The most renowned chronicler of life in Parmer County and environs is the local boy made good, Paul Crume. Paul writes a daily column for the front page of the Dallas Morning News titled "Paul Crume's Big D." This scribbler's recollections go back some 18 to 19 years now, but Paul's reminiscences go back considerably farther than these few years so he reveals local history that is probably new to the majority of our citizens.

Several weeks ago, Crume's column contained a bit of Americana pertaining to several of our local citizens that was quite interesting to me and I am sure it will be to our present readers. So will reprint the column here so that you too may enjoy a peek into the past.

"G. D. Anderson is the first banker who ever took the appalling risk of accepting a check signed by me. I was 14 at the time.

"Mr. Anderson has been president of the Security State Bank in Farwell, Texas, forever. The bank is now housed in a splendid new building which could be tucked away in a small corner of one floor of the new First National but yields nothing, foot for foot, in beauty and costliness to larger banks.

"It even has a broad circular lobby with a stained glass dome. This shows what will happen if you take appalling risks on the right kind of people.

"But this is beside the point. The story is that Mr. Anderson has a farmer friend named J. W. Crim who had a brother named Bromo.

"Even in the plains country this is slightly unusual name.

"Unlike us uncultivated yahoos of Dallas, the plains country people do not go around remarking that a man's name is unusual. He might call them by a more unusual one, Bromo was gone, and Mr. Anderson and J. W. Crim had been friends a long time when the banker finally asked the farmer why his brother was called Bromo.

"Simple, said J. W. Crim. That was his name. His full name was Bromo Quinine Crim. "He then told Anderson the story. B. Q. Crim was a sickly baby when he was born and began to get worse. That was quite awhile ago. Medicine wasn't any better than it need be in the cities, and the Crim family lived in the deep country with few services to rely on except the general store.

"The new infant weakened steadily. The parents and their helpers went far beyond catnip tea into all the oldtime baby remedies without effect. The child was about to die when Father Crim went into the general store and started pouring out his troubles to the storekeeper. A traveling drummer was standing by. He introduced himself, sympathized with the father and asked whether he might see the child. He explained that he sold a line of drugs.

"I'm not a doctor," he explained, "but I might be able to help."

"It was arranged for him to travel to the Crim farm and spend the night. He started dosing the baby with a medicine, which, of course, was Bromo Quinine.

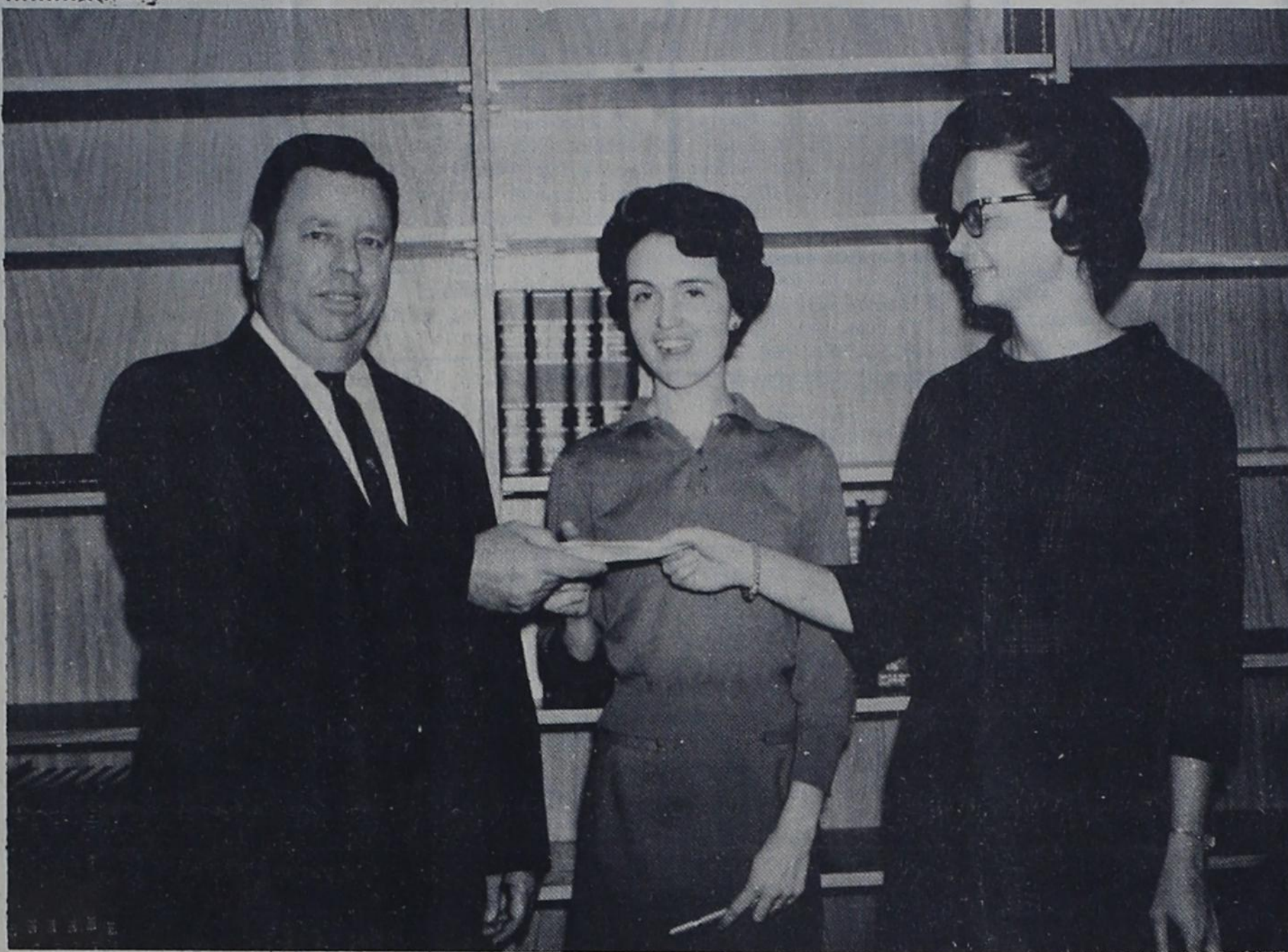
"The baby seemed to improve. He became quieter. He slept.

"Next morning the salesman departed, leaving the bottle behind, and the family continued to dose the baby with Bromo Quinine. He got rapidly better.

"That is all that happened until Mrs. Crim wrote a letter to the drug company explaining what had happened. In gratitude, she added, she was naming the baby Bromo Quinine Crim.

"Back came an excited letter from the company thanking Mrs. Crim. The letter further promised that the company would take care of all the college expenses for young Bromo Quinine when the time came and would make a place for him in the company. It all came to nothing because Bromo Crim, grown, decided he didn't want to go to college.

"But for years, I am told, the letter and a picture of the infant appeared on the Bromo Quinine label."

Friday Winds Cause Damage

Winds which were described by long time residents of the area as "equal to those of the 30's" caused minor damages in the Twin Cities on Friday morning and were the cause of at least one accident in the vicinity.

The winds which were accompanied by blowing sand reached a velocity of at least 72 miles an hour according to local residents. No precipitation accompanied the winds.

In Texico, a tower at the old Santa Fe pump house was blown down and a tree at a rent house belonging to Morgan Billington was uprooted and thrown across the house causing minor damage to the house. Other damage was in the form of shingles blown off of roofs and window panes cracked.

The accident occurred some six miles northeast of Farwell on the Amarillo highway when one vehicle bumped another due

to poor visibility. Names of drivers of the vehicles were not given. Several cars were lined up along the highway before a maintenance crew came

out and set up flares and warned drivers to slow down before driving into the area where the dust was blowing the hardest.

An area some three or four miles long, beginning about four miles out on the Amarillo highway was described as the worst area.

Farwell Teams Win First District Games

Farwell Steers and Steerettes got off to a fine start in district basketball play Tuesday night when they defeated teams from Kress. Coach Vernon Scott stated, "The Steers looked good, they were ready to go and went out and won a game working together well."

2nd Management School Meeting January 17

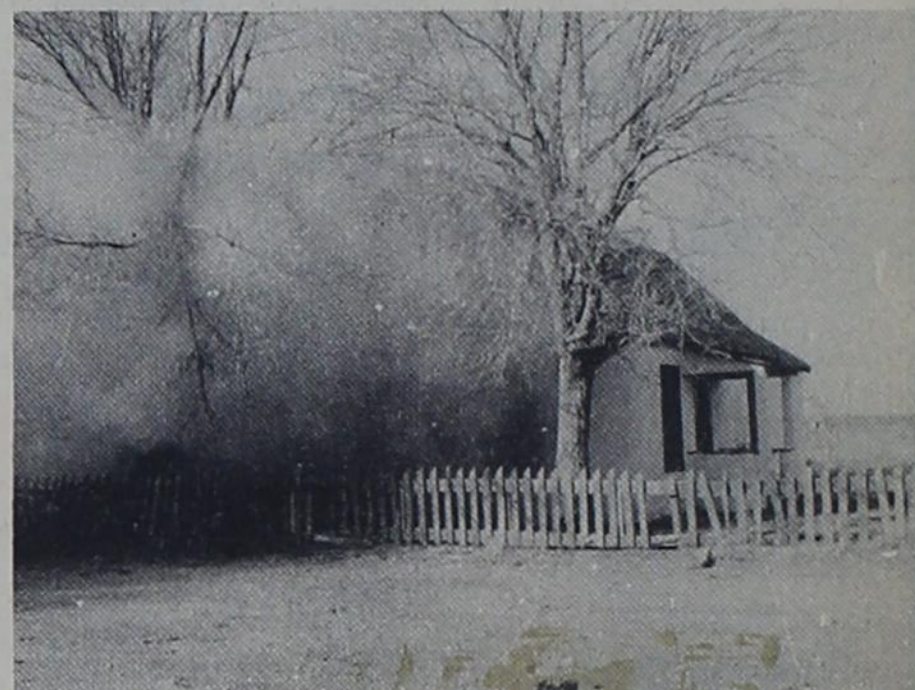
The "Get In Step for 1967-Management School" be held at the Hub Community Center will have its second meeting Tuesday from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m.

No explanation of how the fire started has been given. One person, a boy of approximately 18 years of age, was in the house at time the fire was discovered. When firemen arrived the fire

was out of control; however, they were able to save most of the furniture and the family's belongings. The only piece of furniture which firemen were unable to bring from the house was a cookstove.

No estimate of the value of the house was available, and whether or not the house was covered by insurance is not known.

Coach Green stated that the Wolves will be working hard on free throws this week as well as trying to improve their scoring average from the floor. "Our percentage of shots, both free and from the floor, is way too low for comfort especially when we are meeting some of the powers in the district in the forthcoming games," stated Coach Green.

The Wolves are scheduled to meet Dora Coyotes at Dora Friday night. Dora has won eight games while losing three. However, all of the wins have been consecutive.

Saturday night the Wolves will host the Causey Tomcats. Game time is 7:30 p.m.
