Competing visions for America

Just Passing Through Will Anderson

The U.S. Constitution makes no mention of political parties. The Founders, in fact, were horrified to think that their newly-born United States would ever have political parties like those they had observed during their years as colonies back in the mothercountry of Britain.

There were two competing visions, to be sure, with Thomas Jefferson's Republican faction and Alexander Hamilton's Federalist faction, but they did not function as political parties.

Despite this fact, Americans throughout our history continue to see the ghost of Jefferson competing with the ghost of Hamilton for the soul of the nation.

The Jeffersonians placed complete faith in the American individual who would be empowered by having small government, minimal taxes, and a level playing field in which citizens could pursue personal goals.

The Jeffersonians insisted that with the power of the collective diminished, each individual could improvise, innovate, and prosper and the entire American people would benefit as the combined effects of millions of success stories powered the collective of the society for the good of the whole.

The Hamiltonians placed all their emphasis on the collective first, maintaining that as the collective of the society advanced, individual Americans would

The Hamiltonians demanded the success of the collective people would have to be entrusted to a political elite class – wealthy, educated, and raised from birth to conduct the governance of the American Republic for the good of the great mass of Americans who were to be excluded from national affairs for which they were neither intellectually capable nor classically trained to understand, much less participate.

Our first president, George Washington, was a wealthy, educated squire from a blue-blood Virginia family, and as commander in the successful War of Independence, the overwhelming choice of all patriots. The Hamiltonians fully anticipated he would remain president for life and establish the Washingtons as the royal family – the hereditary kings – of the first American dynasty.

Washington shocked Americans when he refused that chance and relinquished his power after only eight years as president. The world had not seen

such true statesmanship on the grandest of scales since 439 BC when Cincinnatus refused the dictatorship that had been eagerly thrust into his grasp following his victory in war, voluntarily surrendering his power to a Roman Senate.

Our second president, John Adams, was a wealthy, educated squire from a blue-blood Massachusetts family, and he was (unlike Washington) a staunch Hamiltonian. Protective of his regal status and easily stung by any criticism, he actually rescinded the Bill of Rights in 1798 (only nine years after they had been ratified), imprisoning his detractors and impoverishing their families.

He was our first one-term president, overwhelmingly rejected by the American voters in 1800 in favor of the most Jeffersonian of his time, Thomas Jefferson himself.

The next three presidents – Jefferson, James Madison, and James Monroe – were all rewarded with two terms and all stepped down, like

The election of 1824 with its four candidates failed to provide a majority of the electoral vote to any candidate, throwing it to the vote of the House of Representatives, just as stipulated in the Constitution. Adams contrived with Speaker of the House, Henry Clay, to win (or, probably more accurately, to steal) the election from Andrew Jackson, promising Clay appointment to Secretary of State in the eight years of an Adams administration and the creation of a Clay administration to follow thereafter.

It was that tainted election of 1824 that was to force the creation of our Republic's first political party, the Democrat Party. Its appearance in 1828, the "Jacksonian Democracy" it ushered in, and the rough and tumble of political parties were to change the political landscape of the Republic for all time.






