Two 12-year-old Farwell youths were released to the custody of their parents following the vandalism of a rental apartment in Farwell owned by Mae Goldsmith, reports Parmer County Sheriff Charles

Heavy damage was reported as the two youths apparently took white latex paint and smeared it over the walls and furniture. Several light bulbs were broken and numerous tennis balls were strewn about the apartment.


Wichita Falls Tornado Destroys Home Of Former Residents

tool equipment and a paging system which would eliminate the need for calling volunteer firemen by sounding the siren.

Hutchins said the rescue equipment would cost around \$6800 and would probably only be used a few times each year. depending on the seriousness of an accident. He said that presently they can borrow the Clovis Fire Department's "Jaws of Life" rescue tool.

According to Hutchins, he and Texico officials have been talking of a joint purchase of the equipment by the two cities. However, the feasibility of such a plan is not known

Concerning the paging system, Hutchins said it would for one thing -- eliminate anauthorized persons from arriving on the scene of accidents and fires and hindering the local firemen in doing their jobs. He stated that the recent car-train wreck east of Farwell was particularly bothersome because countless people and cars blocked their way and delayed them from getting the ambulance on the road again.

The paging system would also be advantageous in that volunteer firemen who live ear the scene of the accident or fire would arrive on the scene earlier than if they have to go by the fire station first. Approximate cost of installing the system is \$5100.

Council members expressed more interest in the paging system than in the rescue tools; however, at this time

purchasing accident rescue could justify such expenses, but agreed to consider the items again at a later date.

The Council also reported that after surveying the streets of Farwell they have determined 20 streets which need to be seal coated. The areas in question are First Street, Avenues A-G; Second Street. Avenues A-F; one block from Second Street to Third Street on Avenue G; Avenue B, First through Seventh Streets; and Avenue F, Sixth through Ninth

Approximate cost of the paving is expected to be in the \$13,000 range, but bids will have to be advertised for before work can be authorized.

In other business the Council voted to reimburse the fire department \$288.75 for registration expenses for the seven firemen who recently attended the emergency medical technician course in Bovina.

The Congressman explained that in 1974 the U.S. was obtaining 40 percent of its oil from the OPEC nations and now that figure has risen to 50

"That is throwing our balance of trade out of kilter which leads to inflation and that is killing us," he said. "In 1978 our trade deficit was 34 billion dollars and it would have been higher still except for our agriculture exports."

"The decontrol of crude oil is essential," he continued. "It is better for us to pay our own oil

companies rather than the least we would keep our money in this country."

Hance said he will support a bill which seeks to cut both taxes and spending by 10 percent, but says he opposes another bill which would cut not cut spending.

"If we just cut taxes and not government spending we are going to get into more inflation and our balance of trade will be even worse than it is now,"
