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
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## **How Do I Know** if I'm Addicted?





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#### 2012 Referendum on Increased Checkoff

Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB) will conduct a referendum on statewide increased checkoff amounts for corn and corn silage during our biennial election. Eligible voters will decide if an assessment of \$0.074 per ton of silage and \$0.01 per bushel of corn, which is produced and sold in Texas, would be collected and submitted to TCPB, effective June 1, 2012. (The current assessment rates have remained fixed since first being established, despite vast economic changes over the years).

Voting on the increased checkoff will be conducted in all Texas counties and held pursuant to the Texas Commodity Referendum Law, Texas Agriculture Code, Title 3, Chapter 41, Subchapter C, Section 41.

According to this law, a person is eligible to vote in the referendum if he or she is, or for at least one production period during the three years preceding the date of the referendum has been, a producer of, or caused to be produced, corn for commercial purposes. This includes owners of farms and their tenants or sharecroppers who would be required under the referendum to pay the assessment.

Producers from all five TCPB voting regions who meet the above requirements will be allowed to vote by mail. Ballots will be available January 9, 2012 at grain elevators and county agent offices statewide, or by writing TCPB at 4205 North I-27, Lubbock, TX 79403. Ballots must be postmarked no later than January

TCPB is certified under Section 41.011 and Section 41.021 of the Texas Commodity Referendum Law to conduct this referendum and has obtained all approvals and determinations required by law from the Commissioner of Agriculture, Texas Department of Agriculture.

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

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

In 1907, two years before Curry County was created, Texico then in Roosevelt County, was a rowdy town dominated by more or less a lawless element with frequent brawls, fights and knifings.

The honorable men in Texico met and made a plea to the sheriff of Roosevelt County and Portales, Joe Lang, to have Will Tipton, the Portales constable, relieved of his work there and appointed deputy sheriff at Texico. This is what Lang did.

Tipton found Texico to have a total of 20 businesses, 13 of which were saloons and gambling houses. But he came to restore law and order. He was 6 foot tall and weighed more than 200 lbs. and was just as tough as he was big.

Part of his strength can be attributed to the fact he was, by trade, a blacksmith.

For several months, he worked successfully at the taming of the would-be wild boys. He removed the pimps off the streets and put the girls and women out of the saloons and into the red light district. Respected and feared, Tipton met his hardships as they came. But he respected and feared no bad man.

On April 25, 1907, Bryon Parrish, a Portales constable, came into Texico armed. He had just returned from Melrose after a fruitless search for a horse thief. There are several versions of what took place.

One is that Tipton met Parrish on the streets of Texico and demanded that Parrish put up his gun (one person said a feud existed between the two). Following some abusive language, the two met went into the White House Saloon and Tipton demanded that Parrish pass his gun up to be delivered to the bartender.

One report told that Parrish was jealous of Tipton's popularity in Texico and had come to town looking for trouble.

Tipton was in his legal rights as town marshal, or in this case a deputy sheriff, to lawfully carry a gun only in the town where he was employed. This feature of the law was rarely invoked because it was considered a matter of courtesy for a visiting officer from an outside bailwick to carry his weapon when he was visiting another town.

But the bad blood that apparently existed between these two men doubtless caused Tipton to make the demand that Parrish turn over his 6 shooter in while in Texico.

One authority said Parrish was swinging his guns carelessly, then dropped them back into their holsters with belligerence. Tipton said, "You just give your guns to Jake Wells, the bartender."

Parrish drew his gun and apparently made a motion to lay it on the bar but just before the gun touched the bar he made a swing with it and struck Tipton across the forehead.

Tipton then grabbed Parrish and the two men grappled. Before anything could be done, the bartender reached across the bar and wrenched Parrish' gun away from him.

The two men continued to grapple and Tipton's gun was drawn. There are two reports how the gun was drawn, one being Tipton drew the gun and fired,

## Farwell school concerned about flu spreading

Dear Parent,

As you may know, flu can easily be spread from person to person. Therefore, we are taking steps to reduce the spread of flu at Farwell ISD. We want to keep the school open to students and functioning in a normal manner during this flu season. But we need your help to do this.

We work closely with the Texas Education Agency and the Texas Department of State Health Services to monitor flu conditions and take the necessary steps to help combat this problem. Please check our website out at www.farwellschools.org as we will keep you updated if a flu outbreak occurs in our schools.

If the flu becomes more severe, we may take additional steps to prevent the spread such as:

-- conduct active fever and flu symptom screening of students and staff as they arrive at school.

-- make changes to increase the space between people such as moving desks farther apart and postponing class.

-- dismissing students for at least 5 days if they become sick.

Here are a few things you can do to help:

Teach your children to wash their hands often with soap and water or an alcohol based hand rub. You can set a good example by doing this yourself.

Teach your children not to share personal items like drinks, food or unwashed utensils, and to cover their coughs and sneezes with tissues.

Know the signs and symptoms of the flu. Symptoms include fever (100 degrees Fahrenheit or


