Moisture content of the Kaltwasser wheat was 14% and test weight was 61 lbs. per bushel. Little wheat has been received by any of the local elevators since the past weekend.

as now or hereafter constituted, works, systems, plants, pipes and all related facilities to sell, manufacture, store, distribute, convey or otherwise conduct, serve, supply and furnish the inhabitants of the Town and others, and to the Town, whenever the Town may desire to contract therefor, gas for light, fuel, power, heat and any and all other useful purposes, and the said Company is hereby granted passage, right of way and the right to occupy and use in any lawful way during the life of this franchise every and any and all streets, avenues, easements, rights of way, alleys, highways, sidewalks, bridges and other structures and public places and grounds of the Town, both above and beneath the surface of the same, as said streets, avenues, easements, rights of way, alleys, highways, sidewalks, bridges, and other structures and public places and grounds of the Town now or may hereafter exist, for every and any such service, use, effect, and lawful purpose as herein mentioned.

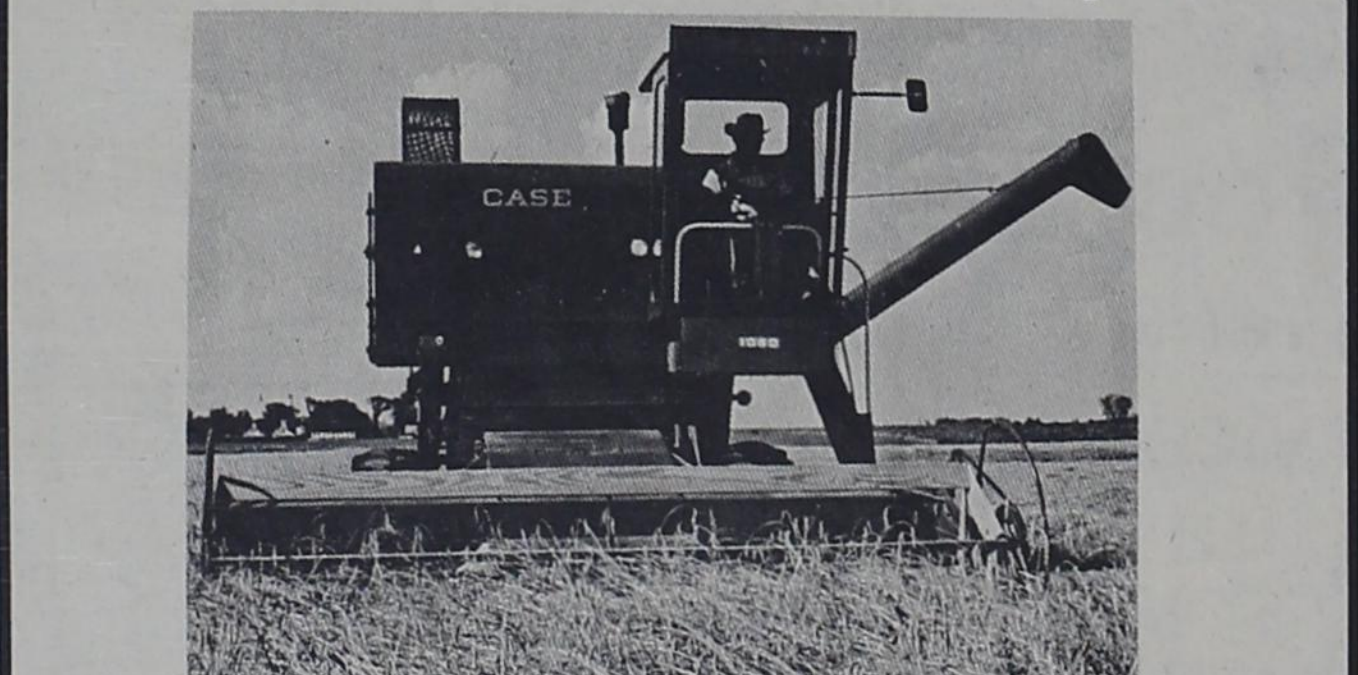

in force from and after thirty (30) days from the date of its passage, during which thirty (30) day period, and prior to fifteen (15) days from the expiration thereof, this ordinance shall be published in a manner provided by law, and shall continue in full force and effect for a period of twenty-five (25) years from the date of its enactment.

On The Farm In Parmer County

There are two short courses coming up during the next month that will be of interest to some here in Parmer County. Both of these will be held at Texas A&M University at College Station.

The first is the Texas Greenhouse Vegetable Growers Short Course and Conference on June 27 and 28. The two day event will cover nearly every aspect of greenhouse tomato production. Many outstanding specialists in this field are on the program. During the past year we have had four different individuals come by and discuss greenhouse tomato production with us. If you have any thoughts about possibly going into this type of business, you should definitely attend this event. You could learn more in these days than you could in a long time of reading and visiting with some of the same people. For more information on this, please contact the county agent.

Over the past two years we have received many inquiries about improved pastures. A Pasture and Forage Short-course is scheduled for July 7 and 8 at Texas A&M. The program will cover most phases of grass and forage production. Both of these shortcourses come at a busy time for most Parmer County folks but either one will give you an excellent educational experience as well as a nice trip into that part of Texas as there are several places of interest in that general area. Contact the county agent for more information.

Comfort, Safety And Easy Care Sought In Furnishings For Elderly -- Older citizens need home furnishings that are safe, easy to care for, and comfortable.

Home furnishing features to look for in selecting furniture for senior citizens actually are the same features which appeal to all members of the family, regardless of their ages.

Attractive colors in furnishings can add much to the lives of older persons. For example, blues and greens are relaxing, while yellows and pinks enliven or "pep up" a room. Patterns and textures are important, too. The absence of pattern is relaxing, but the use of some pattern can add interest and activity to a room.

seen much Johnsongrass that is beginning to head out. You need to get right on this job today.

We think that a methyl arsonate (DSMA or MDMA) sold under several different trade names is about the best chemical for this kind of work, considering cost. Apply 5 pounds per acre active Methyl Arsonate in 40 to 100 gallons of water per acre plus a surfactant when grass is 8 to 12 inches high and actively growing. Wet all of the foliage good. Three sprayings may be required during a year to eradicate the Johnsongrass and temperatures should be 80 degrees or higher when applying.

GRAIN SORGHUM
Generally speaking over the county we have a real good sorghum crop started. Recent rains have helped a little on our irrigation requirements but some areas have already got the first irrigation applied to sorghum.

During the past two years we have seen a few fields where the heads did not completely bloom and set a full head of grain. We don't know exactly what causes this condition but high temperatures and sometimes lack of water have caused the same condition in greenhouse experiments.

The sorghum head is beginning to form about 35 days after emergence and this is an important time in the sorghum plants life. A good supply of moisture is needed about this time to insure a good seed head is being formed. If you have adequate water and are shooting for maximum production, don't wait until your sorghum shows a moisture stress to start your irrigation. These top sorghum yields just need a lot of water and don't let these rains fool you into waiting too long to start your sorghum irrigation. Check the moisture conditions in your soil and plan to irrigate when about 50 per cent of the available soil moisture has been used.

GRASSHOPPERS
Young grasshoppers are appearing in abundant numbers in several areas of the state.

Grasshoppers are relatively easy to control when they are young but become increasingly difficult to control as they near maturity. They are best controlled in their hatching areas before they begin to migrate over, larger areas. Frequently, spot treatment of the hatching areas will prevent later wide-spread damage.

Eggs are usually deposited in late summer and fall in the soil in grassy, uncultivated areas such as roadsides, fence rows, idle crop land and pastures, the entomologist said. The young nymphs, after hatching the following spring, feed in the vicinity for several days before beginning to disperse to fields, pastures and gardens. Applying control measures while population is still fairly concentrated will reduce later damage to pastures and crops.

Several insecticides give effective control of young grasshoppers. Producers should pay careful attention to the label precautions before applying any insecticide to pastures or crops.

For control recommendations on grassland and specific field crops, contact the county agent. We haven't heard of any infestations in Parmer County as most infested areas are about 100 miles east of here. However, if you have an abundance of hoppers please contact the county agent.

JOHNSONGRASS
This is a real busy time for our farmers. Too often many just can't find the time to rig up a sprayer at this time and spray the Johnsongrass along their roads and ditches. We have

An experienced Texas rural electrification specialist departed for Chile this week to help that country further develop its rural electric cooperatives.

Leo Forrest, manager of Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative in Hereford, will spend 30 days in Chile assisting 17 cooperatives plan their future expansion needs.

Under a unique 48-month contract with the Chilean government, Forrest will return to Chile for 30 days every six months to measure the progress of the cooperatives and continue assistance. He also will help them develop a stronger national association to provide services to the member cooperatives.

Forrest will perform his work in Chile over the next four years under a non-profit contract between the Chilean government and the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA), of which Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperatives is a member. Loan funds for the projects are provided by the Agency for International Development (AID).

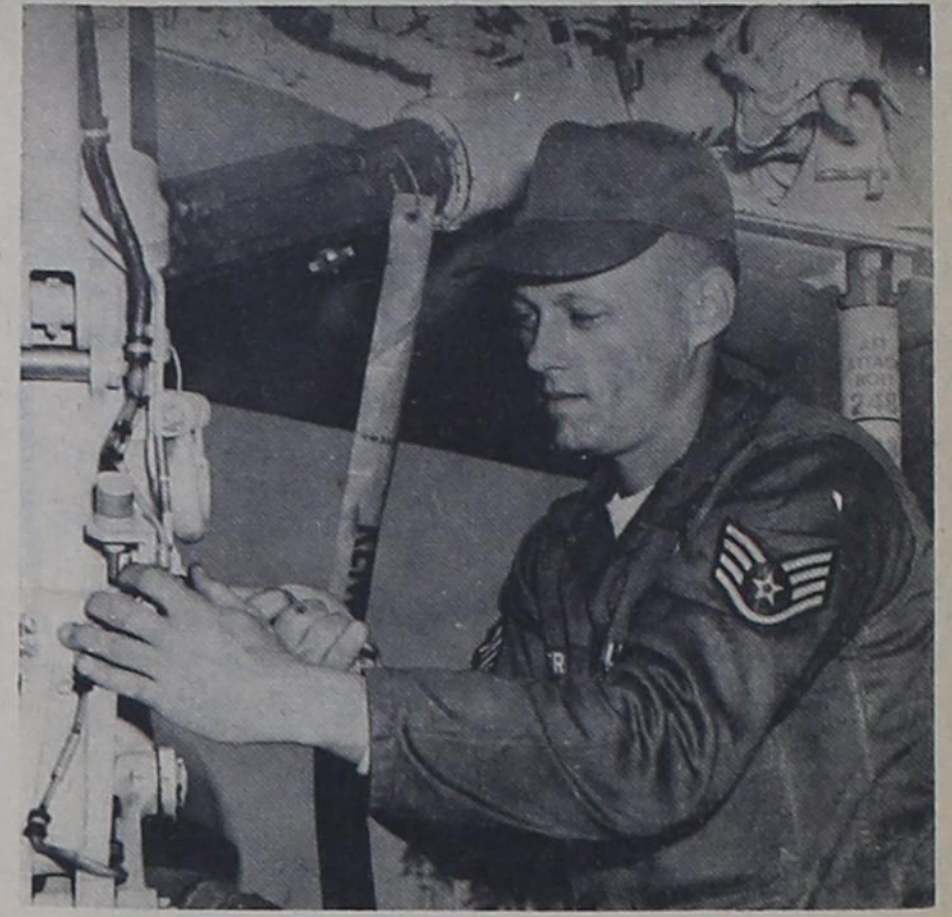

Bookmobile Is Coming

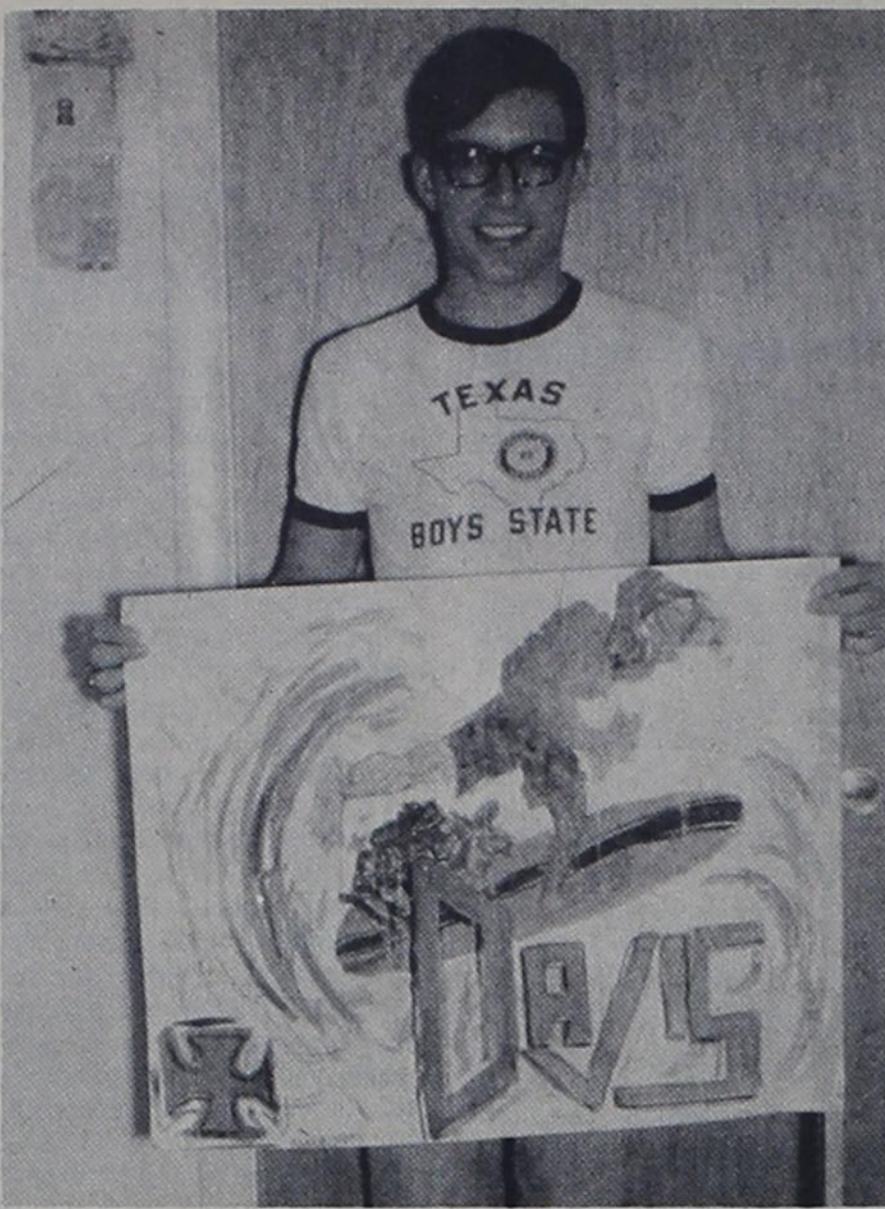

My Impression Of Boys' State

Editors Note

The following account of Texas Boys' State which was held in Austin last week was written by Johnny Schell who was the Farwell High School representative.

By Johnny Schell
American Legion Boys' State is a plan for training in the functional aspects of citizenship. It is a program sponsored by the American Legion, Department of Texas, its purpose is to teach the youth of today constructive attitudes toward the American form of government.

Boys' State attempts to show that all a democracy needs is an intelligent citizenry and a clean and impartial administration, responsive to the will of the people.

The program, originated in Illinois in 1934, has been adopted by the National Organization of American Legion and is now in operation in 47 states. Two delegates are selected from each state and attend a similar program in Washington, D.C., called Boys' Nation.

The constitution and the statutes of the State of Texas are the patterns from which the fundamental law of the American Legion Boys' State has been developed. Boys' State should be thought of as a mythical 51st state with a consti-

tution, statutes, and ordinances constructed by its citizens to govern themselves.

Citizens of Boys' State not only review their knowledge already acquired concerning the political machinery of a commonwealth, but they also find themselves performing exactly the same functions as real officeholders in the everyday world.

In Boys' State, citizens organize their own city, county and state governments. They choose their own officials in accordance with regular election procedures. They introduce and argue their own bills in the legislatures. In Boys' State each boy "Learns to Do by Doing."

This year's Boys' State was honored by many important officials in our state government. Waggoner Carr, the Attorney General, gave a speech on how a bill becomes a law; Robert S. Calvert, the Comptroller of Public Accounts in Texas for the past 19 years, spoke to my city and answered any questions we had concerning his office.

Dr. H. Roe Bartle, the former mayor of Kansas City and one of the five greatest speakers in the world, gave a one and one-half hour speech on Americanism. Dr. Bartle has been ambassador and had met with Adolph Hitler and Nikita Khrushchev. The citizens of

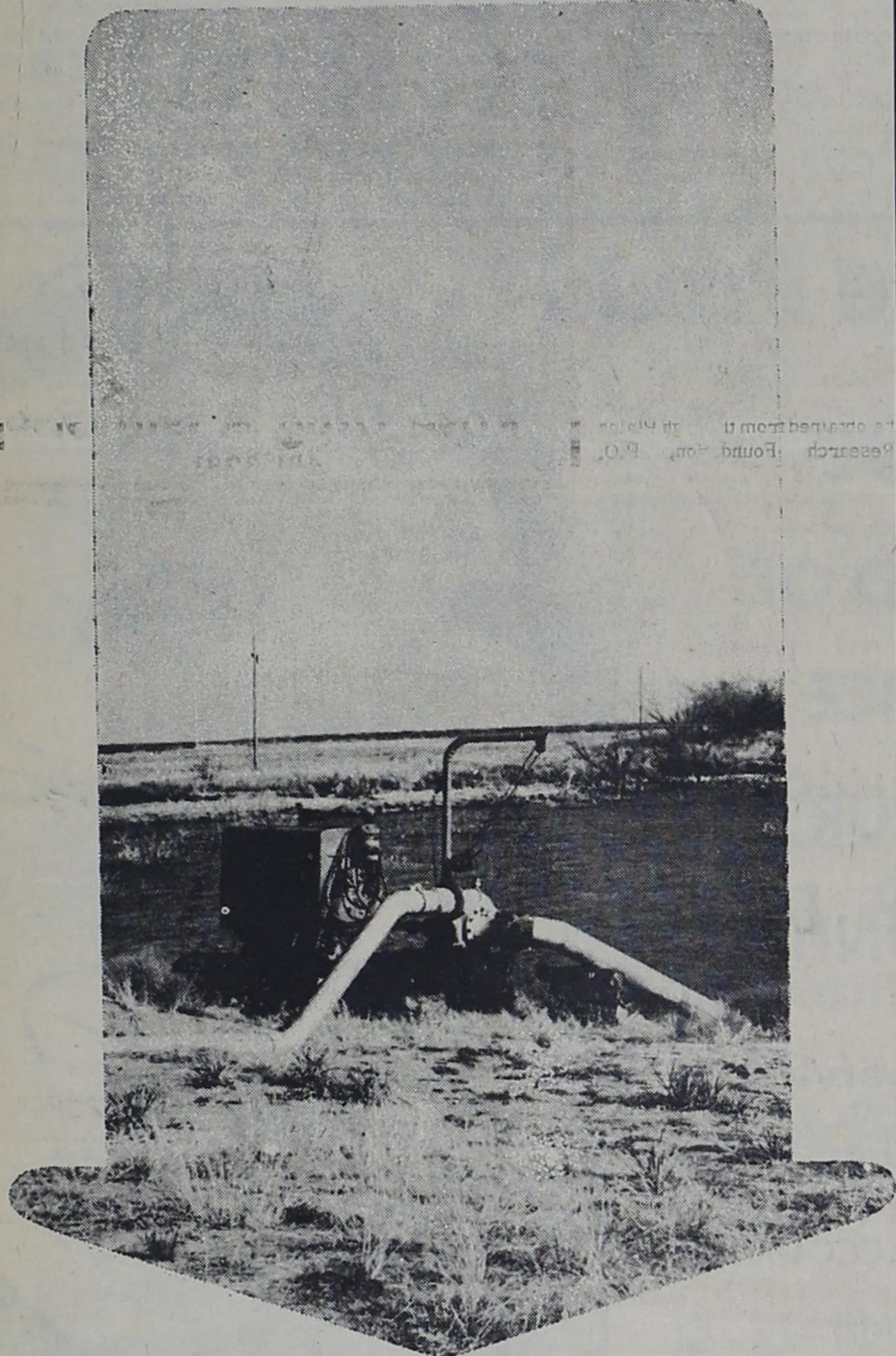

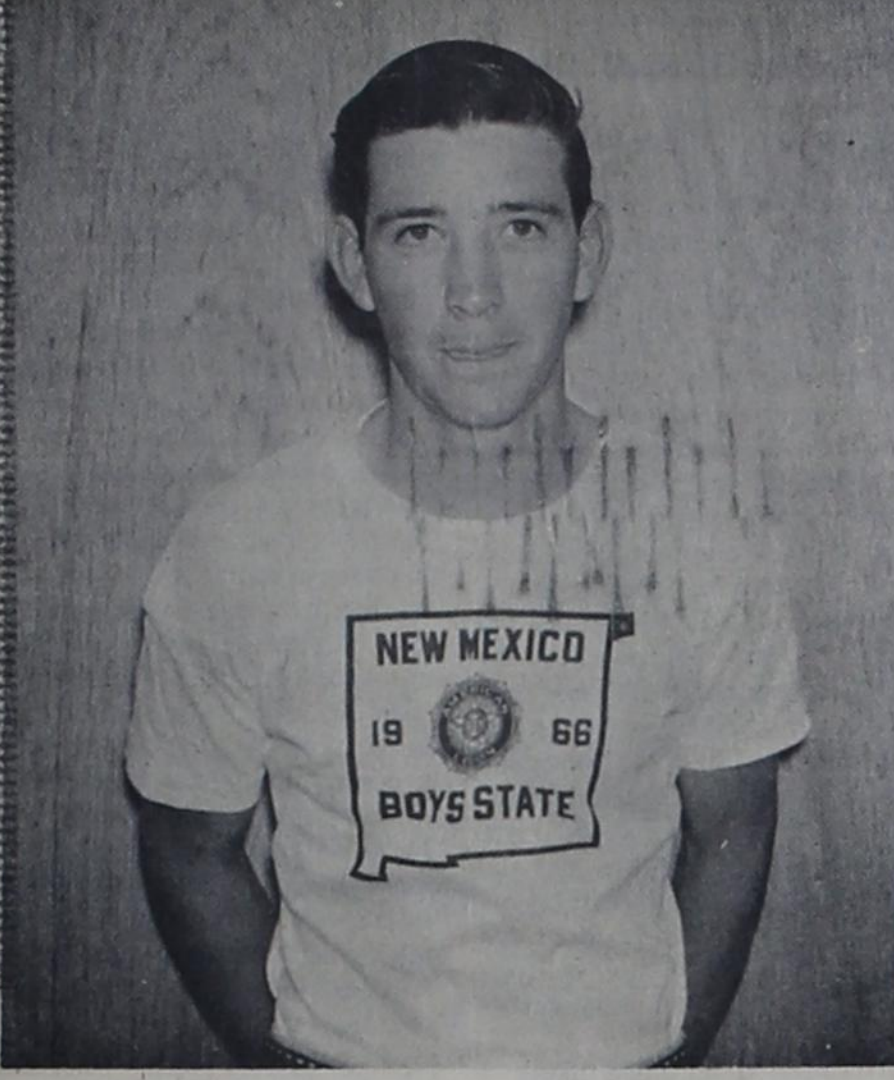

SUG Renews Contract With Town Of Texico

Eight Accidents In County Property Damage High

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents in Parmer County during the month of May, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

The crashes resulted in 10 persons injured and an estimated property damage \$5,350.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1966 shows a total of 37 accidents resulting in one person killed, 23 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$29,134.00.

The number of traffic deaths in Texas has risen steadily since 1960 with 2254 deaths to 3028 deaths in 1965. "For the first five months of 1966, 1137 persons have died in traffic compared to 1032 deaths for the same period of 1965," the Sergeant stated. "This 10% increase is alarming, and when you realize our heavy volume traffic months are still ahead, we must anticipate increasing problems in the accident picture."
