Superintendent Roberts announces that classes will begin at the Farwell school on August 29, with registration on the previous Thursday and Friday, August 25-26.

Headstart Students Show Much Progress

"Much progress has been made by the children enrolled in the headstart program," stated Mrs. L. S. Pool, instructor of the summer course which has been tried in the Farwell school for the first time this year.

Classes in the course began on June 6 and will be completed today (July 29). Twenty-four students have been enrolled in the classes with an average attendance of 20.

During the six weeks the classes have been in progress, children have visited several places on field trips including Clardy-Campbell Dairy, Hotel Clovis where they were given a view of the city from the top of the building and a ride on the elevator, Dr. Pepper Bottling Company, a fire station, and a farm.

All of the trips have been pleasant and easy, stated Mrs. Pool, with many adults from the community volunteering to make the trips with the children. Adults who have volunteered their services for the field trips have been Rosetta Chisman, Deborah Hargrove, Peggy Eason, Kandy Meeks, and Mesdames C. C. Christian, Hardin Atkins, Lee Jones, Fred Curtis, Willie Williams, Joel White, and Bill Foster.

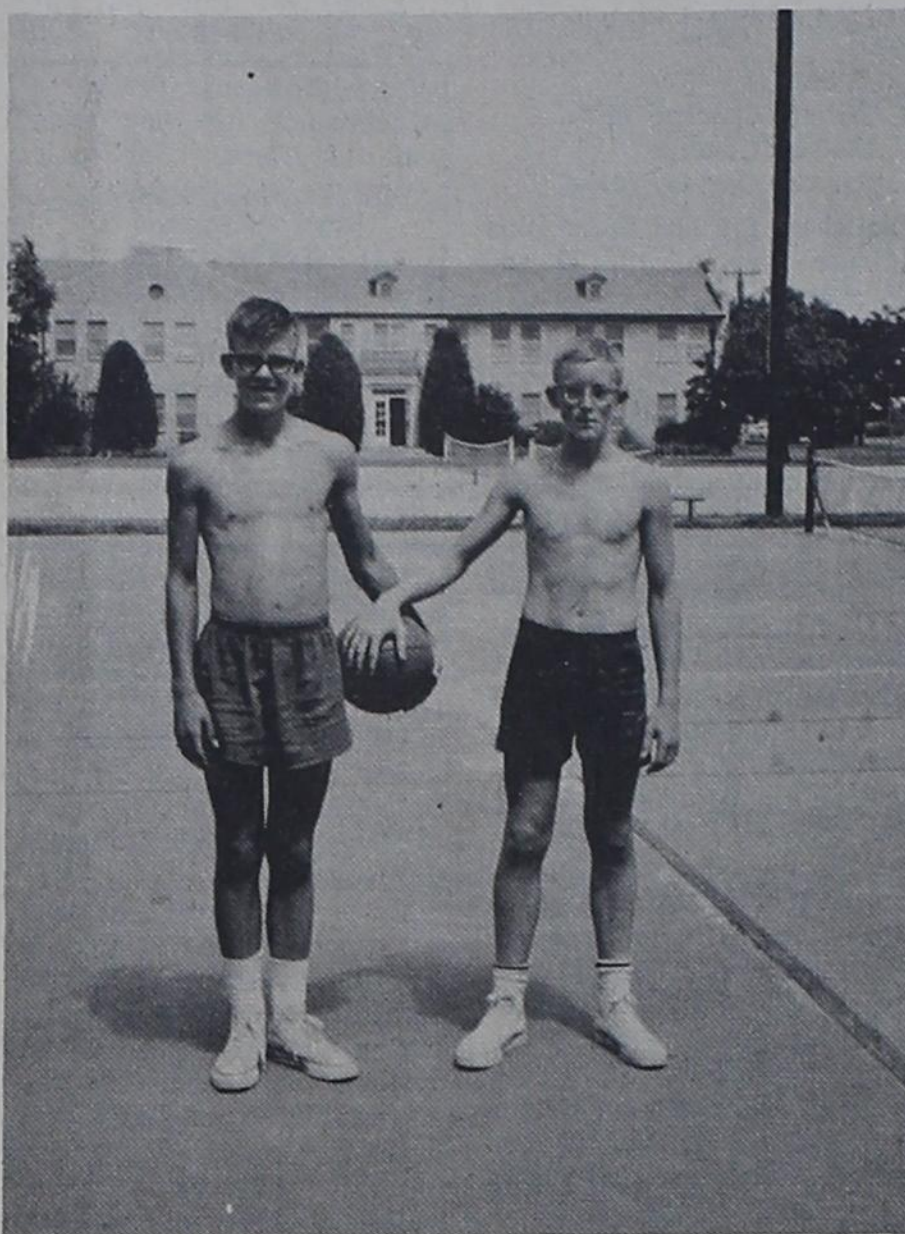
Not only have the children

been taken on field trips, but they have had complete physical checkups by a local doctor. All who needed immunizations were given the required shots, and polio vaccines.

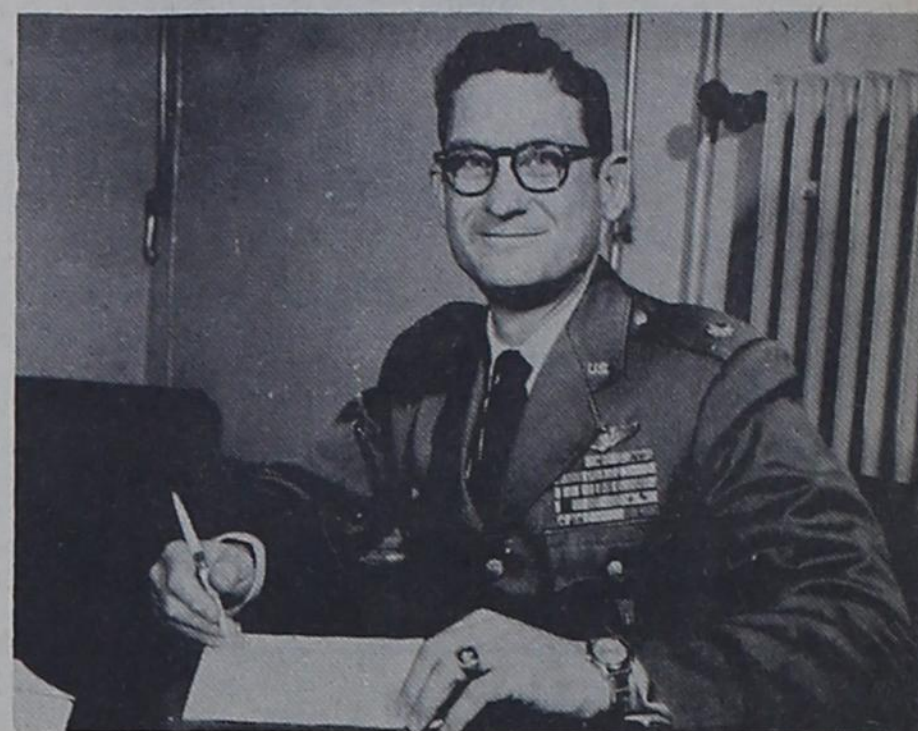
In addition, 11 children enrolled in the program were taken to an optometrist for eye examinations, where it was found that, not all, but a part of them were in need of eye care. All of the children had dental care, including teeth filled and pulled, through the Clovis Dental Association who worked with the school in the program.

While all of these things are important and will be of much benefit when the children begin school, workers with the group believe that some of the greatest benefits of the program will be seen in the progress the children will be able to make when they enter school. Thirteen of the group will enter first grade this year, while the others have another year in which to prepare themselves even further through another "headstart program" if it is offered again next summer.

Many of the children are from Spanish speaking families and it is felt by workers that the association, with other children this summer, has helped to break down the language barrier, since children learn

School Tax Rate Remains Unchanged

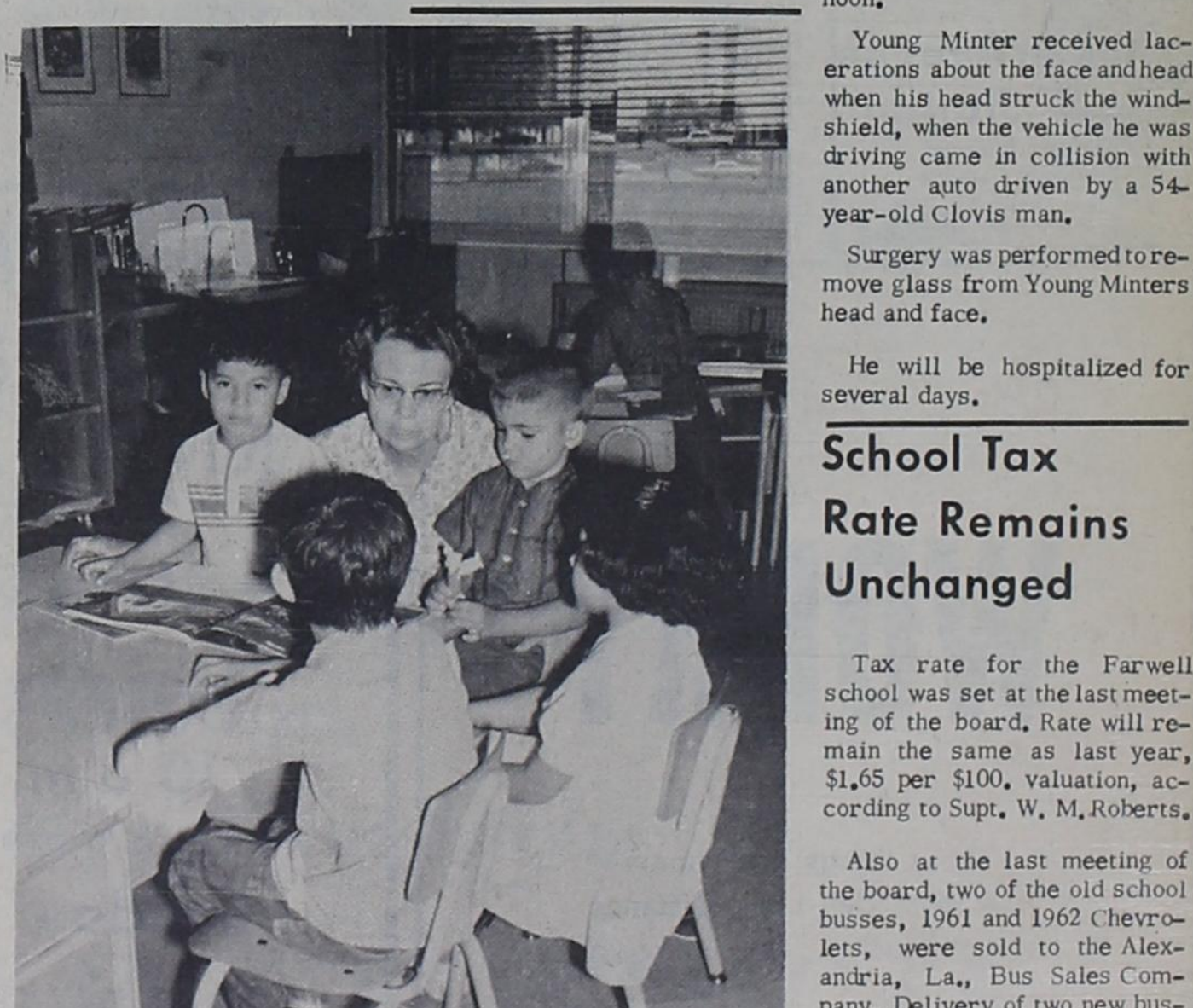

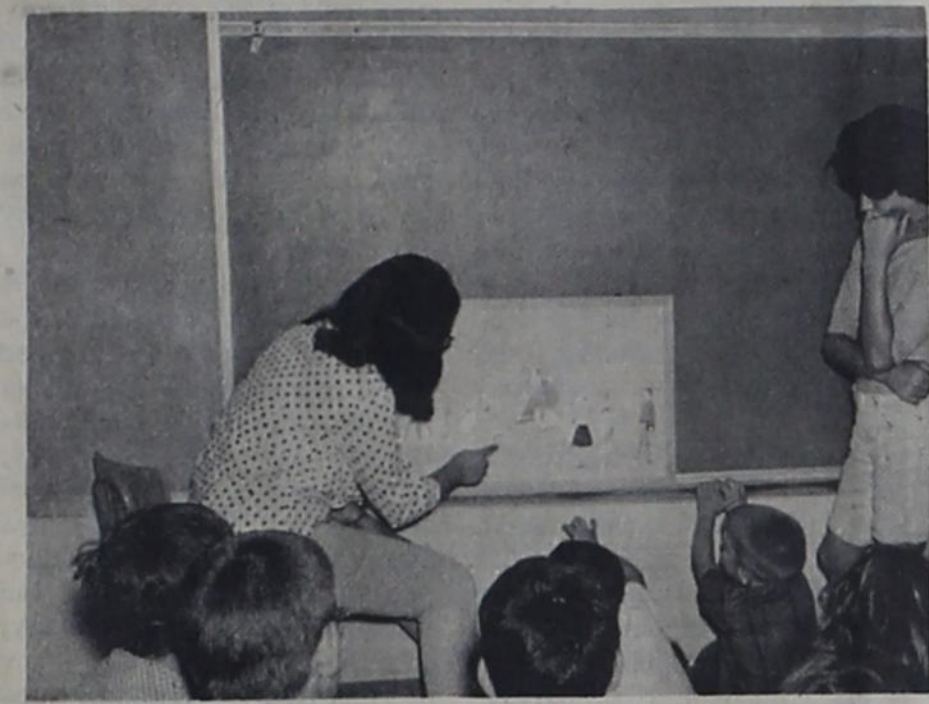

On The Farm In Parmer County

Submitting wheatland soil samples now will insure getting soil test recommendations in plenty of time to plan the most profitable fertilizer application for the fall planted crop.

Fifty bushels of wheat grain contain 50 pounds of nitrogen and 25 pounds of phosphorus. Additional nutrients are used up producing straw and forage.

An early soil test is particularly helpful when a field is found to need phosphorus or when the wheat will be grazed. Nitrogen should be applied preplant to stimulate early growth if the wheat will be grazed. When wheat is grown only for grain, research shows that time of nitrogen application is of little importance.

Phosphorus, if needed, should be applied before planting. Wheat, like other crops, uses it while it is young and phosphorus is not moved into the soil by moisture. Fertilizer recommendations for wheat are based on the nutrients available in the soil and on producers statements about yield goals and anticipated grazing.

The fertilizer recommendations will be most meaningful when the sample is highly representative of the soil and when the information sheet gives accurate details on crop history and production intentions.

Your County Agent can be contacted for sample containers, soil information sheets, mailing instructions and more complete information on soil testing and fertilization.

per scholastic. Bovina received \$3,104.64; Farwell \$3,139.92; Friona, \$6,703.20; Lazbuddie, \$1,774.08; Muleshoe (transfer students) \$10.08; Hereford (school district extends into Parmer County) \$156.24.

The commissioners also voted to ask for the surplus money from gas tax fund for lateral road fund in the amount of \$33,652.51.

A tractor and two weed shredders were also purchased for use in precinct one (Friona). The resignation of the Parmer County Agricultural agent, Joe VanZandt, was accepted, effective August 10.
