2015 Registered -- Residents Must Register To Vote

Early this week only 2015 persons had registered to vote in Parmer County, according to information released by tax-assessor Hugh Moseley. "In 1968, 3870 persons registered to vote in the county," said Moseley, "and this year we hope to have at least 4,000 persons register."

All persons who wish to register should visit one of the following places: city hall in Bovina, city hall in Friona, Methodist Church or Farmer's Co-op at Lazbuddie, Chamber of Commerce in Friona; or the tax assessors office in Farwell, and pick up blanks which are available for that purpose. The registration certificate blanks are

also available by writing to the Parmer County Tax Assessor and asking for them.

Moseley reminds residents that anyone who wishes to vote in any of the elections -- school board, primary, or general election -- must be properly registered.

Final date for registering is Saturday, Jan. 31.

School board elections will be held in the county this year; a primary election with several county offices to be filled will be held in May; and a gubernatorial election will also be held in the state this year. Therefore it is important that all residents register to vote.

Tickets Issued To Town Residents For Disobeying Ordinance 151

B. F. Foster, Texico town marshal, issued tickets to several town residents on Monday for allowing their dogs to roam loose in the town. In addition, he picked up two dogs whose owners could not be located and took them to the pound in Clovis.

The owners of the impounded dogs have five days to redeem their pets from the pound, secure a city dog tag and have them innoculated against rabies.

City Ordinance #151 states that all animals must be kept penned or the owner will have to suffer the consequences. Heretofore the town fathers have been lenient with dog owners. However, at their last meeting plans were made to enforce the ordinance to its fullest since the town has an "over supply" of dogs running loose, and property owners complain of damage to yards.

At that time town residents were warned that their animals would be picked up and the owner would be fined if the animals continued to run loose. City Clerk, Mrs. Clara Wiehl, warns that Marshal Foster has been instructed to enforce the ordinance, therefore dog owners are warned that they must comply with the law or suffer the consequences.

Bank Deposits Reach All-Time High

Deposits at the Security State Bank have reached an all-time high according to the statement of condition released at the end of business on December 31, 1969. Deposits are up almost \$1,000,000 over the previous year, according to R. W. Anderson, bank vice-president.

At the close of business on December 31, 1969, total deposits at the bank totaled \$9,080,418.81 while the previous year on December 31 the deposits totaled \$8,153,013.41. Total assets at the bank stood at \$9,938,244.15 at the year's end. This was \$975,143.87 over

the \$8,963,100.18 figure of the previous year. Another major category showed that loans at the bank were up \$1,754,675.91 increasing from \$2,153,495.06 last year to \$3,908,170.07 at the end of 1969.

Anderson said the statement reflected the continued growth of the cattle industry in the area and the higher price for the milo crop in 1969. "Despite the fact that the crop was slightly lighter than had been anticipated, the higher price of the grain pretty well balanced it out," he said. He added, "we are fortunate indeed that our deposits have continued to show an increase throughout the year."

Stocker Cattle Meeting Set

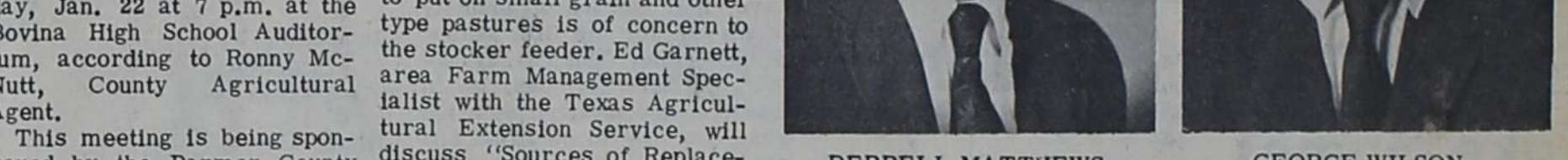

Jack Carrothers, manager of the Friona Feed Yards, will conclude the meeting with a talk on "Cattle Feeding Outlook."

Everyone in the county is encouraged to attend this meeting, adds McNutt.

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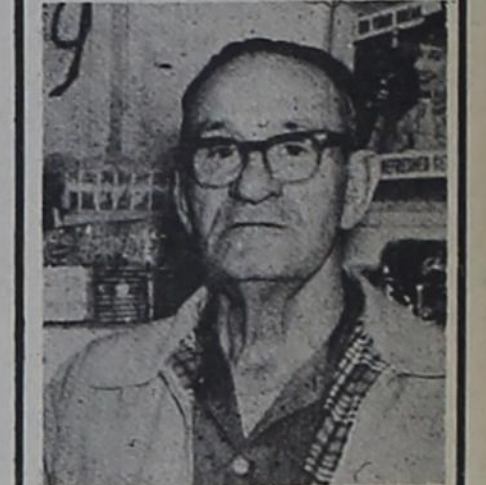

 1/2 cup shortening
 1 1/2 cups sugar
 2 eggs
 2-1 oz. bottles red food coloring
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 2 teaspoons cocoa
 dash of salt
 1 cup buttermilk
 2 1/2 cups flour
 p teaspoon soda
 1 teaspoon vinegar
 Mix soda and vinegar, let stand.
 Cream sugar and shortening, add eggs and beat well. Make Paste of cocoa and food coloring and add to first mixture. Add buttermilk and flour to creamy mixture, mix well and add vanilla, stir well. Last, stir vinegar and soda mixture to make sure it is well mixed then add to batter. Mix well and pour into two greased and floured cake pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Remove cake from pans and allow to cool. Slice each layer and frost with following mixture.
 1 cup sweet milk mixed with 3 tablespoons flour - cook until thickened, stirring constantly; cool well.

Cream together 1 cup sugar and 1 cup butter and add 1 teaspoon vanilla. Combine first and second mixtures; beat two minutes and spread between and on top of layers. Do not frost sides of cake.

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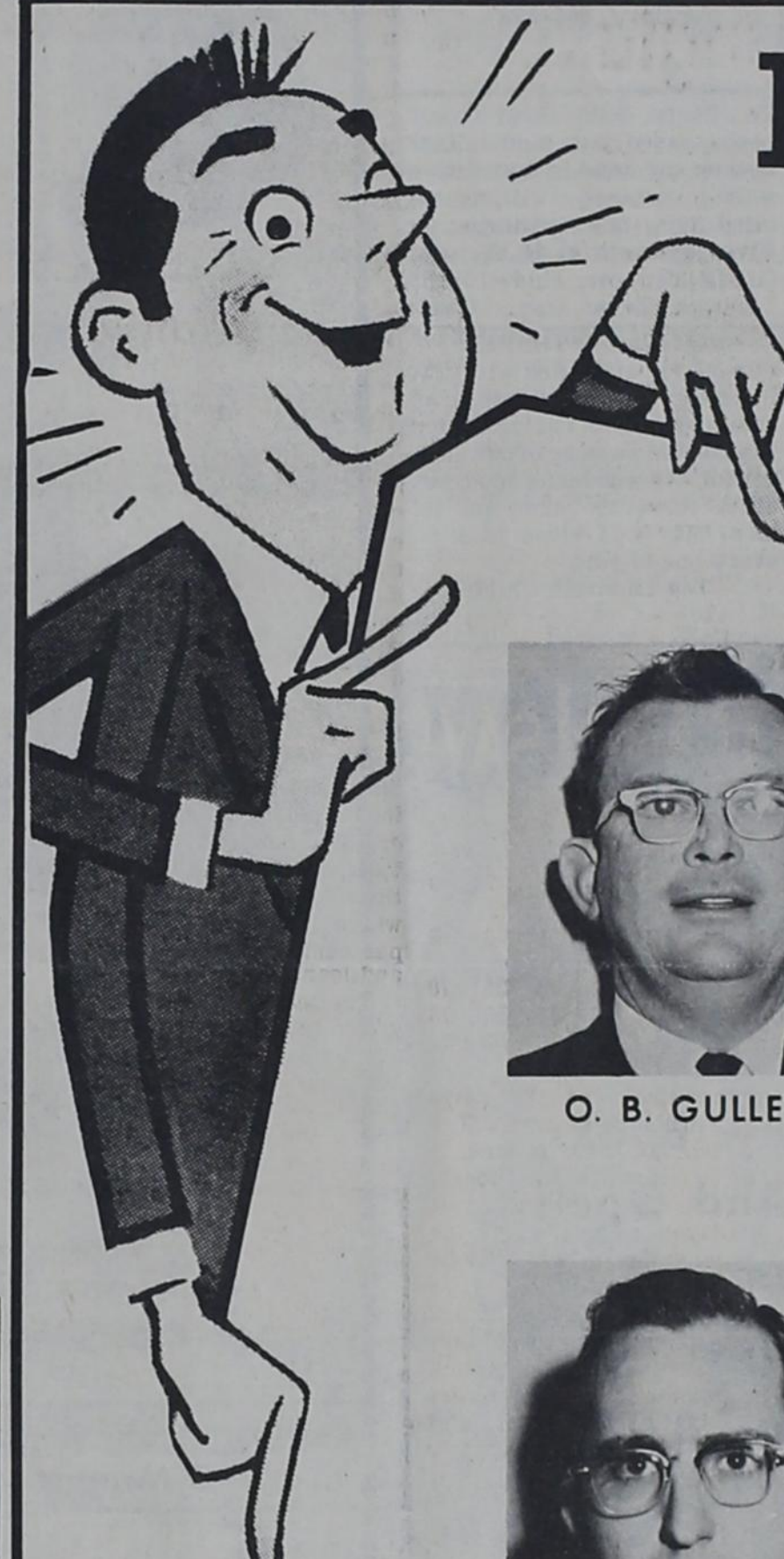

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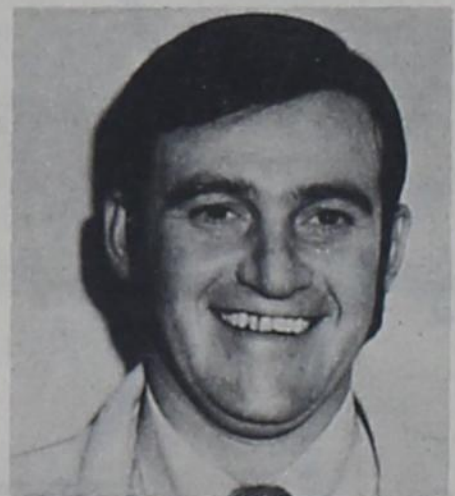

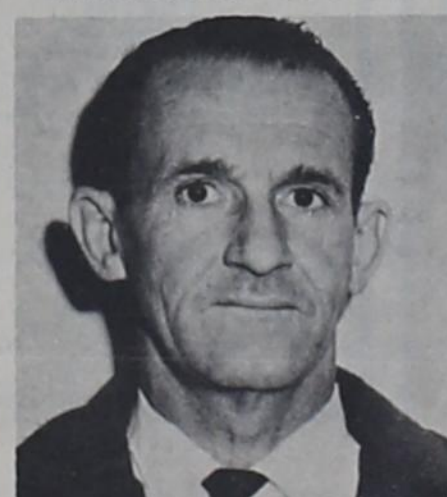
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On The Farm In Farmer County

Four topics of interest to the stocker operator will be "Sources of Stocker Cattle," "Irrigated Pastures," "Health and Nutrition in a Stocker Program," and "Outlook for Cattle Feeding."

POST-PLANTING HINTS FOR TREES & SHRUBS
Post-planting techniques are as important in tree survival as any other factor.

"A bare rooted tree should be supported to prevent damage from prevailing winds," explains Everett E. Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist at Texas A&M University.

The most common method of staking is with two or more wooden stakes driven into the soil around the tree and about a foot from it.

Soft string may be used to tie the tree to the stakes. Wire or other hard materials are poor substitutes because they will injure the tree. Guy wires may be attached to large trees if a section of rubber hose is used to protect the tree.

"If rubber hose isn't used, the wire will cut into the tree and possibly kill it," Janne says.

A tree should remain supported for at least two years. Balled and burlapped shrubs usually do not need supporting.

Newly-planted trees also need to be pruned. The amount of pruning is determined by the

root system, the condition of the plant and its future care. Usually one third to a half of the top growth is removed, the horticulturist says.

Only secondary branches are cut back. Buds along a single shoot can be rubbed off.

Pruning is done to assure a balance of the roots with the top growth. Balled and burlapped plants need little or no pruning.

Plants are not fertilized immediately after planting. A light application of fertilizer should be applied after the first growing season.

After planting, the moisture content of the soil demands careful attention. This is especially true for evergreen plants, he says.

As much or more damage results from over-watering as under-watering newly planted trees and shrubs, reminds the horticulturist.

Plants should not be allowed to wilt from dry soil. Neither should the soil be kept at a water-logged level.

At Home In Parmer County

Some of you may wonder, is it safe to refreeze poultry that was frozen and then thawed? Yes.

As long as it still contains ice crystals or is cold, and has been held in the refrigerator no longer than two days after thawing, it is refreezable. * * *

Soft margarine's consistency is due to its high liquid oil content.

Premium margarines generally are made from more expensive oils and cost more than regular margarines. They always must be refrigerated to protect their delicate flavor; this adds to their distribution costs.

Unsalted margarines are made without salt for people on special restricted diets and for those who prefer an unsalted tablespread.

Low-calorie or diet spreads are labeled imitation margarine because they contain about half the 80 per cent fat content of regular margarine. Therefore, imitation margarine has fewer calories than regular margarine. The ingredient listed first, and therefore present in the largest amount, is water. Imitation margarines are not recommended for baking or frying.

When you are faced with many choices of margarines, do you ask are higher-priced margarines better than those selling for half their price?

There is no simple yes or no.

The more than 20 kinds of margarine fall into six types: regular, whipped, soft, premium, unsalted and low-calorie.

Each has 80 per cent fat blended with milk or cream and each is fortified with vitamin A and some with vitamin D.

The most common type is regular margarine. Generally it is made from soybean and cottonseed oil and costs less than the other types.

Regular margarines are all-purpose, they may be used in cooking, baking, frying, as a seasoning and for tablespread. Inert gas is injected into whipped margarine to increase its volume.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has banned bug-proof shelfpaper impregnated with insecticides chlordane and lindane. The paper cannot be sold across state lines. The shelfpaper "may produce residues in home-stored foods," according to USDA.
