William C. Liles, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe, announces that the Federal Land Bank of Texas' billing rate on farm and ranch land and rural residence loans will be increased from 934 percent on farm and ranch loans to 1012 percent. The rural residence loans will be increased from 1014 percent to 11 percent effective January 1, 1981. In making this announcement, Liles stated that the increase in the billing rate became necessary because of the continued high cost of funds to finance the Banks' lending operation.
