

'I have accepted Jesus Christ as my Lord and Saviour'

A Texico man has found God. "My outlook on life has changed," said Raymond Duncan. "I have to get closer to the man that made me. If it wasn't for Him, I would not be here. He has a purpose for me somewhere down the line."

Duncan's feelings recently came to the fore following a near-tragic accident April 27.

A driver came to the Phillips 66 station, needing air for his tire. Duncan attempted to put air into the 14-inch rim.

"It seemed like it was okay," Duncan said. "But on the second attempt, the tire blew up. Everything went black for me. I can't recall anything after the accident."

The Texico Volunteer Fire Department was called and an ambulance transported him to Clovis High Plains Hospital. He had broken bones in both his arms.

The physician put pins and plates in both arms and scheduled surgery. In the next few weeks, he will have skin grafts, too. Currently, some of his muscle tissue still is uncovered, except for iodine and gauze tape.

He still has no feeling in his left hand and down his arm. But since the accident, he feels his life was spared for a reason.

"My life now has a feeling of fulfillment and a purpose in being

alive. It's time to get right with life and God," said Duncan. "I have accepted Jesus as my Lord and Saviour. It's a new day."

Duncan, a mechanic and carpenter, is an ex-Marine. He and his wife Cheryl have four children -- Raymond III, Shawana, Christopher and Michelle. They have lived in Texico about a year, coming

from Rock Island, Ill. Cheryl's parents are Dale and Patsy Hatcher of Texico.

An emergency fund has been set up at the Citizens Bank branch in Texico for Duncan. It is being sponsored by the Texico Volunteer Fire Department. Donations are welcome.

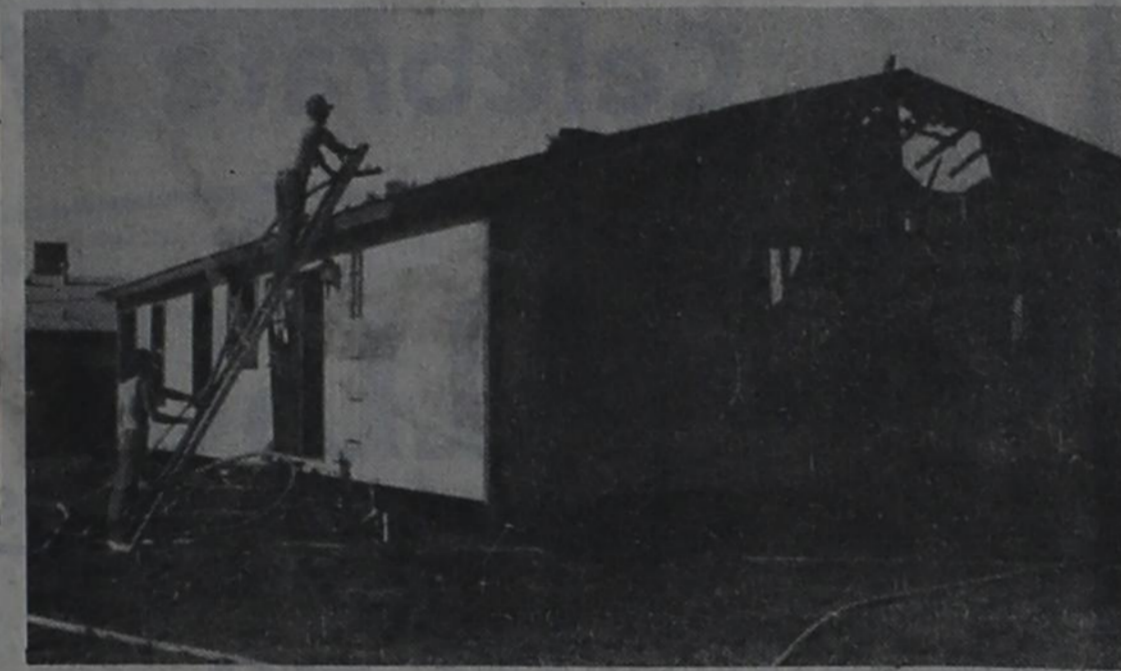
I hope I don't sound too complaining about the sport. Actually, it was really exciting. And educational.

Citizens often ask what can be done to improve the educational process in our schools. Although we feel we are providing an outstanding education for a small school, we realize that we can always do a better job. One way in which the community can help is to volunteer to work in the school system. We could utilize parents, grandparents, retired citizens, homemakers, etc. -- male or female.

Currently, no volunteers are used in the classrooms. But parents have been very helpful with a variety of activities, such as chaperones for field trips, dances, and class projects. I would like to encourage assistance in the instructional and operational functions.

There are numerous ways volunteers could help us on a regular basis. Our schedules are flexible and we hope to be able to work with a volunteer according to the amount of time they can assist. A volunteer one day per week could be utilized.

A major problem with volunteers, because of human nature, is that people tend to start off well and full of enthusiasm, then lose that enthusiasm. Consistency and dependability are all-important. I'd rather have a dependable volunteer for one hour a week than one who volunteers to work five days, but only shows up on three days. This hinders the planning process tremendously. As a matter of fact, it will kill a program.

At the elementary level, here are some of the ways volunteers can help: Assist with learning centers, work in the library, read stories to children, work with under achievers, cover lunch and recess duties, gather resource materials, work with handicapped children, reinforce the alphabet and numbers, play instructional games, run off materials, help with testing and

listen to children read.

At the secondary level, there are other ways: Serve as a resource person for social studies, assist with lab preparation, provide art or music assistance, sponsor clubs or organizations, provide general assistance in various academic areas, and help with student tutorials.

This is an abbreviated list of activities. There are numerous other ways that volunteers can help.

But, one important thing must be clearly understood. Most of the jobs are neither glamorous nor exciting.

To the contrary, the work can be very tedious and mundane. But-and I cannot stress this enough--the work is important and must be done. If we can remove some of the tedium from teachers, and we can free their time for more and better instruction. And that is what we're after -- better instruction for our children. And if you want to help -- I would like to visit with you.

Because this is a new program for our schools, we are still in the process of conducting a preliminary investigation. If a program is to be initiated, it must be done properly, with a clear understanding of goals and a true commitment from the volunteer.

Texico city marshal dismissed

The Texico City Council voted unanimously at a special meeting Tuesday to dismiss City Marshal Fred Hamner.

The decision was made after the council heard several city residents support Hamner and a letter was presented from Hamner's attorney.

It had been reported that Hamner was dismissed last week. But Councilmen Bryan Kube and Butch Tharp said he hadn't been, just that the council had asked him to resign.

Sunday, Mayor John R. Hadley told the Tribune that "Hamner was relieved of his duties because he didn't comply with personnel policies. He had one year to do it."

Hadley didn't comment further but the "one year" apparently referred to the fact that Hamner had been Texico marshal that long but still lived in Clovis.

Hamner turned in his police gear Friday.

At the Tuesday meeting, speaking in support of Hamner were five residents.

Judy Autrey said that Hamner had done an excellent job working with the city's youths. This was seconded by another lady who said that Hamner had found her runaway daughter, and had worked on his own time in that pursuit.

Dwayne Foreman noted Hamner's initiation of a Neighborhood Watch program and Mrs. Foreman said the response time by police has been faster during Hamner's tenure.

Hamner and his wife were present, too. But City Attorney Duane Hamar cautioned the council about asking Hamner questions since there was a chance of possible litigation and Hamner's attorney wasn't present.

The council received a letter from Hamner's attorney, Gilbert Gutierrez.

The letter noted that if the council had terminated Hamner in an executive session, it was illegal

under the Open Meeting Act and that any termination must be taken in open meeting and following the city's personnel policy manual.

Gutierrez said Hamner had given him authority to propose the "following resolution of this matter":

1. That the City of Texico, through its Mayor and the members of the City Council, publicly place, at their own expense, in the Clovis News Journal and distribute to the local news media a retraction stating that my client's termination was due to a misunderstanding and that, in fact, he has not broken any policy of the City of Texico other than not becoming a resident of the City of Texico, through no fault of his own;

2. That my client be reinstated immediately and receive pay to the date of his alleged termination;

3. That he be allowed to submit his resignation to the City of Texico with an effective date 30 days from the date of submission of the resignation, which would be upon reinstatement, said letter of resignation stating that due to his inability to sell his home in Clovis he would submit his letter of resignation to the City Council;

4. That the City pay his attorney fees in the amount of \$500 plus tax;

5. That nothing adverse be placed, now or in the future, in his personnel file to reflect any wrongdoing whatsoever on his part regarding his employment with the City of Texico, except that a statement would be included in the personnel file to state that on such-and-such a date my client submitted his letter of resignation, and that during his term of employment with the City of Texico he performed his duties in a satisfactory manner;

6. That my client be reimbursed for any loss in the sale of his house, which is presently under binder, the loss to be figured at the appraised value minus the selling price, plus any closing costs and financing points, the approximate value of all

said loss and closing costs and financing points being in the amount of \$4,000.

7. That my client be reimbursed for overtime he has accumulated in the total amount of 300 hours, to be paid at his regular hourly rate, figured at \$1,307.60 per month, said 300 hours of overtime due and payable at the effective date of his resignation.

Gutierrez also wrote that if the council doesn't accept the offer or discuss any possible accommodation, the letter was to be considered a request under the personnel policy manual "of a grievance submitted by my client as being terminated without cause and without authority and without justification, nor progressive discipline. My client requests that he be accorded a hearing pursuant to the personnel policy manual, said meeting to be held in the public at a reasonable time and place."

Bovina school request denied

A request by Bovina Schools Monday for its share of the funds in the county's Permanent School Fund was denied by the Parmer County Commissioners.

A motion to give the funds was made by Commissioner Tommy Williams, but was not seconded.

Present were Bovina Supt. Bob Owen and members of the Bovina School Board. They showed four bids they have received for roof repairs, ranging from \$94,000 to \$164,000. Funds from the county fund could go for this purpose if approved.

As has been the case, the commissioners again noted their stand of keeping the fund whole. The fund, more than \$900,000 earns interest. The commissioners basically feel it does more good to keep the money where it is, although if they felt a true emergency had occurred, they would apportion the funds to the school in dire need.

In other business, a governmental lease-purchase agreement was made for a John Deere front-end loader for Pct. 3 (Farwell). The cost is about \$10,000 a year.

The commissioners approved giving a Farwell woman \$194 toward paying a utility bill.

County Extension Agent Gary Patterson asked the commissioners to pay \$40 registration fees for four youths going to the state roundup at Texas A&M. The commissioners agreed.

According to a new state law, each county has to set up an Employee Salary Grievance Committee.

Parmer's committee will be chaired by County Judge Porter Roberts, a non-voting member. Members are Clyde Renner, Bobby Drake, Hubert Gohlke, Gary Renner, T.M. Caldwell, Dwight O'Brian, Frances Johnson, Ben Rejino Jr., and Joan Johnson.

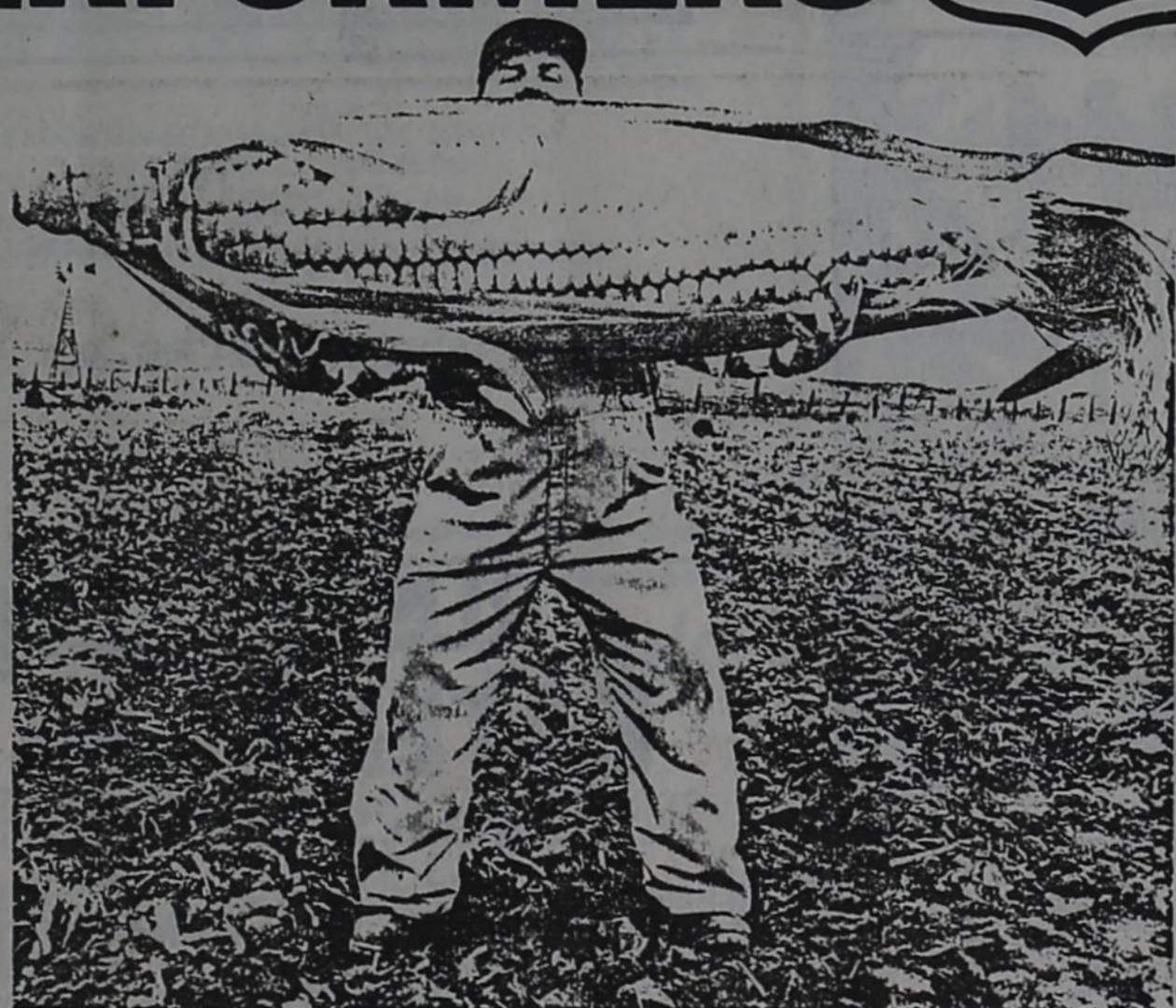
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Triad help rejected

Discussion of officers for the coming year was held. An announcement is expected this month on who the new officers will be.

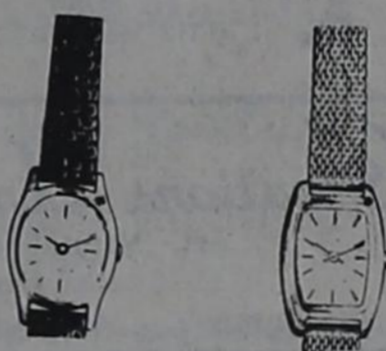

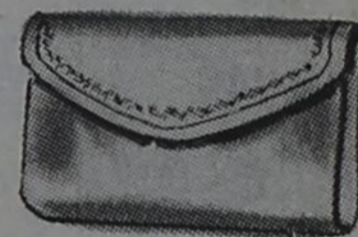
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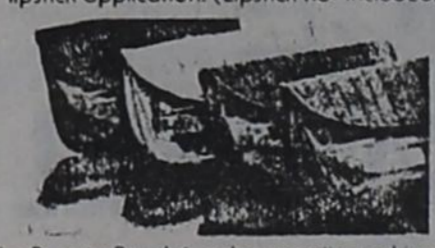
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'Kids of America '86' pageant set for May

Here are some ways to help make ends meet

BY JANETTE PIERCE

The mortgage, car payment and utility bills still have to get paid, even when money is tight. So for most of us, that means "making ends meet" is a matter of reducing household living expenses for food, clothing and home maintenance.

There must be 1001 ways to cut these expenses, certainly more than could ever be listed in this space — or that you could remember.

But there are several general strategies for cutting household expenses that you can apply to your own situation.

First, try trading time for money. Cut up your own chicken, make a casserole from scratch instead of a box and use slow-cooking methods to cook some less expensive cuts of meat. The same thing applies to many home cleaning products, substitute generic products or make your own all-purpose cleaner from vinegar and water, or ammonia and water, at home.

Trading time for money extends to careful shopping: making lists, checking ads for the best prices, coupon clipping, comparison shopping and sticking to a budget.

However, be careful about using coupons to save money on things you don't need or using up more money on gas than you saved by driving across town to get a "bargain."

Another good strategy is to think in terms of recycling or repairing anything before you consider buying. If you sew, mend or update clothes that can be worn another season or "handed down" to a younger child.

Rewire your old lamp, repair your own washing machine or fix the cracked plaster yourself. You can get step-by-step instructions on home repairs from Extension publications, library books and free pamphlets on display at many hardware and home improvement stores.

Sharing is another excellent strategy for stretching dollars. Many families commonly share some items, such as baby furniture or maternity clothes, with relatives or friends.

But also think in terms of sharing other infrequently used items. For example, if you and your neighbor

both garden, you could share the cost of a needed tool. Sharing applies to skills too. If you have a friend who knows how to change the oil on a car, you could babysit one evening in exchange for this service.

The last strategy is to simply cut back. Turn the air conditioner up or the heater down and dress accord-

ingly to cut down on utility costs. Take a careful look at your lifestyle and hunt for those things you could cut out or reduce.

You may be surprised how much money you can save by substituting time for money, recycling and repairing, sharing and cutting back. You may even enjoy some, if not all, of a simpler lifestyle.

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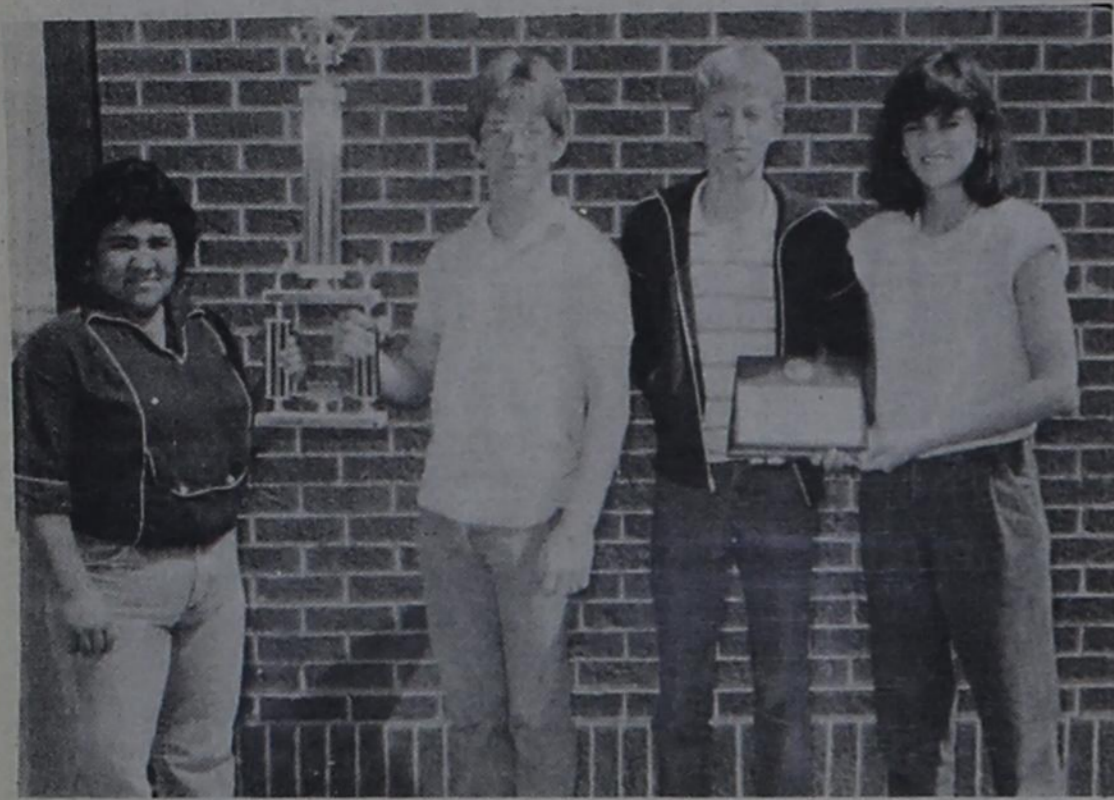

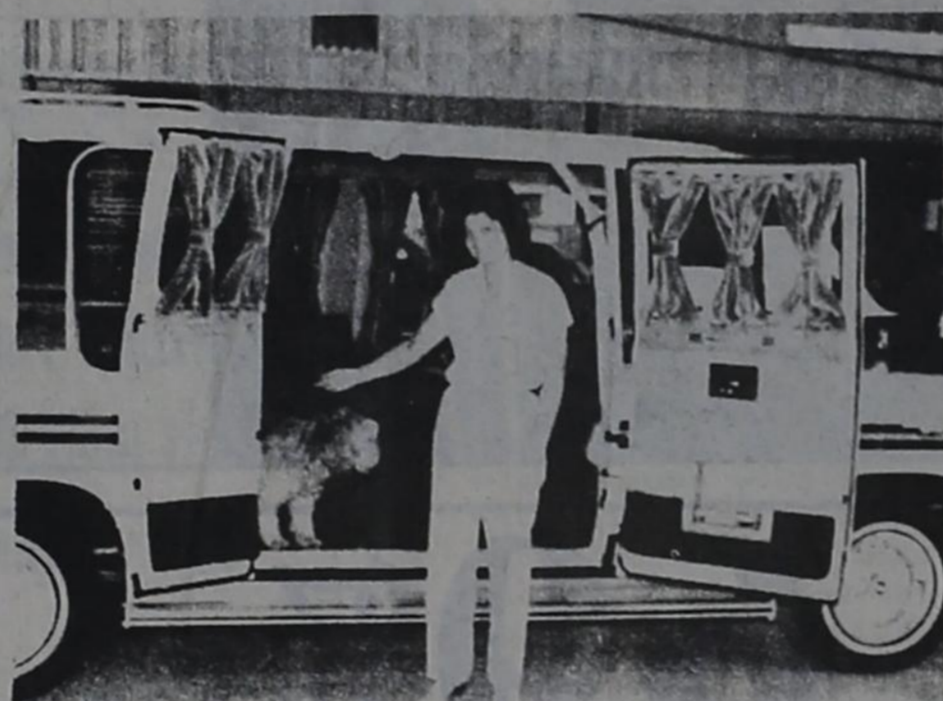

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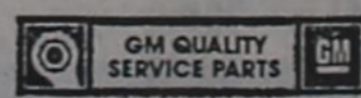

General Santa Anna to be held as hostage

1836: WEDNESDAY, MAY 4. The Mexican property captured in the Battle of San Jacinto has been sold for a total of \$11,184.87. The proceeds are to be divided among the officers and men who took part in the battle, according to a decree signed yesterday by ad interim President David G. Burnet and his Cabinet. The troops voted unanimously to present \$3,000 of their share to the men of the Texas Navy.

Yesterday General Sam Houston, in a document addressed to Secretary of War Thomas J. Rusk, listed the terms which he considers important in the government's dealing with captured Mexican President Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna. "The recognition of the independence of Texas should be sine qua non," he wrote, stating that the boundary should be the Rio Grande River, from its mouth to its northwestern source, and thence northeast to the line of the United States. He proposed that Mexico pay indemnity for all the losses sustained by Texas during the war, the amount to be determined by three commissioners, one each from Mexico, Texas and the United States, with fulfillment guaranteed by the United States.

Other points suggested by General Houston include the immediate release of all prisoners held by Mexico, and the cessation of all hostilities by sea and land. In return, Texas would release its Mexican prisoners. To make sure that these terms would be complied with, Houston urged that "General Santa Anna be retained as a hostage, with such other officers as the government may think proper, until they are recognized or ratified by the Mexican government."

1837: MONDAY, MAY 1. The second session of the First Texas Congress convened today in Houston City, but was unable to muster a quorum and

adjourned until Friday, May 5. The capitol building is still unfinished, with no roof and no seating available.

With the influx of government personnel, highlighted by a grand celebration on April 21 of the first anniversary of the Battle of San Jacinto, the town is a scene of tremendous activity. It now has a population of more than 500. Houses cannot be built fast enough, even though a sawmill has been provided by the town's promoters, Augustus and John Allen. A number of small clapboard houses have been erected, plus a few rough log cabins. The houses are about 12 feet square, plus a small storage room, with one door, hung on wooden hinges, and no windows. When light and air are wanted, one of the boards is knocked off. They are being built for \$250 a few months ago, but now cost much more. There are also a considerable

number of tents, including some large ones for saloons. One has a center pole 30 feet high.

There are several hotels but their accommodations are extremely rough. A traveller who has been in town since March as a "regular boarder," and therefore entitled to the best bed in the house, describes it in this manner: "In an open cabin

without a floor, a fork was driven into the ground a few feet from one of the corners. Poles were laid with the fork to the openings in the logs, which are covered with clapboards. Upon this platform was strewed some moss, which together with a blanket make up the whole bed. Perched upon such an eminence, I can look down with a kind of patrician dignity upon the less favored, who are littered upon the ground."

However, a new hotel and house of public entertainment in a large, commodious frame building has recently been opened by Benjamin Fort Smith. President Houston and a number of friends repaired there for a midnight supper after the San Jacinto celebration April 21.

In view of the town's fast growth, prices are very high. A carpenter can easily get \$3 per day. Meals at boarding houses cannot be obtained for less than \$1.50 to \$2 per day. Chickens are sold for \$1 apiece, and eggs as much as \$1 per dozen. Vegetables, butter and milk are very scarce, but beef is plentiful at from 2 to 4 cents per pound.

1845: TUESDAY, APRIL 29. Andrew Jackson Donelson, envoy to the Republic of Texas representing President James K. Polk, arrived in Galveston today for the purpose of urging the Texas Congress to accept

the terms of annexation being proposed by the United States.

One of President Polk's major planks in his election campaign was the annexation of Texas, and his victory is considered a mandate for

that purpose. Last December, in his final message to Congress, President John Tyler strongly advocated annexation. A bill in the form of a joint resolution was passed by both houses of Congress and signed by President Tyler March 1.
