

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#### 1981 Wheat Program Announced

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland announces that for the second year in a row U.S. wheat producers would not need to set aside acreage to be eligible for the farmer-owned reserve, commodity loans and target price protection. "Wheat producers need only to be sure they plant within their normal crop acreage to be eligible for all program benefits in 1981," Bergland said.

The farmer-owned reserve release and call prices will be increased from the current \$4.20 and \$5.25 to keep them consistent with the cost of producing wheat, he said. The exact amount of the increase will be decided when more precise cost information becomes available.

Bergland said he expects the Congress to authorize a least \$3.00 a bushel. After



Miss Short's interest in China was sparked as a child and she noted that as she grew to adulthood she always knew she would pursue some phase of missionary work there. With that in mind, she became an English teacher. providing herself with a skill that she felt would be helpful to those with whom she came in contact. Later she studied Chinese full time for two years before leaving the United States.

The first three years of Miss Short's work were done in Canton, China, where she taught English in Chinese schools. She then became a resident of Hong Kong, a British Crown Colony which is 98 percent Chinese. For the next 31 years she taught in high schools and in seminary.

In her early years in Hong Kong, Miss Short explained, there were not enough schools for everyone to attend, but she added that the situation has changed in the last six years or so. The educational system has been enlarged to the point that now there is a place for all students on the elementary, junior high and high school levels in Hong Kong. However, the average class is composed of 45 students.

She further said that students are taught English beginning in the first grade and that by junior high age they can read simple novels such as "Little Women." On the tenth grade level, all students are required to take a typing class conducted in English.

That same year, the students choose one of three streams they will follow through the remainder of their school careers: science, the arts, or secretarial training. Miss Short commented that if a student's math and science grades are not good enough, he cannot go the science route.

Although many Western practices and attitudes are becoming more prevalent in Hong Kong, education is approached with a more traditional attitude. For example, students rise and give a unified greeting when the teacher enters the room. Also, through rote memory with little creative teaching. How-

Entire families live in one small 15' X 20' room. However, all the government homes now have individual bathrooms. Until recently, communal baths were located on each floor of the multi-story structures. What were formerly porches have been transformed, with approximately one-third of the area having been turned into bathrooms and the other two-thirds becoming kitchen facilities.

Because most Westerners lump the people of the Far East into one group, Miss Short was sure to point out that most Chinese do not worship Buddha, but that most are ancestor worshippers. In fact, she said that there is really very little known about Buddhism in Hong Kong, Most students on the high school level have no religious preference. Concerning foods, Miss

Short again stressed that although the Chinese consume a great deal of fish, it is not served raw, but is usually steamed. Occasionally fish is fried. Rice, vegetables, pork, fruit and mushrooms are also favorite dishes, as is chicken prepared with ginger. She added that soy sauce is used almost universally in cooking. Recently Western trends

have invaded almost every aspect of Chinese life and Miss Short noted, many of the young people of Hong Kong prefer McDonald's hamburgers to the more traditional foods. She also added that the increased number of supermarkets has introduced the Chinese to Western style, and particularly convenience foods.

One other tradition still followed by most residents of Hong Kong is the use of chopsticks, literally "fast fellows." Miss Short commented that most Chinese food does not taste right unless eaten with those utensils.

She also explained the art of Chinese-style eating. She said that the bowl is held with two fingers and thumb a few inches from the mouth, and that, of course, chopsticks are used. Any tidbits which are dropped fall back into the dish. At the end of the meal, the bowl is brought quite close to the mouth and the remaining food is scooped into it.

Miss Short, who has officially retired from missionary work and will be teaching on the college level here in the States, adds that there are numerous other misconceptions about the Chinese. Undoubtedly, she will attempt to set them straight. And although she will not return to Hong Kong on a permanent basis, her plans for the future definitely include visits to the place which is so dear to her.
