She helps others who have lost limbs

Dora Jean Bussey, 65, moved to Farwell about four years ago and lives with her niece, Wyvonna Haney.

Mrs. Bussey lived about 39 years in Graham, Texas. She and her husband, Sherman Ottie Bussey, were married March 8, 1939 in Graham. He died in 1982. After his death she sold her home and moved next door to her old residence. Later, she moved to Farwell.

Mrs. Bussey is a miraculous person in that she has survived 17 major operations and a stroke-and bounced right back. She often asked herself, "Why me? Why has God spared me?" But the answer is quite apparent: she was needed to help others.

Since Mrs. Bussey used to be a telephone assistant operator in Decator, Texas, she had a ball helping the nurses in the hospital. From 5:30 until 9:30 p.m. Saturday evenings she spent some of her time answering the switchboard for patients.

During her stay in the hospital she was known to many as the "grinningest, talkingest woman in the hospital." She got this reputation from some of the construction workers there.

Mrs. Bussey used to be quite an artist, having painted several country paintings and many portraits of family and friends, had also done three very large

Ron Proctor, manager of the Parmer County Tax Appraisal Office, announced Wednesday that the county Appraisal Review Board has approved a reduction in the new appraisal rates.

FARWELL, TEXAS

Here is Proctor's statement:

"The Parmer County Appraisal Review Board interviewed approximately 250 taxpayers during the board hearings.

"An economic adjustment was allowed for all homeowners, rural improvements and small retail businesses.

"This amounts to approximately a 20 percent reduction which applies countywide to all above listed properties whether or not they met with the board."

The countywide adjustments come after an uproar throughout the county over the new and much higher appraisal rates. The last time properties were appraised was in 1982 and they were appraised too low at that time, Proctor has said.

Appraisals are set (and they will be announced in legal advertisements in next week's State Line

Tribune), local taxing units will set up their budgets, resulting in a set tax rate.

The process used in determing appraisals involve the grade of the house (for example), the square footage, plus the sales of residences throughout the county.

The law requires that appraisals be at 100 percent of a property's market value.

The process resulting in this year's new appraisals took about 18 months to complete.

Mrs. Bussey is a double amputee. but gets around very well in a wheel chair or on her new legs known as "Moon feet," with the help of crutches. Mrs. Bussey lost her legs below the knee due to poor circulation in relation to diabetes.

Mrs. Bussey's healing has taken a long time. From March 24 to July, she has been in the St. Mary's Rehabilitation Center in Lubbock. While in the hospital she was asked by a doctor to help others who have lost limbs. Mrs. Bussey has spent most of her life helping others so this was nothing new to her. She says one of her friends in the hospital put a sign on her door, Dr. Bussey's, Five Cents an Hour." But she told them she didn't have a license to practice medicine and that was too much money.

Mrs. Bussey went to the rooms of other amputees and counseled them on how to get on with their lives. One patient, a young man, had been afflicted with a stroke and had lost both feet.

He thought he had nothing to live for. But Mrs. Bussey knew he had something to live for, because his wife was soon to have their first child. She just asked him to get up and get going, because his wife was going to need his help. His wife had a baby boy and he was soon up and walking.

Mrs. Bussey says she really doesn't have to say much to those who want to try. All she has to do is let them see her and see how well she does and if they're going to try they will. One can't help those who won't help themselves, she says.

Among her other talents are knitting and crocheting. She has made several afghans (some the size of a large bed spread), sweaters, rugs and many baby items. When she was able, she used to sew for the public and do quilting.

She says most anything she does now takes much longer to complete because of her physical condition.

Since Mrs. Bussey has a hard time writing by hand, she uses lan electric typewriter to write letters and to keep notes on different events in her life.

Mrs. Bussey says she has been inspired by others to do well. One of the people who was a great inspiration to her was a coach from Las Vegas. She didn't remember his name, but she did remember how well he did without feet. She said he used to turn his cap sideways if he was upset with how the boys played and they knew then they had better straighten out their act.

Mrs. Bussey says, "I would rather be a midget and walk tall than a tall man and sit in a chair all the time."

Mrs. Bussey has two daughters, May Jo Day, an elementary principal at Hamilton Elementary School in Garland, and Virginia Ruth Parsons, a homemaker. She also has four grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

She is a member of Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church in Farwell and was a head officer, Worthy Matron, in the Eastern Star in Graham, in 1962.

Hassell relates details of nightmarish morning

(Editor's note: The Tribune has received permission from the Amarillo newspaper to reprint this four-part series on Parmer County's most infamous tragedy.)

George Hassell was born July 5, 1888, in Smithville, Tex., and moved to Oklahoma the following year. He ran away from home after his mother died several years later. When he was 15, he heard that his father had died near Fort Worth, and it was rumored he had been poinsoned by his wife, Hassell went home with a gun, planning "to kill the whole bunch, but got too much whiskey and did not use any gun." A short time later, his stepmother accidentally drank poison and died. Hassell embezzled some money at Abilene and was sent to the penitentiary for two years. Upon release, he enlisted in the army at Galveston under the name of Stovall, serving nine months at Fort Sam Houston before deserting. At O'Valley, Tex., he married Minnie Lofley above her family's objections. His wife and child left him after two years, whereupon he

joined the U.S. Navy. He deserted in San Francisco, but later surrendered and served three years in various prisons. After an unsuccessful attempt at reconciliation with his wife, he went to San Angelo, where he became the lover of Mrs. Marie Vogel, proprietress of a rooming house. With the woman and her young son, he set out for California. They ran out of money at Deming, N.M., but managed to raise \$100 by compromising Mrs. Vogel with a man and threatening to expose him. After working in the hay fields for a time, they moved to Whittier, Calif., where Hassell worked in the oil fields. They adopted two more small children who were delivered from Pittsburg, Pa., by Mrs. Vogel's mother. On the evening of draft registration, in 1917, Hassell argued with Mrs. Vogel about whether he should register. After drinking some whiskey, he accused her of stealing some money.



Hassell

had been kicked to death by a mule. The widow, Maud, asked Hassell to come to the farm near Blair, Okla., to help with the crops. He hitchhiked to Blair and, when the crops were in, left for Kansas to work in the harvest. Soon, he received another letter from Maud, asking him to return. Four months after his brother's death, Hassell and Maud consulted the Bible and decided they should marry.

Shortly afterward, Mr. and Mrs. Hassell moved to Farwell, bringing Maud's eight children. The union was troubled from the start because Maud learned that Hassell had been intimate with his niece. With his wife and her children aligned against him, Hassell was in constant torment. As he later said, "I was kind of a lost card."

The situation worsened when Maude saw Hassell trying to teach one of his stepdaughters to swim in a cattle tank. Accused of being intimate with the girl, Hassell announced that he was going away to work in the oil fields. His wife, rightly suspecting he was planning to desert, argued until after midnight. Hassell sat in the living room sulking, until his wife asked him to come back to the bedroom.

Before returning, Hassell made a quick trip to the barn, where he had cached a jub of whiskey. When he came to the bedroom, Maud smelled wiskey on his breath and the argument flared again. Hassell then noticed a ball-peen hammer on the floor. "I don't know where it came from -- it wasn't mine," he said. "I grabbed it up and hit her twice, very fast, and grabbed her throat to keep the sound in. Blood was everywhere, so I released her throat. She made a sound so I tied a stocking around her throat."

For a moment he halted, but now little Sammie awakened and began

crying. Hassell grabbed the boys by the throat and choked him, then tied a stocking around the crushed throat.

"So I had started and Lord God! I would have given anything in the world if I had not made that first lick, but I had started it and I was going to finish it," Hassell said of that nightmarish morning of Dec. 8.

He ran into another room and hit one of the stepdaughters in the head twice with the hammer, then strangled her. He next went to the living room, where Russell was sleeping, and sent the boys to the back bedroom where Virgil was asleep. As soon as Russell got into bed, Hassell rushed him and began choking him. Virgil sprang to his brother's aid and the boys broke free. After a struggle, Hassell rushed out of the room and his the family shotgun

Russell hid in a closet, but Hassell found him and the two fought savagely. The boys was only 12, but hard work had given him the muscles of a young man, and he put up a valiant struggle. Hassell had the upper hand when Virgil, 18

years old and strong for his size, rushed in and hit Hassell several times with a brick. Breaking free, Hassell ran into the kitchen, where he had hidden the shotgun. When

Virgil came after him, Hassell blasted him in the chest with buckshot. The boys fell next to the stove.

Russell tried to escape, but Hassell caught him before he could get out of the house and strangled him into unconsciousness. When the boy continued to wheeze. Hassell

crushed his forehead with an axe. Then he killed three more. The killer's bloodlust was not sated. One more had to die: Alton the eldest son. CONTINUED NEXT WEEK.







Smell of whiskey pervades Texas governmental meetings

1840: MONDAY, AUGUST 24. Profane swearing is one of the most prevalent vices in Texas, according to a minister visiting there, who prefers to remain anonymous. "This low and senseless vice, which has not the form of an excuse, being entirely without temptation, is practiced by high and low, Senators and Judges, officers and citizens, masters and their Negro servants," he says.

-One of those most proficient in profane swearing is Dr. Branch T. Archer, currently Secretary of War, and long prominent in Texian affairs. He is known to his associates as "The Old Roman," and justifies his use of profanity by asserting that he means to honor God by his imaginative use of words and lack of verbal inhibitions. Another accomplished master of this field is Charles Watt Moorman, a leader in the Regulator-Moderator War now raging in East Texas. He proudly claims to have "invented more oats than any other man in the world."

Another vice almost as pervasive as swearing is the drinking of ardent spirits, according to the minister. "As yet, temperance societies have made but comparatively little progress in this Republic," he reports. It is common among Texians of every station, and one of the first structures to arise in any new Texas town is a saloon.

Heavy drinking is no obstacle to candidate for office in Texas. Indeed, giving out free liquor at rallys is one of the best ways to gain support. Many top office holders have been fond of drinking, including the current Vice President David G. Burnet. A candidate for President in 1838, Charles Collinsworth, then Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, was frequently drunk, and had been on a weeklong bout when he jumped or fell from a steamer into Galveston Bay and was drowned two months before the election. The smell of whiskey pervades almost every large gathering, including sessions of Congress. Dr. Anson Jones, Senator from Brazoria, remarks that there was much drinking during the Consultation of 1835. He says: "I was introduced to Bowie--he was dead drunk; to Houston--his appearance was anything but decent and respectable, and very much like that of a brokendown sot and debauchee. The first night after my arrival, I was kept awake nearly all night by a drunken carouse in the room over that in which I 'camped.' Dr. Archer and General Houston appeared to be the principle persons engaged in the



orgie, to judge from the noise."

Ex-President Sam Houston is by far the most prominent example of this vice in Texas. During his sojourn with the Cherokees before coming to Texas, he was sometimes called by them "Big Drunk," and this appelation has stuck. An irate Texian recently addressed him in a letter as "you dam old drunk Cherokee." There are countless stories of his spectacular drinking bouts, including one in which his coat was burned off his back. He has repeatedly attempted to reform, but without success.

1842: MONDAY, AUGUST 22. Colonel Hugh McLeod and 182 prisoners of the Santa Fe Expedition arrived in Galveston late yesterday afternoon aboard a Mexican brig which left Veracruz 10 days ago. Fourteen died there while awaiting passage. The prisoners were released last June 16, largely on the basis of diplomatic pressure by the United States and England. McLeod was commanding officer of the 270-man military escort that accompanied the expedition when it left Texas on June 21 of last year, with about 50 merchants and traders, many from the United States. Three commissioners headed the expedition: William G. Cooke, R.F. Brenham and Jose Antonio Navarro. Navarro was one of the three native Mexicans who signed the Texas Declaration of Independence. He is still being held in a Mexican prison, but the other two commissioners were returned to Galveston on August 10, aboard the U.S. brig Boxer. The expedition was dispatched by then-President Mirabeau B. Lamar to invite Santa Fe citizens to join the Republic of Texas, and to set up trade arrangements with them. It was a disastrous failure. After months of tremendous hardships, during which the expedition lost the trail, faced extreme thirst and starvation, and became widely sep-arated in their desperate search for food, they were rounded up and captured without a fight by a Mexican force under the territorial governor Manuel Armijo. He informed the Mexican government of his "glorious triumphs," and received orders to march the prisoners to Mexico City. The trip was a four-month ordeal, from mid-October to February of this year. A number died along the

way, and many were treated with cruelty, vividly described by a New Orleans newspaperman, George Kendall, who had accompanied the expedition and was a prisoner along with the others.

He tells how the commander of the Mexican guard, named Salazar, enjoyed throwing pieces of bread into the air to watch the starving Texians scramble for them. He de-

scribes a tragic occurance when one of the men, John McAllister, fell behind of swollen feet. Salazar rode back and ordered him to overtake the others, which he was unable to do. In a fury, Salazar threatened to shoot, whereupon McAllister bared his chest, crying out: "Then shoot! And the quicker the better!"

Kendall continues: "Salazar took him at his word, and a single ball sent as brave a man as ever trod the earth to eternity. His ears were then cut off, his shirt and pantaloons stripped from him, and his body thrown by the roadside as food for wolves." The ears were needed by Salazar to prove that the prisoner had not escaped. This was standard practice for all who died en route. At El Paso the prisoners were turned over to a Mexican army unit, and they were treated less harshly. They were paraded through every Mexican city en route. They finally reached Mexico City in February, and were dispersed to prisons in Mexico City, Puebla and to Perote Prison in Veracruz, where most were assigned. There they were placed in chains and forced to haul rocks for construction, and to underto other hardships and indignities. About one-third of those who originally joined the expedition are now dead, killed by Indians and by Mexicans, or from disease and fatigue. Also many Texians believe that the brief invasion of San

Antonio, Goliad and Refugio last March by the Mexicans was in

retaliation to the expedition. President Lamar dispatched it
