We mean not for this column to become a week-by-week report on the interpretation of 1958 football rules. However, we got carried away last week on the rule that prohibits offensive blockers from using both elbows. . . and allows them the use of only one.

While it's questionable as to whether that rule can be enforced to the pleasure of the fans, it's certainly not the most important rule change which is going into effect come September and football season.

Most interesting rule change, and the one which will change the outcome of more games, is the new extra point(s) scoring system.

In years past, of course, a team was allowed a chance to score an extra point after a touchdown. The ball was placed on the two-yard line, squarely between the goal posts, and the offensive team had the option of passing or running the ball over the goal line or place 5 Negro Airmen or drop kicking the ball between the uprights. If either of these options was done to the satisfaction of the officials, the offensive team added one more to its point total and went happily back upfield to kickoff.

This has been changed. In 1958, the ball will be placed on the three-yard line . . .not the two. For one point, the offensive team can place or drop kick the ball through the goalposts. . . same as always. But, if the ball is successfully carried or passed over the goal line, the team gets a bonus of

We daresay local football fans will see few, if any, attempts made to kick extra points in 1958.

Without a kicking specialist, the chances, we feel, of running or passing the ball over are as good as kicking it between the goal posts. So, when the odds are even why try to make one point when you can go for two?

And the same holds true for the team which is fortunate enough to have a good kicker if that team happens to be behind. We'll venture to say that most of the kicking of extra points will be done after a team builds up a lead that it isn't in danger of losing.

Frankly, we don't know why the new extra point rule was put into effect. What good it will do or how it will benefit the game is a mystery as far as we're concerned. Football people probably know the answer and we'll be trying to find out what it is.

We do know that the coach of the first team that gets defeated by an 8-7 score is going to be unhappy with the rule and himself. . . and feel foolish besides. And we're going to be among those who feel sorry for him.

Anyway, there'll be more football game scores which will add up to even numbers in 1958 than there were in



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

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

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas to provide that all county officials for whom four-year terms of office were authorized in 1954 must resign such office prior to announcing for a different office when announcing for a different office when more than one (1) year remains un-served of the term for which they were elected, and providing for the filling of such vacancies in the manner now BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-

URE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 65 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 65. STAGGERING TERMS OF OFFICE.—The following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, and thereafter, shall serve for the full terms provided in this Constitution:
"(a) District Clerks; (b) County

Clerks; (c) County Judges; (d) Judges of County Courts at Law, County Criminal Courts, County Probate Courts and County Domestic Relations Courts; (e) County Treasurers; (f) Criminal District Attorneys; (g) County Surveyors; (h) Inspectors of Hides and Animals; (i) County Commissioners for Precincts wo and Four; (j) Justices of the

"Notwithstanding other provisions of this Constitution, the following officers elected at the General Election in No-vember, 1954, shall serve only for terms vember, 1954, shall serve only for terms of two (2) years: (a) Sheriffs; (b) Assessors and Collectors of Taxes; (c) District Attorneys; (d) County Attorneys; (e) Public Weighers; (f) County Commissioners for Precincts One and Three; (g) Constables. At subsequent elections, such officers shall be elected

elected at the General Election in November, 1954, shall serve for a term of two (2) years if the designation of their office is an uneven number, and for a term of four (4) years if the designation of their office is an even number. Thereafter, all such officers shall be elected for the terms provided shall be elected for the terms provided in this Constitution.

"Provided, however, if any of the officers named herein shall announce their candidacy, or shall in fact become a candidate, in any General, Special or Primary Election, for any office of profit or trust under the laws of this State or the United States other than the office then held, at any time when the unexpired term of the office then held shall exceed one (1) year, such held shall exceed one (1) year, such announcement or such candidacy shall constitute an automatic resignation of the office then held, and the vacancy thereby created shall be filled pursuant thereby created shall be filled pursuant to law in the same manner as other vacancies for such offices are filled."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1959.

"In any district, county or precinct where any of the aforementioned offices is of such nature that two (2) or more persons hold such office, with the result that candidates file for 'Place No. 2.' etc., the officers and laws of this State.

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed Amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to
