Parmer County Stock Show sale sets a record

Once again, the annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show was a huge success -- and likely will set another financial record.

The 65th show brought in \$126,000 the first day -- with add-ons to come later.

Last year, the first day showed a total of \$108,125. With later add-ons, the final total was a record \$165,348.

And those totals compare to the first day in 2010 --\$88,225. Thus, there has been a tremendous increase the past two years.

To show how far the county stock show has come, these numbers compare to the \$40,965 total in 1971.

County reinstates burn ban

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday happy about it. reinstated the county's burn ban, effective immediately, for 90 days.

It is up to the discretion of County Judge Trey Ellis to lift the ban at any time before the 90 days if he sees fit, normally after consulting with the commissioners court.

Ellis also reported on some excellent financial news for the county.

Specialized Public Finance, of Lubbock, which the year-long contract. handled the original bond issue for the county jail, had contacted the commissioners on the possibility of refinancing that bond issue due to lower interest rates.

The commissioners gave the firm the go-ahead to check into it, then agreed to do so.

Originally, it appeared that about \$120,000 would has received a grant to buy. be saved by refinancing on the 10-year debt.

But for the first time, Parmer County received a financial rating from Standard & Poor. It came back as "A+," the international rating firm's highest mark.

So on Jan. 19, Parmer County got its bond issue refinanced at a record low rate of 1.78 percent. This came at a time when many homeowners are refinancing their homes at 3 and 4 percent rates -- and

This meant that instead of the original savings estimate of \$120,000, Parmer County will save \$243,300 over the next 10 years.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Received two bids for Parmer County Jail inmate medical services, from Lacey Meeks and Melinda Burney, who both have Farwell offices.

Ms. Meeks had the lowest bid and was awarded

-- Approved the move of the 911 dispatch center in Friona to the Parmer County Jail.

It was supported by the city councils, of Friona, Farwell and Bovina.

The change should mean faster response time due to new costly computer equipment the county

The move will be made in February.

-- Discussed repairing or replacing the air conditioning units at the county jail.


Of the 10 original air conditioners, 7 have had problems (the jail is now 10 years old).

County Sheriff Randy Geries plans to move the main unit from the ground to the roof, which should make it most cost efficient.





From 1986:

Lillian (Davis) Benderman, longtime area resident. was born in North Carolina in 1899. She came to this area in 1908 when Texico was bigger than Clovis.

They got off the train at Taiban, N.M., and went 15 miles south where they lived on a claim for several years. The claim was a dryland farm where Lillian, parents and 10 siblings lived in a one-room half dugout which had a tin roof.

All 11 children managed to go to school even though the family was poor. They walked 5 miles to school. Lillian started school when she was 9 years old. Her father taught all his children to read before they started school. At that time, the school year was only 3 months long. Later, it increased to 5 months.

The Davis family didn't have it easy to say the least. They were considered to be "nesters" by the surrounding ranchers. At one time, their fences were cut and cattle were run in on their crops.

After several years, the family moved because a good source of water could not be found. She recalls that in 1920 Lillian got appendicitis and needed a hospital but there was none in Clovis at that time. Three doctors rented a room in Clovis and performed the surgery on their dining room table.

When she was 16, she was baptized in a stock tank south of Taiban by a Baptist minister.

After she finished school, she became a teacher in a one-room school. In 1920, she married George Nuzum in Farwell. Because he was just under 21 and his father away, he was able to get married in Texas without parent's consent.


They lived in Clovis for awhile, then moved to Belen, N.M. When they married for 2 1/2 years, Nuzum died, leaving Lillian with two children, including a daughter born 2 days after her father's death.

She returned to school and completed new requirements for teaching, then taught school to support her two children. She worked at Yeso, N.M., then at Guadalupe, N.M. She met J.B. Benderman, a railroad man. They married in 1929.

Shortly later, the Depression hit and Benderman was laid off his job, but Lillian continued teaching school until 1935 when they moved to Fort Sumner after her husband returned to his job.

In 1942, the railroad moved them back to Clovis.

No new county candidates file despite later deadline

Due to the controversy concerning redistricting in Texas, the deadline for signing up for the primary election was put back from mid-January to Feb. 1.

Since the deadline extension, Parmer County's two political party chairmen, Democrat Robert White and Republican Floyd Reeve, report that there have been no new signups.

As things stand now, the only Parmer County race involves four men seeking the GOP nomination for Pct. 3 (Farwell area) county commissioner.

They are Kenny White, Michael Haseloff, Harrol Redwine and incumbent Ronald Byrd.

The primary election date also was moved due to the court decisions. It was moved to early April, but that date is not set in concrete.

Depending on how long it takes the courts to draw up the final boundaries, the election could be pushed back as far as June.

The main sticking point is from Latino representatives who argue that the new redistricting does them a disservice.



So let's skip to the bottom line:

What I wrote in a column years ago was that it was wrong, wrong, wrong to bring in athletes to a small town just so the team can win.

What it does is relegate the kids who grow up in the community to the bench or in a backup position or even to the point where they can't make the team.

One of the great positives about a small town school, like Bovina, Lazbuddie or Farwell, is that if a youngster wants to participate in an activity, he or she usually has that opportunity.

But i would be mad as hell if I saw Farwell Schools, for example, go out of their way to bring in some athletes from wherever and our local kids would sit on the bench or not even be on the team.

Oh, sure, the team would win more games. So what. At what cost?

Now, I don't know if this year's Sudan team is full of athletes who have been Sudan students since kindergarten or first grade. They may well have been.

But the push to beat up on a young, inexperienced opponent makes me continue to question the goals of the Sudan athletic program. And that has not changed over the years for me.

Years ago, when I wrote my column about not respecting Sudan, the then-Sudan newspaper also published it (without even asking me). And I got a call from the Sudan School superintendent defending his policies.

While I appreciated him doing that, it didn't change my mind.

I don't care about how many wins our teams get. What I do care about is how being on a team helps our youngsters mature into men and women. That should be the No. 1 belief of any coach.

Sure, the Sudan girls probably celebrated bigtime over their win over the Fillies.

But who were the real victors?



Live Cattle prices climbed almost \$6.00 in just the last en trading days. Cash prices at \$126 did surprise some analysts, but the nearby February contract rallied into Friday before falling back down into the close. Prices have now moved back from the lower end of a six month trading range back to the top. The highs have been falling between \$126.00-127.00. Technically, trends are up, but probably are leaning towards a potential decline over the near term. A break to new highs above \$127.00 would project a sharply higher move.

Feeder prices were also able to push to new contract high territory, but the nearby March contract was stopped by long term resistance around the \$155.00 level. For those of you who are interested in this particular number can draw a trend line across the tops beginning from last July and into last weeks highs. This trend line crosses the September, October and November highs. Hitting this line stopped the advance on each occasion with last weeks high also stopping the advance for the time being.

Soybean prices have seen a continued advance since breaking down right after the last USDA Crop Production report. As of today, prices have actually recovered 100% of their losses seen on report day. Technically, the market is now poised to retest their early January highs.

Corn prices have also recovered about one-third of their losses seen right after the last USDA report. Corn will need to move just a little higher if intraday trends are going to turn positive. Otherwise, the \$6.20 area will remain a strong level of resistance. At this time, it would take a close above the \$6.37 level to project another retest of the early January high.

Wheat prices which took the hardest hit in the grain complex after the last USDA report has also seen the least amount of recover. Prices are moving higher, but they have not even recovered one-third of their losses seen since making highs in early January. If the rest of the grain complex can continue to move higher, wheat should find some support?

Cotton prices were able to turn most of their long term charts up over the Christmas Holidays and were able to hold these gains after the last USDA report. Prices have since continued to move higher with the next level of resistance coming in around the \$101-102 level basis the March contract. Most of the major support lies around the \$93 cent level at this time.
