The game with Silverton is a district game and the team will be putting out their ALL to defeat the visitors, bringing the Yearlings one game nearer a "District Crown."

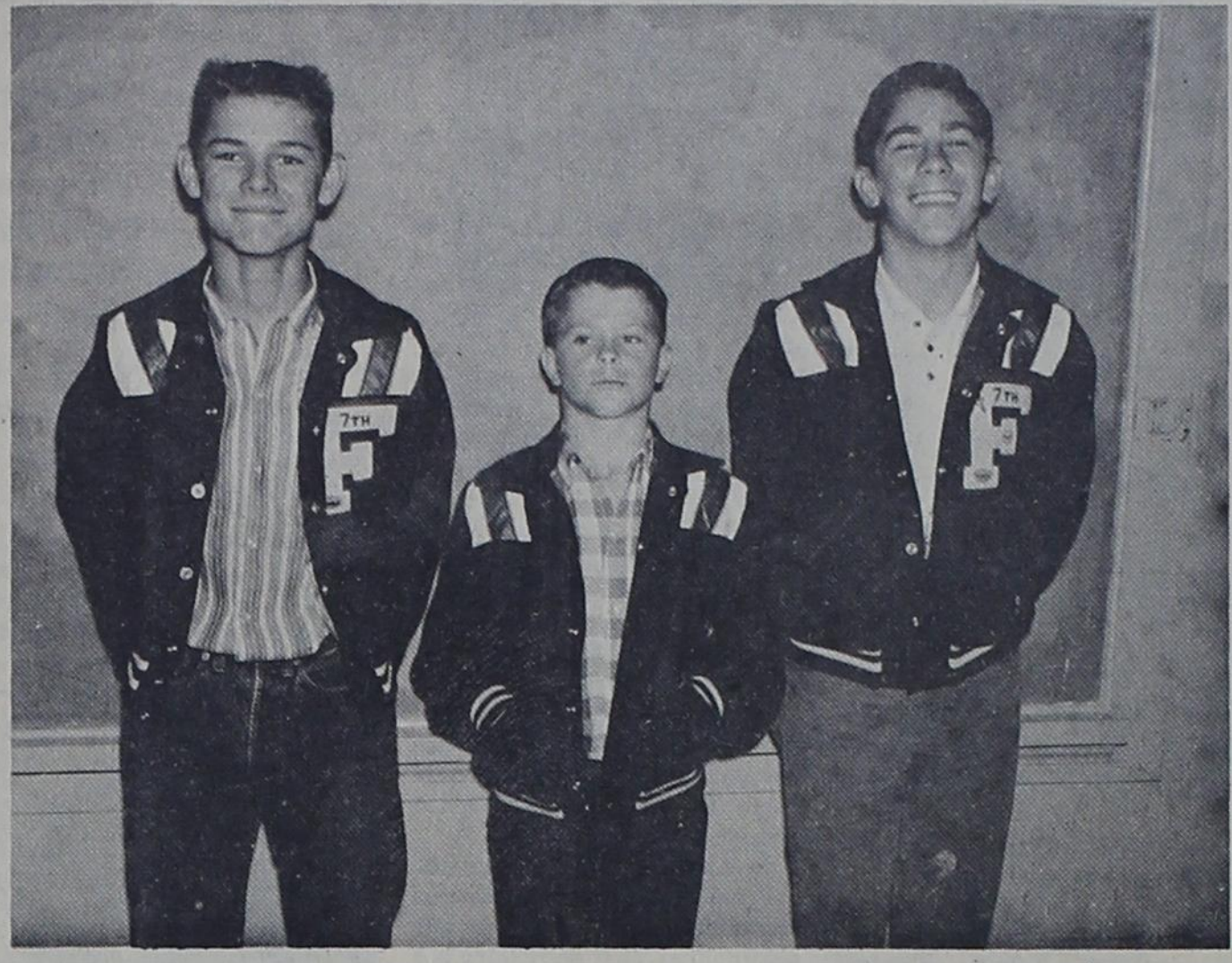

**Tuesday -- Election Set Tuesday On 10 Amendments**

Tuesday is election day for Parmer Countians and other Texans. Voters will go to the polls to mark ballots for or against 10 proposed amendments to the state constitution. The total number of citizens going to the polls is expected to be light in the county as well as across the state. Only 273 voted in Parmer County in another constitutional amendment election last month.

The polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. in eight voting precincts in the county. Precincts, polling places and election judges in the county are:

- No. 1, Black, Community Center, Mrs. Glen Roberson;
- No. 2, Friona, City Hall, Clyde Goodwine;
- No. 3, Bovina, Legion Hall, Tom Rhodes;
- No. 4, Farwell, Courthouse, Albert Smith;
- No. 5, Lazbuddie, School Building, J. D. Carpenter;
- No. 6, Oklahoma Lane, Community Center, Harold Carpenter;
- No. 7, Rhea, Parrish Hall, Melvin Sachs;
- No. 8, Lakeview, Otho Whitefield home, Otho Whitefield.
- No. 9, Bovina, Legion Hall, Tom Rhodes;
- No. 10, Farwell, Courthouse, Albert Smith;

Number One -- would double the amount of money available for buildings and other permanent improvements at designated state institutions of higher learning. It would accomplish this by increasing the state ad valorem tax for this purpose from five cents to 10 cents on \$100 valuation.

Number Two -- would increase Veterans Land Fund from \$200 million to \$400 million. This is the same amendment which was defeated in 1963.

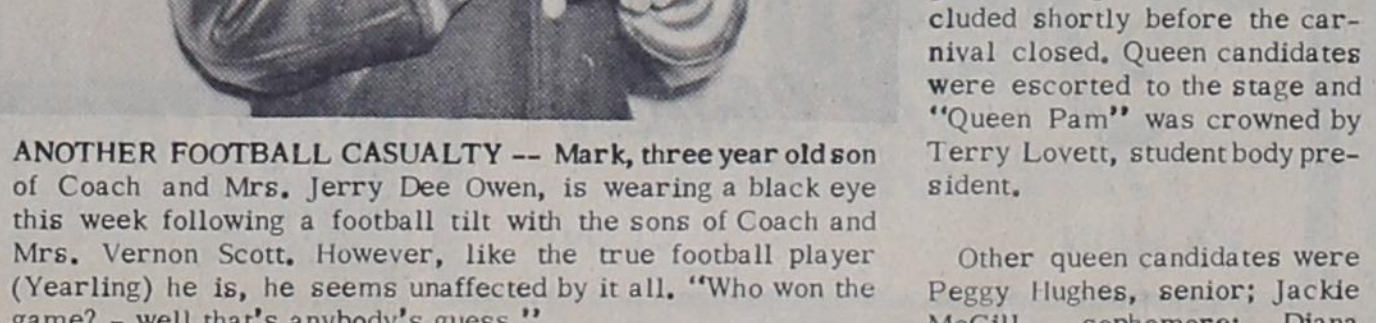

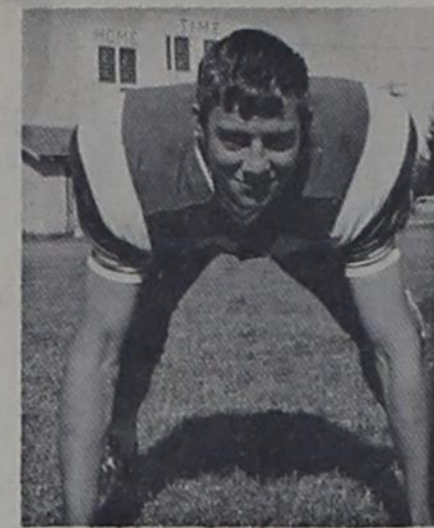

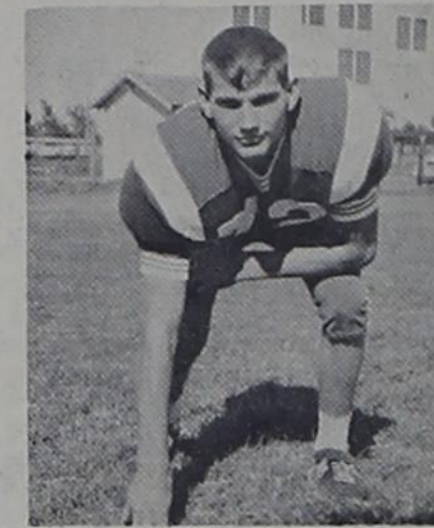
## Steers Of The Week

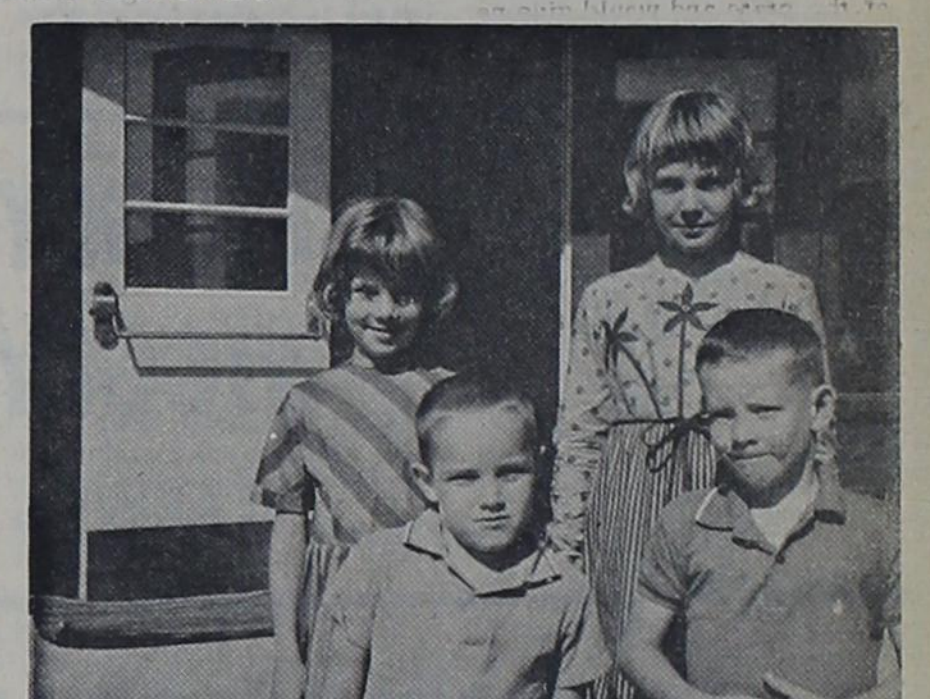

### Delayed Ginning May Help Cotton Quality

Delayed, or deferred, ginning of cotton means higher quality fiber to mills, according to research data compiled by James M. Ward and James W. Graves, assistant professors, Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology at Texas A&M University.

Moisture levels in machine picked cotton vary within each load due to moisture differences in seed, fiber, trash content and the maturity of the cotton. This variation causes some fibers to be overheated and overdried during ginning. The result is lower fiber values to mills due to greater fiber breakage and higher fiber length variation.

No significant differences were noted between the fiber quality of cotton picked in the morning and that picked in the afternoon.

However, deferred ginning, or storing seed cotton for one day prior to ginning definitely had a favorable effect on fiber quality. The moisture level of the deferred-ginned cotton was more uniform due to a moisture transfer from the seed and trash to the fiber during the storage period. This increased uniformity allowed the cotton to be ginned with less drying and, as a result, less fiber damage. Fewer fibers shorter than 1/2 inch, less variation in fiber length, and less waste and delay in spinning operations all resulted from deferred ginning. The treatment had no ill effects on fiber color or nonlint content.

The true worth of cotton to mills is the value of their finished products less manufacturing cost. If significantly higher quality lint cotton with improved spinnability can be obtained from deferred ginning, mills could well afford to pay premiums for such cotton. Deferred ginning may possibly strengthen the market for cotton in the future.

During the course Huffaker received instruction in maintaining records pertaining to the receipt, storage, issue, classification, and salvage of engineer material.

The 18-year-old soldier entered the Army last May and received basic training at Fort Polk, La.

He attended Farwell High School.

### School To Receive Federal Aid

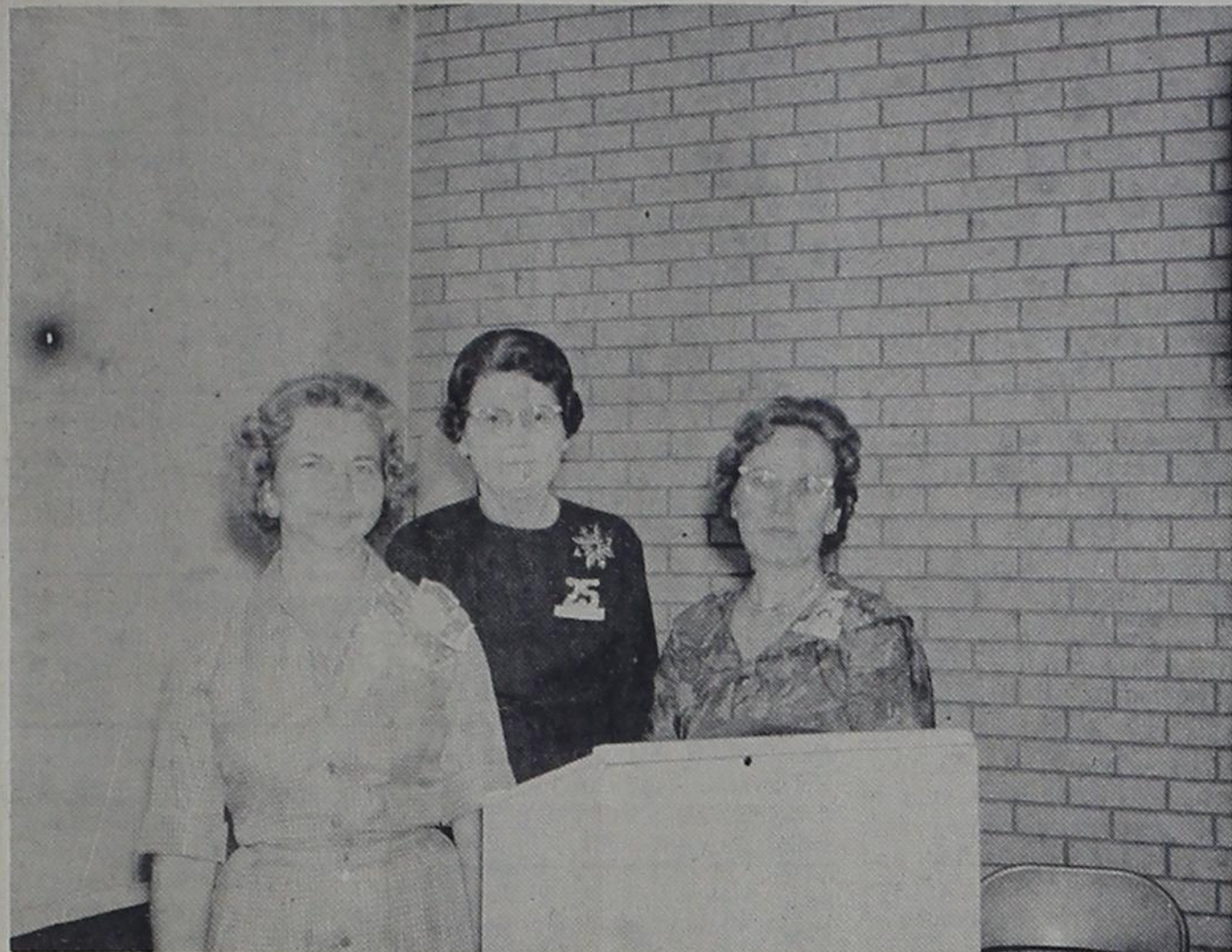

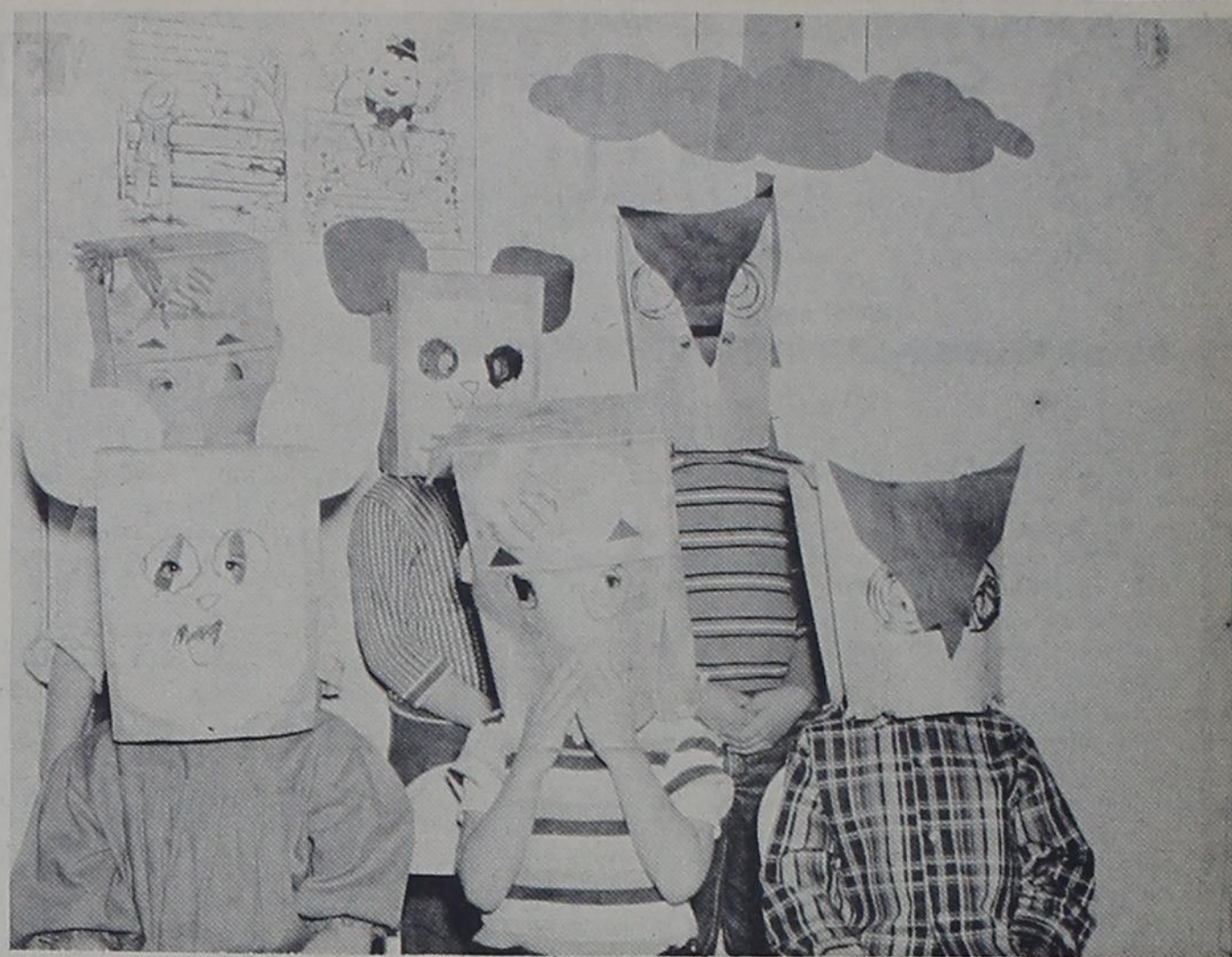

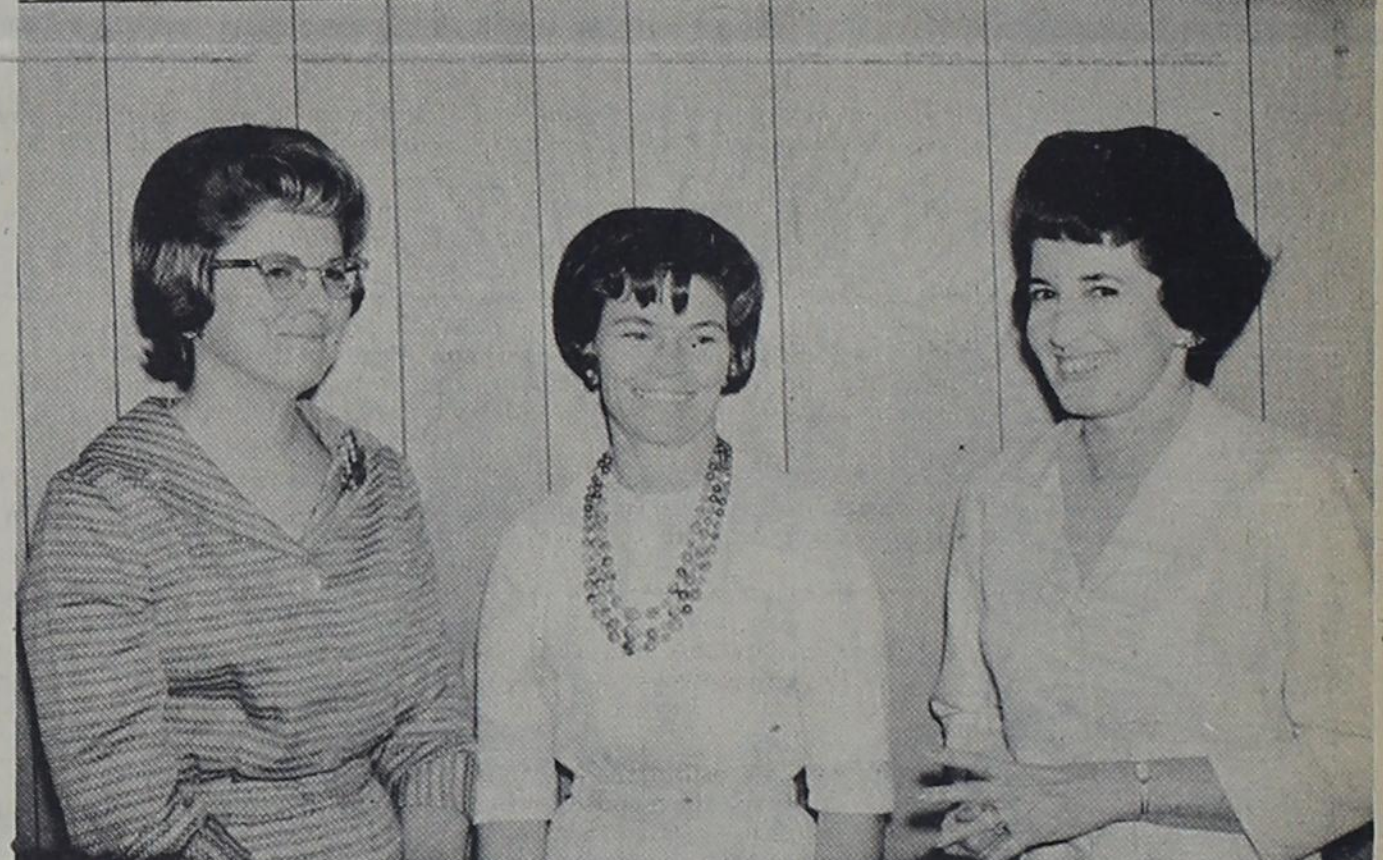

### TREES, SHRUBS FOR WINDBREAKS

Some 17 species of trees or shrubs will be available for planting by Texas landowners, early in 1966, early in 1966, from the Texas Forest Service at a delivered cost of \$1.50 per hundred plus the two percent sales tax.

The trees and shrubs may be used for windbreaks, soil stabilization and Christmas trees planting but cannot be used or resold for shade or ornamental purposes. All seedlings orders will be packed in moss and moisture proof and shipped prepaid direct to the purchaser.

Orders for species shown on the application must be in multiples of 50. This is a real bargain for those of you who need something to slow the wind down around your place. Application forms can be obtained thru the County Agent's office. Orders must be received before February 11, 1966.

### FALL STORAGE

The farmer who makes extension use of pesticides needs two safe storage areas. Keep pesticides and pesticide containers in a separate building or room in an enclosure. Use this storage area exclusively for pesticides and "empty" pesticide containers.

CAUTION: Do not store weed killers, herbicides or defoliant in the same room with insecticides. Materials that change to vapor readily can contaminate other pesticides. Chlorate salts can create a fire or explosion hazard.

Buildings or rooms used for storage purposes should be dry, ventilated and under lock and key. Outside storage areas should be fenced in to protect children and animals. Remove only the amount of pesticides needed for one day's operation and be sure to return "empty" containers, and any unused pesticide, to the proper storage area at the end of each day.

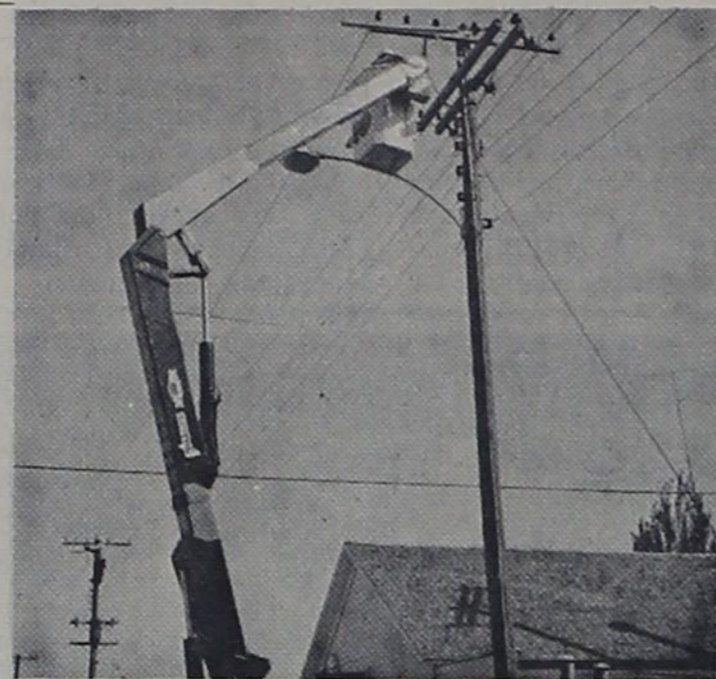

### HOUSING PLANS SHOULD SUIT FAMILY'S NEEDS

Every family wants a house that is suited to its particular needs.

The house that's right for a young family may not be the most suitable for older persons.

Fewer rooms and activity areas are needed for older citizens, and emphasis should be on easy maintenance and safety. Shelves should be easier to reach, movement from room to room should be simpler, and even window heights are important. Windows should be low enough that a seated or bedridden person can see out without straining.

There's a new U. S. Department of Agriculture bulletin that takes into consideration the special needs of older people. Floor plans are designed with the limited budget of the retiree in mind, as well as the best use of space. The publication, "Multi-Unit Retirement Housing for Rural Areas" is written for architects, engineers and builders -- but it will be helpful to any retiree building or remodeling a home.
