Rohrbach's job took him around the world designing cotton gins

Parmer County Cotton Growers Gin Manager Craig Rohrbach never set foot off his family farm outside of Hereford until he was 5 years old.

The youngest of seven children, he was often left with his grandparents at the farm while the rest of the family traveled to town. Working on the farm while attending Adrian High School, he learned a lot about farming, but his parents, Ed and Arline Rohrbach, probably never dreamed where he would take this knowledge.

While most of his brothers and sisters college at attended Lubbock or Canvon. Craig set his sights on Texas A&M -- a good 10 hours away from home. He remembers his mother being more than a little worried about the distance.

"She was very nervous about me going there until we visited A&M. Once she saw how welcoming Bryan / College Station could be, she felt better about my deci-

At A&M, Craig soon found a home in the Ag **Engineering Department.**

"Once you got through the basics, you started building relationships and getting to know your professors and classmates," he said. "Texas A&M helped me realize what opportunities were out in the world for me."


Evidently this took root because Craig would spend the next 10 years traveling the world.

After college, he took a job with a large cotton company in California. His responsibilities included designing,troubleshooting and repairing over 24 gins in the state.

When that company was bought out by a bigger corporation, Craig accepted a job in Alabama for one of the world's largest manufacturers of cotton gin equipment. This move sent him on his worldy trip.

The farmer is paid a small amount of money U.S. educated and the for his cotton.

Since the gins are government entities, they assign people to work there. It was mostly political designations and the workers are not skilled or educated. All maintenance for the gin is contracted through outside organizations such as Craig's Alabama company.

Craig said, "Working in West Africa was very difficult. Gins were extremely isolated and the food and water was to the other countries: not really safe. We stayed in cinder block rooms, many times mosquitos so we didn't mind at all.

Live Cattle prices traded down last week with cash trade coming in around \$126. The nearby April contract actually moved down into a new for the week on Friday, but was able to see some recovery into the close. There seems to be fairly strong support around the \$125 level and this is also about a two-thirds retracement measured from the December low into the most recent high. A close below this level would project another test of the December low made around the \$121 level?

Feeder prices have their strongest level of support around the \$154.20 level basis the May contract. This is about a fifty percent retracement measured from the December low into the contract high. This level usually will attract some buying interest, but like the Live Cattle price, a close below this level could setup a test of the December low at some point. Otherwise, prices could trade back up and hold inside a range.

Soybean prices moved above their long term resistance level at the \$13.34 level basis the May contract. This opened the door to test their old high made back in September. Much of the strength in the grain may come from the USDA Planting Intention's report due out towards the end of this month. Planted bean acres are expected to come in substantially below year ago levels.


Corn prices have continued to ease up into major long term resistance which lies between the October/November highs and also the January high which has been tested on several occasions over the last few days. It would take a strong close above the \$6.85 level basis the May contract in order to turn and long term trends back higher, but a close above that level would also project a move above the \$7.00 area. Otherwise, prices have remained inside a sideways trading range for almost six months.

ing range for almost six months.

Wheat prices are also trading inside a long term sideways range which goes all the way back into last November. The \$7.00 level is basically in the middle of this range basis the July KC Wheat contract. Prices seem to find sellers above this level and buyers below. Until the rest of the grain complex begins to move, wheat seems content to just hang around current levels for now.

Cotton prices trade sideways for most of last week, but were able to rally back up into short resistance on Monday. The market seems to working back and forth inside a narrow channel which began back in January. The market made a strong attempt to break out above this channel just a couple of weeks ago, but failed to close strong enough to turn trends. For now, good support around \$87 basis the May contract.




