Locally, and for the most part, area wide, the 1966 football season has come to an end. We have refrained from comment about football until after the season closed because we were afraid our thoughts would be misconstrued, and they probably will be now.

First and foremost, we want to say that the 1966 edition of the Farwell Steers was the scrappiest, grittiest and most determined group of boys we have ever seen wearing the Blue and White, Our personal admiration for the coaches and the team is the very highest. Farwell closed with the poorest won-lost record in a long time. However they gathered a measure of esteem and respect seldom seen even by a big winning

The results of many of our games could have been different except for very tough breaks and some extremely inept officiating. For instance, in one game the opponents threw a pass that bounced off the hands of two receivers and in the hands of a startled third man. Pure luck that went against us. In another, the opposing quarterback was making an end sweep and dropped the ball. It bounced right back in his hands and he did not even have to break stride. Breaks, you bet. These "lucky" breaks did not go for the Steers this year and the games were lost.

Inept officiating -- well, "for instances" are almost too numerous to mention. One outstanding instance denied the Blue and White a winning touchdown. Another very crucial long TD run was called back, Bad breaks? Yes, but they determined the outcome of many of our games this year. Farwell could have had a better winning year, but they could not have had a more "successful" year as far as we are concerned.

As a side thought, the Texas Interscholastic League must take steps to raise the caliber of its officials. The value of the sport is too great to be lost because of an official's lack of knowledge of the game. Putting league heads in the sand and ignoring the existence of poor officiating will not correct it or cause it to remedy itself.

This deficiency must be recognized and intelligently dealt with before it turns football into a contest of what team can get which officials. Pious words and sanctimonious utterances will not cure this ever increasing gridiron malady. Let us hope that rational action will be soon forthcoming. We need it.

Last Saturday's game at Texas Tech was truly one of the greatest games to which this area has ever been treated. And one of our local boys, Jerry Lovelace, was one of the main cogs in the Tech upset machine. Many well-deserved words of praise were given to Jerry by area papers.

Here are a few quotes from the Lubbock Avalanche-Jour-

"The authoritative running of senior Jerry Lovelace, coupled with what was probably the best overall defense performance by Tech since it became an SWC member, paved the way for what eventually became perhaps the sweetest Red Raider victory ever scored."

"Lovelace, ripping off 71 yards on 13 carries and coming through time and again when the situation would allow for nothing short of a clutch performance, closed out his Tech career by averaging 5.5 vards per carry against the stinglest defensive team the league has to offer."

". . . wearing the 'hero' label was Jerry Lovelace, who closed out his career with his finest game, and it couldn't have come at a better time."

How proud we were to see these words of praise and how well-deserved they were. BUT, before some fathead rushes out to give the coach an extension of his contract for this upset, a word of caution, Personally, we think this game demonstrates not what a great coaching job was done, but what a poor job has been done all year. This fine material that Tech used to win Saturday's game has been available all season but not used to its potential.


