With a quick glance around the room, the influences on Hayley's talent were obvious. Some older Lazbuddie residents may remember that Ted was also once in a band and his brother, Larry, is in the music business.

There is a great picture in front of the store of Larry playing with the Crickets after Buddy Holly died in that tragic plane crash. It is likely that Hayley has not only natural talent but also a little environmental influence as well.

Hayley has put her talent to good use. Not only is she playing the lead female role in "The Adventures of Tom Sawyer," but also has played the leads in other productions as well.

Last spring, she starred in "Double Falsehood," an off-Broadway production of the Classic Stage Company. Hayley enjoys classic theatre saying, "Shakespeare is my favorite. I really enjoy the process of understanding what Shakespeare is trying to say and then adapting a unique version for the stage. It is kind of like having to learn all the rules before you can break them."

Hayley describes her current play, "The Adventures of Tom Sawyer," as a spirited version of the play that "keeps you on the edge of your seat." She says the set is very demanding physically with a lot of movement and action in the play.

Hayley enjoys the cast and crew she works with on this play. She says, "We all worked together to do an honest portrayal of the play. We

want to make sure the audience believes in the performance." They are performing this play in four cities for this tour, beginning in Louisville, then St. Louis, Kansas City, and ending back in New York. Each loca-

tion hosts the play for about 5 weeks. After this play, Hayley's next ventures may be in TV.

### 'PIPs isn't just about basketball; it's about confidence'

"PIPs isn't just about basketball," says Farwell PE teacher and PIPs organizer Jana Perkins. "It is about confidence."

Jana, a PIPs instructor for 10 years, gets a little teary-eyed when she talks about the program. She believes in the power of the PIPs program to transform a shy, introverted student into a self-confident, talented competitor.

Jana thinks the best thing about the nationwide basketball skills program is that it allows kids who have never been exposed to the spotlight to get out there and perform and believe in themselves.

She relates the story of a girl who was so shy that she cried every time someone asked her to get in front of a crowd. Jana said the PIPs coach had to stand with her during the first few programs just to keep her on the court.

"By the end of our PIPs season, that little girl was performing with confidence. This confidence helped her to be more outgoing in school and develop friendships."

The PIPs program was started in 1987 by David and Brenda Land to help create an early interest in basketball, improve ball handling skills, improve general fitness and build self-confidence.

PIPs stands for "Players in Progress" and it provides kids from kindergarten through 6th grade a chance to perform basketball skills and tricks in one wants to master - spinning! front of a crowd.

Groups can form through churches, schools, cities, etc. Every year, groups around the country practice their basketball routines and perform local-

For example, this year the Farwell PIPs performed at halftime for Farwell and ENMU basketball games. They will travel to Lubbock on Feb. 9 to perform with the Harlem Globetrotters.

Jana feels like she belongs to the PIPs family.

"Once a year, PIPs hold a festival where hundreds of kids from around the country compete and show their skills. I love to attend the festival and see everyone. It is a very positive experience and full of energy."

Students compete at the festival with kids of their own ability level. They can compete individually or in groups but the point is to be rewarded for their hard work. Continued on Page 3



Registration costs \$10, which includes lunch.





### Read discusses school test changes

A message from Farwell School Supt. Mike Read: The problem with standardized testing in Texas

education is that it presumes "all things being equal." Or seen from the opposite perspective, the problem with school funding in the state of Texas is that it isn't standardized, but our testing is most def-

The gist of the problem, either way you look at it, is that you have to have it both ways: standardized testing and standardized funding. Not all of one and none of the other.

This definitely wasn't the problem back in 1984 when the inequity of Texas' public school finance system was taken to court. Back then, when the Edgewood vs. Kirby lawsuit ruffled feathers and caused tidal waves, the idea of students being measured against a statewide standard of performance was not a blip on anyone's radar.

In 1984, the problem was framed as one of basic inequity. There were poor school districts and there were rich school districts, and the difference had to do with property tax rates. The consequences of those differences were seen in the quality of education: rich kids got a better education than poor kids.

The push for higher expectations for the poorer school children came from community leaders and parents. It was the community itself that saw the need for equity and argued the case for change.

It's a decades-long legal battle that has yet to be settled. Currently, there are four lawsuits filed by various groups and coalitions. I expect these four suits to merge into one lawsuit aimed at providing a fair playing field for all kids. Bottom line, same fight, different round.

In 2001, Congress passed a law that claimed our education system would leave "No child left behind."

It was designed to close the achievement gap with accountability (tests), offer more flexibility, and provide choices for students as to where they attend school, etc. In doing so, it mandated standardized testing to set a bar for students, teachers, and school performance. Then it used that standard for determining incentives and rewarding success.

The new STAAR (State of Texas of Academic

Readiness) and the EOC (End- of-Course) tests will cost the state of Texas an estimated \$95 million annually. Currently, school districts will end up footing the bill. This is the new reality: If you standardize the expectation but not the funding, it is unfair!

The TAKS (Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills) test is being phased out with this year's sophomores and juniors. So, in essence, the 10th and 11th graders must take and pass TAKS in order to receive a high school diploma.

Students in grades 3-8 will take the STAAR tests while this year's 9th graders will take the STAAR End-of Course exams. The end-of course exams are course specific tests. For example, a 9th grader who is taking Algebra I will take an EOC Algebra I test.

This year's 9th graders will be the first class to fall under the new guidelines. By the time this year's 9th graders finish the 11th grade, they will have taken 12 end-of-course exams. The STAAR/EOC tests will have a 4-hour time limit whereas the TAKS was not timed. Fair? Equitable? You be the judge.



Live Cattle prices have continued to work lower from last weeks highs. Keep in mind that most of the highs seen last week also stopped the advance back in October and November. There was little or no cash trade last week with a handful of cattle trading at \$124. Prices closed below last weeks low early this week. It will take more selling pressure to move the market lower. Otherwise, prices will need to catch immediately and turn back higher followed by new contract highs. Long term trade is still sideways overall.

Feeder prices failed once again to follow through to the upside after making new contract highs. The market is currently trading inside a tight range which began about a week and a half ago. Until the market can convincingly break out and see some follow through, expect a prolonged range bound type trading.

Soybean prices saw a significant drop early this week following a two week strong advance. The daily charts are beginning to turn down, but there is still some support around the \$11.80 level basis the March contract. Some reports of improving weather in South American have also deflated bean prices to some degree.

Corn prices pulled down into some major support levels around the \$6.28 level basis the March contract and has held up to this point. A close below this level would begin to turn most trends back down. The market was due for some type of price correction, but the drop seen on Monday may have been just a little bit overdone? Beware of a turn if prices continue lower. The Dollar is also trying to gain some momentum back to the upside this week which is also a contributing factor to the current price decline.

Wheat prices were lower early this week, but seem to have held their gains much better than the corn and beans which is a change. Prices bounced off some short term support levels around the \$6.90 level basis the March KC contract on Monday. A close below this level would translate into about the same thing as the rest of the grain complex which would be lower.

Cotton prices had a hard day down last Wednesday, but held into Fridayis close. The market moved back down a little on Monday, but is still holding major support levels around the \$94 level basis the March contract. A close below the last three weeks low could lead to a change in trend. Prices have tried the \$1.00 level on a couple occasions, but have yet to break above this level. The next few days will be critical.

### Benjamin Fears was first Tribune publisher

(Editor's note: the following story was submitted to Hugh Moseley, former chairman of the Parmer County Historical Commission, by Claude Fears and Mary Fears Sanders. Moseley complied the informa-

Benjamin Franklin Fears, his wife Lois, and their two young sons, Claude Hollis and Harold Franklin, moved to Farwell in the spring of 1907 during one of the worse sandstorms that occurred that year.

Fears had visited the Parmer County area in the fall of 1906 and discovered it to be a "land of promise." He had been working in the coal mines near McAlester, Okla., as a carpenter and timber man. However, after two near fatal explosions and caveins he decided to seek his fortune elsewhere.

Fears had worked on a newspaper in Oklahoma, he printing shop. decided to buy the Texico newspaper in 1909.

The news plant consisted of a few fonts of type, and an 18x24 Chandler and Price foot-powered press and a few other items.

Fears soon added an 8x10 job press and some more type, installed a gasoline engine for power and started publishing the State Line Tribune on a full time basis.

In 1913 a second-hand flatbed press was added which printed a whole double page without folding it. This had not been possible with the Chandler and Price press.

Fears was a self-educated man who wrote editorials with a sharp pen. Naturally he had his hand called a few times. In those days the editor of a newspaper wrote what he thought and was prepared to back up his convictions.

The citizens of Parmer County did not always have money to pay for their subscriptions to the State Line Tribune, and printing jobs. Sometimes the customers paid their bills with chickens, eggs, a pound of butter or a side of bacon. These payments were readily accepted by the Fears family who lived in the rear of the printing shop.

> A devastating, May 19, 1913, fire destroyed the "Hamlin Brick" building, which had served as a temporary courthouse, located on the west side of Third Street in the 300 block, and it almost destroyed the building housing the State Line Tribune and the Fears family. The Fears boys helped rescue the county records form the burning building. Later they threw water on the roof and south and west sides of the Tribune building.

> Ten years later another fire succeeded in destroying the building. According to Claude Fears, all the old Tribune newspaper copies were lost in the fire.

Fears sold his newspaper to the Autrey brothers in

After moving form the Tribune building, the Fears family lived for a short time in the Congregational Church parsonage, located about one block northwest of the Farwell Inn.

The Fears family moved again on July 14, 1914. They had bought the O.M. Conoley home at 510 Third St. (Sidenote: by coincidence, this was the same home that current Tribune publisher Rob Pomper lived in when he came to this area.) Mrs. Fears added two rooms to the home. The two young boys were thrilled to have their own rooms: however, this did not last long as Mrs. Fears soon took in

Two of the new residents were Fannie Boyle. school teacher, and Brother Wright T. Moore, a minister of the Christian Church, where Mrs. Fears played the piano for Sunday school classes and church services. Moore came to Farwell from El Paso where he had been stationed with Gen. John Pershing's army. Moore was an expert with the rifle and often took the boys hunting.

While living at their new home, another daughter. Mary Eunice, was born on July 14, 1920.

In 1924, Fears' ill health forced him and his family to leave Farwell and the Texas High Plains. They moved to Uvalde where Fears became the editor of the Leader-News.

B.F. Fears died on Dec. 1, 1965, preceded by the death of his wife, Lois, on Jan. 15, 1965. They both were buried in Uvalde.

## Infrastructure worked on

(Editor's note: This is part of a series of civic employees explaining their jobs or giving an update on city workings. The following is from Mayor Stan Miller.)

I would like to begin with some of the infrastructure projects we currently are undertak-

Construction on the center community should start by this month. I hope you are as excited about this as the City Council is. We have built up the road bed and applied wrap to 1st Street to improve the street for travel during wet weather. Wrap will be applied to cover the rest of the existing dirt streets that eventually will be seal-coated to achieve pavement on them.

Public works has worked with the citizens to clear many lots in town to improve property. Subsequently we have experienced some growth in the past year or two. The City is in pursuit of some additional affordable housing to accommodate growth.

New radio-controlled water meters have been installed citywide with technology that is more precise ... resulting in smaller water loss.

Our police department has been proactive by performing neighbor-



hood patrol to keep our citizens safe. In other areas, a rise in crime has been experienced but it is this approach that I feel has been successful to protect our citizens. The officers have done community policing to connect with the citizens through various activities supported by the area businesses.

Our Public Works department has done a great job this past year. They have taken on many projects, and saved the city money by completing these tasks with our own employees.

Some of these are 1) Installing the new radio controlled water meters that were purchased with grant funds. The labor served as a match which served as the city's match on the grants resulting in financial savings.


