provide additional direct instruction and assistance for students who are experiencing difficulty succeeding
in the regular in the regular classroom.
Any student is eligible for and
encouraged to attend tutoring sessions, but, by law, the program is
specifically targeted to specifically targeted to students
scoring below 70 or in jond scoring below 70 or in jeopardy of
scoring below 70 in a course or

Districts are required to provide
tutoring at all levels from
tutoring at all levels from grades 1
to 12 , in the subjects of English to 12 , in the subjects of English
language arts, math, social studies,
and science. At the junior high, our tutorials are built into the regular

tutoring is offered from 8 a.m. pefore scholel starts, and at $3: 30$

The Brutus is a rather slow schooner of 125 tons, armed with eight guns, carrying a crew of about 40. Captain William A. Hurd had been in command since it was first commissioned, early in 1836. How- ever, his voyage to New York for repairs was undertaken without authorization, and when he arrived in Galveston last Saturday, he was replaced by Captain J.D. Boylan. The importance of a navy was demonstrated to the Texians as early as September 1, 1835, when the merchant schooner San Felipe was attacked by the slop-of-war Correo Mexicano as it approached Velasco harbor. On board were Stephen F. Austin, returning from his long imprisonment in Mexico, and Lorenzo de Zavala, later to become the first Vice President of Texas. They were rescued by the small steamer Laura.
