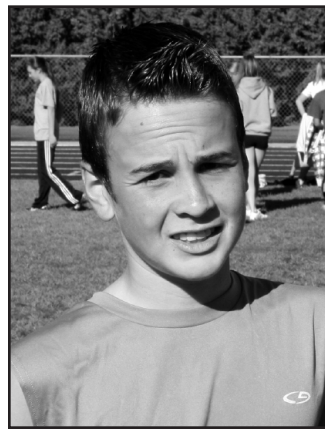

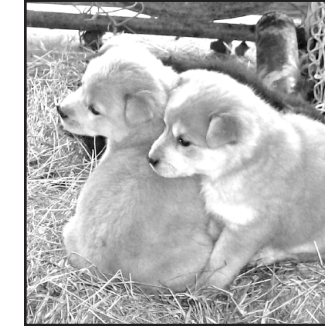

Farwell Schools will close at noon on Friday for parent-teacher conferences, and will also be closed on April 22 as a 'snow day'.

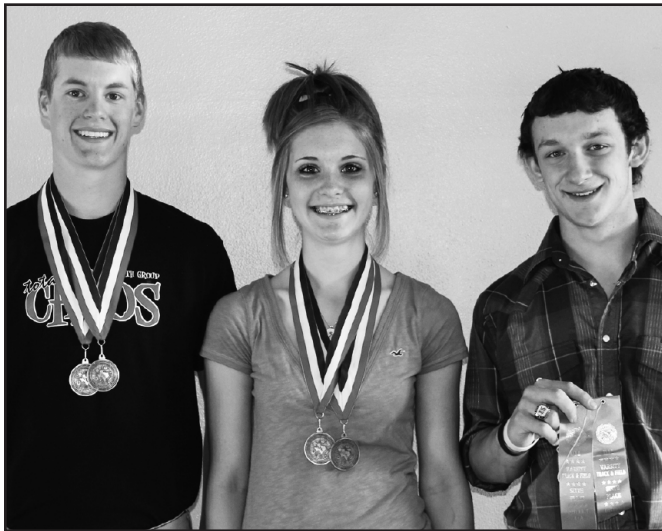
The seniors at the Farwell Senior Meal Site are making the desserts for the Farwell Chamber Banquet on Saturday as a donation.

Texas Department of Health will be in Farwell on *April 19*.

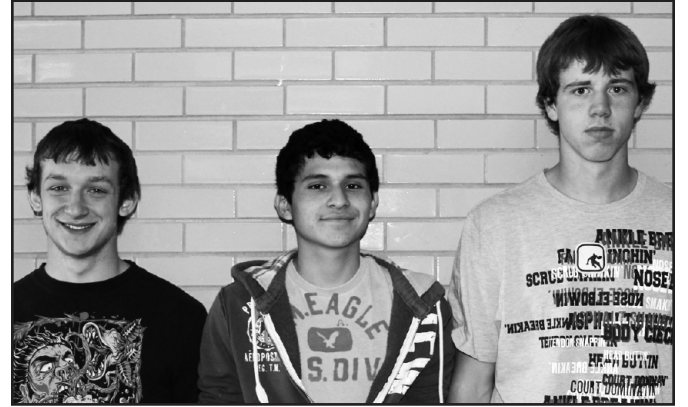
The Texas Department of Health comes to Farwell to give immunizations to everyone who needs them. Persons of any age are eligible. There is no charge; the shots are free.

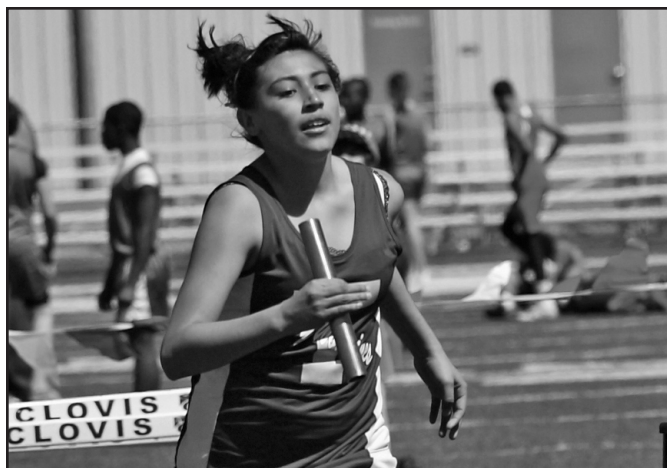
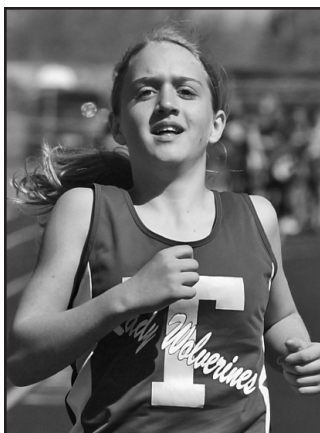

Neugebauer seeks local viewpoints

U.S. Cong. Randy Neugebauer's mobile office, headed by Mary Whistler and Brice Foster, were in Farwell on April 5.

"In the election results last November, the American people sent a message to Congress that they are anxious about the growth of the national debt," Foster said. "Every place we go as staffers, some people say we should compromise on that issue."

"However, a lot of peo-

ple are telling us just the opposite. Cut the spending, whatever it takes, including the shutdown of the federal government. It's going to be a tough issue."

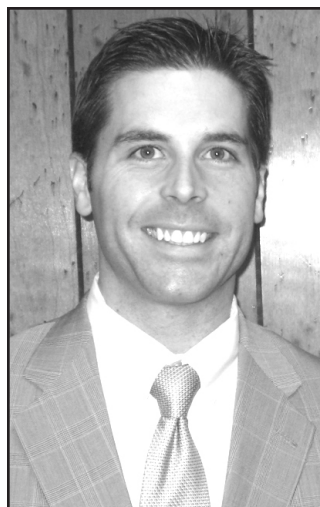
Foster said the House budget bill, HR1, received over 100 hours of debate from both sides of the aisle. "It was sent to the Senate with more than \$63 billion in cuts, which the other party choked at."

"But at least they had a chance to oppose it on

the floor. At least they had the chance to offer their own amendments. That's the way democracy is supposed to work and the new House leadership will ensure it does."

Whistler and Foster said Texans' views on these issues directly go back to Neugebauer to keep him abreast of his constituents' concerns and opinions.

Foster, a Lazbuddie High grad, was happy to visit with Logan Nichols,

Roch discusses legislative issues

Dennis Roch, Curry County's representative to the state legislature, returned to Texico following the completion of this session, noting that new winds are blowing in the state's politics.

"The legislators who always want to raise taxes knew that any bills like that would be dead on arrival on the new governor's desk," he said. "That changes everything because in this session they were not going to commit their efforts to something they knew was pointless. That gave us a lot of time to work on more important issues."

"You could see the new dynamic in the make-up of the House membership, too," Roch continued.

"For instance, the state's permanent fund is designed to provide funds from the interest it yields and to never touch the principle."

"This session, however, the spenders tried to eat into the principle and we defeated that with a 35-35 tie vote," he said, noting that in this session, very many bills were either won or lost by only one vote.

Roch again submitted his proposal for the State Sovereignty Act. This legislation, already enacted in many other states, re-affirms the authority of the 10th

Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which states that all powers it does not specifically cede to the federal government and does not forbid to the states and the people shall in all cases default to the states and the people.

The purpose of this bill is to empower local communities and state governments and to turn back the increasing encroachment of Washington, D.C., on the American people.

In last year's session, this bill was "pigeon-holed" to four separate committees, the political chicanery that a Speaker of the House can use to consign a bill to the oblivion of parliamentary deliberations that ensure it can never to come to the floor for a vote.

After that rebuff, Roch continued to campaign across the state for this measure and he re-sub-

mitted it in this session as House Joint Resolution (HJR) 10. His efforts gleaned some progress as the bill this time was assigned to only two committees but one of them, the Judiciary Committee, still contrived to table it so it could not get its floor vote.

"I won't give up," Roch

said. "The people of New Mexico deserve greater freedom from Washington, D.C., and this bill for that purpose deserves a vote, up or down, by their elected representatives."

In the next session of the legislature, Roch assures his constituents that he will submit the bill again.

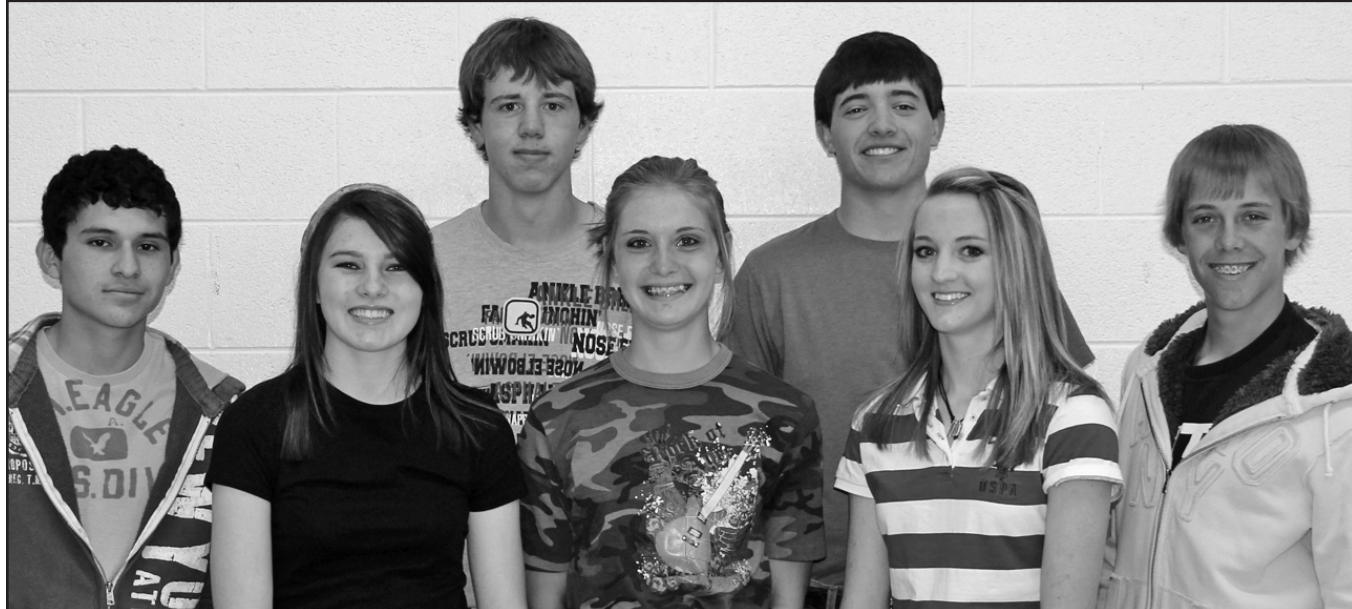

I'm sure you have seen the shiny new signs you paid to have placed around the Farwell schools -- "The use of a wireless communication device is prohibited in the school zone."

That makes me think of another quote which suggests that the ultimate answer to kings, or small town governments for that matter, is a belly laugh. Those in government, at every level, give me opportunities to laugh at their absurdity on a daily basis.

Obviously the sign doesn't really mean what it says. I assume what it is trying to wirelessly communicate to those who read it is that the use, by drivers, of cell phones and other things of that sort is prohibited

while passing through the school zone.

Maybe it is also intended to be interpreted as prohibiting the students from using cell phones in the school zone before, during, and after school, as well.

But that is not what the sign says.

If the sign were taken literally, it would mean books, blackboards (or their modern equivalent), and the human voice are now prohibited in the school zone, including in the classroom. That would effectively shut down the schools.

While I agree with that

course of action, I seriously doubt that was the intent.

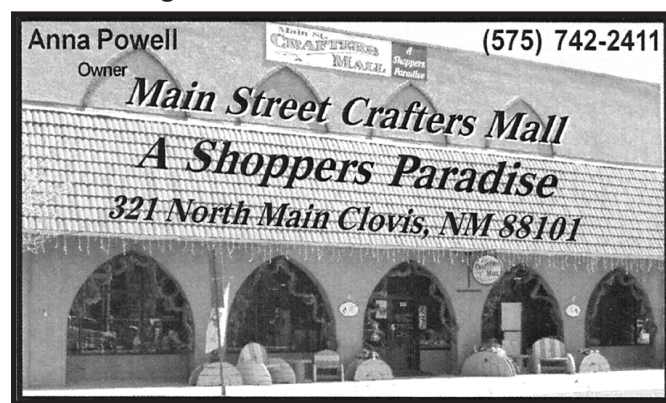
If the signs were taken literally, it would mean that those of us who live in the school zone would be prohibited from using any wireless communication device in our homes. I think any attempt to enforce that one might be unpopular with more than just the rare libertarian.

The sign is a humorous reminder of the reactionary nature of would-be rulers. It is an attempt to hold back the tsunami of technology with a sign backed up by a law. That

hasn't ever worked in the past, and I doubt this will be the first time it will succeed.

Responsibility, by drivers and pedestrians alike, is the only thing that will work, and that can't be legislated. Yes, the best reaction to any government is a good belly laugh.

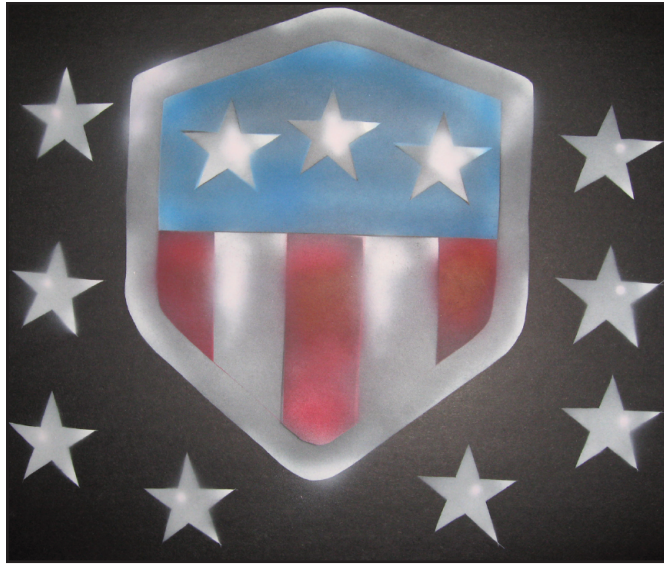

Fighting the good fight

As the Tribune reported, U.S. Cong. Randy Neugebauer sent two of his staffers to Farwell on April 4 to listen to county constituents' views.

Those staffers reported back to him and two days later he phoned his answers to the Tribune himself, taking a few minutes to break away from the floor of the House of Representatives and calling from a phone in the foyer.

Apologizing for having only a few minutes to speak, he sketched the activity in Congress these days with both chambers trying to pass a budget for the 2011 fiscal year (7 months late).

"Nancy Pelosi and Harry Reid had control of both chambers last year when the 2011 budget should have been passed but they never

got it up for a vote. For political reasons, they just didn't want to put a budget before the people that had a \$1.6 trillion deficit," he said.

The debate and vote on that budget, if it would have happened, would have come immediately prior to the 2010 election.

"After the House changed hands in the 2010 election, we are trying now to change things," he continued. "Big government has been the problem, not the solution. We got to the point that for every dollar that Congress voted to spend, 42 cents of it had to be borrowed."

"The problem is not that Americans are not taxed enough; the problem is simply that government is spending too much," Neugebauer said. "At the rate Congress spent in 2009 and 2010, the debt burden the American people had to bear would have more than tripled in less than 10 years."

"I'm not a representative who puts forward a lot of bills because in my opinion, we have too many regulations as it is. Every regulation gives

more power to the government and it does that by taking freedom away from the American people. My interest here has been to take away that intrusion, to trim government as much as possible, and to give that power back to the people themselves."

"When government takes money from the private sector, it takes it away from private companies that would use it to create jobs and build prosperity.

The budget that Cong. Paul Ryan has put forward for 2012 is a "pathway to prosperity" well beyond that; using these principles, we will cut \$6.2 trillion from the budgets over the next 10 years."

"Government also regulates too much and that takes freedom away from the people at the same time it hurts the economy. We have to rein in bureaucracies like the Environmental Protection Agency. We have to allow America to drill its own oil reserves and to better provide its energy needs with its own natural gas and clean coal technologies.

"We have to get out of the way of the American people."

Activity on the House floor required him to leave at that time.

"I have to get back to the floor," he apologized. "It's a tough fight right now but please remember the path we're trying to follow in this new House."

And with that, he hung up and went back to the House floor.

I hope he and his like-minded colleagues keep up the good fight.

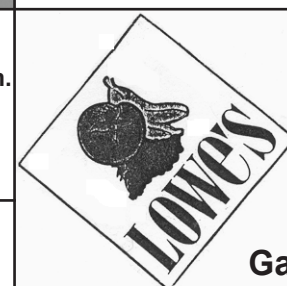
