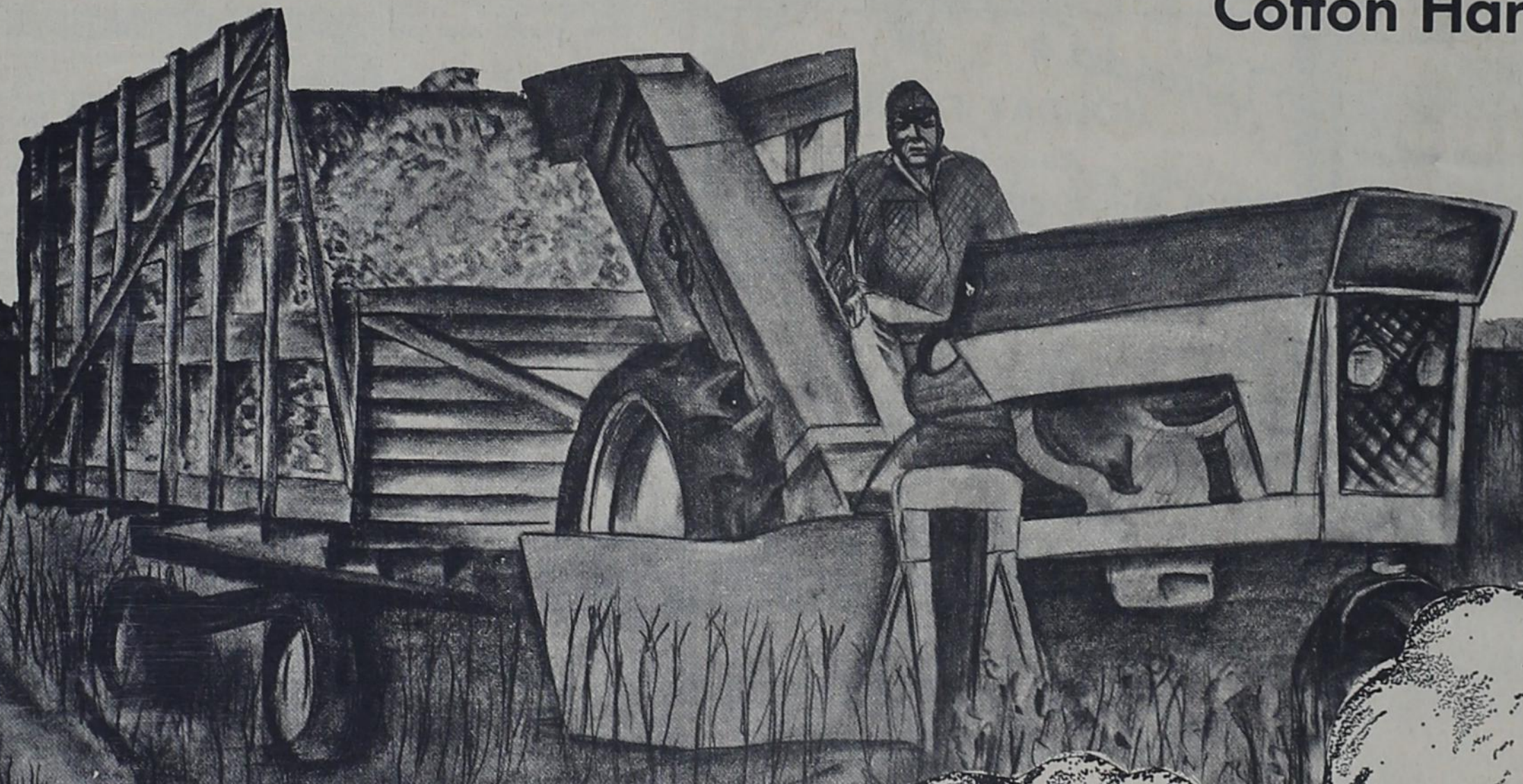
