'Most people never think of breast cancer as a young person's disease' Shauna Mahaney triumphs over cancer

Shauna Mahaney, of Farwell, knows personally that breast cancer affects more than just older women.

It can affect anyone, young and old, male and female. Even though she is in her early 30's, she has beaten breast cancer twice.

The first time it happened was when she was 27. She was going through a routine screening process for another type of cancer when breast cancer was detected.

Her first thought was "I'm too young to have breast cancer."

Going to the doctor's offices for appointments, she said "Everyone around me was much older and people would ask me if I was there waiting on my mother."

It made her realize most people never think of breast cancer as a young person's disease.

It's vital to catch this type of cancer early. She credits her success in beating the disease with that fact.

For both her bouts with cancer, Shauna needed only a needle biopsy procedure and oral chemotherapy to treat it. Her treatment was minimally invasive compared to some other manners of dealing it.

Many people who don't find out about their cancer until the later stages generally must endure major surgeries and ultimately breast removal, or mastectomy. Thus, she encourages everyone to get regular mammograms.

Texas ranked 2nd in the U.S. for deaths due to breast cancer in 2010. Shauna notes that most people don't realize insurance pays for mammograms and doctor visits. Her advice is "just go."

For the past three years, Shauna has participated in the Parmer County Relay for Life to raise awareness about breast cancer.

And during her battles with cancer, folks at her church, Hamlin United Methodist, came to her aid. "They brought food and helped with the kids, prayed for me, and just offered support."

Other major support was offered by her in-laws, Robin and Lynne Mahaney. Shauna said she could not have sur-

vived without their help, especially since her husband, Justin, works for the railroad and was often away.

"Moms are always supposed to keep going, even when they don't feel well," Shauna comments. "My in-laws were great about helping the kids deal with my cancer when I was sick."

One thing Shauna found interesting about her cancer was how her children -- Parker, a 4th grader, and Katie, a 2nd grader, were affected. Even though they did not understand everything about the disease, they dealt with it in their own ways.

Parker researched the disease, and even agreed to wear pink in honor of his mom to the "Pink Out" football game. For his little league football games, he was about to protest the tape on his cleats until he realized that they were being taped pink in honor of breast cancer awareness month.

Parker wore a pink breast cancer bracelet for a long time after her first bout with cancer, as a connection with his mom.

Shauna said her grandmother, her mother, and now she have all had breast cancer. Whether breast cancer is hereditary has not been absolutely proven, but with such a family history, Katie will certainly watch for it early.

"Most doctors recommend that the first mammogram should be scheduled when a girl

turns 18 if the family has a history of cancer," shares Shauna.

Needless to say, Shauna has spent countless hours researching her disease.

"Since cancer affects the entire family, it would just be nice to have someone to talk with that has experienced similar things," says Shauna, emphasizing the need for cancer support groups.

Shauna also thanked Melinda Burney at the Farwell clinic for helping her deal with medical problems.

Since chemotherapy weakens the immune system, there were always little issues to worry about. Even sniffles can be dangerous, so she appreciated Mrs. Burney for helping her keep on top of her symptoms.

Here are some things Shauna shares about breast cancer:

-- Breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in women.

-- Only half of women age 40 or over get mammograms and the statistics for those under 40 are worse.

-- About every 3 hours, a Texas woman dies from breast cancer.

-- Breast cancer is best treated if detected early. See a doctor.

-- Most insurance will cover mammograms. Sometimes there is grant money available through clinics to cover it. Ask your doctor.

-- Women of any age can get breast cancer. Get mammogram to detect early stages of cancer.

A sack by Morris, a stop by Ledbetter and penalties forced Sudan to punt from deep in their own territory with the Steers getting excellent field position.

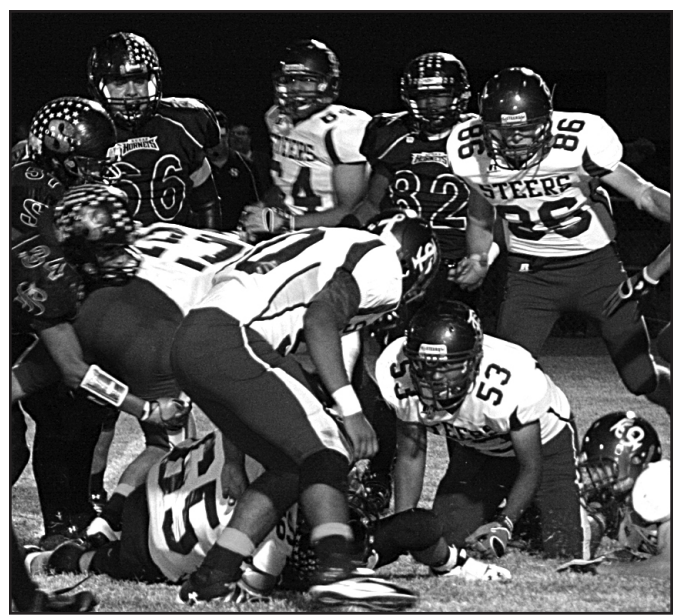
Christian had a good run behind a Ledbetter block to the Sudan 6. Morris gained 5, then Christian snuck over for the TD and a 12-0 lead.

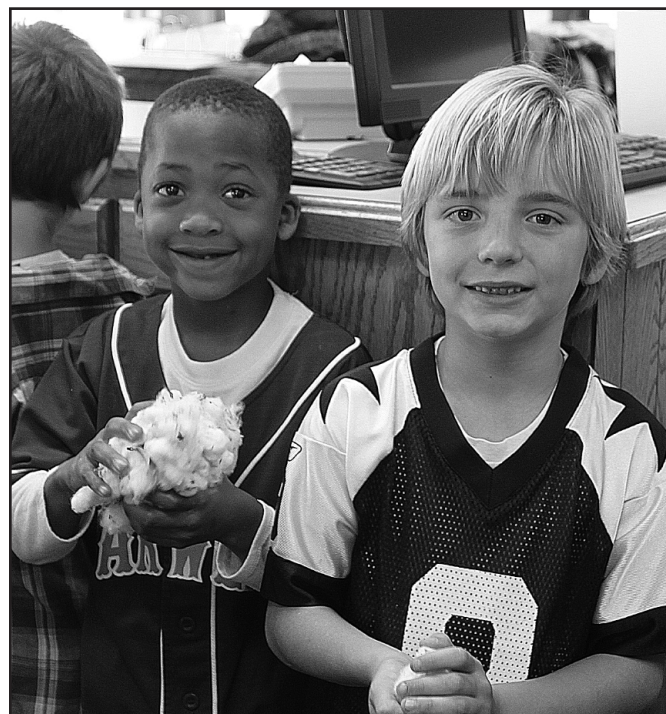

Local resources available for cancer patients

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month and the State Line Tribune would like to help area women obtain information about breast cancer and available resources.

One local resource is the Parmer County Cancer Coalition.

Another resource for local women are the Farwell Clinics. They offer women's exams that include pap smears and breast exams. The Clinics can also assist with many medications and references to cancer specialists in other hospitals.

Also, for women who may not have insurance or who are underinsured, a program called ABC4WT (Access to Breast Care for West Texas) provides free mammograms.

The Laura W. Bush Institute for Women's Health received a \$1.67 million grant to launch the program. It provides breast cancer screenings and preventative care to underserved populations throughout the Panhandle.

To be eligible you must be a Texas resident; have a photo ID, and verify your income -- you must be uninsured or underinsured. Citizenship is not considered.

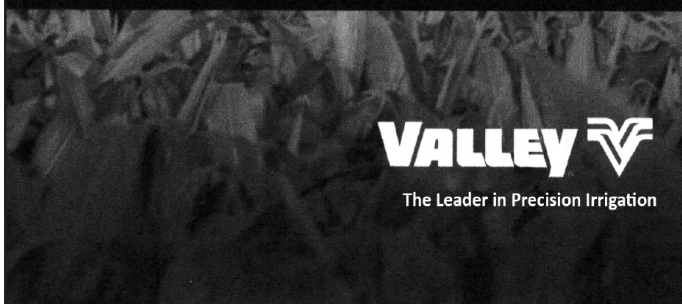



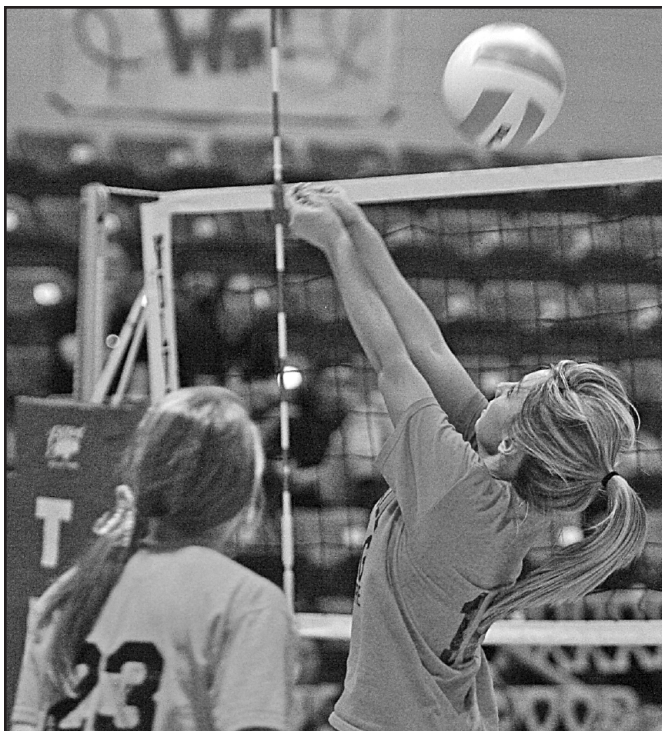

The youth of St. John Lutheran Church of Lariat are selling fragrant live Christmas wreaths and centerpieces for the next two weeks.

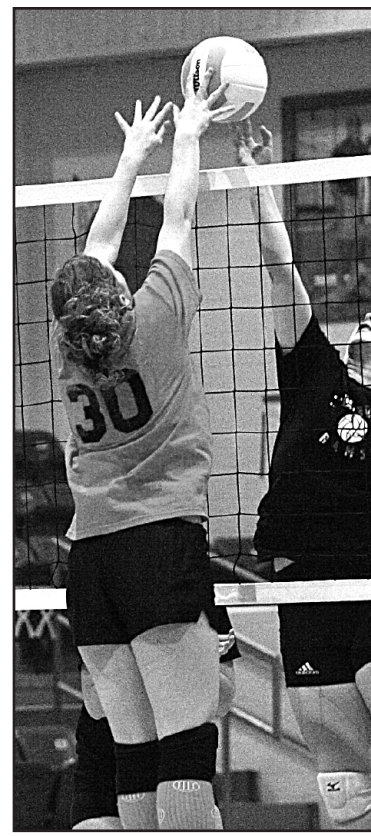
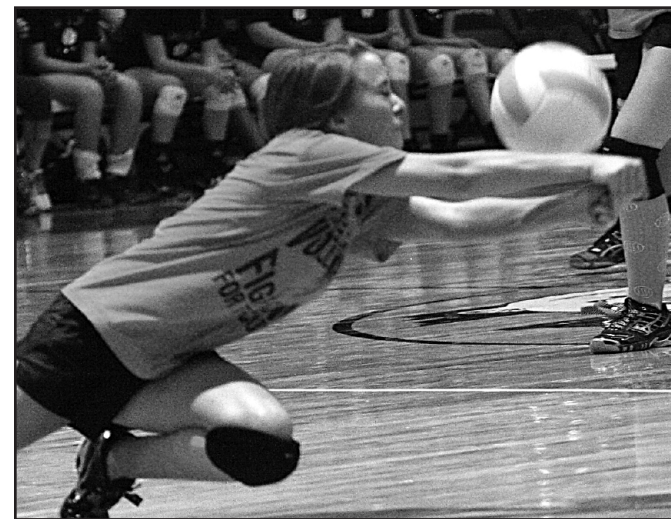

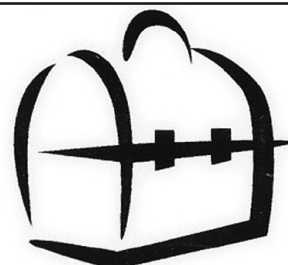

How Do I Know if I'm Addicted?

The first time you take a drug, you choose to take it. The second time might not be a choice any more.

There are many different signs that point to drug addiction. The most obvious is a need to have a particular drug or substance. Changes in mood, weight, or interests are other signs of drug addiction.

If you think you - or a friend - may be addicted to prescription drugs, talk to your doctor, school counselor, or nurse. They can help you get the help you need. It's especially important for someone who is going through withdrawal from a depressant to speak with a doctor or seek medical treatment. Withdrawal can be dangerous when it's not monitored.

If a person has become addicted to prescription drugs, there are several kinds of treatment.

Behavioral treatments teach people how to function without drugs - handling cravings, avoiding drugs and situations that could lead to drug use, and preventing and handling relapses. Wolverines beat Santa Rosa in Battle of Titans

It was a battle of the titans at the Field of Hopes and Dreams last Friday in Texico.

Two of the state's top 3 Class 2A teams went at it, and the Wolverines beat the defending state champion Santa Rosa Lions, 21-20.

Texico is now 6-1 overall and 1-0 in district. Santa Rosa is 5-2 and 0-1.

After an early scoring drive by the Lions, the Wolverines answered with a drive behind strong runs by Donovan Johnson and Shay Harrison, and key blocks by Uriel Munoz, Elliott Pelfrey and Jesus Rivera. A 2-yard TD run by Johnson and the extra point kick by Sergio Posada tied it at 7-all.

It only took Santa Rosa two plays to score a TD, with the kick making it 14-7.

Texico got the ball back and moved downfield behind solid runs by Posada, Rivera and Harrison. As the 2nd quarter began the drive continued, thanks to a great block by Zac Madrid. But the drive ended with a fumble near the Lions goal line.

The Lions drove to midfield but were held on a 4th down play. Good plays were made by D.J. Griego, Brandon King, River and Harrison.

Texico was held. Then it looked like Santa Rosa might score again except for a great play by Alan Valles, knocking the ball out of the running back's grip. Adrian Gomez caught the fumble in mid-

Texico was held again and Harrison came through with a big punt. King made a strong defensive play and the half ended.

Both teams' defenses stood tall and each team was held to a 3 and out to start the 3rd quarter. Johnson had a good punt return to the Santa Rosa 40. Good runs by Harrison, Rivera and Johnson were aided by blocks by Madrid Pelfrey and Griego.

On 4th and 2 at the Lions 10, the Wolverines surprised Santa Rosa with a pass -- complete from Rallin Harris to Gomez for a TD. The Posada kick tied the game at 14-all with 3:27 left.

The final period started with a Santa Rosa 40-yard TD run, but the hold on the extra kick miscued and it was 20-14 with 11 minutes left in the game.

Texico then played ground control, chewing up 7 minutes off the clock, mainly thanks to runs by Harrison and Johnson with good offensive line blocking.

After a huge 25-yard gallop by Harrison, the drive was capped by a Harrison TD. Posada's kick gave Texico the lead with 4:25 left.

On defense, King had a sack for a loss. Then the Lions' 4th down play was halted by a second

sack, courtesy of Griego and Rivera.

The Lions had to use their timeouts during the Texico series, and got the ball back with only 27 ticks on the clock. King had a near sack and Griego recorded the game-ending tackle.

Also worth noting during the game was great kickoff coverage by Justin Lopez, Elesio Arinavez and Justin Rucker.

Johnson rushed for 121 yards and Harrison 102.

2012 Referendum on Increased Checkoff

Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB) will conduct a referendum on statewide increased checkoff amounts for corn and corn silage during our biennial election. Eligible voters will decide if an assessment of \$0.074 per ton of silage and \$0.01 per bushel of corn, which is produced and sold in Texas, would be collected and submitted to TCPB, effective June 1, 2012. (The current assessment rates have remained fixed since first being established, despite vast economic changes over the years).

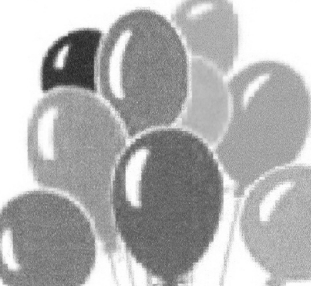
Voting on the increased checkoff will be conducted in all Texas counties and held pursuant to the Texas Commodity Referendum Law, Texas Agriculture Code, Title 3, Chapter 41, Subchapter C, Section 41.

According to this law, a person is eligible to vote in the referendum if he or she is, or for at least one production period during the three years preceding the date of the referendum has been, a producer of, or caused to be produced, corn for commercial purposes. This includes owners of farms and their tenants or sharecroppers who would be required under the referendum to pay the assessment.

Producers from all five TCPB voting regions who meet the above requirements will be allowed to vote by mail. Ballots will be available January 9, 2012 at grain elevators and county agent offices statewide, or by writing TCPB at 4205 North I-27, Lubbock, TX 79403. Ballots must be postmarked no later than January 23, 2012 to be counted.

TCPB is certified under Section 41.011 and Section 41.021 of the Texas Commodity Referendum Law to conduct this referendum and has obtained all approvals and determinations required by law from the Commissioner of Agriculture, Texas Department of Agriculture.

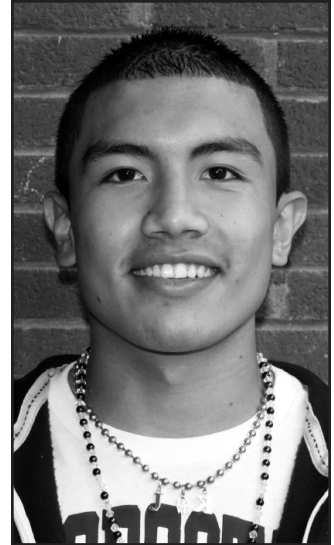

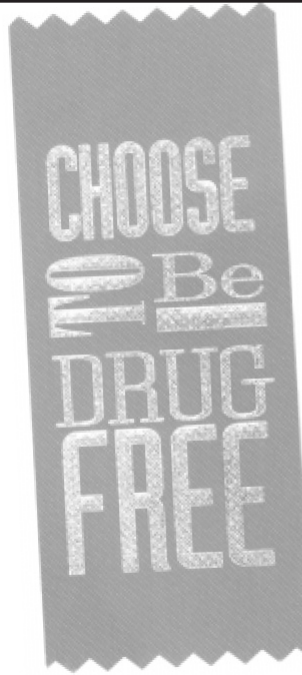
