The recent release of unofficial census figures showed that Farwell had a 16% gain in population in the past decade. The same figures indicated that Friona had a 50% gain and Bovina, a figure halfway in between. This puts the county seat as low man on the county totem pole. We wonder how long the rest of the county is going to put up with us as the county seat.

The census indicated that the Sam Aldridge -towns have grown at the expense of the rural population. We had realized that many rural folks had moved their homes to town, but did not realize that apparently there has been a decline in the number of farm laborers in the county. This is probably a reflection of lowered prices coupled with higher wage demands, forcing alternatives to human labor usage. While our area's overall growth was not as much as we would have liked, we are in much better shape than the large number of Texas towns that lost population in the soaring sixties.
