Harrol Redwine

Honoring American heroes

"The true heroes from the Vietnam War are the soldiers who never came home. They sacrificed everything to serve the people of the U.S, says Harrol Redwine.

Redwine, a retired farmer from Lazbuddie, should know. He served as a helicopter pilot in Vietnam. Redwine acknowledges that he was fortunate to avoid being injured or killed in the time he served overseas, but still remembers and honors those who were killed.

"So many good men never came home. They gave their all."

Redwine, son of J.C. and Nina Redwine, of Lazbuddie, never planned to be a part of the military, but when the Vietnam conflict heightened, he enlisted. At the time, he was pursuing a degree in agronomy from then West Texas State College in Canyon.

The government was drafting young men and Redwine decided to enlist in 1969. He trained to be a helicopter pilot in the Army.

His training began with Primary Helicopter training. Around 100 trainees started in it, but Redwine was one of only about 50 who graduated.

From there, he was sent to Fort Rucker in Alabama for Advanced Helicopter Training. He also earned a commercial pilot's license.

His rank at this time was Warrant Officer Grade 1 but he achieved Grade 2 within a year. He finished his career with a Grade 3 ranking with Grade 4 being the highest possible rank at the time.

During his career, Redwine trained to fly all types of helicopters, but specifically, he flew the UH - 1H Huey.

Redwine noted that three Lazbuddie graduates were all involved with Army helicopters together. Don Watson and Gary Foster graduated a year ahead of Redwine in 1962 from Lazbuddie High.

Watson served as the maintenance technician for Army helicopters in Vietnam, while Foster was a test pilot.

Redwine recalls being "scared to death" when he first was sent to Vietnam in 1970. His main responsibility was flying helicopter missions to bring supplies, pick up wounded or dead and even sometimes pick up prisoners of war. He was part of the 164th Aviation Group, 7th Squadron Blackhawks, 1st Cavalry.

Redwine lived in a military camp at Vinh Lang, Vietnam, with about 1,000 other military personnel. They lived in huts when not flying and had very little time for

Guest speaker will be Mike Pomper, former publisher of the State Line Tribune. Pomper served in the U.S. Army from 1965-68, during the Vietnam War.

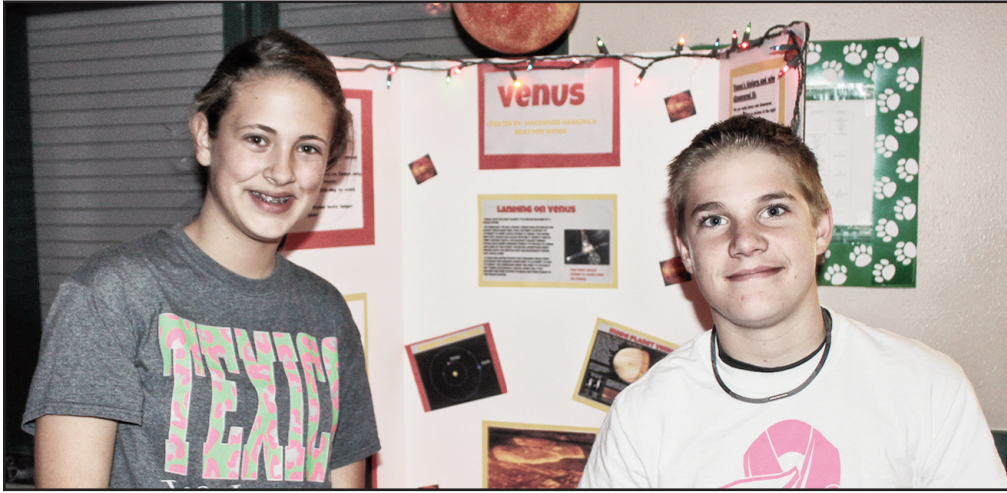
The Farwell "Legends in Blue" Band, directed by Bill Shelly, will perform.

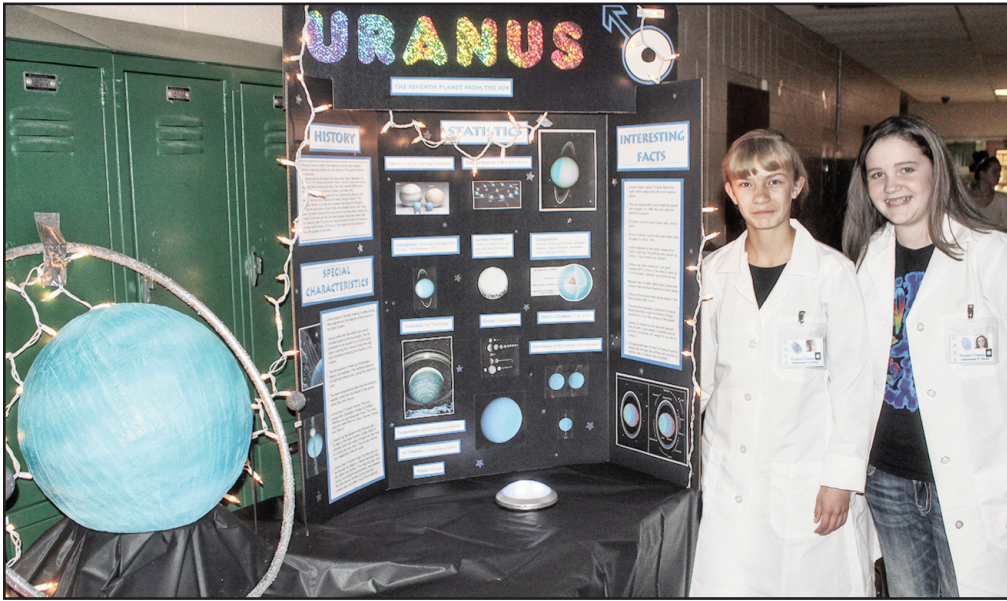
The entire Junior High went dark for the show, with each exhibit lighting up their own space. Visitors listened to the students present their information and learned fun facts about space during the two hour event.

Steers clinch state playoff berth

Farwell dominated the Springlake-Earth Wolverines, 34-0, at home on Friday and clinched a spot in the State playoffs.

The Steers finished District with a 3-1 record and have a bye this week.

If Springlake-Earth beats Bovina this Friday, Farwell will be District champions (due to a point schedule) and draw a bye the first week.

If Springlake-Earth loses to Bovina, Farwell, Springlake-Earth and Sudan will be co-champions. Sudan will be seeded No. 1, and Farwell No. 2.

Defensive tackle Gerardo Martinez returned to the team after breaking his arm earlier in the season.

S-E opened the game with the ball and their first play went for 55 yards. That was their last big play of the night.

Dillon Kirkland, wearing No. 21 in honor of his brother Daniel, who is out for the season due to injury, snuck behind the S-E offensive line to stop the running back for a loss. And the defensive line overwhelmed the Wolverines pressuring their QB into missed passes while under extreme pressure.

Farwell took over on downs, and Kirkland and Adrian Aleman quickly moved the ball into Wolverine territory. A reverse sweep by Chase Mitchell gained 17 yards to a big block by Curt Langford. J.J. Herrera passed to Angel Graxiola, but the Steers had to punt.

Alejandro Bermea sacked the Springlake QB, forcing a punt. Langford returned the ball to the 32, giving the Steers a short field, and a Herrera pass to Langford plus a Kirkland run gave Farwell their first lead.

The Wolverines then went 3 and out as Lazaro Velasquez, AJ Bermea and Graxiola stopped S-E plays.

Farwell was forced to punt the ball back, and S-E made it to midfield before facing a 4th and 1. Kirkland came up huge as he found the ball and gave Farwell great field position.

The Steers got a huge break on a swing pass from Herrera to Bermea. Bearmea caught the pass and lineman Keith Kalbas sealed out three defensive backs to allow a 3 yard run.

On 3rd and 1, Kirkland scored an easy TD as all five linemen for Farwell, Kalbas, Mitchell Ratke, Trevor Schilling, Zac Dale, and Dakota Meeks pushed the Wolverine defense back into the end zone.

S-E then went to the air to try to even the score, but Graxiola twice knocked the ball down, forcing a 3-and-out.

Kirkland and Aleman each had runs for over 10 yards and Herrera completed a passes to Aleman for 36 yards and Langford for 12 to finish the scoring drive with seconds left in the first half.

Farwell started on offense in the 2nd half and S-E started to show signs of frustration from the domination.

Farwell only needed four plays to go 65 yards for the score. Graxiola caught a pass for 25 yards, Aleman ran for 10, Bermea ran for 8 with a 15 yard

penalty on S-E for unsportsmanlike conduct. Kirkland finished off the drive with a 10 yard TD run.

The Wolverines again tried to throw the ball, but the Steer defense again heavily pressured the QB.

After the teams traded punts, S-E put together its longest drive.

The Wolverines got inside the Farwell 2, but the Steer defense held four times in a row, culminating in a Velasquez tackle for loss to give the Steers the ball back.

The Steers faced 99 yards between them and the

S-E end zone. but a pass from Herrera to Langford knocked out 65 of those yards.

Aleman and Bermea then marched the rest of the way and Kirkland again followed his linemen in for another untouched score.

Andrew Michalski, who went 4-for-5 with his extra point kicks made the score 34-0.

On defense, Oscar Muniz had a sack, and while tackling the QB a few plays later, S-E was called for intentional grounding.

S-E's drive ended again as they went for it on 4th down and the Steer defense held them from converting it for the 4th time.

District Clerk Sandra Warren will seek re-election.



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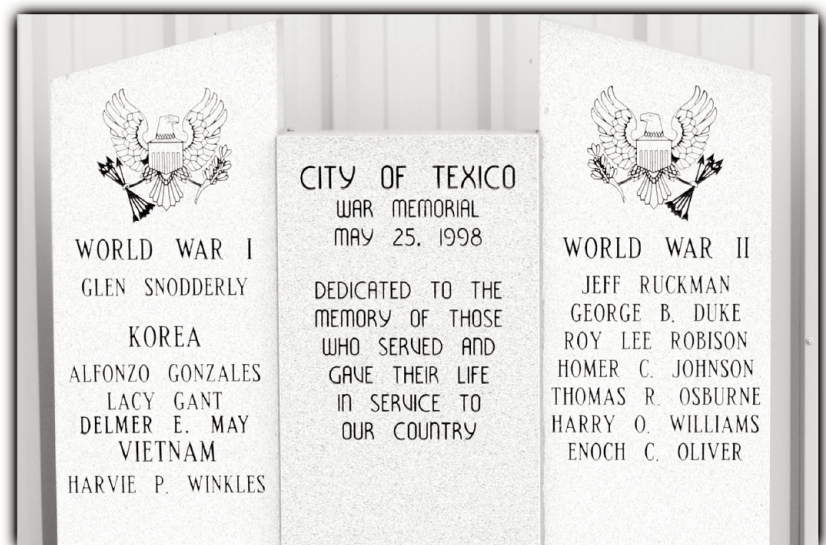

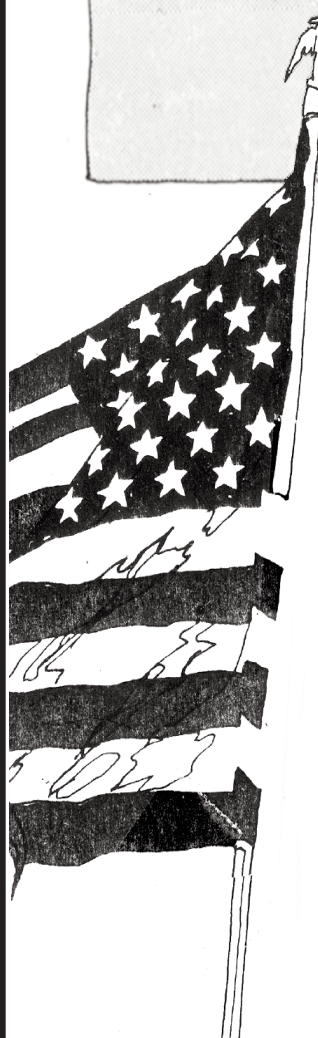
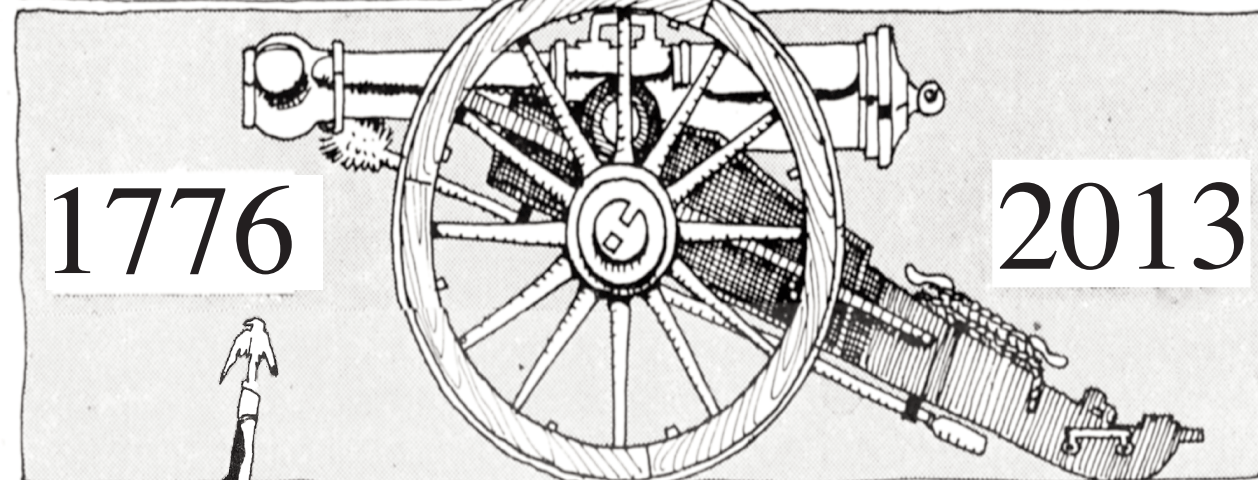
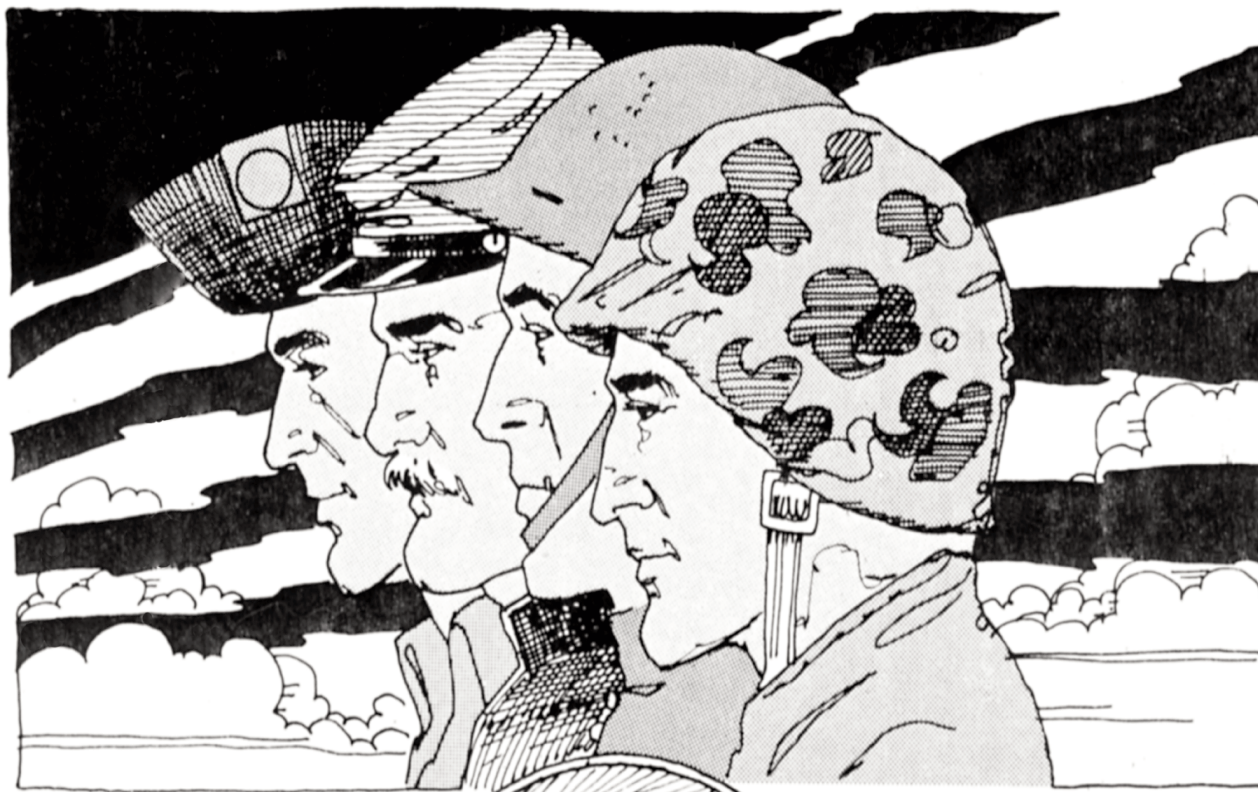
She was preceded in death by her husband, Demp Foster, in 2010, and her parents.

This put Amherst as District champion. The Longhorns are 1-1 in District and take on Whitharral this Friday; the winner advances to the state playoffs.

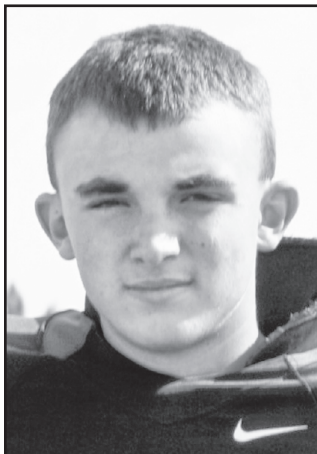
The game against Amherst was close much of the first half as the score was tied 6-all at one point.

But the 'Horns got hit with two key injuries in the first half. Fullback Luis Godinez hurt his knee and McCoy Ruthart suffered a concussion.

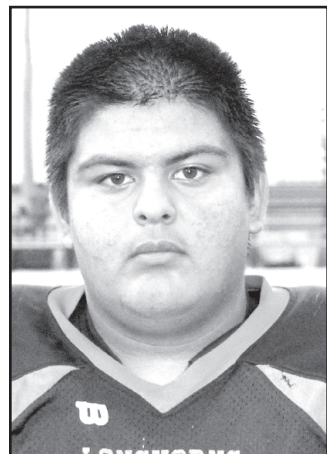
Coach Kevin Roberts said there is a good chance Godinez will be back for the Whitharral game but Ruthart won't.

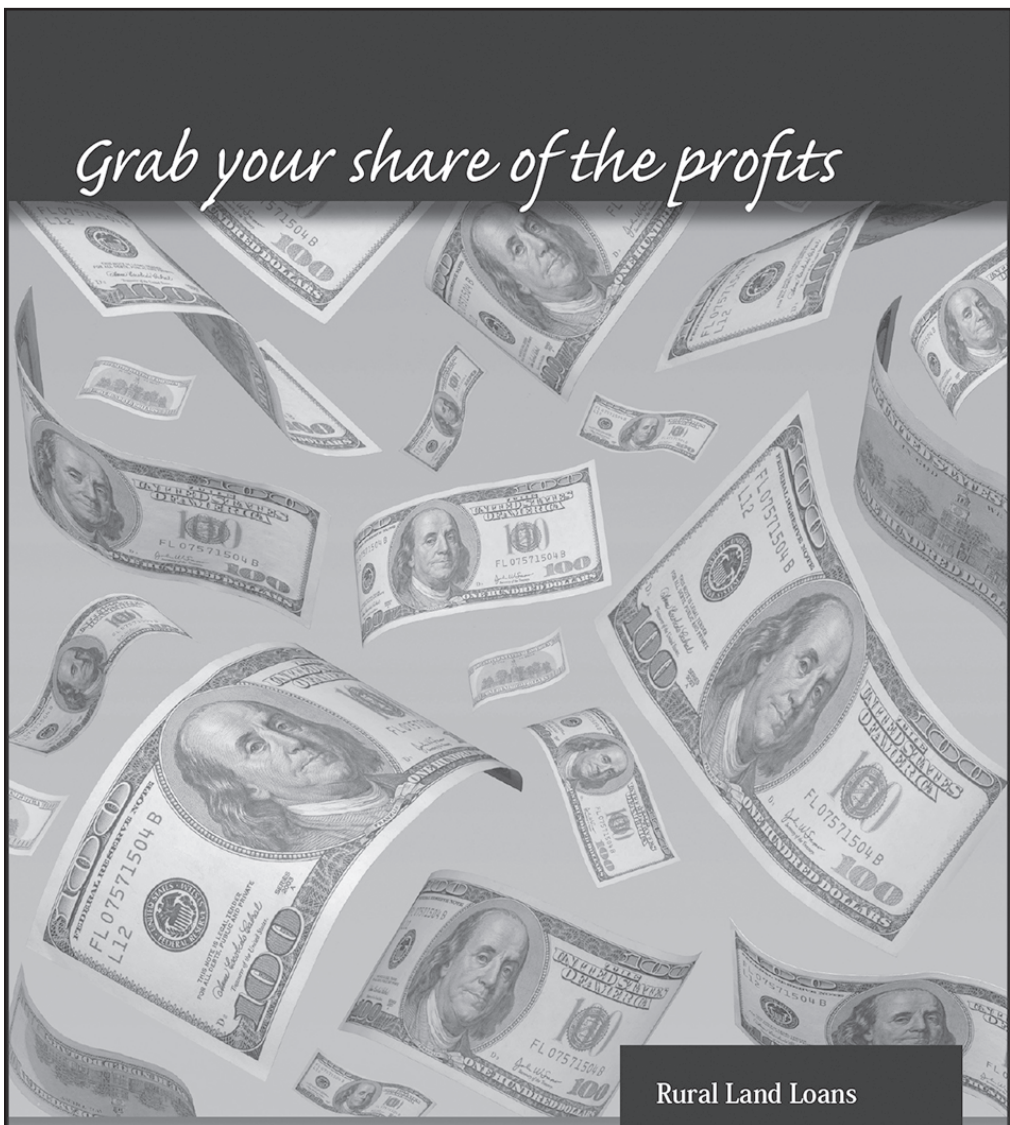

Tips to help your lawn

From Parmer County extension agent Benji Henderson:

As we are getting deep into the fall of the year, many homeowners want to put their yards to bed for the winter.

Here are few things to help your lawn survive the winter and recover vigorously in the spring.

Fall fertilization is the key to prolonging fall color and promoting early spring recovery of the lawn. It helps produce a dense turf that resists winter weeds.

Fertilizer used in the fall should be higher in nitrogen and potassium and lower in phosphorus. Grasses fertilized this way have shown greater survival during winter months than those fertilized with high phosphorous.

During the winter, if it doesn't rain for several weeks, then the lawn should be irrigated. Irrigation before a hard freeze is helpful in reducing freeze injury to the grass. It takes much colder air temperatures to lower the temperature of a moist soil than that of a dry soil.

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

anything besides flying. The camp had a make-shift runway that was made out of metal for pilots to land.

Redwine said no flight training could have prepared him for flying in Vietnam. When a pilot came in, he would have to put the helicopter's props in reverse just to slow down enough to not overrun the landing zone.

"We knew how to fly, but we had to learn everything different for Vietnam."

On one mission, four helicopters were sent to collect troops. The location where they were supposed to land was covered in three feet of water, so the helicopters were forced to hover right above the water. They began to have difficulties, so Redwine, who was the "Command in Control" on this mission, ordered the helicopters to "Fly it up".

Basically, he told them to take off and get out of the area. As one of the helicopters tried to lift, the tail boom fell off and landed in the water. Several men were killed because they were not strapped in at the time. Redwine said that "hovering" was one of the hardest things to do in a helicopter, but it was frequently essential to their missions.

Redwine said many helicopters crashed while he was stationed in Vietnam. Their missions were sometimes extremely dangerous and the enemy often scored artillery hits on them.

Redwine recalls one

mission where an enemy shell entered his helicopter and continued right through the machine without harming any crew members. He says that the hole "blew up" part of the helicopter, but they were still able to land. "We came in contact with the enemy all the time. We could not worry too much about getting shot down."

Redwine said he has the ultimate respect for the Marines and other trained specialists who went into dangerous areas first. "They were truly the best of the best. They would go in first to confront the enemy. Many of those guys gave their lives."

Redwine's unit had LOH (low observation helicopters). These smaller, compact helicopters would scout the areas first to try and locate the enemy. When they did find a target, the LOH would drop colored smoke to mark the spot for following helicopters.

The Cobra helicopters would follow to drop bombs at marked locations. The enemy eventually caught on to this tactic and begin putting out their own colored smoke signals to divert the Cobras from their real targets.

Medivac helicopters also drew a lot of respect in Vietnam. They flew unarmed into dangerous territory to rescue soldiers injured in fighting. Redwine says that he flew some medivac helicopters, but that was not his main duty.

During his first year in Vietnam,

recorded over 1,250 hours of flight time. One of his many medals that he received in Vietnam came from a troop recovery mission that he flew after already flying for 18 hours straight.

During one day, helicopters had dropped 3 loads of 80 troops at a location. As darkness neared, the soldiers got in trouble and needed reinforcements. Since it was already too dark for the Cobras to help out much, recovery helicopters were sent to retrieve the troops. By following the orange tracers that marked the location, the helicopters were able to find the location in the dark.

Redwine was called to replace a pilot who broke down and could not fly the mission. The American troops were being overrun in that area, so four helicopters were sent back for the rescue mission. He landed and rested for about 15 minutes after flying all night and then began the recovery mission. The mission was successful and the troops were returned safely to base without losing any helicopters.

Among the medals he received were a Distinguished Flying Cross with bronze oak leaf cluster, 3 Bronze Stars, and a Vietnam Gallantry Cross. Although he does not specifically remember the missions that produced all the different medals, Redwine said

they were awarded when someone "went beyond what was expected of them in a mission."

He said everyone who went to Vietnam had the same basic mission - to take care of each other. The most important thing was protecting each other. When the conditions of war were horrible, there were often heroic actions that resulted.

He told the story of two enemy soldiers who chained themselves to a tree. Armed with machine guns, their mission was to shoot down helicopters as they flew over. Several helicopter pilots were shot down that day because they refused to give up on their friends. The first helicopter that encountered the enemy was shot down, then the second and the third. Hearing the situation, more helicopters appeared to rescue their predecessors and take down the enemy threat. It took 12 helicopter pilots to get the job done, but they refused to give up on their friends and refused to give up on the mission to eliminate the two enemy machine gunners.

Redwine left Vietnam in 1971. However, he stayed on "standby" status with the Army until 1976 when he was honorably discharged. He returned home to

Lazbuddie where he worked at the Lazbuddie Co-op until buying his own farm.

While in Vietnam, his daughter was born, so he looked forward to reuniting with his family. Unfortunately, his wife and older son, Russell, later died. Harrol then focused his attention to farming, raising all types of crops.

In 1994, Harrol married his second wife, Leslie, the daughter of John and Bobbie McFarland, who still lives with him at his Lazbuddie residence. He farmed for a total of 41 years before retiring about 2 years ago.

Since returning home, he has never flown again. He says he was just much too busy farming and tried to forget much of his Vietnam experience.

Originally, he was in charge of a local veteran's club, but says the memories kept bothering him. "Talking with other veterans about experiences in Vietnam was hard. It just brought back too many memories."

He also has served on the Lazbuddie School Board and been a volunteer firefighter in his area. Neighbors like Wayne Jesko and Tony

Beauchamp describe Redwine as "the nicest man you could meet."

Redwine also is now the preacher at the Lazbuddie Church of Christ where he jokes about having "100% attendance" from the 16 church members.

Redwine is adamant that he is not a war hero. He believes everyone who went to Vietnam just did the best they could to survive the experience and take care of their fellow soldiers. He is proud to have served with many fine men and still keeps up with many of them through email.

Veterans' issues are also important to him and he believes these men deserve good treatment as they get older. And he believes that God was important in his military experience.

"You could tell the difference in those who kept God in their lives," recalls Redwine. "They just had a higher set of morals. It was so important."

On this Veterans Day, he wants people to remember those soldiers who gave their all and were never able to come home to their families after the war.

"Those men sacrificed everything. They are the real heroes."

Live Cattle moved lower overall last week with cash trade taking place at \$132.00. Short term trends have turned down at this time, but long term support levels lie down around the \$131.30 level basis the December contract. Odds favor lower prices into the December time frame with the strongest level of support coming in around the \$130.00 area. A break below this level could push prices even lower?

Feeder prices are now in their second week of decline, but are very close to reaching their first strong level of support which comes in around the \$163.25 level basis the November contract. There are more support levels which come in a much lower levels with the key support now between the \$156.50 to \$159.00 area. Odds favor a continued move down into the December time frame.

Soybean prices have rolled from the November contract into the January contract as lead month. The January contract actually broke down through short term support levels on Friday which came in around the \$12.60 area. Prices now look like they could move back down towards the \$12.15 level in short order. The August low made around \$11.68 is still expected to hold over the long term.

Corn prices continue to move lower, but gradually. Prices seem to find some buyers each time the market moves down into a new closing low. The price action seen late last week seems to confirm that prices are going to drift a little lower ahead of this weeks USDA Crop Production report. The next level of short term support comes in around \$4.21 basis the December contract.

Wheat prices have also taken out much of their short term support which came in around the \$7.42 level basis the December KC contract. Prices have held their long term 50% retracement level at \$7.32, but could be in jeopardy if the rest of the grain complex continues to move down from here. The seasonal tendency is to see higher prices into the December/January time frame.

Cotton prices have continued to move down since taking out their long term support levels at \$82.20 basis the December contract. Odds have leaned towards hitting a target down around the \$74.50 area, but the market has yet to reach that mark. Another 2 cent slide could reach this target and possibly generate some buying interest to bump the market back up over the near term?

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Have You Started Taking Your RMDs?

Throughout your career, you have been working hard to save in one or more retirement accounts. Then, once you retire, you'll have some new decisions to make. But one choice has already been made for you: the age at which you must start taking withdrawals, or "distributions." It's a good idea to familiarize yourself with these distribution rules because they can have a big impact on your retirement income. And you may even want to take action before the end of the year.

Here, in a nutshell, is the story: Once you reach age 70½, you must begin taking taxable withdrawals — known as "required minimum distributions," or RMDs — from your traditional IRA and most other retirement plans, such as a 401(k) plan, a 403(b) plan or a 457(b) plan. A Roth IRA, however, is not subject to RMDs.

If you turned 70½ in 2013, you may want to take your first RMD no later than Dec. 31. You could wait until April 1, 2014, to take your initial distribution, but you'd then have to take your next one by Dec. 31, 2014 — and two distributions in one year could have a sizable impact on your taxes. After you've taken your first RMD, you'll have to take one by Dec.31 of each calendar year for the rest of your life — or until your account balance is zero.

These minimum distributions are calculated annually based on your age, account balance at the end of the previous year, marital status and spouse's age. If you do not meet the annual minimum distribution, you may be subject to a 50% penalty on your underpayment, plus ordinary income tax as the funds are withdrawn.

Of course, while you have to take at least the minimum distribution from your retirement plans, you can always take more — but should you? There's no one "right answer" for everyone. Obviously, if you need the money, you may have to go beyond the minimum when taking distributions. But if you have enough income from other sources — such as investments in other accounts, Social Security and even earnings from a part-time job — you may want to stick with the minimum distributions and leave your retirement accounts as intact as possible for as long as possible, thereby allowing them to potentially continue growing on a tax-deferred basis.

Whatever your decision, you'll want to allow sufficient time to determine the size and timing of your RMDs, because if you have several retirement accounts, you may need to make some choices. For example, if you have more than one IRA, you can add the RMDs and take the combined distribution amount from any one — or more — of your IRAs. And if you have more than one 401(k), you must calculate your RMDs separately for each plan. To help ensure you're doing things "by the book," consult with your tax and financial advisors before you start taking your RMDs.

You work hard to build your retirement plans. So, when it's time to start tapping into them, you'll want to make the right moves.
