





Mix soda and vinegar, let stand. Cream sugar and shortening, add eggs and beat well. Make Paste of cocoa and food coloring and add to first mixture. Premium margarines generally are made from more expensive oils and cost more than to USDA. regular margarines. They always must be refrigerated to protect their delicate flavor; this adds to their distribution

Unsalted margarines are made without salt for people on special restricted diets and for those who prefer an unsalted tablespread.

Low-calorie or diet spreads are labeled imitation margarine because they contain about half the 80 per cent fat content of regular margarine. Therefore, imitation margarine has fewer calories than regular margarine. The ingredient listed first, and therefore present in the largest amount, is water. Imitation margarines are not recommended for baking or fry-




