Texico's Top Athletes

Cheryl Scott and Earl Bibbs were named Texico's best All-Around athletes Saturday, May 14, at the Wolverine Booster Club's annual athletic banquet honoring varsity and junior varsity athletes.

Karen Snodgrass and Lynn Tubbs were presented the Sportsmanship Awards. According to Coach Roy King, to be eligible for the sportsmanship award, the athletes must compete in three sports, have a good attitude, and "put everything they've got into the team and their effort."

The all-around athletes must letter in three sports, and Cheryl, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Keith Scott, qualified in basketball, volleyball, and track.

In basketball she was named honorable mention on the All-State team the past season, and was on the All-Tournament teams at the EPAC and Floyd tournaments. The sophomore was also named to the 6A All-District volleyball team. She qualified for state competition in the discus and shot put events and emerged with a 2nd place in the discus and 7th place in shot put at the state track meet.

Earl, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Travis Bibbs, accomplished most of his athletic achievements in football where he was

named the Class A Back of the Year for the 1982 season, making the All-State first team as an offensive back, and the second team as a defensive back. Earl also qualified for the state track meet in the long jump.

We can read about the past, we can dream about the future, but we must live in the present. Therefore, our actions should be based to a large extent on things as they prevail, right now. Somehow, we have the uneasy feeling that so many of our national and world leaders are living in the past and not even thinking about the future.

We cannot explain how Yasser Arafat can think war, let alone talk war with Israel. It was only yesterday that he got his fannie whipped to a fraz and the PLO soundly defeated. It looks as if today's prudent action would be to lick his wounds and wait for better times in the years ahead.

We cannot explain how certain union chiefs can talk of wage raises when it was only yesterday that their company was on the edge of bankruptcy and there would be no jobs at all. It looks as if today's prudent action would be to allow the company to gain some measure of economic strength before trying to suck it dry again.

We cannot explain how certain politicians can continually vote for the same economic policies that produced 20 percent inflation and 25 percent interest rates. It looks as if today's prudent action would be to cut the budget, hold the line on taxes, hang on to the present wage scales, and wait for the country to also gain some economic strength before returning to the tired old liberal policies of the past.

A good question might be: Have we really reached a time in the world and our country when there are no "statesmen," only greedy people and politicians?

So you think it has been cool? Well, it has been, but is it all that unusual? No, not really.

One of the advantages of running a newspaper is the access to files that reflect all sorts of things, including the weather last year and the year before that, and the year, etc., etc. By going and looking at the news and columns about this time in the years ago, we can only conclude that the weather is acting pretty normal for this time of the year.

It seems that at this time we all are striving mightily to have the good old summer time arrive early, and any deviation from our desires is looked upon as abnormal. In a month from now we could be in the middle of our hottest time of the year. It often is, and we have often commented on that fact. This is again part of our human tendencies to view things not as they are but only as we want them.

Politicians will be politicians, or there's where the money goes. The Texas higher educational system now includes 34 public senior colleges, eight medical facilities, and four technical institute campuses. Plus, the state provides a large portion of the financial support for 47 public junior colleges.

Yet, in various stages of the legislative process are proposals to: change a two-year upper-division to a four-year school; establish a new university system administration component; create a new School of Podiatry; provide almost total state financing of a deaf institute; and authorize a new technical institute.

These additional expenditures are contemplated in spite of the fact that enrollment growth in public senior schools will likely be less than one percent per year to the end of this decade.

We have no statesmen, only politicians.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J.P. Armstrong, a brother, C.J., and one grandchild.

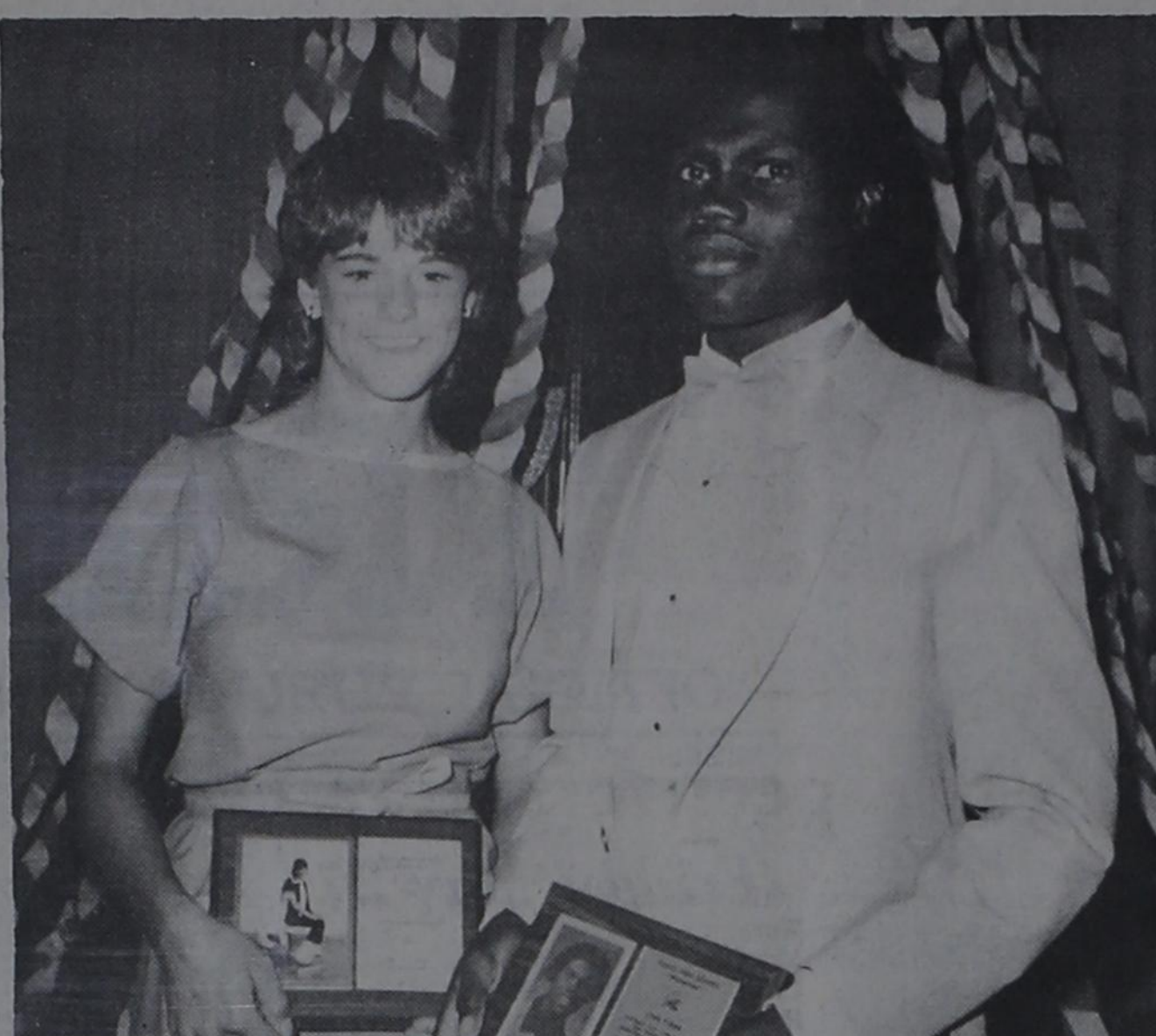
Services Held For Mrs. Roy Melugin

The father created what he calls the Kiddycheck system. A child deposits his allowance with his banker (mom or dad), and when he needs cash, he writes a check which his parents redeem.

The 7-year-old and his 6-year-old brother deposit their

\$4 and \$2 allowances each Friday. They cash checks to buy staples such as candy or comic books.

"These children balance their checkbook," Mrs. Martin said. "Overdrafts have occurred, but that is what the learning process is all about."

Pleased that Kiddychecks have been successful with his own children, the father, Matt Beha, is selling a system to other parents, Mrs. Martin said. A kit which includes a checkbook, a record-keeping ledger and an instruction sheet, sells for \$3. It can be ordered from Kiddycheck Company, Department MM, P.O. Box 25044, Lansing, Mich. 4890

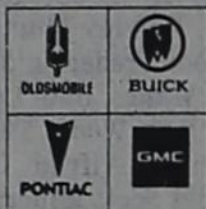

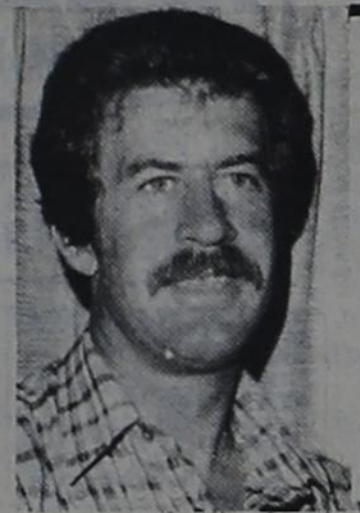
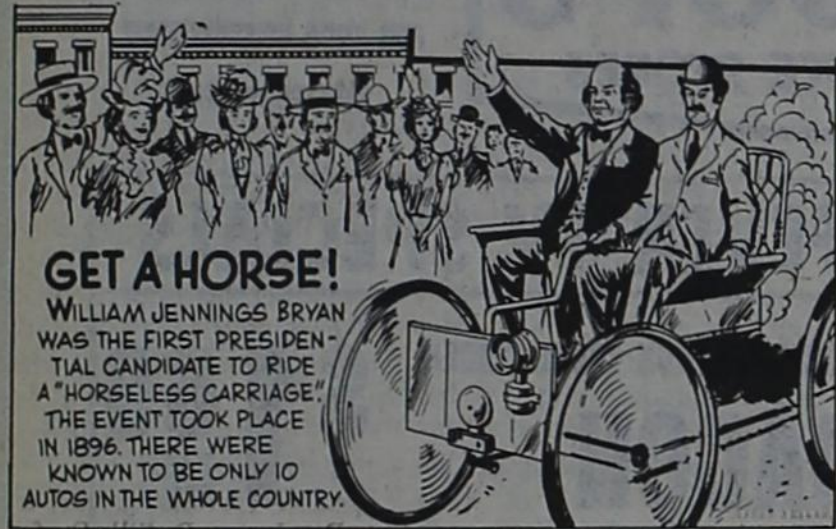

Extension Service Explains Home Canning Safety Changes

COLLEGE STATION—The United States Department of Agriculture this week released new processing recommendations for tomatoes and tomato juice, applesauce, fruit purees, and pumpkin.

To prevent food-borne illness and the loss of valuable home canned foods, specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are urging home canners to follow the new USDA guidelines.

The USDA now recommends the following:

- *The hot pack processing time for canning tomatoes should be increased to 35 minutes for pint jars and No. 2 cans, and to 45 minutes for quart jars and No. 2½ cans.
- *The hot pack processing time for canning tomato juice should be increased to 35 minutes for pint and quart jars, and for No. 2 and No. 2½ cans.
- *Strained (pureed) pumpkin and winter squash should not be canned at home. Instead, cubed pumpkin and squash may be canned using a processing time of 55 minutes for pint jars and 90 minutes for quart jars.

According to Marilyn Haggard, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Extension Service, the changes in canning recommendations are based on research conducted at land-grant universities and Research Center of the USDA.

"The recommendation to more than triple hot-pack processing times for tomatoes was based on research which indicated that shorter times could be insufficient under certain conditions," says Haggard. Insufficient processing could allow botulism organisms to survive the heat treatment, grow and produce harmful toxins, she explained.

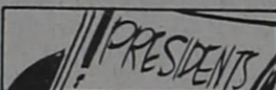

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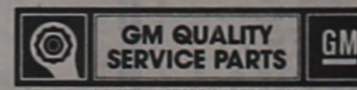

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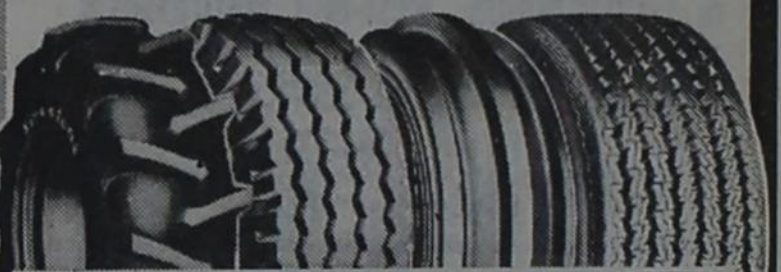

Land Bank Reduces Variable Rate Loans

Interest rates on Land Bank variable rate loans will be reduced to 11 percent on farm loans and to 11.50 percent on rural residence and farm-related business loans effective May 1, 1983, said Bill Liles, president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe.

In addition, the Land Bank has reduced its Bank closed loan fees to 1 percent on farm loans and to 2 percent on rural residence and farm-related business loans, according to Thomas H. Benson, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas. These reduced fees are effective April 25, 1983.

"The adjustments follow reductions made earlier this

year," Benson said. On January 1, 1983, the Bank's interest rate on farm related loans was lowered to 11.25 percent. The interest rate for rural residence and farm-related business loans was lowered to 11.75 percent. Bank closed loan fees subsequently were reduced in February from 4 to 2 percent on farm loans and from 7 to 4 percent on rural residence and farm-related business loans. The fee reduction was made possible, Benson said, by the decrease in the Bank's cost of funds.

The Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe makes long-term real estate loans in the counties of Bailey and Parmer.

Memorial Day Drivers Urged To Use Caution

Memorial Day signals the end of school and the beginning of summer vacations. There will be an increase in the number of vehicles on our streets and highways, according to Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Cawthon stated, "Countless lives would be saved if drivers would not disregard their own safety and the safety of others. Speeding, drinking drivers, and carelessness will account for the greatest percentage of deaths this Memorial Day weekend."

DPS records show that 58 persons died in traffic accidents on Texas streets and

highways during the Memorial Day weekend last year, and the DPS Commander pointed out that, "one drinking driver or speeding motorist has destroyed an entire family."

Cawthon said, "Holiday or vacation trips should be planned and a rest stop should be made every two hours to allow drivers and passengers a chance to get out and stretch to help eliminate stress and fatigue."

Major Cawthon added, "Drivers who think ahead, stay alert, wear their seat belt, avoid the use of alcohol while driving, and obey speed limits can have a safe trip and a great vacation."

THE FATHER OF BELIEVERS

"Abraham believed God, and it was counted unto him for righteousness" (Rom. 4:3).

Has it ever occurred to you that the most loved, the most honored, the most respected person of history is--not Christ, but Abraham, Christ ought to be, but Abraham is. Besides the millions of professing Christians, there are untold other millions of Jews and Mohammedans who speak with reverence of "our father Abraham."

Clearly this is why God used this man to show us how to be saved and justified before a holy God. As Paul is God's great example of grace, so Abraham is God's great example of faith--saving faith.

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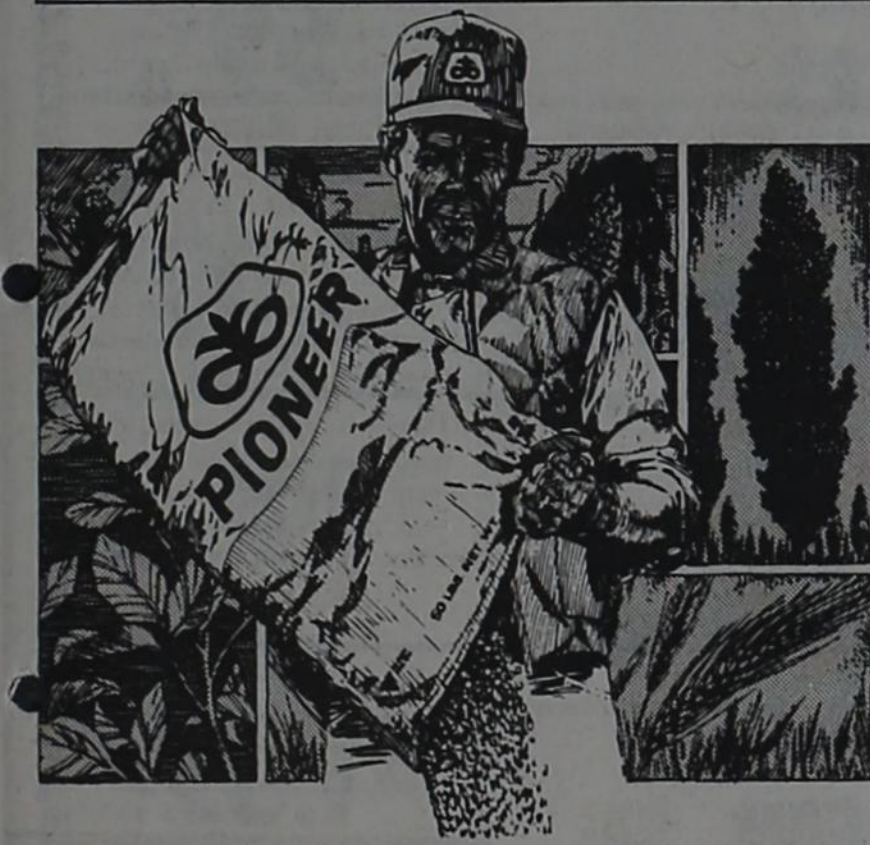
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Wolverine Booster Officers
