

come." And they do more than 400 every Thursday.

They flock to the BBQ Shop in Farwell for ribs, brisket and pulled pork.

Owner Kelly Mimms is still amazed. "This all started out as just a hobby with my backyard charcoal grill."

Kelly, also known as Boss Hogg, says he just wanted to make authentic barbecue. "We like good food and just started experimenting."

Kelly, who grew up in Lazbuddie, soon outgrew the grill and moved up to a specialized ceramic cooker. "People liked my food and would ask me to cook for various events. This eventually led to building a trailer mounted smoker that I would sometimes take to barbecue cook-offs."

The first trailer smoker was built in 2006 in the shop of his "real" business at Curry County Fertilizer. He, along with BBQ partner Truman Woody, designed it and planned to take it to several barbecue contests.

Woody eventually decided not to pursue barbecuing, and Kelly bought out his interest in the smoker. From there, Kelly hit the road with wife Judy and son. They entered cook-offs in Enid, Okla., and Pueblo, Colo., with mixed results.



Texico Friday night scenes





his food.

He regularly gets visits from biker groups, Cannon Air Force personnel and traveling company reps from the Lubbock and Amarillo areas.

Last year, Kelly let his partner buy out his interest in the fertilizer business and he has concentrated even more time into making his barbecue the best.

He started out his barbecue career with a basic rub recipe and experimented until he found his own special combinations. Kelly and Judy made many trips to other areas of Texas to research famous BBQ joints.

Now, Kelly estimates that he and Judy spend about 40 hours each week working at their "hobby."

Kelly gets up about 3 a.m. on Wednesdays to start the meat in the smoker, cooks and prepares all day and then spends the night at the shop to watch the meat. He has two huge smokers that sit in the back section of the shop and slowly smoke the mouthwatering Boston Butt bone-in pork, turkey, ribs or brisket.

On Thursday mornings, he is up early, and the shop finishes up about 2:30 to 3 p.m. when the food is gone or the last customer served.

Judy helps on all aspects and even makes all the famous pork buns by hand. She helps with the Facebook page and the BBQ shop website, thebbqshopfarwell.com.

Live Cattle prices have continued to trade weaker vith cash trade a little softer as well. Cash traded about \$1.00 lower last week at \$126 and futures prices came into this week somewhat lower, but still holding last weeks low made around the \$125 area. A break below last weeks low could spell a little trouble over the near term. Softer corn prices seem to translate into softer eattle prices as well.

Feeder prices actually gained a little from lower corn prices, but still unable to cross major resistance levels around the \$148 level basis the October contract. This market has continued to trade inside a tight sideways range for almost four weeks. Take into account that corn prices have actually declined about \$1.00 over that same time frame and feeders look a little weak. Sideways rade overall.

Soybean prices turned both their short and long term trends down last week and the market continues to decline coming into this week. The market took out last weeks lows, but was able to see a little recovery into Monday's close. The grains have all seen a big hit and should be in position to bounce back a little, but overall with long term trends pointing down, traders will sell into strength.

Corn prices have spent the last month drifting lower each week and have not seen on limit down day along the way. Prices closed below critical long term support lev els around the \$7.86 level and have now turn their long term trends down. Most traders will be looking for a place to sell on rallies as we move forward. Most short term levels of resistance will lie between \$7.85-7.90 basis the December contract.

Wheat prices have remained inside a trading range for almost three months. Prices have been able to trade to the top end of this range and back down to the bottom, but have yet to breakout of one side or the other. Wheat prices have move higher and lower with the rest of the grain complex, but have little to no direction overall Sharply lower beans and corn may pressure wheat prices over the long haul.

Cotton prices also came under pressure late last week with little news to drive prices. Overall, this market has drifted off their Summer lows and stalled out around the \$77.30 level basis the December contract. Until this market can convincingly break above or below this sideways trading range, more sideways action is expected. There emains very little news to drive this market.

Plains was no longer a predator -- he was simply prey to the elements or to enemies.

The winter of 1874-75 was the last stand of the tribes on the southern Plains. Robbed of their finest horses, too dogged by the cavalry to even hunt, and finding fewer and fewer buffalo, the bands began to trek into Fort Sill, Okla., to settle into reservation life.


By February 1875, almost all the bands had surrendered due to hunger and the last band, led by Quanah himself, finally gave up in June.

Within five years, 3 million acres of the land that had once been the Comanche stronghold were fated to become the XIT Ranch. And within a decade, the settlement of "Bull Town" was in full operation just a few miles away from the old Comanchero Trail – it is now called Bovina.

The earliest reference to Farwell is 1894, and by the turn of the century, both were linked by railroad to Amarillo and families began to arrive to establish the towns and homesteads we know today.

All of that was made possible by the buffalo soldiers in a skirmish fought 138 years ago, and the red-letter date of that battle is Sept. 28.







Sept. 28: a day to remember

Sept. 28 should be a red-letter day America, especially for the Texas Panhandle.

It was on Sept. 28, 1874, that the last great Indian war party of the High **Plains** defanged in Palo Duro Canyon.

With the departure of Civil War, the Comanche attacks pushed the line stretched from Dallas to Laredo back by about 100 miles. The post-war advance of the American nation was stopped dead at that rough line by just 3,000 Comanche warriors.

Quanah, son of a captured white girl, Cynthia Ann Parker, and a warrior, Peta Nacona, created the first-ever major alliance of Plains tribes against the white intruders, uniting Comanche, Kiowa, Southern Cheyenne, and Arapaho warriors by the hundreds.

On June 27, 1874, they rode down on the camp of 28 buffalo hunters and one woman in Adobe Walls, northwest of today's Amarillo, the name given to the crumbling remains of a trading post.

The war parties with 30-caliber repeating rifles picked the wrong armed with Sharps .50-

caliber buffalo guns. Those breech loaders, designed to drop thick-coated buffalo, fired a bullet halfan-inch in diameter. In into the canyon without the face of a monster gun like that, the swarms of horsemen across the plains were the Comanches' 1,500 dropping like flies, horses were stampeded almost literally exploding as the huge bullets impacted them or their lowed, almost every horses before they could even get into range to shoot back with their light repeaters.

The tribes regrouped, about 15 city blocks

away from the buffalo hunters. Inside Adobe Walls, a young hunter named Billie Dixon squinted at the warriors in the distance and took a random shot with his Sharps. It killed a warrior astride his horse.

It seems a medicine man who had inspired the tribes earlier saying the white man's bullets could no longer kill them was mistaken.

The war bands began to split up and go home.

Back on their home turf, each war band unleashed bloodshed across five states. Graphic reporting of the terrors exploded across American armies for the the nation in hideous descriptions.

In that environment, of "civilized Texas" that the Army threw itself into the fight. In Texas, the buffalo soldiers (freed slaves, now cavalrymen) of the 4th Cavalry under the command of Col. Ranald Mackenzie, rode onto the Caprock in a strength never seen before. Tonkawa scouts led the cavalry in its pursuit of Quanah's war bands from water hole to water hole.

Comanche villages on the Plains, too isolated to fear attack, were not small circles huddled in defense. A village could range 15 to 20 miles down on the Comanchero Trail (now called Running Water Draw) and the 4th Cavalry troopers who surprised them were not taking prisoners. Women and children had a primary task in torturing captives and cavalrymen who had seen their handiwork felt Winchester and Henry no pangs in killing them,

Finally, the Tonkawa fight with buffalo hunters led the 4th to the lip of the Palo Duro Canyon, a major feature that the single-shot army had never known to exist. On the morning of Sept. 28, squads of Mackenzie's men slipped being detected and their sudden take a 21-7 lead. under thundering bursts of covering fire, away.


