Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- · the market or appraised value of your property
- · the unequal appraisal of your property · the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- · any exemptions that may apply to you · the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- · the taxable status of your property
- · the local governments which should be taxing your property • the ownership of property
- . the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- · any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affects you.

(Insert description of appraisal district's informal review process, if any, then give name and telephone number of person taxpayer

should contact.) If you wish to have an informal review of your property with

our staff, please come to our office in Bovina, M-F, 8:30am to 5pm except holidays.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. The law provides that before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any written material intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented

appraisal before the hearing, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator or SOAH

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. In certain cases, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may file, not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order, a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district. In certain cases originating in certain counties, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may appeal to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH). An appeal to SOAH is initiated by, not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order, filing with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district a notice of appeal. Appeals to District Court, Binding Arbitration, or SOAH all require payment of certain fees

or deposits. Tax Payment

You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the

property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good

Late protests are due the day before the ARB approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a

required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

Live Cattle prices came back strong late last week with ash trade back up around the \$128.00 level. Attempts to take out the March lows have been tried and tested many times over the last few weeks and the market is once again showing a spark of strength. The nearby June will eventually need to move above the \$124.50 level in order to turn long term trends back higher.

Feeder prices also moved sharply higher last week and actually showed significantly more strength than did the Live Cattle price. Feeders have been under considerable pressure in the cash side of things and cash prices will need to show some strength over the near term if the May contract is to continue to move higher For now, prices look like they could go higher, but there needs to be a higher close on Monday.

Soybean prices were quick to come back off their six month lows and saw a couple of very strong days up last week. A close above \$14.00 basis the July contract could push the market back up into the top of the six month trading range. It was previously thought that planting delays in the Mid West may actually shift acres from corn to beans, but current market action looks to be just the opposite.

Corn prices took out their April lows last week before seeing a weak recovery back up into Friday's close. It was positive that prices traded below and closed back above their April lows, but this market may have an iphill battle fundamentally this season. The overall sentiment at this time is to expect lower corn prices. This comes from analysts and traders alike. Markets like this usually will trade higher before lower?

Wheat prices finally showed some strength after veeks of doing nothing. Weather damage created by sev eral fronts which brought freezing temperatures reportedly have done some of the worst damage ever recorded. but until there is either an official report or harvest proves out the expected decline in production, prices could find it difficult to continue their current rally? Market is trying to move higher.

Cotton prices took out some very important support levels last weeks which could be turning the long term trends back down. There is little demand coming out of China at this time and prices are beginning to reflect this. There could possibly be some weather scares which give the market a bounce back higher, but for now, the market looks like it could be in some trouble. The \$82.00 level is next support basis December.

Call completion problems grow

Long-distance call completion problems have reached near-epidemic proportions in some rural areas of the country.

Amy Linzey, CEO/general manager, says West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative is well aware of the frustrating issue and is working with federal regulators to address the problem for WTRT service customers.

"Many telephone customers in rural communities all over the country have reported not receiving calls they should, and experiencing poor quality when they do get calls. Frustrated consumers often blame their local telephone companies, but rural telecommunications companies are not at fault," says Ms. Linzey.

"It's believed that most rural call completion problems stem from a practice called least-cost routing (LCR), where long-distance carriers send calls destined for rural consumers to intermediate providers to reduce expenses. In many cases, calls are not properly routed to their destination, and, as a result, some calls may be of poor quality and many calls are not connecting at all. This means rural consumers may be missing important phone calls.,"

The Federal Communications Commission recently announced that a national long-distance provider will pay a voluntary fine of almost \$1 million as part of an investigation into the company's efforts to route and complete calls to rural communities.

Still, policy makers need to do more to put an end to the epidemic of call failures once and for all," said Ms. Linzy. "This also shows that local telecommunications providers like WTRT are not to blame and that this problem is part of a much larger issue associated with our country's telecommunications networks.."

WTRT customers are urged to continue to let the FCC hear about their long-distance call issues.

"Report problems to your wireless provider if you are using a wireless phone. If using a wireline, report to the wireline provider on the originating end of your call," Ms. Linzey advised. "When notifying the FCC of a problem, provide as much information as possible on every problem call, including its date and time, and the number that the call originated from. Attempt to contact the originating providers if possible, before contacting the FCC," she instructed.




