men but they have not been properly utilized. Poor judgment on the part of Tech's coaching staff has destroyed the potential of many of their fine players. It will do so in the future unless a wholesale turnover there occurs. Often times it seems that more decisions about who plays for Tech is made in the newspaper columns than in the athletic department. We seem to imagine that often the weight of a scribe's opinion is more effective than the weight of a good boy on the scales.  
A realistic appraisal of the last five or six years of Tech's record indicates the urgent need


of a complete change of that school's coaching staff and yes, if need be, the athletic office. Tough words, yes. Sour grapes, possibly. But, if we are to enjoy the full potential of our area's football, these things must be discussed with the view of constructive criticism. Listening to yes men and sycophants has been the downfall of many an organization in the past and will be in the future. Let's not wait until the patient dies to hold a post-mortem, but let's have some intelligent diagnosis and prescribing while there is still life in the grand old game.

Saturday night Texico B defeated Logan B 40-22 with Lynn Hughes scoring 10 points for the victors.



Sprayers and dusters should be given special attention prior to winter storage. Proper care at this time can add years to their useful life, and have them ready for use without delay next spring. Be sure and follow the manufacturer's manual for cleaning and storing.  
All pesticide materials should be removed from the equipment by washing or by other means. Moving parts should be lubricated. Some parts, may need to be disassembled for cleaning.  
After spraying is completed in the fall, soak nozzles and strainer (screens) in kerosene. Run a wire through the spray rods and rinse the hoses. Clean hoses should be put where they will not crack or freeze.  
Before putting the cleaner power sprayer away for the

Winter is the best time to control rats. Reason is the high morality rate from natural causes and the resulting low level of rat population.  
The anti-coagulant rat poisons are good for permanent bait stations. The rats have to feed on these baits for several days and, because there is no pain which they can associate with their feeding, the sickrats continue to eat the baits until they die.  
Use fish, meat, bread, fruit, vegetables, cereal, water and yellow corn meal as bait with the anti-coagulant poisons. Mix one part of the anti-coagulant to 19 parts of the bait material.  
The bait should be concealed along a rat runway, because rats avoid feeding in the open whenever possible.  
Make sure small children can not get hold of the poison or bait.

Cotton producers will have the opportunity to vote in two referendums during the period of December 5-9.

The questions are as follows:

1. Producers of upland cotton will vote to determine whether a research and promotion order should be issued for upland cotton.

If approved, the program would be financed through assessment of \$1 per bale from upland cotton producers. This program would be administered by a cotton board. The members of this cotton board would be nominated by cotton producing organizations. The \$1 will be collected by cotton handlers designated by the cotton board.

What kind of vote will cause this program to become effective?

Approval by two-thirds of the producers voting, or by a majority of the producers voting if that majority accounts for two-thirds of the cotton represented in the referendum, is necessary for the order to become effective.

If the order becomes effective, you can get your money money back. Collections from any cotton producer who did not wish to contribute would be refunded upon written application. The \$1 per bale assessment would start at the beginning of the ginning season for the 1967 crop.

2. Cotton quota referendum is basically the same thing cotton producers have voted on each year since 1953. Quotas will become effective and the upland cotton diversion program will be available next year if at least two-thirds of the growers voting approve the quotas. This program would provide price-support and diversion payments as was true in 1966.

If more than a third of the growers who vote disapprove quotas, price support at 50 per cent of parity will be available to growers who keep their 1967 upland cotton crop acreage within their farm allotments.

Both of the questions will be balloted by mail. Ballots will be mailed to all known eligible voters by the local ASCS Office in each county. Instructions will be enclosed with ballots.

Any person who engaged in the production of 1966 crop upland cotton is eligible to cast one vote.

Parmer county farmers have always shown a high degree of interest in the farm commodity programs and have turned out to vote in goodly numbers in past years. The Parmer County ASCS office urges each and everyone (who is eligible) to study the situation, mark their ballots (soon after received) and return them to the ASCS office to be counted. This is the way to let the rest of the public know what cotton producers want or don't want.

**Commissioners OK Several Contracts**

The commissioners court entered into a contract with the City of Muleshoe to continue to furnish Bookmobile library service to Parmer County. The Texas State Library is presently furnishing books for the four-county Bookmobile on a wear-out basis.

Commissioners also entered into a contract with the Lewellen Brothers to build a bridge on a county road in the Lazbuddie vicinity for a total cost of \$8800. This includes tearing away of the old bridge and construction of the new bridge.

The county commissioners along with the city of Friona is requesting the state highway department to make certain improvements, including widening, on state highway 214 south of Friona. The improvements being considered are construction of an overpass over the railroad in the south edge of Friona.

Commissioners also approved condemnation of Sunset Terrace Memorial Cemetery for 50 feet of right-of-way for highway 60.

**Mail Holiday Gifts Early**

Postmaster Smart reminded Farwell residents today that there are only 27 mailing days before Christmas.

"While that may seem like a long time to most people, it is frighteningly short to those of us in the Postal Service," he said. "Postmaster General L. F. O'Brien has predicted that well over eight billion pieces of mail must be delivered between now and Christmas Eve, a new record."

"We are asking everyone to start thinking about their Christmas shopping and mailing now. If all the holiday mail were to hit the postal system at one time, it is obvious that we'd have difficulty delivering every piece on time."

Mailing early and spreading the mail flow out along the entire pre-Christmas season is the key to better mail service at this time of the year.

Last year the public cooperation was "tremendous," according to Mr. Smart. Virtually every piece of holiday mail was delivered before Christmas Day. This year with increase volume because of the continuing strength of the economy, we are hoping to see that fine cooperative spirit again.

Postmaster Smart offers these mailing tips:

- \*Use ZIP Codes on all mail.
- \*If there are some ZIP Codes that you still need for your mailing list, come to the Post Office and look them up in our ZIP Code directory or give us a call. ZIP Codes are more important than ever this year.
- \*Prepare your gift list right away. The earlier you do your shopping, the better chance you have to get exactly what you want while the stores are still full of merchandise. That way, you can mail earlier too.
- \*Wrap your packages well -- include sufficient padding. Remember, that your parcel may be shipped in a mail sack with a set of the encyclopedia riding on top.
- \*Include a card or piece of paper inside the package with your name and address and that of the person you are sending the parcel to, in case the wrapping should be loose and come off. That way, you can be assured that your gift will not wind up in the dead parcel office. Also, insert a list of the package's contents.
- \*Address your gifts and greetings clearly so that postal workers will have no difficulty in reading the destination. Use first class postage on greeting cards -- this assures their being forwarded if the recipient has moved. Cards that are undeliverable will be returned when you include a return address on the envelope. The Post Office Department has issued a special five cent Christmas stamp which will help decorate your holiday mail, and these stamps are now on sale at the local post office.

not see any district action but is as fine a middle linebacker as there is in the district."

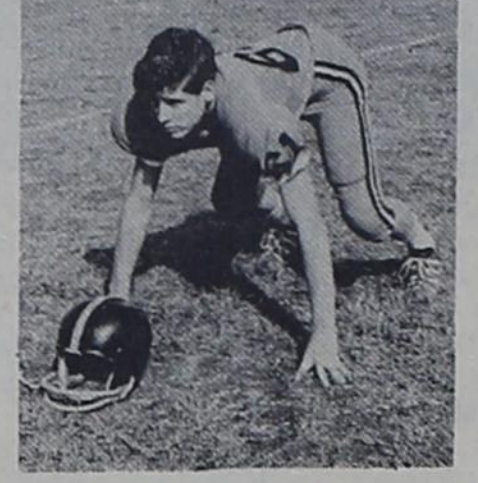

"Danny Miller is a two year letterman and has been a real surprise to the coaches when he inherited the offense position from Royce Barnes. Danny has turned in some fine

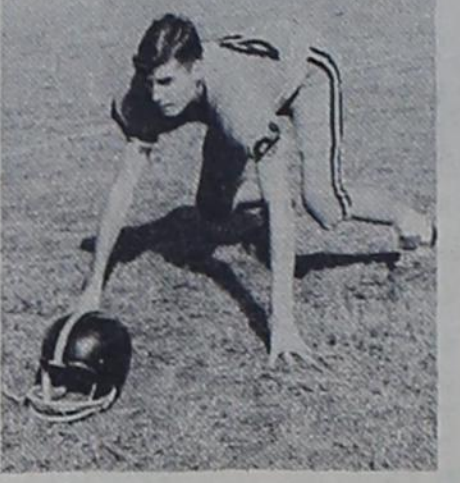
guarding as shown on our films on offense. He handled the snaps on punts and extra points. We haven't had a punt blocked this year and the main reason was the fine job Danny was doing."

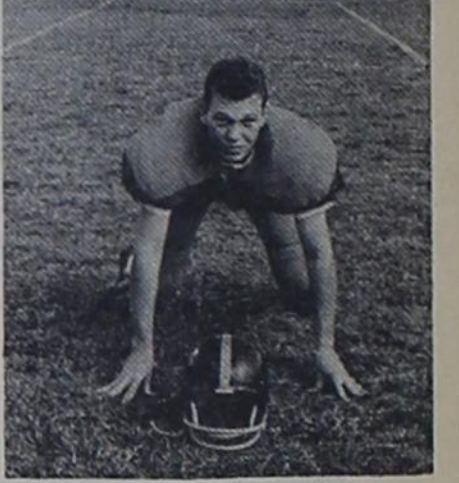
"Timmy Foster is a two year letterman and has played offensive and defensive halfback

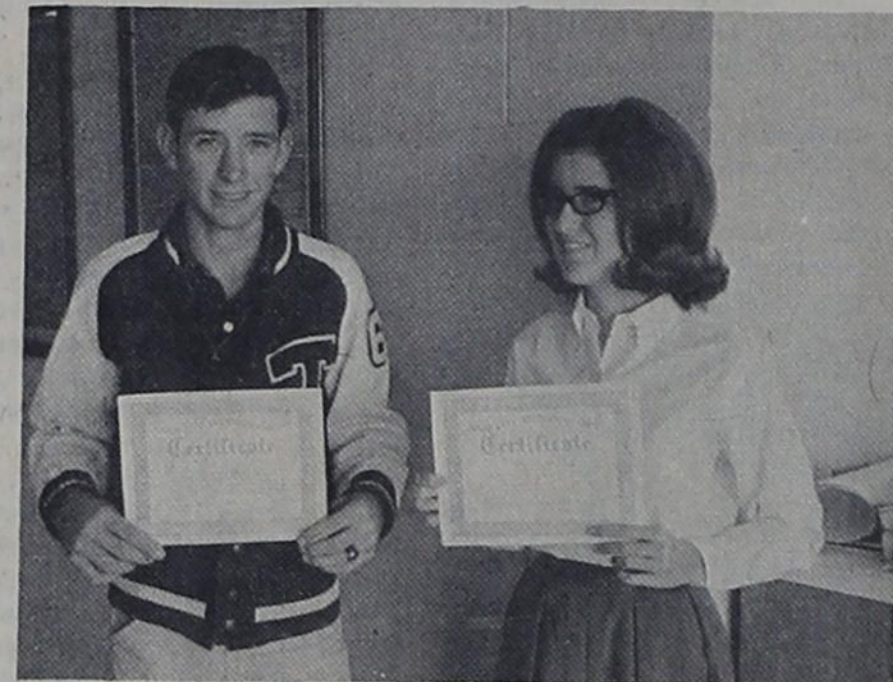
