

County Commissioners Have Lengthy Agenda

the Parmer County Commissioners Court, members voted to try and qualify the Parmer County juvenile probation office position to serve both Parmer and Bailey counties. County Judge Porter Roberts had been contacted previously about this possibility and the commissioners voted unanimously to make it possible.

In other action, commissioners voted to pay county volunteer fire departments a total of \$3,500 each to assist them in their operating costs. "When the fire departments are called out to a county fire they are using city equipment," explained Judge Roberts. "This money is to help defray their costs of traveling to county fires," he added.

In other money matters the commissioners voted to invest \$25,000 in a CD to mature by March of 1981. The money is to come from the county's general fund.



JV Steer Claud Gobble [14] goes up for two points during the Farwell junior varsity competition with San Jon as


