

The house that's right for a young family may not be the most suitable for older persons. Fewer rooms and activity areas are needed for older citizens, and emphasis should be on easy maintenance and safety. Shelves should be easier to reach, movement from room to room should be simpler, and even window heights are important. Windows should be low enough that a seated or bedridden person can see out without straining.

There's a new U.S. Department of Agriculture bulletin that takes into consideration the special needs of older people. Floor plans are designed with the limited budget of the retiree in mind, as well as the best use of space. The publication, "Multi-Unit Retirement Housing for Rural Areas" is written for architects, engineers and builders -- but it will be helpful to any retiree building




