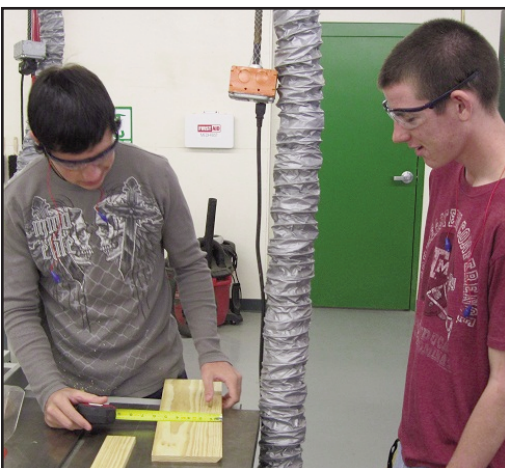

The sordid history of 408 3rd Street

Murder. Jealousy. Lies. Love.

All the ingredients for a full-fledged mystery right here at home in Farwell'

For Rob and Rebecca Pomper, this mystery may literally come a little too close to home. Their house on 3rd Street is the setting for a controversial, but well-known, mystery that dates back to the 1920's.

The story goes that in 1916, Capitol Land Trust agent Walter Mansfield decided to move to Farwell from Clovis. Since his office was prominently located on 3rd Street, Mansfield decided to make his home next door.

The two-story house at 408 3rd St. became home to him and at least one of his two daughters -- Montell.

Montell was a beautiful teenager when her dad relocated to Farwell. It is thought that she graduated from Farwell High School, although no records were ever uncovered at the school.

After graduation, Montell left Farwell to live in New York. She purchased a country home in Poughkeepsie that was known as

Spring Top Farm. Here, the mystery deepens as Montell was supposedly murdered by her lover - possibly fiance, Gail Hamilton.

The two young people were found dead in Montell's upstairs bedroom after a party with a .32 caliber revolver lying beside the bodies. At first thought to be a suicide, later interviews with guests and an anonymous letter to Montell's family pointed more firmly to a murder-suicide.

A day after the funeral, Walter received an anonymous letter

signed, "From One Who Knows" detailing the events of the day. The letter says that Gail and Montell has a lover's quarrel in her bedroom over another man.

It goes on to say that Gail "...slapped her in the face and tried to choke her ... In his madness at that time, he shot Monty dead, then he tried to save her but it was too late. So when he see what he done and that he killed Monty in his madness, he tried to bring Monty back to life."

To support this theory,

Steers win District game over Morton

The Farwell Steers are 5-3 overall and 1-1 in district after knocking off Morton there on Friday, 12-7. Morton started at its 34, drove the ball downfield and after gaining 5 first downs scored from the 4. The kick was good and it was 7-0.

After that score, the Steers defense held Morton scoreless the rest of the game.

On Farwell's first play from scrimmage, Collin Christian completed a 7-yard pass to Curt Langford. On 3rd down, Christian hit Herrera with a pass for a first down. On 4th down at the Morton 46, Farwell went for it but was held.

The Steers started the 2nd quarter with the ball and maintained control most of the quarter behind strong running by Kolten Morris. And Farwell got good, long punts from Bretton Stancell. But the Steers didn't score and it was Morton ahead 7-0 at the half.

Langford took the kickoff to start the 2nd half out to the Steers 36. On Farwell's second possession, the Steers drove downfield. The drive culminated at 7:13 when Morris scampered through the defense to score from 39 yards out. The extra-point kick was blocked and Morton led 7-6.

Morton went 3 and out and Farwell got the ball back at Morton's 32. Christian passes to Langford for 10 yards. Morris ran for 5, and Herrera nabbed a pass for 7 more. Then Christian hit Langford with a 15-yard TD pass at 3:37 of the 3rd quarter. The extra point try failed and Farwell led 12-7.

In the final quarter, Christian ran for a first down, and passed to Langford for another. Morris ran for 10 giving the Steers a first down at the Morton 15. On 4th and 6, Farwell went for it but was held.

Morton got another chance to move the ball downfield. With just a few seconds left on the clock, Langford intercepted at the Farwell 40 to cinch the win.

The Steers defense played tough throughout the game, with big plays and hits coming from several players.

Gas rate hiked for Farwell

The Farwell City Council held a special meeting on Oct. 23 to discuss the West Texas Gas rate hike proposal.

The Council voted to accept the settlement rate proposed by the gas company. The discounted settlement rate will take effect in April 2013 for citizens of Farwell.

Now, Farwell residents pay \$9 a month base rate and \$2.42 per 1,000 cubic feet. With the increase, each customer will pay \$13.50 and \$3.63 per 1,000 cubic feet.

WTG said the rate hike is needed due to higher costs caused by state and federal regulations on utilities.

the coroner also concluded that Montell was murdered. The physician believed that the bullet was fired from a pistol several feet away and Montell's hands showed no sign of powder burns. However, Hamilton's hands did have the distinct marks from hot discharge of the pistol.

Walter Mansfield was devastated by the death of his young daughter. He believed that Gail Hamilton's jealousy of his daughter's popularity led to the tragedy.

Long-time Farwell resident Bob Anderson knew Walter Mansfield, who traveled to New York to retrieve his daughter's body. Anderson recounts an interesting twist to the story as told to him by Walter.

Evidently Hamilton had given Montell a diamond ring, thought to be an engagement ring. When Walter Mansfield asked about the ring, he was told that there was not a ring when the body was taken to the funeral home.

After a visit with police and a search of the funeral home, the ring was found there. A funeral home employee had taken it.

The ring was returned to Walter Mansfield, who brought it home with his daughter's body.

Walter's love for his daughter showed through in his final arrangements for her body. He purchased six lots at the Mission Garden of Memories Cemetery on West 7th Street in Clovis and built a beautiful mausoleum to memorialize his daughter.

This mausoleum ties Montell and Walter together in a final resting place as he was buried there upon his death in 1945.

The interesting part is that it also ties Farwell and the Pompers into the mystery. The mausoleum looks exactly like the original Mansfield home at 408 3rd St. that is now home to the Pomper family. Made from the same brick and mirroring the architecture of the home, the mausoleum is a reminder of Mansfield's life in Farwell and Walter's heart-felt tragedy.

According to the Pompers, there have been no supernatural events since they purchased the house eight years ago.

"We always thought of the house as a blessing, since it was right next door to our business, the State Line Tribune," said Rob Pomper. "No one told us about the mysterious circumstances of the Mansfield family when we bought the house. J.R. Ivins (Farwell dentist and historian) brought us an article several years back about Montell's death and we were very interested to read about it."

Rebecca admits that sometimes when their daughter Rory was younger that she would sometimes wave to someone standing by the front door. "Rory would be sitting in her high chair and all of the sudden, she would smile and wave toward the door. It happened several times, but there was never anyone there that I could

see."

The Pompers don't seem to be bothered by this mystery or the fact that a mausoleum exists that mimics their home.

"Every old home has little creaks and sounds, but we certainly don't think our home is haunted by the Mansfield's tragic past," confirms Rob. "We have always thought of our home as unique and this adds one more layer of interest for us."

The plaque on the front of the mausoleum details Walter's intense love for his daughter.

Several years ago, the mausoleum was in disrepair from vandals and weather. Former Farwell resident Virgil Reed made it his mission to repair the monument.

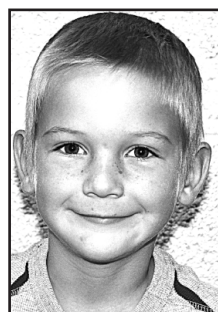

Live Cattle prices were quiet starting out this week. Cash trade was \$127.00 last week and futures prices remain somewhat weak. The December contract has some resistance around the \$128.50 level and backed off into lower levels, but trends still seem to be holding together. Reports of tighter supplies have helped to support prices, but market will need to move above the \$128.50 level in order to show strength.

Feeder prices have softened some, but still trading up near their Summer highs. Prices backed off these level last week, but no so much to have turned short term trends down. Overall, the focus seems to be concentrated more on the Live Cattle prices than corn these days. Corn has been relatively quiet and had little impact of feeder prices. Market will need to hold the \$147.50 support basis the November contract.

Soybean prices have moved off last weeks lows and short term trends are pointed higher at this time. There seems to be some fairly strong resistance across the board in the grains as the November contract is struggling around the \$15.60 area. Most of the focus now points towards planting and weather in South America with some analysts looking at a potential record crop coming from that area.

Corn prices moved up into the \$7.70 resistance area basis the December contract and stalled out. Prices really haven't turned down, but have been quiet early this week. A move above this level should push the market up into the \$7.85-7.95. For now, the market continues to trade inside a range between \$7.30 and \$7.70. If prices can't push higher, then odds are good another test of the \$7.30 is in the cards?

Wheat prices have been trapped inside a trading range since back in early July. Prices have tried on several occasions to move outside this range and have failed on every attempt. Overall, wheat prices continue to take their lead from the rest of the grain complex. Until another significant move takes place in the corn and beans, odds are good wheat will continue to hold inside the range.

Cotton prices basically exploded to the upside last week and even though prices were able to break above their Summer highs around the \$77.25 level basis the December contract, the market was quick to move back below those levels. Most of the rally began with 'short covering' and ideas this crop may be lower quality, but world cotton stocks seem to be on the rise which brings everything into question?

This annual event focuses on teaching children to be safe on the farm or ranch. Over 560 pupils attended, including some from Farwell and Texico.

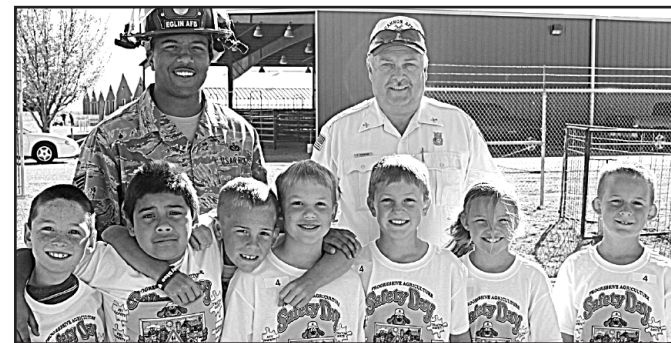
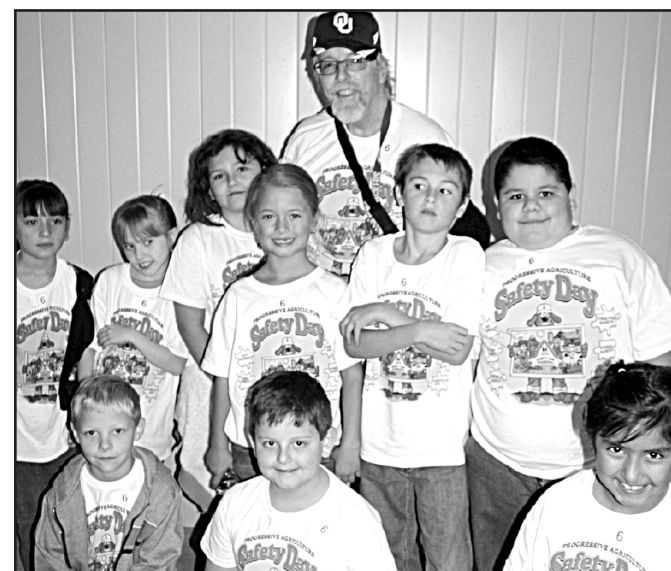

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

I am writing this as a concerned parent and as a concerned teacher. Times are changing and I feel like our children are being taught on the foundation of sinking sand.

Every year our kids are being pushed to know more and more information. They are memorizing information in order to take a test and I do not think it is sticking. They are being taught how to take tests that are written in order to trick them, (the tests writers call it "higher order thinking").

Our kids are restricted on what they can eat in the cafeteria and they are being restricted on what they can bring from home. It will only get worse.

Teachers are told to push, push, push more information whether they are ready for it or not. If they are not getting the information then they are supposed to be taught an extra 40 minutes a day on the information and if they still don't get it we refer them to an additional teacher and tack on 30 more minutes a day.

By the way, recess is optional for these kids in order to get this done. Then when testing gets closer, the 3rd grade on up gets to stay after school another hour, four days a week. Oh, don't forget homework after school as well.

How many parents are enjoying their kids when they get out of school? Are you yelling at them to get their homework done? Are you stressing because there isn't enough time in the day to finish everything? I am! We get our children for such a short time. I want it to count in a good way.

In parts of Texas they no longer have recess. In Lubbock, some schools have recess one day a week.

I struggled as a student because I have learning disabilities. It took me two to three times longer to do what average students can accomplish. I have a high IQ but it does not matter when you struggle. I already felt stupid as a child and if they took away any breaks I had in the day I think I would have completely lost all my self esteem.

What are we doing to our own children? Are we teaching them an educational foundation that is solid and we can build on or are we teaching them how to take tests? Are we teaching them how to feel good about themselves no matter what level of learning they are at or are we teaching them to see themselves as failures early on in life?

I have taught school for a long time. I have home-schooled and taught Sunday School. There is not one child that is exactly the same as another. There is not one child that learns exactly the same as another. We are trying to teach our children to learn within a certain set of guidelines that has been set by the state and federal government. Like we are all a box and we can all fit in the same box. I have never taught a BOX and I don't think I will ever teach a box!

We will see the drop-out rate increase because it gets harder and harder to pass a test. We will see less children who want to go to college attend because of test scores. I believe the drop-out rate will increase with boys, in particular, because they are not allowed to move.

We need to stand up for our kids and take back our schools. We have an amazing staff which works really hard for your children but our hands are tied. We need to stand up and fight to get our children back. I want my children to have knowledge and understanding of the learning they need in order to succeed in what God has planned for them.

Band earns excellent rating

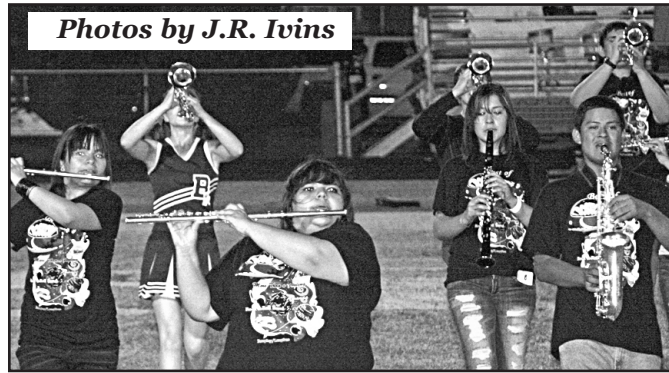
From Bovina Band Director Brad Walker:

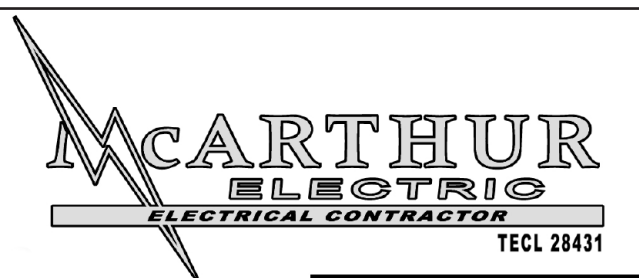

Both will start their duties on Nov. 1. More details about the new appointees will be in upcoming issues of the Tribune.


