In studying the multitude of factors that now influence commerce, the factor of adequate facilities for the spending of leisure time often is the final one in determining if a town gets a new business. We here in the twin cities

are blessed with a wealth of natural resources, transportation facilities and a proximity to lush markets, but we are weak in recreation at home. One of the topics of coffee cup conversation for several years has been a golf course and its subsidiaries, a country club with a swimming pool. This has always seemed to be a monumental undertaking with a limited appeal, community wise. Now the picture is rapidly changing and such a project is not only becoming more feas-








The Farmers Home Administration extends credit accompanied by farm management assistance to 100 families of Parmer County.
