#### CLEANING CHIMNEY INTERIOR

If you use your fireplace frequently and burn resinous woods such as pine, spruce or fir, flammable deposits may form on the inside of the chimney making an annual cleaning a "must"

Check the unit with a flashlight to determine condition of the chimney walls. If they appear "furry" and flake off when brushed, clean them before the fireplace is used.

Cleaning the interior chimney requires agility and care because the operation is carried out from the rooftop.

Begin by placing a plastic dropcloth inside the fireplace to catch dropping debris. Then, fasten another piece of plastic over the opening and attach securely around the outside with duct or masking tape. This important step will protect furnishings against soot

Cleaning equipment is simple and inexpensive.

If the house is single-story, try using a long-handled broom to dislodge the sticky deposits. If chimney height prevents use of a broom, try a cylinder of chicken wire or a rock-andstraw filled burlap bag suspended by a rope.

From the roof, the cleaning device is lowered and raised to dislodge soot deposits from the interior wall of the chimney. Precautions are in order if your home is old or has a poorly constructed chimney. Where this is the case, it is best to have the cleaning job done by a professional with modern suction equipment.

> 1) one-half cup vinegar or acetic acid, one-eighth cup detergent, and one gallon water, or 2) for more stubborn stains,

use one to two cups trisodium phosphate, one-half cup household bleach, one-eighth cup detergent, and one gallon water.

Apply either solution with stiff (natural or plastic bristle) In addition, when it comes to scrub brush. Wear gloves and cleaning the masonry or stone protective clothing to avoid skin irritation.

rinse well with clear water.

When masonry is completely dry and free of stain, a clear masonry sealer may be mopped or sprayed on to prevent deep penetration of stains.






