Farwell focuses on drainage problem

Unlike the writing of the past, they mostly just report what the candidate has done that week, who supports them, and broad beliefs they hold.

Getting specific on any point opens them up to criticism so they take the easy way out and avoid any issues that aren't safe.

Here are just a few quotes from e-mail that we received in the last week:

Presidential hopeful Bill Richardson sent us a couple e-mails last week to let us know that he supports women. Not just because they are a special interest, but because they make up over half the voters in this nation, in my opinion.

Another e-mail went on to say, "As president, Gov. Richardson will launch a national dialogue on water issues affecting all parts of the country, including quality, conservation, efficiency and reuse."

Forget about the national water supply, Clovis and Texico are getting a pretty good look at his water policy already. Especially since the Ute Water Project is becoming more and more of a pipe dream.

GOP hopeful Rudy Giuliani wrote us repeatedly letting us know that he is going to be holding fund-raisers and press conferences this week.

I'm going to go way out on a limb and bet that he will be having press conferences and fund-raisers until the day he leaves the





Texico Council discusses Ute Lake Project

The Texico City Council discussed the Ute Water Project with Scott Verhines, the Program Manager, on Tuesday. The purpose of his visit was to answer questions and to look at the projected cost of water for Texico residents if they stay in the project.

As part of the program, Verhines estimated that the city currently pays \$4.17 per 1000 gallons of water. He believes that if the Ute project is completed soon than the cost would only go up by 5 or 10 cents.

was expected to begin, and received, "I don't have an it needs to stay open for the residents that use it.

Autrey also asked if Ute would have enough water to supply the area. Verhines reported that the average surplus of water in Ute Lake was around 24,000 acre feet of water, and the project would only use around 16,000 acre feet.

The water is currently sent down river to Texas. This project wouldn't change the level of the lake, just how much water was let into the river leaving the lake.

Verhines also pointed out that the ground water is declining at a rate of around 2 1/2 feet per year and in some places the water table dropped over 7 feet per year. He pointed out that in 60 years the Ute Water Project would be a lot less expensive than trying to get water from the ground.

The price estimates are currently being based on the cities involved paying 10% of the costs, the state paying 15% of the costs, and the federal government pay-

He also pointed out that the current situations in the Middle East could put the brakes on domestic spending until a new government takes office next year.

From that point it would still take several years before the project could be started.


