Common sense: There's no substitute

This is the kind of column that's going to get me in a heap of trouble. However, when you're a columnist, trouble comes with the territory. The fella who is going to be angriest with me is Fred Chandler. Most of you know Fred. He's over at Shirley-Anderson-Pitman and he's been on the Farwell City Council for a bunch of years.

What I'm about to do is to say something really nice about Fred. The problem is that Fred is the modest type and he isn't going to be real happy about what I'm going to write about him.

Sorry, Fred. I've been watching government in action for more than 20 years while being a newspaperman. I've seen the whole gamut, from politicians who are only in it for themselves to legislators who don't give a hang about what they're voting on to folks who do care about serving their fellow citizens.

I've been watching Fred for going on two years now. He has really impressed me with his knowledge of the community and his desire to do what's right for folks here. But what has really jumped out at me is his common sense way of handling government matters.

Let me give you a couple of illustrations:
A few weeks ago, Fred was at a Farwell Chamber of Commerce meeting and we were discussing a proposed project. Based on my experience over the years, I waited for the group to arrive at something like "let's set up a committee to investigate it" or "we need more feedback" or "it sounds interesting, let's discuss it again later."

Well, what did Fred do? He simply said something like "sounds good; let's do it."

Y'know, if we could teach those politicians in Washington to cut through red tape like that, then we'd have a decently-running government. If an idea sounds good, try it! That sure beats setting up committees and subcommittees for further study.

Another example occurred recently at a Farwell City Council meeting. Due to an unintentional error, some folks hadn't been treated correctly and came to the council to voice their complaints.

After they had the opportunity to fully explain what had happened, Fred took the floor to apologize for the city's mistake, thanked them for coming to the council and said steps would be taken to insure that the error wouldn't happen again.

Now that seems easy, doesn't it? And, in my opinion, it's the completely correct way to handle that kind of situation.

But over the years, I've seen the opposite happen more often than not. I've seen folks come with a problem to a government meeting and get turned away without getting a decent hearing. And I've seen government officials get into a verbal fight over who caused the problem. And I've seen folks leave such meetings with more bitterness than they had when they walked in.

It's easy to mis-handle a situation when folks have a problem with government. A good way is to hear the problem, indicate that it's a two-way situation and promise that you'll do the best you can to alleviate it if possible.

Most importantly, I've found, the best way involves using plain, old-fashioned common sense. And that, apparently, is what Fred has a large stock of.

There's a real problem here with trains blocking the tracks next to Farwell's Dairy Queen. We're talking about trains that stop and sit for awhile.

I think the only way to attack this problem is when it happens to you, write or call the Santa Fe people in Amarillo. If enough of us do it, maybe we can get them to stop this poor practice.

Our 75th Anniversary edition, which is due out in September, is coming along nicely. Ruby Meeks of Farwell stopped by last week to loan us a 1956 issue of a detective magazine with a full story and picture spread on the Hassel murder case of the 1920s.

Texico organizes 'Watch' program

Texico City Marshal Fred Hamner told a group of Texico residents Tuesday night that he is currently investigating three daytime burglaries in the city but has no information to help him find the culprits.

And that's one reason why the meeting was held - to organize a Neighborhood Watch program for the city.

The two main points Hamner made were:

-If you see a suspicious vehicle, take down the license number or the vehicle's description.

-If you see an illegal activity occurring, contact Hamner immediately. This can be done via the Clovis Police or Parmer County Sheriff.

Ten Texico residents attended the organizational meeting: Ann Cooper, who is the city's Watch coordinator, Wanda Beavers, Carl Hahn, Marilyn Hahn, Mary Ellen Ricketts, Thelma Venable, Rhonda Foreman, Aileen Teel, Ruthie Maule and Adele Waller.

Each will serve as a block captain for a given area of the city. Their areas were laid out by Hamner. In addition, Mrs. Cooper had a list

of about 20 more persons who have agreed to be block captains but weren't at the meeting. Their names were given to those present to call and get involved.

A second organizational meeting for all the block captains will be held at 7:30 p.m. MST June 9 at the Texico Community Center.

Hamner said a block captain is needed for West Hereford. Persons wanting to volunteer should call Mrs. Cooper.

After the June organizational meeting is held and the areas handled by block captains solidified, Mrs. Cooper said a joint meeting would be held with Farwell block captains to learn more about how to make the program effective.

Hamner said the two biggest crime-related problems in Texico are dogs running loose and youths speeding in their cars.

Mrs. Cooper announced that the Texico Chamber of Commerce had agreed to sponsor the city's Watch program and is buying 10 signs to be placed on city streets.

Watch decals have been bought by the city and will be handed out at the June meeting.

Kube elected Chamber president

Bryan Kube was elected Monday night by the Texico Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors to be its president for the 1986-87 year.

Kube has served as vice president for the past year. Also elected were Charlotte Pierce as vice president and Ann Cooper as secretary-treasurer.

The new Board of Directors includes Bill Christian, Lewis Cooper, Ann Cooper, Bryan Kube, John R. Hadley, Charlotte Pierce and James Pierce, present Chamber president.

In other business, the Chamber finalized plans for the annual banquet next week.

Also, a discussion was held of the planned Neighborhood Watch program in the city. The Chamber agreed to be its sponsor.

As part of that, the Chamber will purchase 10 Watch signs, similar to the ones in Farwell, to be placed at the outskirts of the city. City approval will be sought to put the signs on street posts already used. The signs cost \$14 apiece.

State fire marshal to be speaker

New Mexico Fire Marshal Carl Standefer will be the guest speaker at the annual Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet.

The banquet is scheduled at 7 p.m. MST April 22 at the Texico School cafeteria. Tickets are \$7.50.

Standefer attended Eunice High School and Eastern New Mexico University, Portales. He served in the U.S. Navy.

He has served as a firefighter for 8 years, fire department captain for 4 years, fire department assistant chief for four years, fire department chief for 7 years, municipal building inspector for 7 years, instructor at the New Mexico annual fire school for 15 years and has attended every New Mexico fire marshal's training school since the beginning 30 years ago.

He became state fire marshal in 1985. Prior to that he served in the fire marshal's office in three other capacities: fire protection specialist (field instructor), fire services chief (director of training) and deputy state fire marshal.

Gikas era starts with flurry of activity

With new Mayor Chris Gikas at the helm Monday, the Farwell City Council forged ahead on several fronts.

ANIMALS RUNNING LOOSE

Gikas said it is time that the city ordinances pertaining to cats and dogs running loose be enforced.

City Clerk Janie Bowery said the ordinances had not been enforced. Gikas said animals will need to be vaccinated for rabies and \$2 licensing fees be paid. "The fee should be paid to generate the cost to the city for hunting strays. In February, for example, 23 strays were put to sleep."

Animals will be required to have tags. A veterinarian will be asked to come to the city to have a clinic. No deadline was given for pet owners to meet city requirements but it was indicated that enforcement will likely begin sometime this summer.

Once that deadline is set, then animals running loose will be picked up in a concerted effort by city employees. Gikas said he plans to appoint a committee to attack the animal problem.

PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT

Gwen Corn, representing ESA Sorority, said her group has decided to spend \$6,000 from its pheasant hunt profits, to install new playground equipment at the city park.

She said ESA prefers a large, metal piece of equipment but that a resilient ground surface is recommended, such as gravel or sand. It would be placed between the swings and the merry-go-round areas. There would be no cost to the city.

Gikas said the city has a supply of gravel which could be used for the project.

RAILROAD TRACKS

Gikas said the condition of the Santa Fe Railroad tracks over the highway between Farwell and Texico is degrading to the city. "This is a priority with me; those tracks need to be repaired," he said.

Gikas said he has called Santa Fe officials to urge that the work be done immediately. He plans to wait a week and if nothing is done, then to call other railroad officials.

If necessary, Gikas said, he will stand in the crossing and stop the trains himself. Some councilmen said others in the city would stand with him.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Gikas said he plans to set up an economic development committee. First, he will talk with members of Farwell Development to see if they would like to serve on it. Farwell Development hasn't had a business meeting in two years.

The creation of this committee is an outgrowth of an economic development meeting held at the Farwell Community Center last month.

Also, Gikas said the cost to join Triad, the area economic development unit, was \$500 a year. He plans to see if interested persons and groups would join in the cost with the city before a decision is made on whether to join.

Last month, the council sent out a questionnaire to residents asking their views on economic development. Mrs. Bowery said she hasn't compiled the results yet.

HONORING RESIDENTS

Gikas said he plans a program of honoring individuals who deserve recognition.

He has ordered proclamation forms and would like to hand out five each week. "We need to honor those who have assisted our city, those who have been successful and those who have done good deeds. This will help lead to pride in our community."

Each week, those honored will be written about in the State Line Tribune with information about them. Persons suggesting folks to

be honored should call City Hall.

CITY EMPLOYEES

Gikas plans to spend at least one day working with each of the three city employee groups: 1) the city office; 2) sewer and water department, and 3) waste pickup and disposal and parks.

"I need to know the people who work for the city and to get to know their duties," he explained. "So if we get a complaint, I'll have some knowledge of what was required."

CITY COUNCIL AGENDA

Gikas stressed that persons coming to City Council meetings need to be taken care of promptly. "If someone calls to be put on the agenda, then they will be put at the top of the agenda," he said.

If a person comes to a meeting but hasn't called first to be put on the agenda, Gikas said he will try to take care of that person quickly but that the agenda will be followed.

TOWN FORUM

Starting in May, Gikas will initiate a "town forum" whereby residents can meet with him. "It will be a time folks can air their gripes, offer innovative ideas or comment on anything for the betterment of the community. We want suggestions and recommendations to improve our community," he said.

The town forums will be held at 5:30 p.m. at City Hall on the first Tuesday of each month. This will be six days before the monthly City Council meeting and thus ensure time for Gikas to pass on the information to the councilmen before their meeting. Councilmen also will be welcome at the town forums.

CITY HALL OFFICE

Gikas has set up an office at City Hall and will have office hours from 9 a.m. to noon Mondays.

"The purpose of this office is to allow me to take care of city business and correspondence," he explained. "Also, if someone can't make a town forum, they can stop by at this time and tell me of their concerns."

Gikas stressed that he is willing to meet anytime with residents if they can't make the town forums or his City Hall office hours. All people need to do is call City Hall and schedule an appointment - at their convenience, he said.

SESIQUICENTENNIAL MURAL

Gladys Hardage, representing the Farwell Study Club, presented a \$250 check to the council toward paying for the Sesquicentennial mural on the side of City Hall. So far, \$495 has been contributed toward the \$3,600 mural, with the city paying the remainder.

Councilwoman Liz Phillips, who

has spearheaded the mural project, noted that a dedication is planned Friday (today) for the mural.

She noted that the mural still lacks one part: a whip needs to be placed in the hands of the wagonmaster.

Also, the council voted to put the Sesquicentennial sign, currently at the bottom of the mural, atop it.

NEW PARK

Gikas said one of his plans is to create a small park at the New Mexico entrance to Farwell. He plans to talk with the highway department about moving a Texas sign to the area next to the Santa Fe tracks so persons entering Farwell know they are in Texas. He also would like to see some picnic benches placed there.

It was noted that a small area across the highway from City Hall, and adjacent to the railroad tracks, was donated to the city last year.

Along the same lines, Julia Symcox, representing the Farwell Study Club, asked that the world "Texas" be placed at the end of the "City of Farwell" sign on the side of City Hall.

CITY LANDFILL

The council met with Robert Mitzelfelt about the city pits, leased on his property. Covering them has been a problem.

Gikas said the city will cover the pits properly and that councilman Fred Chandler is to oversee the work and report back to the council.

Also, due to new state rules, records of tonnage taken to the landfill must be kept. Gikas has explained the rules to city employees. It was stressed that persons wanting to take loads to the landfill must check first with City Hall.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business:

-The council designated the week of May 5-10 as city cleanup week. The landfill will be open May 10, a Saturday, free of charge to city residents. Gikas plans to appoint a committee to deal with this week.

-City Neighborhood Watch coordinator Frances Kube said eight Watch signs have been received. The council decided to place them at entrances from Ave. A and at other visible spots. City employees will install the signs.

-The council discussed repairing some curbs and gutters and a portion of the sidewalk on First Street next to City Hall. The matters will be looked into further before decisions are made.

-The council agreed to pay the fee for any city employees who wish to attend a safe-driving course in Friona.

-The council agreed to give a special plaque to former Mayor Walter Kaltwasser in recognition of his long service to Farwell.

Frankly, the student participation of this program has been disappointing. This extra help is available to all students, regardless of their grade. We have a very dedicated staff of teachers and administrators who are ready and willing to provide these services and help.

But, if a student refuses to come to tutorial, even after we have requested their attendance, there is little that can be done. But, one thing is clear, extra help is available to all students. Many failures or near failures could be prevented if the student would come for this extra help.

And we should not forget that, although the school does not impose any penalty for not utilizing the tutorial program, there are other penalties. Failure in any subject (below 70) eliminates that student's participation in all extra-curricular activities for six weeks. That's a pretty stiff penalty.

I'd like to encourage parents to have their children take advantage of this program. We need that parental "push" to get the students to take advantage of this very worthwhile program.

Funeral services were held April 10, at Memorial Estates Mortuary. Burial was in Mountain View Memorial Estates, Salt Lake City.

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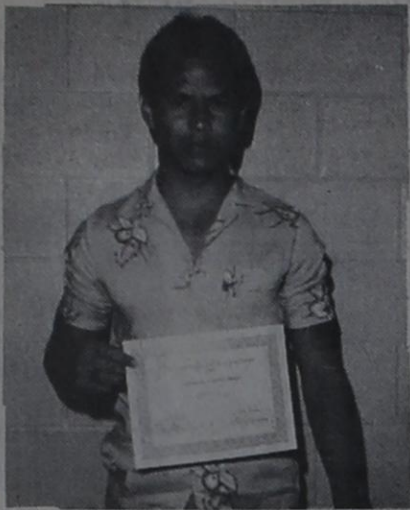
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Garcia cited as soloist

Emergency loan applications accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by hail, high winds, drought, excessive rainfall and abnormally low temperatures are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Farwell, FmHA county supervisor Weldon C. Rainey said.

Parmer County is one of 15 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Weldon C. Rainey said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses, or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate on the first \$100,000 borrower is 5 percent; interest rate is 8 percent on the balance borrowed over that amount. For farmers who can ob-

tain commercial credit but who choose to borrow from FmHA, the interest rate is 12 percent.

As a general rule, a farmers must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan, Rainey said. Farmers participating in the PIK or federal crop insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

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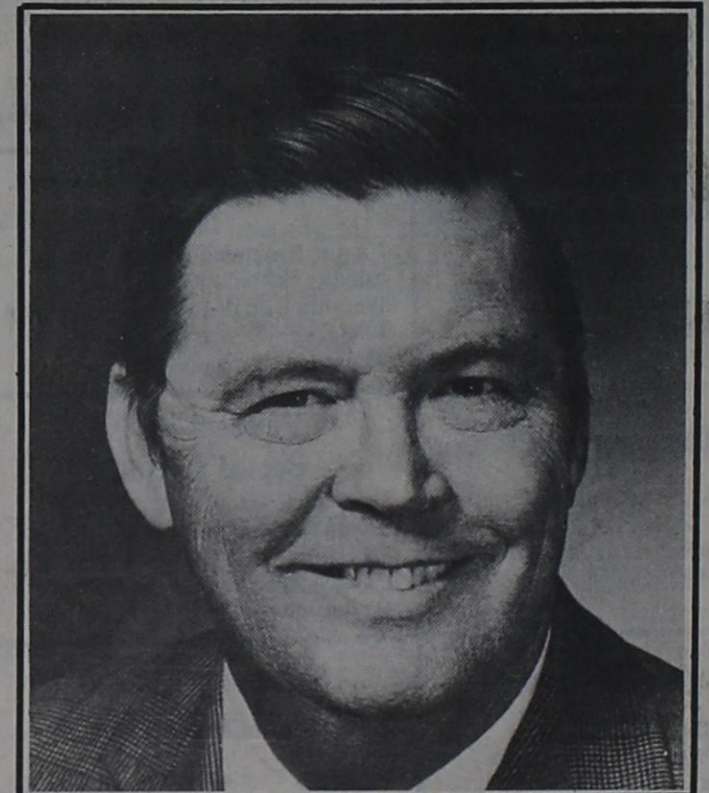
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Santa Anna burns town of Harrisburg

1836: TUESDAY, APRIL 19. Mexican forces under General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna entered the town of Harrisburg on Friday, and reduced it to ashes before moving on to New Washington. Santa Anna had hoped to capture officials of the Texas government, whose presence in Harrisburg was reported by his spies, but they had already dispersed. President David G. Burnet and Vice President Lorenzo de Zavala on Wednesday took their families to safety on Galveston Island, on the small steamer Laura. Only two Cabinet members remained in Harrisburg, Secretary of the Treasury Bailey Hardeman and Attorney General David Thomas, and both managed to escape in time.

The invading Mexican army is now scattered throughout lower Texas. It is estimated that from 700 to 1,000 are with Santa Anna. General Jose Urrea is at Matagorda with some 1,200 men; General Antonio Gaona is somewhere between Bastrop and San Felipe with about 725; General Joaquin Ramirez y Sesma is at Fort Bend with about 1,000; General Vincente Filisola is somewhere between Fort Bend and San Felipe with about 1,800; and Generals Adrian Woll, Jose Andrade, Eugenio Tolsa, Martin Perfecto de Cos and others are at various locations with smaller contingents. The total number of Mexican troops in Texas is estimated at between 5,500 and 7,500.

Secretary of War Thomas J. Rusk has joined General Sam Houston at army headquarters near Harrisburg. Today he issued another desperate appeal "To the People of Texas" to join the army. "Santa Anna himself is just below us," he states, "and within sound of the drum—has, we understand, only 500 men." He urges: "Rise up at once, concentrate, and march to the field! A vigorous effort and the country is safe! A different course disgraces and ruins you—and what is life worth with the loss of liberty? May I never survive it!"

1837: MONDAY, APRIL 17. The Texas naval schooner Independence, which sailed from New Orleans on April 10 with a crew of 31 and several passengers, was captured this morning by two Mexican brigs-of-war after a six hour battle, about 30 miles out from Velasco, its intended port. All on board were taken prisoner, including William H. Wharton, Texas Minister to the United States, returning home after having negotiated U.S. recognition of Texas on March 1. The only casualty was Captain George Wheelwright, who was severely wounded, requiring him to relinquish command to Lieutenant J.W. Taylor.

The two Mexican ships are the Libertador and the Vencedor del Alamo (Conqueror of the Alamo). They have been engaged in the current blockade of Texian ports. The



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Libertador carries 100 men and 16 9-pound guns. The Vencedor carries 100 men and six 12-pound cannons plus a long 18-pounder. It is understood that the prisoners are being taken to Brazos Santiago, near Point Isabel, and from there to Matamoros, where they will be imprisoned.

The Independence will no doubt be incorporated into the Mexican Navy. It is a former United States revenue cutter, originally named the Ingham. It was purchased for the Texas Navy late in 1835 and put into service the following January under Captain Charles E. Hawkins, who was later named Commodore of the Texas fleet. Upon Hawkins' death from smallpox last February, Captain Wheelwright was given command. It is a somewhat slow ship of 125 tons, with six 6-pound guns and one long 9-pounder. It cruised the Gulf coast and has captured or destroyed a number of small enemy craft.

The Texas Navy is now left with only two ships, the Invincible and the Brutus, both recently returned from New York, where they underwent repair. Texas was unable to pay for these repairs, and there was danger of the ships being sold for costs. The New York financier Samuel Swartwout advanced the funds and the ships were released. The Invincible arrived in Galveston on March 14, and the Brutus only last Saturday, April 15.

The two ships have been away since last September, and from that time until the present, the Independence has been alone in defense of Texas waters. It was itself laid up in New Orleans for a while.

Last October 16, a Congressional Navy Affairs Committee warned that with only the Independence to rely on, "it is in the power of the enemy, at his pleasure, to cut off our supplies, and seize upon our seaports." Mexican warships have captured and taken as prize a

number of ships bound for Texas ports, all from the United States. These include the Julius Caesar with a cargo valued at \$30,000 and the Champion, which was carrying provisions for the Texas army. The United States is expected to demand release of the ships and their crews, but the cargoes will never reach Texas.

The Invincible and the Brutus were acquired at about the same time as the Independence, early in 1836, before Texas independence had been formally declared. The Invincible is considered the flagship of the Texas fleet. It is a fast clipper-type schooner of 126 tons, of deep draught and fine lines, with two 18-pound cannons amidships and two 9-pounders plus four 6-pounders in the waist. It carries a crew of 70 men. Originally captained by Jeremiah Brown, it is now under the present Commodore of the Texas fleet, H.L. Thompson.

On April 6 last year, the Invincible, under Captain Brown, captured the American brig Pocket as it was approaching Matamoros. It was believed to be carrying supplies to the Mexican army, and this was confirmed after capture. The cargo was insured by a New Orleans company, which demanded satisfaction from Texas. The United States Navy ordered the sloop-of-war Warren to capture the Invincible and bring it in to New Orleans. This was accomplished without incident, and the captain and his crew were jailed on charges of piracy, brought by the insurance company.

The case was brought to trial before U.S. District Judge Edward Rawle on May 6. Testimony showed that powder, ammunition and other military stores were aboard the Pocket, and that it was commissioned to pick up Mexican troops in Matamoros and transport them to Texas. The court ruled that the Pocket was indeed carrying contraband, purchased with Mexican

funds from F. de Lizardi and Company of New Orleans. The cargo was condemned as a lawful prize, but the ship was held to be neutral and therefore could not be detained by Texas. Cleared of piracy charges, the Invincible and her crew were released on May 9 and sailed for Matagorda.

The Brutus is a rather slow schooner of 125 tons, armed with eight guns, carrying a crew of about 40. Captain William A. Hurd had been in command since it was first commissioned, early in 1836. However, his voyage to New York for repairs was undertaken without authorization, and when he arrived in Galveston last Saturday, he was replaced by Captain J.D. Boylan.

The importance of a navy was demonstrated to the Texians as early as September 1, 1835, when the merchant schooner San Felipe was attacked by the sloop-of-war Correo Mexicano as it approached Velasco harbor. On board were Stephen F. Austin, returning from his long imprisonment in Mexico, and Lorenzo de Zavala, later to become the first Vice President of Texas. They were rescued by the small steamer Laura.



Texico students visit Los Alamos

Science students from Texico attended the Los Alamos National Laboratory April 10 and 11. This was part of the 30th annual Science Youth Days. The students spent a full day learning about scientific advances in nuclear energy, health research, fusion, earth and space sciences and other programs currently under study at the Laboratory. 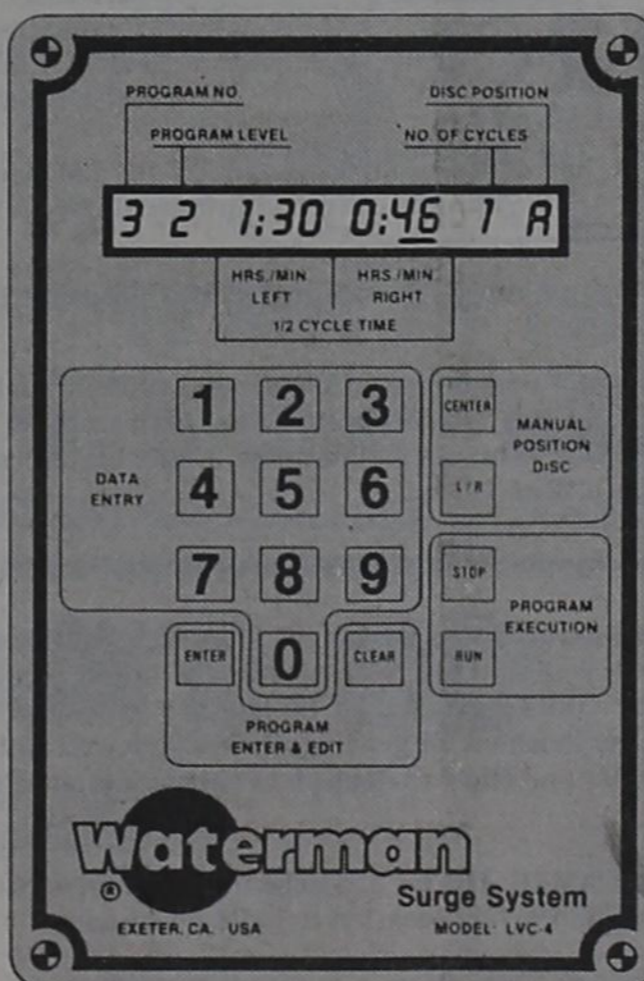

Conservation plans prepared

Bids on only 31,298 acres of land in Texas were accepted by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Conservation Reserve Program for 1986. Bids were accepted from 155 farmers.

The state was divided into seven bidding pools. The highest bid accepted for pools 1, 2, and 3 were \$35.00 per acre on 26,251 acres. These three pools made up the western half of the state.

Cropland that is in Land Capability Class VI, VII, and VIII or land that appeared to be eroding at greater than 3.5 times the tolerance level at sign-up time is automatically accepted. Land that appeared to be eroding between 2.5 to 3.5 times the tolerance level was declared questionable; Soil Conservation Service personnel will determine final estimated erosion rates on a field by field visit to this land.

Any questionable land that is de-

termined to be eroding at an estimated rate of more than three times the tolerance level with an acceptable bid will be placed in the reserve.

In determining estimated erosion, SCS personnel use the Universal Soil Loss Equation for water erosion and the Wind Erosion Equation for wind erosion.

SCS conservationists are now in the process of preparing conservation plans on land accepted in CRP. Cropland will be planted to grasses and legumes, wildlife plantings, windbreaks, or trees.

For land accepted into CRP, farmers will receive their per acre bid annually shortly after Oct. 1 for 10 years. They will also receive 50 percent cost-share assistance for establishing permanent vegetation or trees.

The sign-up period for the 1987 reserve is scheduled to begin May 5.

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

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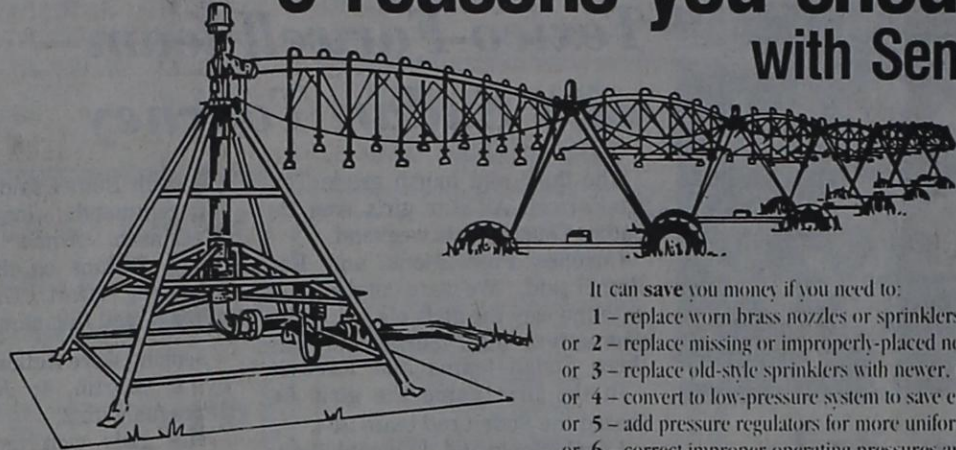
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
