"We're looking for a good ball game, added the coach, "but it'll take everything we have." The kids looked good in scrimmage against Portales, he noted.

Discussing the coming game, Booth says Friona probably has five of the finest linemen the Steer fans will see this year, with an average of 200 pounds in the line. Friona scrimmaged Fritch and according to reports, had nine touchdowns to one. From reports, the Chiefs have a fast backfield, do a pretty good job throwing the ball, and probably one of the strongest points will be on defense. They have four linemen back on the interior, and last year, no one hurt them "up the middle", he contends. "We haven't learned their weakness if they have any", he concludes.

Booth feels Steer defense is "our toughest" and hopes it will

show up Friday night. "Our backs are doing a pretty good job running and our ends do a pretty good job catching the football. He was "pleasantly surprised" at the outstanding showing the boys made against the Portales team at scrimmage.

The State Line Tribune is being published under the management of John Getz of Farwell this week after a transaction in which he became publisher September 1.

Getz, who has been Tribune advertising manager, and his wife will operate the paper under a lease. W. H. Graham, a native of Farwell and longtime Tribune publisher, has contracted for the purchase of The Lovington Leader in southeast New Mexico. Graham says he and his wife and family will move to manage that paper full-time as soon as housing can be arranged.

Getz is also publisher of The Curry County Times, a weekly newspaper in Clovis. He will continue in that capacity. Mrs. Jim Moss of The Tribune editorial department will remain in her present capacity.

Mrs. Getz, who has been office manager for Plains Publishers, will be associated with her husband in his business enterprises. "We are enthusiastic about this opportunity to serve the community with a newspaper, and we hope to publish a quality product deserving of the public's acceptance and respect," said Getz.

Graham, who has resided in Farwell 35 years, said he had deep personal regret at making the change, but feels his chance to buy the New Mexico property too attractive to pass by. He has been a stockholder in the Lovington Publishing Company for four years. Mr. and Mrs. Getz have one

son, Mike, who is a pre-med student at West Texas State University, Canyon. The Gra-

hams have four sons, three of whom are in school and one of pre-school age.

## Farwell School Enrolls 650

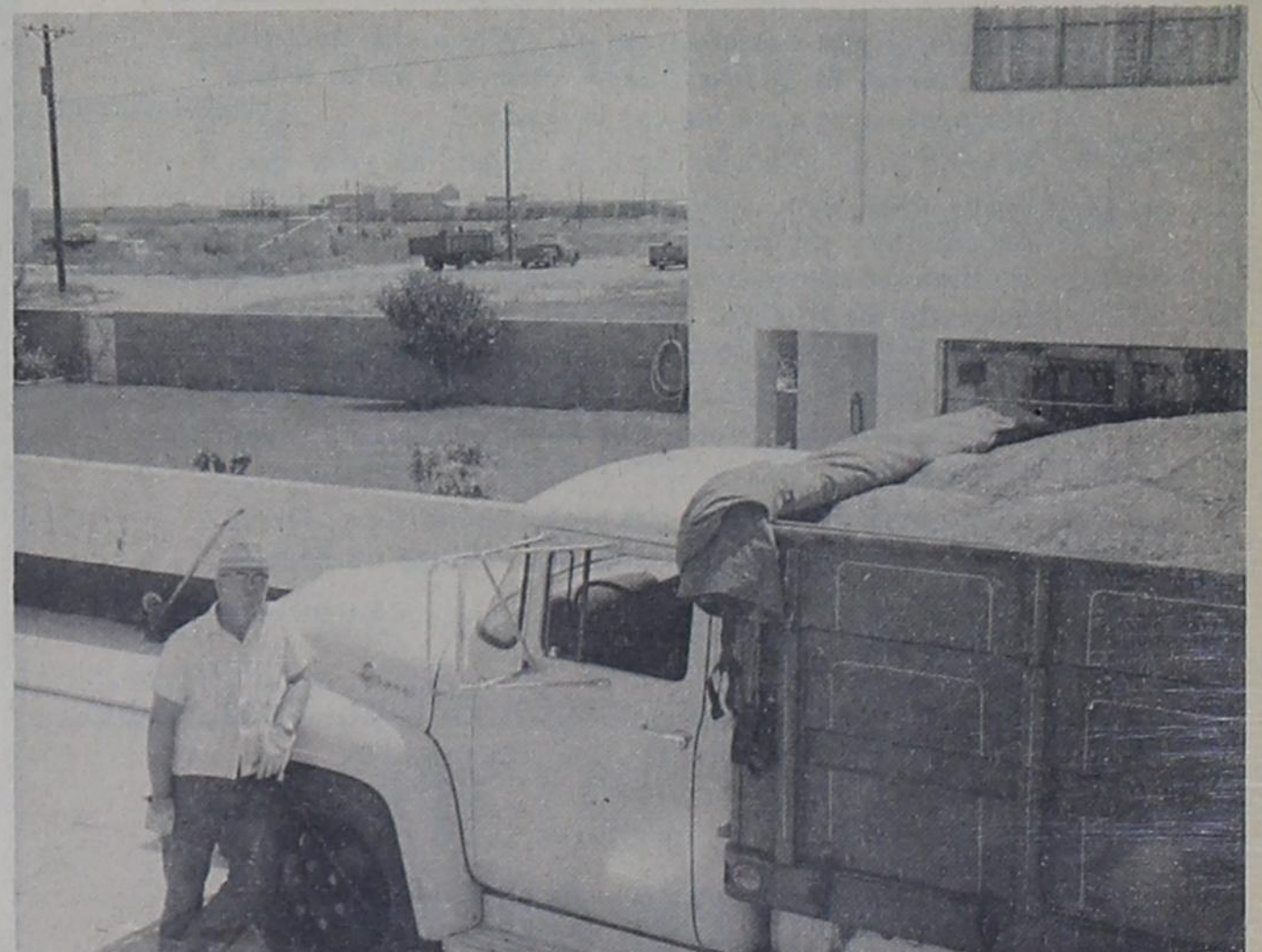
According to reports some 650 students had been enrolled in the Farwell school by Wednesday morning with several others expected to register by end of the present week or early next week.

Principal Jack Williams reports approximately 290 students in the elementary division, 173 are enrolled in the high school and approximately 190 in junior high school.

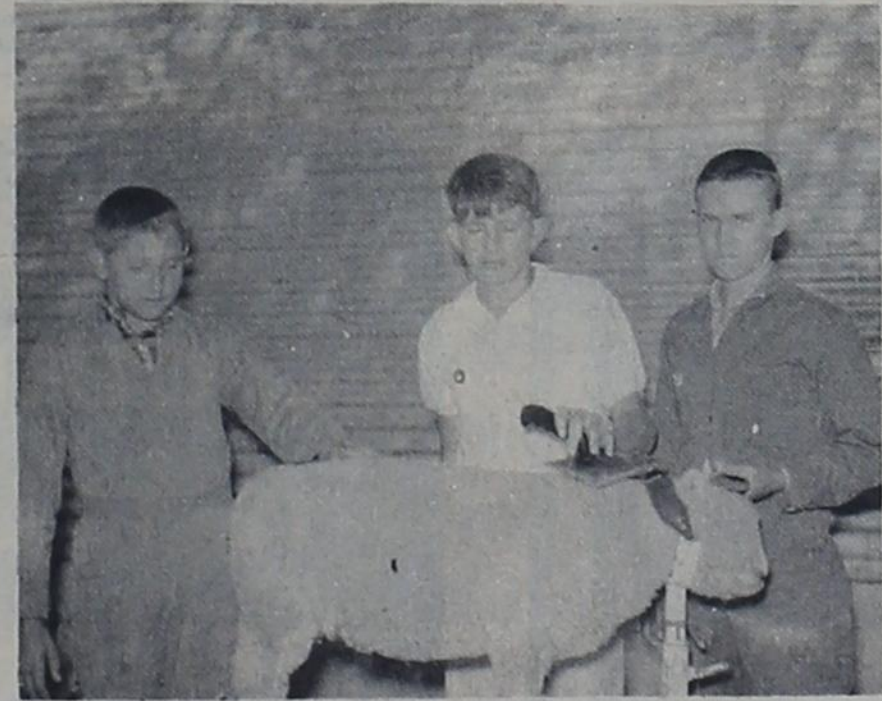
Latest addition to the faculty is Larry Reynolds, a graduate of
