





## Stop Us, Before We Kill Again

I was saddened this week to learn of the untimely death of Hodgson, lot 9, Blk. 2, Welch one of my friends due to an automobile accident. What saddened me even more is the senseless manner in wich the wreck occurred. The car my friend was riding in was struck by an auto driven by an intoxicated driver who had no more business driving than a blind, deaf and dumb donkey. By an asinine twist of justice, the intoxicated driver escaped serious injury, but if he is allowed to escape justice by statute law, then a far greater crime will have been perpetuated upon the responsibile American motorist. Let him be punished and punished severely for taking the life of another for reasons of sheer stupidity.

I do not advocate prohibition, but I do advocate a toughening of the laws dealing with traffic violators and especially drunken drivers. I am sick of seeing a driver charged with DWI, paying a fine of \$25, and then being sent on his merry way to perhaps cause serious injury and even death to an innocent person. Get tough! Make a jail sentence mandatory in cases of reckless driving due to intoxication or any other reason. Make this irresponsible driver realize that while he is driving, he is in control of one of the most destructive weapons known to man, the modern automobile. If he must serve a prison sentence before he comes to realize that, then let it be. Far better for that to happen than to permit him to someday snuff out the life of somebody's

Every year thousands of Americans are murdered on the highway, many of these through no fault of their own, Something must be done. The government is currently holding hearings on auto safety, but to date the only thing that has come of it is possible government regulations concerning the building of the automobile. This is not the answer.

It would be impossible to build a car that would afford its occupants a guarantee of surviving a head on collision at 70 mph. Even if such an auto could be built, the cost would be prohibitive. Granted; safety belts, padded dashes, etc., are valuable in preventing minor injuries in some cases but let's face it. a head on collision is the only sure killer. Besides, the best seat belt in the world will not do any good unless the owner fastens it. A senate committee can not legislate common sense.

The only thing that will stop this carnage on the highways is when people stop behaving like the south end of a north bound mule and start concentrating on going from point A to point B in the safest possible manner.

Quoting statistics will not help either. So what if 50,000 people are killed in car accidents. It doesn't mean a thing unless a loved one is one of those statistics. What is needed is for people to be shocked into driving with care. Mere statistics do not provide that shock.

People simply do not realize what tremendous forces are brought to bear upon the unprotected human body in a head-on crash at 70 mph. Perhaps if everybody had the opportunity to witness the results of such a collision for themselves, the accident rate would drop.

Can you imagine what happens when a car taveling at 70 mph is stopped dead in its tracks by colliding with another vehicle moving at a similar rate of speed? The car may stop, but the occupant's body does not, It continues moving forward at the same velocity - until it smashes into the jagged edges of a torn dashboard, or is hurled through the broken windshield, with razor sharp pieces of glass digging into the skull that is no longer connected with the rest of the body. Perhaps if everybody had the opportunity to view a broken and mangled body with the intentines oozing through a ten inch hole in the abdomen and spilling onto the pavement; perhaps if everybody had the opportunity to see the top half of what was once an 18-year-old girl lying on the pavement in a pile of guts and pool of blood with the rest of the body in a similar condition lying some 20 feet away; perhaps if everybody could see a skull split wide open with the brains spilling out, then they would drive more carefully

Do descriptions such as the preceding ones shock you? I hope they do. They shock me. If this is the only thing that will make people more safely minded, the let the police stop people at the scene of a serious accident and let them view the gory results for themselves instead of flagging them on by. If they get sick then let them get sick. I know one thing for sure. It's a safe bet that they would become more careful drivers.






### Returns To Home Base





# **Know Your Amendments**

A brief description of the proposed constitutional amendments that are to be voted on in the November 8th election is presented below. The summaries were prepared by the Texas Press Association in the interest of a better informed pub-

Parmer County voters will join others in Texas in marking a king-sized ballot in the general election in November. The main reason for the increased size of the ballot will be 16 proposed state constitutional amendments.

The 16 amendments have been submitted by the state legislature for the voters to decide

State law requires that the text of the amendments be published in order for voters to have ample opportunity to be informed.

Three of the amendments are being published in The Bovina Blade while the others appear in other Parmer County newspapers.

Following are brief descriptions of the proposed amend-

Amendment No. 1 -- Provides that all land owned by natural persons and designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

Amendment No. 2 -- Would authorize creation of airport authorities composed of one or more counties. Amendment No. 3 -- Would

withdraw Arlington State College from participating in the Permanent University Fund.

Amendment No. 4-- Increases the permissible term of office for directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years and validating present statutory terms of office for such officials.

Amendment No. 5 -- Would authorize the legislature to provide for a system of retirement, disability and death benefits for county officials andemployees and others.

Amendment No. 6 -- Provides for payment of assistance to survivors of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Cor-

rections and full-paid firemen. Amendment No. 7 -- Would repeal the Constitutional provision requiring a poll tax as a prerequisite to voting and requiring the Legislature to provide for annual registration of all voters.

Amendment No. 8 -- Would authorize the Legislature to enact laws permitting persons to vote for state officers and for president and vice president of the United States without having fulfilled residence requirements to vote for other officers, as well as laws permitting former residents of the state, for a certain period, to vote absentee for president and vice president.

Amendment No. 9--Increases to five the number of judges on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and lengthens the term of that court.

Amendment No. 10 -- Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy after such change without further election. Amendment No. 11-Would

authorize the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon two-thirds vote of the Legislature and expanding the uses to which money Fund may be put.

in the Texas Water Development Amendment No. 12 -- Provides the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts.

Amendment No. 13--Would authorize the Legislature to provide for consolidating the functions of government within a county having 1,200,000 or more inhabitants and to provide for intergovernmental contracts between political subdivisions of the county.

Amendment No. 14-Would allow members of the armed forces to vote in Texas upon satisfying the residence requirement applicable to Texans in general.

Amendment No. 15 -- Authorizes the channeling of funds from private and federal sources through the state for use by privately owned or local agencies in establishing and equipping facilities to assist the handicapped in becoming gainfully employed.

Amendment No. 16--Estab lishes the date on which newlyelected members of the Legislature qualify and take office.
