





#### **Texas Department of Health** will be in Farwell on *April 19*.


The Texas Department of Health comes to Farwell to give immunizations to everyone who needs them. Persons of any age are eligible. There is no charge; the shots are free.


We would just like to say THANK YOU for what you do. We know that these words are not enough to compensate you for your time and energy, but please know that what you do is extraordinary.


