



Mary Olea Macon Gibson, 95, of Farwell, passed away Sept. 11, 2012, at 6:47 a.m. cst.

She was born Aug. 2, 1917, in Leonard, Fannin County, Texas, the daughter of Thomas Franklin and Martha Ann Hornsby Macon. She graduated from Leonard High School in 1935 and attended business school in Houston, Texas. She was employed as a secretary but spent most of her life as a homemaker. She was a china painter, collector of antiques, loved music and chocolate candy.

On June 15, 1936, she married Charlies Walter Gibson in Lubbock, Texas. they resided in the Leonard, Brownfield, Dimmitt and Friona areas before retiring in 1990 in Littlefield. She was a lifetime member of the Church of Christ. After her health failed, she moved to Farwell to be close to family.

She was preceded in death by her husband in 1995, as well as 4 brothers, 4 sisters and her parents.

Survivors included sons Charles Gibson Jr. (Sue) of Bonham, and Anthony Macon Gibson, of Amarillo; daughter Anne (Gerald) Norton, of Farwell; 3 grandsons; 3 granddaughters; 5 greatgrandsons, and a great granddaughter.

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






Stock show dinner held










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Lynell Griffith Skarda

Lynell Griffith Skarda, 97, of Clovis, died Sept. 2, 2012, at home.

He was born on Aug. 28, 1915, in Clovis. He lived with his mother in Long Beach, Calif., during the school year and spent summers with his father, A.W. Skarda in Clovis, living at the Hotel Clovis where he worked as a bellhop. He graduated in 3 1/2 years from Long Beach Polytechnic High School in 1933, just before the Long Beach earthquake.

A champion swimmer, Lynell came close to going to Annapolis, but he lacked 20/20 vision. He went to the University of California at Berkeley, graduating a semester early with a bachelor's degree in chemistry. Wanting to take Chinese as an undergraduate, Lynell went to the Dean for permission and was told,

"Well, Skarda, if you take Chinese you won't be in the College of Chemistry."

After a brief stint at Standard Oil, Lynell went to Washington & Lee Law School in Lexington, Va., where he made the Law Review in 1940-41. Both of his brothers, the older - Langdon Lamar, and the younger - Cash Γaylor, also got law degrees from W&L. With what is now called a Doctor of Jurisprudence, Lynell clerked for Federal Judge Sam Bratton in Albuquerque and then established his own practice of law until World War II.

Enlisting like many men of his day, Lynell served the Army Air Corps as a Captain, earning a commendation ribbon in 1945-46 from the Military Affairs Division of the office of the Judge Advocate General in Washington, D.C. Court-martials were never easy, he recalled, but someone had to do them. He returned to Clovis in 1946 after his military service.

Early in his career, he served as District Attorney for the 9th Judicial District of New Mexico; he ran for and was defeated in a bid for the Supreme Court in 1952, a loss he came to appreciate as his legal practice expanded and as he assumed serious responsibilities as the lawyer for the Citizens Bank of Clovis, founded in 1916 as Farmers State Bank of Clovis; in 1920, his father became bank president. In 1954 he was admitted to the bar of the U.S. Supreme Court; he won his case, Moore v. Mead's Fine Bread Co. On his letterhead Lynell had printed, "Attorney and Counselor," for he was truly a valuable adviser to many, young and old, over his long years as a lawyer and banker. His office was always over the bank, a situation that is metaphoric.

For six years, Lynell served on the Civil Committee writing the Uniform Jury Instructions (UJI) for the New Mexico Supreme Court. He was secretary, always getting out the minutes immediately and efficiently, thanks to his excellent legal secretary Lucile Laughlin who worked many a Sunday after the Friday/ Saturday meetings in Albuquerque. He was honored for his Outstanding Service to the Judiciary by the Supreme Court in 1982.

In the early 1970s, Lynell took up flying, a hobby his

wife Kathryn Burns Skarda regarded as suicidal (she preferred him sculpting at home). His pilot's license was the first time he could specify "white" as the color of his hair. Flying himself back and forth to Albuquerque or Santa Fe in 21 CB (that's Charlie Bravo) expedited his work on the UJ I and other appeals necessitated by his flourishing legal practice. He was instrument rated in 1973. Flying didn't get in the way of his golf game; he looked always for the "secret" to the perfect swing, practicing it in the backyard, on the driving range, and on courses throughout the country.

He traveled a good bit in the 1980s, going first to Alaska (including Pt. Barrow and Prudhoe Bay), then down the Amazon River, to the Lesser Antilles, to Italy for a long sojourn, to Scandinavia on a maiden cruise, and on a 50th wedding anniversary cruise at Christmas in 1989 from Malta to Madeira to Northern Africa and Spain. Seeing the world literally expanded his horizons and committed him still more to being a citizen of the world. In 2000, he joined the Roman Catholic Church at Sacred Heart Parish in Clovis. His confirmation name was Thomas Aquinas. Immediately he researched and drafted two papers on the sex abuse cases that riddled New Mexico in the 1990s and the country some while thereafter. Nothing interesting eluded him, and he shared his knowledge with his pastor, archbishop, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, and even with Cardinal Ratzinger, then head of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith and now Pope Benedict XVI. "I'm old," he said. I can send letters and documents to whomever I wish." He took seriously the injunction to St. Francis "to rebuild the church," investing lavishly in the plant of the local parish. His last gift was new handmade doors, following on improvements to the church building, pews and carpet, and easy maintenance landscaping. From the archdiocese, he received the St. Francis of Assisi Award in 2010 for his far-sighted improvements and for starting what he deemed "something good."

In the anniversary video of the Clovis News Journal, Lynell is something of a star. He explains why Clovis is a good place to live and work -- good hospital and medical care, thriving economy, and expanding opportunities for education through the Clovis Community College.

Lynell is survived by a son Jeffrey J. Skarda, J.D., of Houston; a daughter Patricia L. Skarda, Ph.D., of Northampton, Mass.; 8 grandchildren: born to Jeff (Tom, Jennifer, and Loren), to the late Katrina Skarda Green of Colorado Springs, Colo., (Evan, Katlin, and Hannah), and to the late Gregory A.F. Skarda of Clovis (Eric and Erin); and 2 great-grandsons, Henry Nathaniel McCann IV, born to Jennifer and Gregory Ryder Skarda, bom to Eric.



The District Attorney's office handles Bailey and Parmer counties.


In other business, the commissioners:

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50 years ago, City of Farwell took over the waterworks

Folks tend to take their water systems for granted. Here's a look back 50 years ago this week for Texico-Farwell.

From the Aug. 31, 1962, Tribune:

The Farwell Waterworks Inc., one of the Twin Cities' most venerable institutions, transferred its assets to the City of Farwell.

The transaction took place at Security State Bank where R.W. Anderson voted 11 proxies that had been vested in him by owners and heirs of the firm. The only stockholders present were G.D. Anderson and Leroy Faville. All votes were affirmative to convey the facilities to municipal ownership.

Under terms of the transfer, the Waterworks will pay its current bills and whatever cash is left over will be distributed equally to shareholders or their heirs. This is expected to run about \$700 per shareholder. In any event, the city has guaranteed the stockholders that they will receive no less than \$500 for their interest in the company.

The waterworks as it stands today is the remnant of the effort begun in 1930 when the tanks, well, pump, lines and other property were transferred to a group of local citizens. Owner of the property at that time was the Capitol Land Co., which had invested considerable money in developing Farwell. Their efforts ended about that time and the water facilities were taken over locally.

Twenty citizens stepped forward with \$25 each to buy the system and water meters were ordered, installed and business was under way. A few years later, profits from the system paid off the meters and the \$500 was returned to the Haakma, Brianna Reyna, Halee Prather; 2nd row, Taylor Romans, Halle shareholders as it had been turned in.

Topsy. Improvements were paid out of operating profits. No dividend of any sort Askew. was ever paid to any of the shareholders (except to return the original investment).

Through the years two persons were on the Waterworks payroll, those being a water superintendent (now V.C. Venable) and a secretary (now R.S. Schumann).

In the mid-1950s, Texico decided it needed a system of its own and revenue bonds were voted to drill a well, put up a tank and get into the water business on a municipal basis. This was a period of debate and confusion, but after the dust settled, there were two systems left to serve the Twin Cities.

Operation of the Waterworks as a business was on a pretty informal basis and in recent years most of the decision-making fell to three local men (all original stockholders), W.W. Vinyard, H.Y. Overstreet and G.D. Anderson. These man professed that the Waterworks was nothing more than a nuisance to them, but the mechanics of dissolving the firm and getting its assets under municipal control were snarled.

Finally, all the original 20 incorporators (or their survivors) were located, contacted through correspondence and the Tuesday meeting was set up. It went smoothly. The transfer is effective Sept. 1.

One area where I feel there is a great weakness in Parmer County deals with the lack of folks hired to seek state and federal grants.

I've noted this in the past, to no avail. And we miss a golden opportunity because of it.

The fact is, in our time, using federal and state grants is the way to go. We just haven't figured that out yet.

A couple of years ago, I, and others, tried to get Parmer County the Commissioners to hire a part-time grant writer -and we struck out.

By hiring a person on a contingency basis, there is no cost to the government unit unless a grant is received.

All I can say is that there is a whole lot of state and federal monies out there ... and our government entities do little to seek it.

Very sad.

There has been one exception, though. Former Bovina City Manager Jana Pitcock did an outstanding job to seek grant monies -- and was highly successful.

For example, a hearing is scheduled next week to work toward Texas Capital Fund grant money for City of Bovina infrastructure improvements.

That is the type of grant application that Parmer County and all its cities should be making.

And last week, Lazbuddie School Supt. Martinez Joanna announced the school had received a \$49,000 Lending Technology **Program Grant.**

It will be used to buy 20 new laptops for studecline in school student scores.

In a nutshell, students are simply not learning as much as they did 50 years ago. One stat said it all: a high school graduate of 1947 had the equivalent training of a college graduate of 2010.

Anyway, millions of words have been written and talked about the problem. And scholars ask, "What is going on with our educational system?"

Well, I think the wrong question is being asked. What should be asked is, "What is going on with our families?"

You see, in my opinion, the problem does not lie with the educational system. The problem is within the family unit.





Live Cattle seemed to be running out of gas last week and again this week. They really need to push above their highs made back in May, but have made several attempts over the last few months and just can't seem to breakout. Cash trade was a miss last week with bids at \$124 and no seller's so the packer went home with no trade. A negative close today. Another down day would turn short term trends back down.

Feeder prices held up early this week, but not a very strong close with corn prices down over 16 cents. There are concerns surrounding the Live Cattle prices. Lower Live Cattle prices will not support higher feeder prices over the near term. A break below last weeks lows would turn trends back down. For now, the market seems to be in a holding pattern waiting for Live Cattle to pick the next direction.

Soybean prices moved down for their fifth day in a row, but are still holding some support around the \$16.90 area basis the November contract. Overall, long term trends are still holding up, but a break below support could lead to a much stronger move to the downside. South American planting is about to begin and analysts expect to see a significant increase over year ago levels.

Corn prices had turned up late last week and looked as though there would be a shot at higher prices coming into this week. The market failed today and closed at their lowest levels seen since late July. Aside from the USDA Crop Production report due out on Wednesday, the pressure is on. The USDA is expected to drop production by another 400,000 bushels, but the market is already expecting this to take place. Prices have been loosing steam over the last two weeks. These trends could be turning down?

Wheat prices closed basically neutral when compared to the last couple months of trading. The July KC Wheat 2013 came within three cents of the \$9.00 level and also made new contract highs. The market could not hold their early gains and ended the day closing near the low which makes the market look weak. Depending on the direction of the corn and beans, odds are good wheat will follow.

Cotton prices have once again slipped into a sideways trading range which has lasted about the last three weeks. Prices have 'drifted' off their lows, but with little enthusiasm compared to rallies seen in the last couple of years. Overall, there has been little news to drive the market in one direction or the other. Until something changes, odds are good that the market will remain in slow trade for a while.


This drive was assisted by key blocks from Ramiro Carmona, Justin Curtis and Castillo.

Kim McArthur and Dr. Mindy Neal officially opened their new building last week.








